Hunt Leftists

ISTANBUL, Turkey (UPI) — Armed police backed by army soldiers patrolled Istanbul today, nunting for leftist terrorists who plotted to kidnap the U.S. and Israeli consuls and killed an American soldier.

Police said Sunday they learned of a plan by the ultra-leftist Turkish People's Liberation Front to abduct Robert B. Houghton, the U.S. consul general in Istanbul and Israeli Consul Berl Zerubavel, in a pre-dawn raid Saturday in which two leading liberation front members were killed and two others injured.

The same group launched a precision ambush Friday in the Istanbul suburb of Atakoy.

Dose Higher

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government again increased its estimate of the maximum radiation exposure to people near the Three Mile Island nuclear reactor, but insisted that only one fatal cancer case would result.

A new report on the health effects of the March 28 accident at the plant near Harrisburg, Pa., increased the maximum dosage estimate - in person rems from 3,500 to 5,300.

Earlier estimates came to 1,800 person rems. The new report put the average dosage level at 3,300

person rems. Specific personal dosage levels are measured in millirems, and the report said: "The maximum dose that an individual located offsite in a populated area might receive is less than 100

Funds Aplenty

WASHINGTON (UPI) - There should be plenty of federal money to run the 1980 presidential election, even though Americans in increasing numbers are failing to check the box that permits \$1 of their taxes to be spent on cam-

But there is not enough cash to finance any of the various plans for federal funding of House and Senate elections now being considered in Congress, even if the plans passed this year, however t is unlikely they would go into effect in 1980.

Big Laotian Family Begins a New Life

MANCHESTER - After nearly four years in a refugee camp in Thailand, a Laotian family of 12 traveled many miles in 28 hours to reach a haven of new life and new opportunities.

Arriving in Manchester Friday night after having landed at Bradley Field, the parents and their 10 children, ranging in age from a few months to 21 years, showed the effects of weariness Saturday when visitors and other Manchester Laotian families made welcoming visits.

They are living on the second floor of the Odd Fellows Building, which was recently renovated to house refugee Laotian families. There are three families living on the third

This is the first Laotian family

being sponsored by St. James 1970 to 1973, he worked for the Public Church. Mrs. Terri Parla, chairman of arrangements for the parish sponsored family, said the church had a family reserved for sponsorship in 1977, but the family hasn't been able to leave its refugee camp. She didn't

The St. James parish members will be companions and friends to the new family, and help them get on their feet, Mrs. Parla said.

Members will take the family shopping, and help teach them English. although there is a volunteer who comes in daily to teach the other

Khamsao Keovilay, the father, 49, studied paramedics in the refugee camp in Thailand. He speaks some English and French. He was a lieutenant colonel and battalion commander in the Laotian Army. From

Health Division of U.S. AID as a public medical supply officer. From 1974 to 1975, he owned a private transport company.

Speaking in broken English, he described the 40,000 member refugee camp where his family had lived. Most families had only a nine-squarefoot room they called home, but because his family was so large, Khamsao said they had two such rooms. Cooking was done outside in a thatched roofed "cooking house."

Although many items have been donated by Catholic Services for the Laotian family's comfort, there are still many things needed, one of which is some kind of kitchen cabinet

the Town of Manchester had not been determined this morning although Town Manager Robert Weiss said he did not expect a major drop in the taxes paid to the town next year by the J.C. Penney Co.

Construction and the ordering of equipment needed for the operation were not started until legal cases involving the proposed J.C. Penney project were resolved

The construction schedule was revamped and accelerated to meet the 1980 deadline, but the arrival of the equipment apparently will be delayed because of the late ordering.

The town will lose all personal property taxes that J.C. Penney would have paid on such equipment until the center is operating, Weiss said. He could not estimate the exact total of those taxes.

He did not expect any substantial difference in the amount of real estate property taxes paid by the firm although less taxes will be paid until the building is completed. No exact date for the opening was

Kennedy Offers Insurance Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sharply attacking President Carter's 'piecemeal approach," Sen. Edward Kennedy today introduced a national health insurance plan to provide cradle-to-grave care for all Americans and sharply control skyrocketing medical costs.

Under the bill, every resident of the country would be issued a health insurance card and be guaranteed hospital and doctor care at set fees regardless of income.

It differs sharply from Kennedy's previous two attempts to get the controversial legislation through Congress because it would put strong emphasis on private health insurance as well as government financing for the poor and elderly. Kennedy announced his plan at a

news conference attended by Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., chairman of a House committee which will soon begin hearings on the plan soon.

Waxman's support was seen as a coup for Kennedy in his battle with Carter over when and how to get

national health insurance. Kennedy's phased plan would begin going into effect in the early 1980s as would President Carter's plan, which has not yet been introduced in Congress. But the Carter approach is much more cautious, because it's

phase-in would depend on the state of the economy. "There are those who believe that comprehensive national health insurance, however desirable, is inconsistent with today's budgetary politics," Kennedy told a news conference, obviously referring to the

The glass works, on Pitkin Street was the first glassmaking factory in Connecticut. It was built in 1783 and was in operation until 1830. The Pitkin family was granted a monopoly to produce glass flasks in exchange for having supplied the Continental Army with gunpowder.

Budget Hearing Tonight

SOUTH WINDSOR - The public will get another chance to comment on the general government budget tonight at 7 p.m. when the Town Council holds the second public hearing, on the proposed budget, before final adoption.

Tonight's public hearing was suggested by Mayor Nancy Caffyn

because of the massive changes in the proposed budget request since the first public hearing on April 30. Mrs. Caffyn said she felt the public "should get another chance to com ment because the new budget proposal is so different from the one presented at the last public hearing." If the public approves - which seems likely judging from public response to the council's desire to cut the original budget - the proposal could mean a drop in South Windsor's tax rate from 40.8 mills to 39.4 mills. The tax rate decrease would be possible only if the council agreed to the originally proposed cut of \$145,-000 in the Board of Education budget and does not restore any monies to

the board budget.

Town Manager Allan Young had proposed a \$6.3 million general government budget, representing a 14.8 percent increase over this year's allocation. Mayor Nancy Caffyn, however, asked Young to present a new budget which would represent no more than a 7 percent increase. The new budget, drawn up by Young represents a 7.2 percent in-crease. Most of the cuts in the new budget have come from the area of capital improvements. Last week the Town Council reviewed the capital improvement requests with Young

eliminating all for what Young said were "not top priority items." Most of the items cut were drainage work, park improvements and purchase of open space property.

The top priority projects, which were not slashed from the new budget, include repairs to the police radio system, ball fields and the Sand Hill Road culvert which Young said is deteriorating and could become dangerous if not handled this year. In a statement issued last week Mrs. Caffyn said that she felt it was unfair to ask the taxpayers to fund in one year, so many capital im-provements which would be enforced






