Few State Stations Open This Weekend

By United Press International Gov. Ella Grasso has warned Connecticut motorists that gasoline won't be flowing freely this weekend, saying as few as 20 percent of the stations will be open.

But public and private officials Thursday said there should be sufficient supplies of gasoline if people use their own cars.

The Connecticut AAA and AAA motor clubs predicted around 68 percent of the state's gas stations would be open Saturday, 19 percent Sunday and 22 percent Monday.

There's no reason at all to panic," said Alan Sagal, spokesman for the state Office of Policy and Management.

Massachusetts. New Hampshire: Gas situation stable; American Automobile Association predicting no shortages through end of month, including holiday weekend.

Rhode Island: Gas supply adequate for Memorial Day and last few days of May, but AAA says most stations plan to close Sunday, May 27, and Monday, May 28.

Vermont: Gas situation stable but state Thursday set up a 500,000 gallon set-aside program to ensure supplies through the month; few weekend closings, no lines.

RAIFORD, Fla. (UPI) — Convicted killer John Spenkelnik was put to death today in Florida's electric chair, the first person to be executed in the United States since Gary Gilmore went before a firing squad in Utah in 1977.

Spenkelnik, who waged a 5 1/2-year legal battle to escape the executioner, was strapped into the chair by his wrists, arms and legs shortly after 10 a.m. EDT.

A black hood was dropped over Spenkelnik's face and the first jolt hit him at 10:12 a.m. EDT, quickly followed by two more surges.

The only indication he was being electrocuted came when he clenched his fist, which was resting on the arm of the electric chair.

Gas Prices Spark Rise In Inflation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gasoline prices shot up in April at the fastest inflation rate since the 1974 Arab oil embargo, sparking a steep 1.1 percent rise in consumer prices, the government reported today.

Food costs now have climbed at double digit rates for five consecutive months and were 11.7 percent higher than a year ago.

Gasoline prices, the nation's newest inflationary headache, skyrocketed by 6 percent during April. It was the largest monthly increase since a 7.3 percent jump in March, 1974 at the tail end of the oil embargo imposed by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

Gasoline costs now have jumped 14.4 percent during the first four months of 1979. That is an annual rate of 49.6 percent, the Labor Department said.

But fuel was not the only problem area. Food prices increased by 0.9 percent.

August Hearing Set in CD Case

That timetable, however, could become nonbinding if the town appeals the temporary injunction Blumenthal issued a week ago.

The temporary injunction keeps the town from withdrawing from the Community Development program until there is a hearing on the merits of the entire case challenging the town's decision to withdraw.

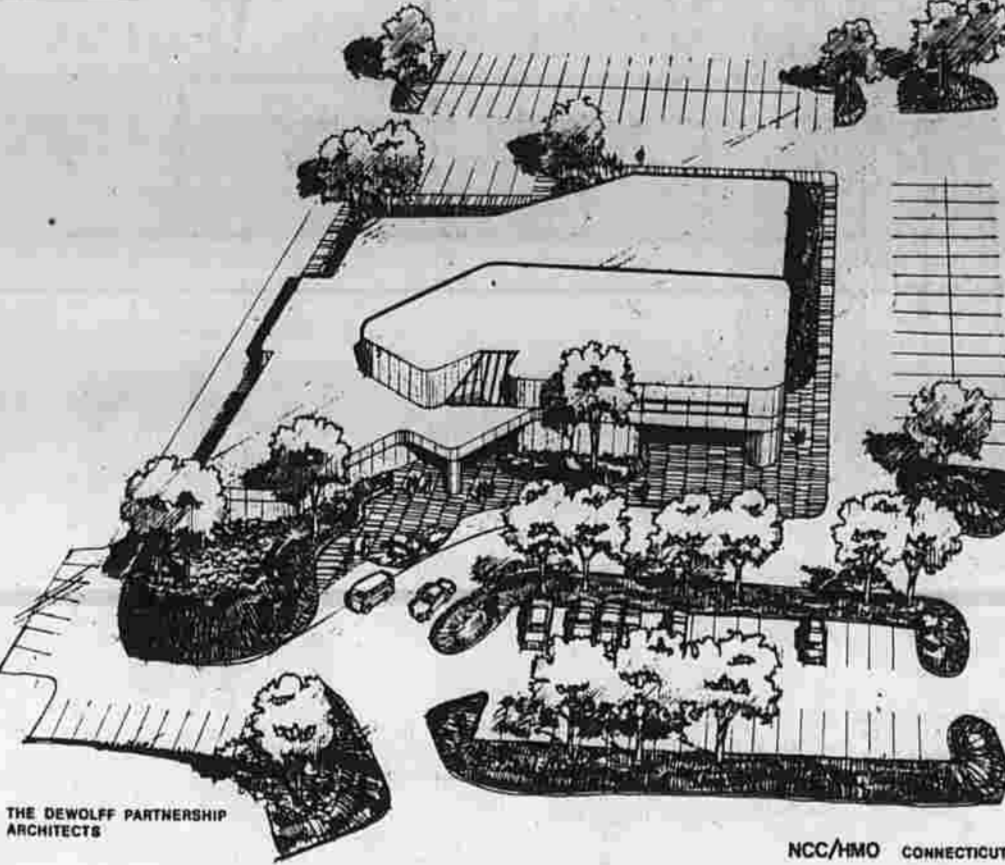

Area HMO Starts Work For New Health Center

EAST HARTFORD - North Central Connecticut Health Maintenance Organization held groundbreaking ceremonies Thursday morning for construction of its 30,000-square-foot ambulatory health center to be built on Ash Street in East Hartford.

NCC/HMO, which will open on June 1 from interim facilities on site, will provide comprehensive health care services to its members who will be drawn from the 13 towns in the Greater Hartford area.

NCC/HMO, a staff model health maintenance organization, is a prepaid health program that will be offered to members through area employee groups as an alternative to their present health benefits.

The \$2-million dollar Health Center will house complete primary care and basic emergency health services including physicians, offices, examination rooms, laboratory, pharmacy, physical therapy, an optical center and mental health care facilities.

Primary care physicians will be on staff, providing medical care to NCC/HMO members on a full-time basis. Members will have access to health care 24 hours a day.

Interim facilities, already on site consist of specially designed prefabricated medical units, that will enable NCC/HMO to provide comprehensive, quality health care while the main center is under construction.

NCC/HMO is currently undergoing application procedures for designation as a federally qualified HMO under Department of Health, Education and Welfare guidelines. It is expected that NCC/HMO will receive its federal qualification the program's opening on June 1.

When fully operational, NCC/HMO will provide health care to an estimated 30,000 members. An HMO provides its members with complete health care (primary care, emergency services, home visits, and hospitalization) for a fixed monthly prepayment, thus holding down individual's health care costs to virtually one fixed, predetermined amount. Its backers say, NCC/HMO will have primary care physicians on staff (specialists in internal medicine and pediatrics) and will utilize the services of noted area physicians in all major specialties, on a contractual basis.

The program will also offer the services of area hospitals, including St. Francis Hospital and Medical Center, Hartford and Mount Sinai hospitals, to members who are in need of hospitalization.

School Achievement Studied in Vernon

VERNON - The Vernon School system, in compliance with state law, will conduct an educational evaluation and remedial assistance plan to provide a planned program of instruction to raise achievement in basic training, language arts and math skills.

This is to be provided for at least those students who are performing below the statewide level of expected performance.

School officials said that the objectives of the plan are to have an established procedure for identifying students requiring remedial services, in compliance with state statutes, to implement programs, to use achievement test results as one portion of the procedure of evaluation, and to make necessary changes in the instructional program.

The procedure for the implementation of remedial assistance will include the screening of general achievement test results to identify those students who may need remedial assistance as indicated by their level of performance in relation to ability.

The data will also be analyzed, as it has been in the past, to determine if students are achieving at a level that is consistent with students established by the school system.

Students achieving at, or below, the 25th percentile, based on national norms, on the general achievement tests will be screened for possible inclusion in a remedial program.

Also, in some cases, referrals from classroom teachers, concerning non-achieving students not eligible for other remedial programs, may be considered by the Modified Planning and Placement Team.

Members of the team will eliminate from the list those students not eligible for assistance such as those students whose needs are being met already through special education programs or state-funded bilingual education programs.

The placement team would then refer all other students for diagnostic assessment such as educational assessment of the academic areas. Psychological evaluation (individual intellectual assessments) may be recommended when additional information is required.

Students who have been identified as needing remedial assistance will then be programmed in basic reading, language arts and/or math, depending upon the areas of deficit.

The director of continuing education will coordinate all remedial assistance programs related to the provisions of the general statutes. He is a Board Certified Internist and a Board Certified Dermatologist.

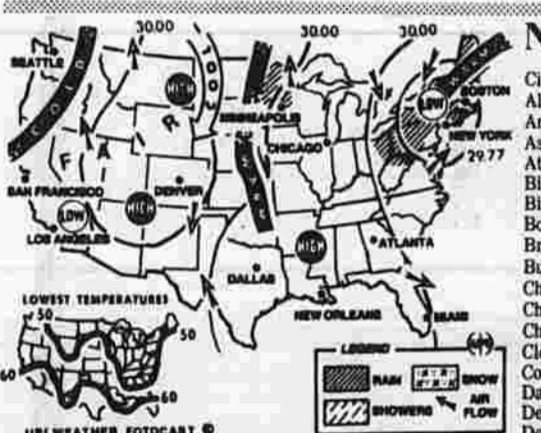

Students Should Avoid Bridge

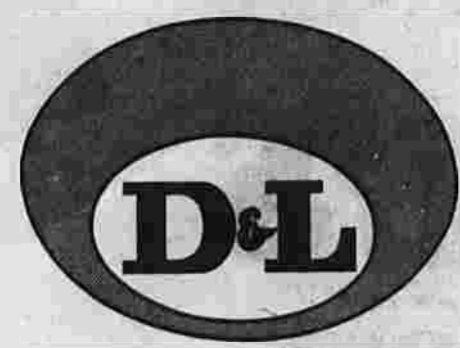

Police Tally Bolton Crime

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Bolton Panel Sets Rules on Wetlands

BOLTON — Inland wetlands regulations and an inland wetlands and water courses map for Bolton were adopted by the Conservation Commission Wednesday. The adoption came during a regular commission meeting, after a public hearing.

Only one town official, Selectwoman Joann Neath, and two reporters were at the hearing which, appropriately, was held on a very wet night.

Stanley Bates, commission chairman, gave what he called a "spied about regulations and map."

The conservation commission has worked since 1972 on a set of regulations for the town. Under a 1974 town ordinance, the commission was designated the town's inland wetlands agency.

Bolton has about 9,920 acres of land. Of that amount, 12.6 percent, or 1,250 acres are wetlands.

Bates said it was estimated that by the year 2,000 the town's water needs will be doubled. "We are concerned that wetlands be retained, not abused," he said.

Bates said wetlands are important for their sponge effect to hold water, habitat for wildlife, food production, fur-bearing animals, migration stop, timber production, pollution control, nature study and recreation.

Wetlands are identified by soil characteristics. Bolton has 65 different soil types. Bates said the town's regulations follow the state regulations but "we tried to give local flavor — Bolton feeling, into them."

The purpose of the regulations is to "protect, maintain and use the wetlands and water courses in the best interest of the health, welfare and environment of the citizens of Bolton," he said.

The regulations include a chapter on definitions, permits, activities in wetlands and water courses, regulated wetlands and watercourses areas of Bolton, application and decision procedures, insurance and bond, enforcement, appeals and conflict and severance.

The Conservation Commission will administer and enforce the regulations.
