While it may not yet be possible to answer all the questions that in plants of the same design, but also in those built by other are in people's minds, we urge you to seek out facts and to avoid the emotionalism which obscures truth and impedes the making of rational decisions. Northeast Utilities is committed to candor and openness in communicating with the public about nuclear matters. The entire nuclear industry and the government agencies that regulate it share the responsibility to eliminate confusion in times of emergency and to assist the public in developing a basic understanding of nuclear technology and to place in perspective

What is known of radiation levels at Three Mile Island? While there were conflicting reports of leaks and emissions following the accident and, while controversy continues over the levels of radiation dosage considered biologically safe, it is now known that the largest dose any individual living within five miles of the plant could have received was no more than the average Connecticut resident receives from annual exposures to medical x-rays. Moreover, the head of the Food and Drug Administration said there has been no risk to the area's food or drinking water.

The most frequent questions we receive concern the safety of Northeast Utilities' nuclear plants. Could an accident similar to that of Three Mile Island occur at Millstone or Connecticut Yankee? While it may take months to determine exactly what happened at Three Mile Island, on the basis of what we know to date we feel confident in stating that the likelihood of such an accident occurring at the nuclear plants we operate, Connecticut Yankee and Millstone, is remote. This confidence is based on significant differences in plant design, pipe layout, installed equipment and operating procedures.

Nevertheless, there are lessons to be learned from the accident. Accordingly, even prior to any federal actions. Northeast Utilities appointed a 15-person task force to study the Three Mile Island accident sequence, identify possible implications for Northeast Utilities' plants and recommend appropriate changes.

The question about human error must be dealt with. For this reason, we place great emphasis on the importance of training highly competent operators. Our nuclear plant operators receive the best training that can be provided. They take refresher courses egularly and are continually updated on procedures. In training and retraining, they use sophisticated equipment that simulates a broad band of emergency conditions, not unlike the training

manufacturers, such as those of the NII system. We shall meet all new standards and requirements with the objective of further strengthening reactor performance and safety. This will make our plants even safer than they are now.


Nuclear Power — Energy for Today

While the chances of a nuclear accident here are even less as a result of the extra precautionary measures being taken, the matters of risk assessment and choice among the alternatives still remain. It must be recognized that there is no energy source available today that is risk free. Every technology brings with it a certain risk. It is left to society to decide whether or not the risk justifies the benefit.

We at Northeast Utilities continue to examine alternatives, while at the same time take all necessary actions to continue and to better, if possible, our record of safe operations. While the economics of power supply is important, we give first consideration to public health and safety.

Coal, for example, is mentioned frequently as an alternative But in New England, where air and water quality are of such concern to the public, burning coal is not the answer. To produce the amount of electricity in a coal plant to equal the output of Millstone I and II, a supply of coal would have to be delivered everyday on a train a mile long. The waste would amount to 1,600 tons of sludge and ash each day, and the disposal, if such a site could be found, would fill a hundred-acre area two to three feet deep every year. And this is without even mentioning the health hazards and deaths associated with mining, as well as the dangerous pollutants emitted when coal is burned, including

The use of oil can no longer be viewed as a long-term energy choice. It is hard to know which is worse: the rising cost of imported oil, or the rising uncertainty of its availability as the oil producing nations manipulate supply as an instrument of international politics. Last year, nuclear power produced by Northeast Utilities replaced some 23 million barrels of oil, saving





South Windsor Council **Restores School Funds**

Monday night concluded its budget deliberations by restoring \$20,000 to the Board of Education budget and reducing the general government budget by \$20,000, by voting against the proposed hiring of a

The lengthy and often heated deliberations began at 7 p.m. with the se-cond public hearing on the general government budget. Monday's public hearing was intended to give the public the opportunity to speak on the new budget, reduced at the request of Mayor Nancy Caffyn by an additional \$337,0000, sliced from capital

Although most in attendance at the public hearing spoke in defense of the udget cuts, some of the 35 persons present criticized the Town Coucil for its \$145,000 cut in the school board budget. Board member Marge Hutensky ignored repeated out-of-order rulings, charging that the council was irresponsible in proposing a tax cut when it pared away at the Board of Education budg

"This town can obviously afford a minimal school board budget," shouted Mrs. Hutensky. "The people of this town cannot be fooled." Following verbal attacks against individual council members, for what she terms "gross irresponsibility," Mrs.

Hutensky left the meeting.

David Perkins of Scott Drive asked why the additional cut in the captial improvements area was not deliberated prior to the first public hearing. "We did review the budget," answered Mayor Caffyn. "We asked specifically for the public to consider the area of capital

'Did you get input from the public in that area?" asked Perkins. "No," answered Mayor Caffyn. "So essentially they (the \$337,000) are cuts deliberated only be the council," said

A straw vote taken at the close of the public hearing showed 26 persons in favor of the additional \$337,000 in budget cuts, four in favor of additional cuts and none in favor of restoring the monies to the general government budget.

A special Town Council meeting scheduled for the purpose of adopting both the general government and Board of Education budgets convened at 8 p.m. Republican Councilman Robert Sills surprised fellow GOP council members by amending the resolution to adopt the Board of Education budget of \$8,091,738. Sills proposed adding \$20,000 to the board budget so that additional repairs, primarily in the elementary schools, could made. Herald Corresponden HEBRON - In a 123-79 vote, Monday night, Hebror residents rejected a proposed combined budget of \$2,945,420 but didn't give any direction to the Board of Finance as to what they wanted it to come back with. Some 200 persons attended the meeting to act on the Board of Education and general government budgets. An

attempt was made to split the two proposals but the mo-

tion failed by a resounding nay voice vote. Before the meeting several persons, mostly involved with education, urged the rejection of the education budget which reflected a \$63,700 cut recommended by the Board of Finance. Joseph Pelletier, chairman of the school board, and the Hebron Education Association, were among those urging its rejection.

The association members said that the finance board cut would severely affect the quality of education and would cause the curtailment of enrichment programs such as instrumental music, library books, and field trips as well as curtailing the buying of instructional supplies. Following a brief discussion, last night, the finance board moved to adopt the proposed budget and that was he motion that was defeated The finance board now must return with another

budget, within two weeks. This meant that the finance board, at a special meeting following the town meeting, had to delay action on adopting the budget as well as setting a mill rate. The board was prepared to set the rate at 43 mills, a two mill reduction from the current rate.

Although the recommended budget wasn't adopted, no motion or action was taken by any of the residents to give direction to the finance board as to what it expected the board to bring in for further consideration. The finance board will meet again on May 23.

In other action the meeting adopted a resolution to require that all residents of Hebron and non-residen property owners, as of the Oct. 1, 1979 Grand List, be required to pay their property taxes in two installments one on July 1, 1979 and the other on Jan. 1, 1980. The residents also voted unanimously to pay all motor vehicle taxes in one payment.

VERNON - Ronald Hine, director public works, reminds residents hat they must use legal sized containers for the refuse collection. The containers must have handles on them and not be in excess of 30-gallon

Refuse or garbage placed out in paper bags will not be collected but plastic bags are acceptable. Dirt and stones, dog or cat feces should not be put into barrels or bags. This also includes glass as several of the workers have suffered severe injuries, Hine said.

Building materials, old tires or auto parts are not acceptable for either refuse or large item pickup. Brush in amounts that can be tied will be picked up but anyone having brush coming from taking down whole trees or from land clearing, must be disposed of by the land
