

Attendance Is Next Goal at MHS

MANCHESTER — The major objective for Manchester High School administrators next year will be improving the students' class attendance, Principal Jacob Ludes III said Thursday.

Speaking before a group of parents, faculty members and students at an informal coffee hour at the school, Ludes said pupil attendance is an area "we can do better on."

He told them the school has "all the resources we need" to solve what he called a national problem among high schools.

He said the administration has revised its data system to keep an accurate check

on students' attendance. Because the revision was completed so late this year, Ludes said a more appropriate time to begin the operation would be the next school year.

The system will provide "cumulative data" on each student which is "clearly visible and easily displayed," he said.

Ludes said the Youth Services officer, who was hired late in this school year, will be available to counsel students with chronic attendance problems.

"Every administrator will have one priority — school attendance, no class cutting, no truancies," he declared. "It's got to be our primary objective this year."

The coffee hour was the final of at least three meetings between the school administration and parents. There has been

considerable discussion about the school's so-called "open campus" policy and Ludes reiterated its procedure.

He said the privilege is not available to sophomores, who will be assigned to study halls for at least the first semester. Those sophomores showing regular attendance and good behavior, he said, will be offered the privilege during the second semester.

Juniors and seniors who abuse the privilege will be forced to attend study halls in the second semester.

Ludes said the revised policy will take effect in September because the school will have the capacity to assign the study halls.

Ludes also said educators will visit the school for three days next fall to examine all aspects. The monitoring is part of the

process leading to re-accreditation by the New England Association of School and Colleges.

Gas Status

BOSTON (UPI) — The following is a state-by-state capsule look at the gasoline situation in New England based on a spot-check by UPI.

Connecticut: Only one out of every five stations will be open Sunday and Monday. AAA recommends motorists plan in-state trips requiring a half-tank of gas. Up to 100 additional state troopers will be on patrol this holiday weekend cracking down on speeders and drunk drivers.

Maine: "We look pretty good especially in light of the rain. I don't think people will be doing much," said Renee Polosky of the state Energy Resource Office. No lines reported; stations expected to alternate openings this holiday weekend. Stations along the Maine Turnpike have been limited to purchases between 6:56.

Massachusetts: Gas supplies should be adequate, AAA said. Cape Cod, where tourists are expected to congregate, and Amherst, where several colleges are holding graduations, have received extra allocations. State Police, under orders to reduce accidents and conserve gas by strictly enforcing 55 mph speed limit, will have 40 additional patrols on the road with 10 marked pace cars — vehicles that always go 55 mph. Stations on Massachusetts Turnpike limiting to \$5.

New Hampshire: Rainy weather could be more of a problem than gasoline shortages for tourism-related business during holiday weekend. "There will be plenty of gas in the northern part of the state," says John McDonald of the New Hampshire-Vermont Gasoline Retailers Association. He warned any gas crunch over the holiday weekend would come in the southern, more urban sections.

Rhode Island: Gasoline available, but AAA says 50-70 percent of filling stations will close at 6 p.m. Saturday, 90 percent will be closed Sunday and 65 percent closed Monday.

Vermont: State Energy Office says this holiday weekend will be "normal, no problems. As far as we know, tourists will be able to go from one place to another. There are natural Sunday closings, but some stations will be open. It may be the rain that keep them away."

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Chicago Crash Nation's Worst

CHICAGO (UPI) — A wide-bodied jet airliner packed with 276 persons turned nose up and crashed backward in flames moments after takeoff from Chicago's O'Hare International Airport Friday. There appeared to be no survivors in what was believed to be the worst air disaster in the United States.

The American Airlines DC-10, bound nonstop from Chicago to Los Angeles, was crippled by an exploding engine and fell in flames in the midst of three mobile home camps. At least three persons in the vicinity were injured and taken to hospitals.

But the American Red Cross said there were no survivors among the 264 passengers, 5 crew members and 10 flight attendants.

A death toll of 276 would be nearly double that of the worst air disaster in the United States, when 144 persons died in the collision of a Pacific Southwest airliner and a light Cessna 172 over San Diego.

The three-engine American Flight 191 ran into calamity as it took off from runway 14 of the world's busiest airport at about 3 p.m. CDT at the beginning of the Memorial Day weekend.

A spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration said the jet's left-wing engine exploded on takeoff.

The plane rose to about 200 feet heading north over lightly-packed suburban Chicago. Then, as it banked to the southwest, it turned nose upward, burst into flames, fell backward and took what a witness described as "swan dive" into the ground.

And authorities confirmed that statement.

Employees at the O'Hare military site said they saw one of the engines of DC-10 lying on the runway shortly after the plane crashed.

FAA Administrator Langhorne Bond, former Illinois transportation secretary, planned to fly into Chicago from Washington to take personal charge of the investigation.

Black smoke was visible for several miles from the crash site in an unincorporated area close to the suburban village of Elk Grove.

A temporary morgue was set up in one of the American Airlines hangars.

Preliminary unofficial reports said none of the 276 passengers and crew members reported to be aboard survived.

That would make the death toll nearly double that of the previous record established exactly eight months before — on Sept. 25, 1978 — when a Pacific Southwest airliner and a small Cessna 172 collided over San Diego, killing 144 people.

The deaths in the San Diego accident included 135 on the FSA Boeing 727 jet, two on the Cessna and seven on the ground in a residential neighborhood.

Town to Pay District

MANCHESTER Town officials indicated Friday they will make a payment next week to the Eighth Utilities District for past taxes collected in Buckland.

The payment to the district is one step the town is required to take according to the court decision that ruled the Eighth District does have the authority to provide fire protection in Buckland, a section in northwest Manchester.

During the dispute over the Buckland section, the town continued to collect fire taxes in Buckland. It now has to refund those collected taxes. Altogether, the town collected about \$190,000. Part of that, about \$63,000, has to be paid back to the district. The remainder is owed taxpayers in the Buckland section.

Town Manager Robert Weiss said Friday the town should make the remainder of its payment to the district next week. It already has paid about \$25,500 of the \$63,000 it owes the district, he said. The \$63,000 figure also could change slightly because of some late alterations for other expenses that might have to be made," he said.

The payments to the individuals will be delayed at least a couple of weeks because individual checks have to be drawn for those payments, Weiss said.

State House on Stamp

By RUSS MACKENDRICK Here is the Old State House Local Post stamp. This one is imperforate, but they also made it in perforated form. It is in multicolor (four-color process), reproduced by off-set lithography on white paper by the Printing Division of the Travelers Insurance Co. - note the inscription low artist at the right. Low artist Glenn de Cicco shows the State House in brick and white dome, and surrounded by green shrubbery. Dominating the scene is a swooping eagle with enormous lavender wings. His head and neck are white and the bill and talons yellow.



The State House was rededicated, after much refurbishing, just a week ago. It got good press coverage on the way, having a half-page pictorial piece in the Sunday New York Times of May 15, with story of the voluntary \$5 window tax paid by some 1,000 workers in nearby office buildings who are privileged to gaze out and rest their eyes on the old-time edifice now and then.

There is need for a large endowment to ensure the preservation of the building in perpetuity and the local post stamps are part of the effort being made to do this end. To commemorate the rededication a special souvenir sheet has been prepared. It has four of the above stamps with an appropriate legend on the selvage. Bob Johnson of the Manchester Philatelic Society notes in a communique to this column that the sheets of 25 per cent and imperforate stamps will also have desirable selvage markings that would not be received by purchasers of less than full sheets.

Sheet quantities are limited to 5,000 of the souvenir type, 500 imperforate and 2,000 perforated. First day covers will be prepared and are available for \$1 each plus 25 cents postage and handling. Souvenir covers (prepared and postmarked on date of servicing) are 75 cents each plus 25 cents postage and handling. Souvenir sheets are 40 cents each plus 25 cents P & H, and full sheets, shipped flat are \$2.50 plus 50 cents. All of the above will be shipped under special cover and address labels would be appreciated.

Imperforate full sheets will be supplied, when requested, as long as the supply lasts, after that perforated sheets will be sent. Single stamps are available for 10 cents each. Please send a self-addressed stamped envelope with the order. The check should be made payable to "Old State House" and the order addressed to Old State House Local Post, P.O. Box 383, Central Station, Hartford, CT 06103.

Main Flushing Set Next Week

MANCHESTER - The Water Department will be flushing water mains in the South Wind of town and in part of Glastonbury next week. The department will do work along Hebron Avenue and Manchester Road in Glastonbury. It will also do the following Manchester streets: Indian Hill, Shallowbrook, Line, South Main, Lakewood Circle, Village, Comstock, Arvine, Lewis and Warren. There may be discoloration of water and reduced pressure during the flushing. If water appears discolored, the homeowner should try to avoid using it until it clears. This will prevent rust and sediment from being brought into the home's system. If sediment does get into a home's hot water tank, the homeowner should wait until the water clears and then open the faucet at the bottom of the tank to drain the collected material, which will settle at the bottom. Also, if a load of wash is done during the period of discoloration, the load should be done again after the water clears. Four ounces of cream of tartar should be added to help clean any discoloration of the clothing. It normally takes a couple of hours for the water to clear in a home. If water appears discolored for an extended period, the homeowner should call the Water Department at 647-3115.

Composed of the chief officers of New England state library agencies, NELB coordinates the library programs between the six New England states. Emergency Plan Not Formulated

MANCHESTER - The town has not set up any contingency plans in case the revaluation phase-in is eliminated, and it doesn't plan to take any such action unless a judge's decision requires it.

That's what Town Manager Robert Weiss said Friday.
 Manchester was the first town in the state to adopt the phase-in, which permits a community to spread the increases in assessments from a revaluation over a five-year period. The town's adoption of that phase-in, however, is being challenged in Hartford Superior Court.

A similar challenge to New Haven's adoption of the phase-in was upheld by a New Haven Superior Court judge.

Soon after the New Haven decision, some town officials suggested that Manchester establish a plan to be enacted in case the phase-in is eliminated.

Elimination of the phase-in would lead to a change in the mill rate and tax bills because the gradual enactment of the revaluation assessments would be eliminated.

Now, however, Weiss does not feel the idea of a contingency plan is worth the effort.

"We could spend hours figuring out what the alternatives are," Weiss said. "We're not going to pre-guess."

As well as name an acting president to replace the departing Ronald Denison of Manchester Community College has not been named.

"I would assume that at the Trustees 18th meeting the Board (of Trustees of the Regional Colleges) will take such action," Dr. Searle Charles, executive director of the Regional Colleges, said Friday afternoon.

No other meeting has been scheduled before the June 18th forum. Denison, who was not represented to a fifth one-year term by the board after a marathon session Monday and early Tuesday morning, is contracted to serve through June 30. He arrived at the college in the fall of 1974.

As well as name an acting president, the board will probably organize a search committee to select Denison's successor, Charles said.

Charles said representatives from the Board of Trustees will serve on the committee in a non-voting capacity. However, committee

Weiss said the judge's decision, if he decides to eliminate the phase-in, could include a number of different requirements or options for the town. These would dictate what steps the town would take after that, he said.

Also, the town can appeal the decision, so it might not have to implement it immediately what the judge orders.

Manchester differs from New Haven because it is in its second year of the phase-in. New Haven had expected to start it this year.

Carl Zinsner, a member of the Town Board of Directors, had suggested the idea of establishing contingency plans. He still thinks it should be done.

He feels it would take plenty of work to meet the requirements of eliminating the phase-in. The increased work load could create chaos in the town departments involved.

"Rather than wait for that to happen, we should be preparing something now," he said.

This will prevent the town from scrambling around at the last minute," he said.

Another director, Stephen Cassano, agrees with Weiss.

He feels creating a contingency plan for the town will be extra work that might not be needed.

"To have them do a duplicate role that might not be needed would be unfair," he said.

"Generally, there doesn't seem to be any need for it at this time," he said.

Energetic Young Lady Enjoys Working Outdoors

MANCHESTER - The job Mary Selinger now has is one that she would not even have thought about taking a few years ago.

"I hadn't even considered it. Women just didn't work outside," she said.

But, after five years of indoor work and with the women's liberation movement knocking down barriers, Mary saw no reason not to apply for a job as a member of the Town of Manchester's forestry crew.

She applied, was hired, and has not regretted it.

The work has included chopping down trees, clawing through thick underbrush and tramping through two feet of snow.

She was the only woman to apply and be hired, and people questioned how long she would remain.

"Most people said they didn't expect me to stay more than a month," Mary said with a proud smile. She has been a member of the forestry crew since it started in January 1978.

The work won't continue for much longer, though. The crew is funded through the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act program, and funding is expected to expire in July.

Mary hopes to go back to school and study horticulture landscaping or a similar field. The work with the town has helped her obtain the in-the-field experience she needs, and she now wants to couple that with an increased academic background in such areas.

The crew she works with in town is responsible for control of the forest areas surrounding town reservoirs. Older trees and ones that have died are removed and replaced by seedlings planted by the crew.

The work includes tree chopping and cutting, dragging logs, lifting and loading and other physical duties. It sounds like a job best suited for some husky person with blacksmith's arms.

Mary hardly fits that description, and she admits the job is demanding. "This work is awfully hard for me. I've come a long way, but at the end of the day, I don't have any energy at all," she said.

Even if the work is tiring, it does not affect her daily performance. "She's a good worker. I wish we had 10 more," George Murphy, head of the forestry crew, said.

"She pulls her weight very well—more than her own sometimes. She hauls logs as much as the guys. I'm surprised at some of the stuff she picks up," Murphy said.

Mary, who is 26 and lives on Wells Street, first thought about working outside when she moved to California after five years of work in a hotel reservation office.

"I felt like I'd missed the whole day," she said of her days working in the office. While in California, she applied for a job as a line worker with the telephone company.

The hiring process was lengthy, however, and she moved to Connecticut before taking the final test.

When she arrived here, she heard about and got the Manchester job. Her co-workers have been very helpful, she said. They also have developed a few nicknames for her. Some, such as "Sawdust" and "Wood Chip," she liked. One, "Chainsaw Mary," she hated.

Her family has supported her working in a job that a few years ago would have been labeled, "For men Only."

"In fact, my father got a real kick out of it," she said.

Opponents to Act On Plan Reviews

MANCHESTER - Opponents of the Buckland Commons project plan to take part in all of the review of the proposed development done by the Eighth Utilities District.

Attorney Bruce Beck, who represents the persons, said he plans to file an intervention petition for his clients. This would permit them to take part in all of the district's reviews of the proposed Buckland Commons project, he said.

Beck said his clients are Michael Dworkin, a local pharmacist and environmentalist, Raymond Smith, a Windsor Street resident who has been a leader among neighboring residents opposed to the project, and the Manchester Environmental Coalition, which is headed by Dworkin.

The Eighth District Board of Directors Monday night approved an application to provide sewer service for Buckland Commons, a large development that would include a shopping mall and residential units.

The application was filed by the Hartman Tobacco Co., which now owns the property. MAP Associates, the developer of Buckland Commons,

would have to purchase the land from Hartman.

The approval by the district directors means that the district plans to maintain the authority to provide sewers for the area. But, the directors also said the project plans will have to receive district approval before the sewers are installed.

It is this phase—the review of the plans—that Beck wants his clients to participate in.

"We want to make sure environmental factors are given full consideration," he said.

Even though the district meetings are public sessions, Beck wants the district. He feels this will insure that his clients will be permitted to speak about the concerns they have about the project. It also increases their legal standing, he said.

Attorney John LaBelle Sr., counsel for the district, seemed surprised by the idea of an intervention petition since district meetings are open to the public and all persons have been permitted to speak in the past.

"That's a new angle to me," he said.

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Braves' Murphy Unusual, Said Contract Too Much

NEW YORK (UPI) — The late Bill Lucas always liked telling the story about Dale Murphy and the contract he once sent him. Every time he'd tell the story, Lucas would laugh and say something like that had never happened to him before, which isn't so hard to understand because a ballplayer like Dale Murphy hasn't happened that many times before to the Atlanta Braves, either.

The contract Lucas liked to tell about was the one he sent Murphy at the beginning of the 1978 season. Murphy, a big, gentle-natured, right-handed pitcher, had enjoyed his best year in pro ball the season before with Richmond of the International League by driving in 90 runs, hitting 22 homers and batting .306. When the Braves brought him up in September of that year, he hit .316 in 18 games and Lucas, in his capacity as director of player personnel, wanted to do a little something for Murphy.

So he sent him that contract, which Lucas felt was a good one but not anything on which Murphy could live and immediately retire for life, and Lucas was rather surprised when the director of player personnel wanted to sign him. He was even more surprised, downright flabbergasted, in fact,

when Murphy included a letter along with the contract saying he felt Lucas was offering him too much. That's right, too MUCH, not too little.

"That was the first time something like that ever happened to me," Lucas would say and laugh. "No player ever asked me to give him less money, but that's what Dale was asking me to do."

Bill Lucas could get a little stubborn and take a hard line when he thought he had to, and this was one time he felt he did. He mailed back the same contract to Murphy with the same figures in it, telling him that he was sorry to disagree with him but he believed the salary figures were fair.

If you ask Dale Murphy about the offer, he seems to be a bit foggy over the exact details, quite possibly because he's an uncommonly modest young man and doesn't care to make drawbacks of his own and the contract is true, however, and he does stop short of denying it.

"I do believe in that philosophy," says the Braves' 27-year-old catcher-first baseman. "I feel you shouldn't take money you haven't earned."

It's no bad Bill Lucas isn't around anymore to see the way Murphy is earning his money now.

Murphy has had Lucas' contract drum stick nailed a bit as if it's a sacred relic. Nobody's even signed. He was even more surprised, downright flabbergasted, in fact,

His teammate, Barry Bonnell, converted him to Mormonism and baptized him. Bonnell is the Braves outfielder who was so taken aback by the immediacy of it all when female sportswriters were allowed into the club's dressing quarters for the first time in April that he herded them into a separate room along with the regular male sportswriters.

Dale Murphy doesn't go quite that far. He's a bit of a prankster. He's a right-handed pitcher, he's one of those straight arrows who delivers talks in churches, never uses profane language and doesn't drink smoke.

What he likes to do is hit baseballs — a long way. He's also beginning to appreciate disco dancing and when he gets out there on the floor, he attracts more than the ordinary attention.

You don't see too many 6-foot-5 guys dancing.

Or sending back contracts, either, because they think they're being overpaid.

Finley Exercised Right Lane Fired Only Once On Long Baseball Trail

NEW YORK (UPI) — Frank Lane was fired only once in his life, and the man who bounced him was Charlie Finley.

That was 18 years ago and although Lane took Finley into court over the firing and collected more than \$100,000 from him in a breach of contract suit, the two men still get along well with each other.

Lane has a love-hate relationship with the owner of the Oakland A's. He loves the fact he isn't working for him anymore but hates the idea Finley may be forced out of baseball. Who would Lane have left to need if Finley sells the A's?

Finley hasn't convinced Lane he actually wants to do that. Finley certainly is in no hurry to sell the A's for what he's being offered for them.

"Charlie Finley is a very smart operator," says Lane. "He believes everything comes to him who waits. That's what he's doing now. He's waiting, and he knows if he waits long enough the other American League clubs are going to get tired of making a trip out to Oakland that costs them \$8,000 just to collect \$800. Finley knows that eventually the owners will work out a plan where he'll be free to leave Oakland or get a tremendous sum of money for the club."

Specifically, Lane was talking about Finley's attendance problems in Oakland, where the fans allow the A's to have the ballpark all to themselves by staying away from it in droves.

In a game at home with Seattle last month, the A's announced the attendance at 63. Actually, it was about 15 because some people who had tickets for the game stayed home. In 23 home dates so far, the A's have drawn 53,404 fans. That's an average of 4,061 a game, easily the poorest showing in both major leagues. To give you some idea of how poor, the Cleveland Indians are the second-worst drawing club and they're averaging 8,815 a game, more than twice as much as the A's.

Originally, the A's were located in Philadelphia. Finley purchased them after they had moved to Kansas City and he subsequently transferred the club to Oakland. Since the A's have been in the Bay Area, there has been talk periodically of moving them to Washington, New Orleans or Denver among other places, and recently one prospective buyer from Venezuela explored the idea of operating the club in Caracas.

In his time, Lane has had all kinds of jobs both in and out of baseball. At one time or another he was a referee for college football and basketball games; a sportswriter; racing judge; baseball scout; farm director; general manager and league president. Finley hired him as vice president and general manager for the A's and he lasted eight months.

"Eight months, 23 days, 14 hours, 23 minutes and 34 seconds," Lane corrects. "I remember the last day I worked for Charlie. It was August 23, 1961. I had just finished making a speech at a luncheon in the Muehlbach Hotel in Kansas City telling everybody about our ballpark and when I left the hotel to go to the ballpark, the fellow who dispatched the cabs said to me, 'Gez, that's your last day, Frank.'"

"I had no idea what he was talking about and I said to him, 'What happened, did one of our ballplayers get hurt?'" he said. "No, you got fired. I just heard it on the radio."

That was the first time Lane had ever lost any job. Since then, he has worked for the Orioles, Brewers, Rangers and Angels, and before that he was with the White Sox, Cardinals and Indians so employment never has been much of a problem for him. With the Angels now, he's excited over how much Rod Carew is contributing to the club.

Preserving Trophy Fish

The telephone rang the other day, and a voice laded with suppressed excitement, asked if I was Joe Garmann. I said I knew anything about fish, and he said he had a trophy fish he wanted me to preserve. The caller turned out to be Cliff Hills of Manchester, and he had real good reason to be excited. He had the nicest and cleanest side facing out trout, and if I had been here, they would have had to tie me down to keep me from banking off the walls. He had a fish he wanted me to preserve, and he wanted me to know of the reparation of the fish for mounting, and discussion of the merits and drawbacks of different types of taxidermy, I thought it might be a bad idea to pass some of this information on to you readers.

The best way I know of preserving a trophy fish for taxidermy is to skin it. When you get to the fins, you may cut them from the fish, and sever them at the backbone. Then work the skin loose over the back with your finger or a knife, and sever the backbone at both head and tail. From here on it, it's easy.

You may leave the head whole; just remove the gills. Now you are just about finished with the fish. If you leave a little flesh on the skin or around the gills, just forget it, as you will be removing the skin removing the skin in a large container, make a salt brine from anywhere you can place the fish with your wet salt, and you are ready to go. The brine has to be cool, or it will cook the fish. Place the skin in the brine, and leave it there for one or two days stirring it occasionally.

After a couple of days in the brine, place the fish in the heavy plastic bag along with some wet salt, and seal the top of the bag. Put the bag and fish in the coffee can, and seal with tapes. You are now in business. You may travel thousands of miles this way and it will stay preserved for months.

I know that there are many capable taxidermists around the area, and I'm sure that most of them are really good, but the greatest I have ever seen besides Herb Welch who is now located in Lewiston, Maine. Footer, a protégé of Welch, makes fish taxidermy really and truly an art form.

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

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



Ira Angustain to Play Freddie Prinze

Dressed in jeans and a Mickey Mouse ski sweater, the native Californian griped about the inconveniences of New York. Ira Angustain couldn't get home fries and his breakfast eggs and the buildings were too crowded. The Mexican-American Angustain will play the late Puerto Rican comedian, Freddie Prinze, in an upcoming CBS movie, "Can You Hear the Laughter?"

Angustain's resemblance to Prinze is remarkable. He has the same thick dark hair, the same expressive eyes and, in time, he'll have the same mustache.

He explained that, at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas, women went into shock and were unable to speak when they mistook him for the late Prinze.

His other qualification for the role, he eagerly announces, is that Prinze was his idol. "He was my ideal, the only Latin I ever idealized. It's an honor to be playing him."

There's an irony in casting Angustain to play Prinze. Angustain can recall a neighborhood group of Mexicans petitioning NBC to remove Freddie Prinze from "Chico and the Man" because he wasn't Mexican. Now, the

Mexican Angustain will play the Puerto Rican who played a Mexican on the popular TV show.

"I feel something for the guy, I'm sincere about it," says the 20-year-old actor whose greatest visibility so far has been his role of student Ricky "Go Go" Gomez on CBS' "The

White Shadow."

"His (Prinze's) death stunned me," Angustain continues. "At first, I thought someone had murdered him."

Angustain tried out for the Prinze role after seeing it was open in a trade publication. He knew that Erik Estrada (of NBC's

"CHiPs") had been considered for the part, but believes he was picked after producer Peter Greenberg saw him on "The White Shadow."

The film will follow Prinze's career from his early days in New York City to his Las Vegas stints, to the Los Angeles production of "Chico and the Man," stardom, and, ultimately, his tragic suicide.

On the versatility of the role, Angustain says, "As Ken Howard would say, this goes from A to Z."

For a kid who landed a role on a CBS replacement series in March, "Can You Hear the Laughter?" will prove an enormous career boost. Angustain is aware of this, but he's also eager to continue with "The White Shadow" this fall.

"I love 'The White Shadow,'" he says. "It's not like work. We go there, play basketball, play around. Everything we do comes from us."

According to Angustain, "High school is done true to life" on "The White Shadow."

"Kids aren't always goody-goody," he concludes. "People really believe there is a Carver High in Los Angeles."

This fall, they'll see there really was a Freddie Prinze, too.

Power protest

After the landslide of publicity from the Three Mile Island accident, CBS will base a movie on public indignation with the power companies.

"Ohms" will star Ralph Waite as a conservative middle-America farmer who is riled when he discovers that a power company is planning to erect huge towers carrying a million-volt power line across his land. He calls in a former war protester to help organize his fight against the utility company.

Private Talk

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Secretary of State Cyrus Vance met with Pope John Paul II in a private audience that sources said included a discussion of the Middle East situation, particularly the status of Jerusalem.

Vance, ending a two-day trip to Italy, also conferred with Premier Giulio Andreotti. Sources said the pope met with the pope alone for 15 minutes at the Vatican. Mrs. Vance and Washington special envoy to the Vatican, former New York Mayor John P. Wagner, joined the pope for another 10 minutes.

The Vatican, as is customary, did not disclose the private audiences, did not say what the two men discussed.

Vatican sources, however, said the discussions were to include the Middle East, with particular reference to the status of Jerusalem and the Palestine

Gasoline Woes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Motorists are not the only Americans concerned about gasoline shortages. Officials say the oil problem under efforts to strengthen the economy and even has a damaging effect on U.S. foreign policy.

Administration sources said advisers have warned President Carter that while the U.S. petroleum imports originally expected to be around \$4 billion this year, it instead will be at least \$52 billion and will cause fears that America's economic position is crumbling.

The higher costs also will up the U.S. balance of payments deficit, a major factor in limiting international confidence or lack of it — in the dollar.

And it comes at a time when administration's defense budget was beginning to take shape. The dollar had generally been created by about 7 to 10 percent average foreign exchange this year.

Working Hours

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Contrary to the belief of some taxpayers, most federal government employees not only their required 40 hours a week but many put in extra time charge.

A report to Congress by the General Accounting Office estimates the extra hours worked by government employees last year between \$660 million a million per year, based on pay rates.

Time lost due to work abuses costs between \$85 million and \$120 million a year, for a substantial net gain for employers — U.S. taxpayers. GAO, the investigating agency, based its report on questionnaires completed by about 3,000 randomly selected federal agencies, which employ 70 percent of civilian workers.

Iran Death Toll

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Islamic revolutionary forces shot five soldiers, bringing to 250 the number of executions since the shah's fall. In the port of Khorramshahr, unidentified gunmen, believed to be members of an extremist Arab nationalist group, gunned down revolutionary guards, said.

The five army men — second lieutenants, one captain and two privates — were in Tehran's Central Prison, authorities said. A total of 100 have been executed since Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Islamic revolution took power in February.
