## WHAT'S NEWS

### Rain and Snow

Rivers and streams, gusted by unrelenting rains, spilled into residential areas in Kansas and Missouri Friday, forcing hundreds of families from their homes and isolating towns. Two people were missing and feared drowned.

Snow pushed across the Rockies and rain doused much of the Plains. Scattered showers flitted across the Ohio Valley and the Appalachians. Rain also fell on the eastern Gulf Coast and pushed north along the southern Atlantic Seaboard.

More than a half foot of rain sent floodwaters from the Walnut River gushing into northern and eastern parts of Eldorado, Kan., and forced hundreds of persons from their homes. Some areas were under 15 to 20 feet of water.

### Marches Set

DECATUR, Ala. (UPI) — Authorities in Alabama and neighboring Mississippi shifted state trooper forces Friday in preparation for Saturday demonstrations reminiscent of the 1960s.

Extra state troopers were moved into the Decatur area, and the National Guard was placed on standby for rival marches scheduled here by the Ku Klux Klan and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the group founded by the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

In Mississippi, Gov. Cliff Finch said additional troopers were being posted to Okolona where members of the United League of Mississippi intended to protest the shooting death of black jail trusty Lee Andrew Carothers by white Deputy Sheriff Hansel Rogers.

### Banks Seized

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — The revolutionary government Friday nationalized all banks in Iran, seizing control of all assets belonging to foreign banks and to absent relatives and aides of deposed Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi.

A decree announcing the takeover was read over state radio by Prime Minister Mehdi Bazargan, who said the decision was taken by the Revolutionary Council "to preserve the nation's rights and wealth and to safeguard the people's savings and assets." Western bankers in Tehran were surprised by the takeover. Iranian businessmen welcomed the move as a timely aid to smaller banks hit by the revolution but were worried about its impact on future foreign credits.

### Range Fires

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Unseasonably gusty winds fanned hundreds of range fires in California Friday, and the biggest, roaring at 2,000 acres an hour, blackened 51,000 acres in the San Joaquin Valley near Mendota.

The big blaze, called the Cierro fire, was started by the hot exhaust from a pickup truck in grass and light brush in 100-degree weather.

The truck driver was unsuccessful in extinguishing the fire by turning up dirt with a shovel, and 50-mile-an-hour winds whipped it up quickly.

Fast-moving flames eventually surrounded seven shepherds who saved their lives by crawling under a tarpaulin. An aerial tanker bombed them with retardant chemicals, and the fire burned over them, leaving them hot and frightened but unharmed.

Hope of containment of the Cierro fire depended on an expected drop in the wind. State forestry crews, setting back fires in some spots, developed 50 miles of containment line without encircling the blaze.

## Carter Backs MX Missile



## Decision To Boost SALT II

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House announced Friday that President Carter has decided to develop the MX mobile missile to protect America against any Russian nuclear attack — a move officials said should help persuade the Senate to ratify SALT II.

Deputy press secretary Rex Gramum said Carter decided in favor of the huge MX — which will cost \$30 billion over 10 years — because "in his best judgment, we need to take this action to maintain our strategic security."

Defense officials said Carter plans to build 200 of the missiles and equip each one with 10 warheads. Each warhead will have 25 times the explosive power of the first atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima.

Officials said the MX will give the United States for the first time the ability to threaten large numbers of Soviet land-based missiles, and at the same time, will protect the 1,654 American land-based missiles now in underground silos in the Midwest from any attack Moscow might contemplate.

Gramum said the MX will mean "there can be no Soviet advantage in an arms race."

He said the new nuclear weapon will be "as capable as any missiles the Soviets can deploy."

Since the missiles would be mobile — moved around — the Soviets would never be sure where they were.

Defense officials said Carter has decided to base the missiles in the southwest in Utah, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico, moving them around over 4,000 miles of trenches. But they said details of the plan are still to come.

The White House announced Carter's decision on the MX just 10 days before he is to sign the second strategic arms limitation treaty with the Soviet Union at a summit meeting with Leonid Brezhnev.

The MX is the largest missile the United States is allowed to build under the SALT II agreement, and defense officials said Carter's decision to go ahead with it may help persuade the Senate to ratify the treaty because it would reassure those who fear a growing Soviet weapons advantage.

Early Senate reaction, however, was mixed.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., head of the Armed Services Committee, said he welcomed the move, but the panel's ranking Republican member, Sen. John Tower of Texas, called it "transparent SALT salesmanship."

Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., said the money could be better used to improve the nation's transportation system, but Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., said he welcomed the decision.

## Kennedy Has Edge in UAW Poll

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Edward Kennedy holds a 10-1 popularity edge over President Carter among local United Auto Workers leaders and California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. has almost drawn even with the president, union President Douglas Fraser said Friday.

But Fraser said he "won't be involved in a draft Kennedy movement. That's a decision the candidate has to make."

Fraser's comments came at a founding convention of the United Food and Commercial Workers Union.

Fraser said the UAW had been asked to join a labor-for-Carter group to build re-election support, "and we refused."

"We're neutral," he said. "It is a flexible position."

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## Seventh Republican Joins Race

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. John Anderson of Illinois announced Friday he will seek the Republican presidential nomination, and will try to stake out a position in the center of the political spectrum.

Anderson, 57, has been in Congress since 1961 and holds the third-ranking GOP leadership post in the House.

He is the seventh candidate to announce for the GOP presidential nomination in a field dominated by conservatives, and which does not yet include two of the best known probable candidates — Ronald Reagan and Senate Republican leader Howard Baker.

Anderson, a Harvard Law School graduate, is regarded by conservatives in the GOP as a liberal. While he has a record of fiscal restraint, he opposed the Vietnam War early and was the first Republican in the House to call for Richard Nixon's resignation.

He said he will try to rebuild the party by attracting blacks, ethnic groups and union members.

As for his liberal image within the party, he said, "I believe that the times have changed since Nelson Rockefeller unsuccessfully sought the nomination of the Republican Party" in 1964.

Anderson said if he is to make a good race for the nomination, he needs to win the Illinois primary, which probably will include Rep. Phil Crane of Illinois, who is already in the race, and Reagan, a native of the state.

The other announced GOP candidates are former Gov. John Connally of Texas, former CIA director George Bush of Texas, Crane, Sen. Robert Dole of Kansas, former Republican National Committee official Benjamin Fernandez and former Gov. Harold Stassen of Minnesota.

### Collectors' Corner

## Sulfides Are the Tops

This is a "sulfide" marble with a statue of a standing lion. The marble is made of clear glass which appears dark by a vagary of the lighting. The sulfides are just about tops in marble collecting. This one is 1 1/2 inches in diameter and is worth about \$40 regardless of the few nickles in the glass. A lion crouching instead of standing would be worth \$60. These figures are taken from a "Price Guide to Antique Marbles" by Paul Baumann (published in 1976). In that pamphlet, the little clay marbles we called comies are priced at 65 cents each! Some agates are \$12, tigereyes \$20, china marbles from 80 cents to \$33. There are six classes of handmade glass "core types" ranging from \$2.50 to \$115. Baumann gives 64 sulfides with the most desirable evidently being ones with a pair of doves or a pair of fishes inside - each of these marbles is listed at \$25. There is a report of a super-rare sulfide going to \$800 at an auction.

The Price Guide is an adjunct to "Collecting Antique Marbles" by the same author. This hardbound book of 86 pages is illustrated with 20 color plates. You need these because the kaleidoscope of marbles is beyond words. The book shows marbles made of calcareous limestone, rose quartz, chalcedony and other minerals. The true "agates" are in this class. The clay, crockery and china marbles are something else, and also the handmade and machine-made glass ones with variously colored and swirled enclosures. A pretty good article, with pictures of "clamshells" and "peppermint swirls," appeared in the "Yankee" magazine for September 1977. Here we read about the formation of the Marble Collectors Society of America with headquarters at Trumbull, Connecticut, and members in every state of the Union. (Their "Subscriber Listing" of a few months back shows 16 in Conn.) The society got underway in 1975 after Stanley Block (now the club's president), visited a museum with a group of marble-ist friends and was aghast at the poor apology for a marble exhibit being shown. They formed a society of 60 charter members and some very praiseworthy goals. Already they are well along with a collection to be donated to the Smithsonian comprising 19 types of handmade glass marbles, 12 of clay, porcelain or pottery, seven of natural stone (plus a manmade "goldstone"), five of machine-made glass, and some miscellaneous items including toys, games and books. The society has a tax-exempt status and material given by members or others is deductible.

## Town Sidewalks In Bad Condition

MANCHESTER - A resident of Green Manor Road complained at this week's Town Board of Directors meeting about the condition of sidewalks in the area. Town Manager Robert Weiss said, though, that the Green Manor Road walks differ little from many others in town. "We've got sidewalks in horrible shape all over town," Weiss said. The town has spent most of an \$800,000 federal grant it received more than two years ago for sidewalk work, he said. Even so, there still are many needed repairs to be done on town sidewalks. Green Manor Road is one area in town where part of the \$800,000 grant was used. The sidewalks were repaired on only one side of the street, though, Weiss said. This was done to make the money stretch as far as possible. The sidewalks on the other side of the street were not repaired. Residents of the area will be consulted before sidewalks are removed, Weiss said. "I don't believe we want to go in and pull out a sidewalk without the support of the people," he said.

## Town Will Study Anti-Idling Law

MANCHESTER - The town's Health Department will seek information about an ordinance in Pittsfield, Mass., that prohibits the idling of a motor vehicle for more than three minutes. A town resident attended Tuesday's session held by the Town Board of Directors and suggested that Manchester consider enacting a similar ordinance. The ordinance apparently is aimed at cutting down air pollution and the wasteful use of gasoline as possible. Even though they are sending for information about the ordinance, department officials are skeptical about enacting such a law. "It's something that's very hard to enforce," John Salicrus of the Health Department said. He said Manchester would ask Pittsfield how that town enforces its law. "I'd be curious to see what that town does," he said. Dr. Alice Pures, director of health, said she expects such an ordinance, if enacted in Manchester, probably would be enforced on a complaint basis. The department does not have the staff to travel through parking areas regularly to look for idling vehicles, she said.

## Plan Would Revise RHS Math Program

VERNON - Proposals to revise the math program at Rockville High School will be presented to the Board of Education Monday night, and if approved, the proposed changes will be made during a curriculum workshop this summer and will go into effect in September 1980. Plans are to present a course in Basic Algebra I, for one year, to replace the present two-year sequence of Basic Algebra I and II. The course would run for five periods a week and the student would receive one-half credit for it. The proposal was prepared by Dr. Lynn Anderson, math supervisor for the school system, on recommendations made by Walter Neff, head of the high school math department. The goals and objectives of the course include giving the students the necessary skills in algebra which can be applied in non-technical careers. The students will acquire the concepts and skills in algebra required for entrance into a two-year college. Students with only satisfactory success in general math will be able to take General Math II instead. Upon successful completion of the course, a student may elect basic geometry or modern geometry. Anderson said the cost of implementing this course is estimated at \$500. Another proposal to be presented to the board will be for a General Mathematics II course for students who have successfully completed General Math which is to be renamed General Math I. Anderson said emphasis in this course would be in applications of mathematics which are relevant to a 16-year-old student. He said these applications would include job entry skills, sports and consumer items used by the teenager.

## Vandalism Cuts Rental at Park

BOLTON - Because of numerous complaints concerning damage and vandalism in the building at Herrick Memorial Park, the Board of Selectmen has decided to stop rental of the building until further notice. The complaints were made by Stanley Bates, park director, and the selectmen have instructed the Park and Recreation Advisory Committee to look into the matter of vandalism at all of the town parks and to report back to the board. Rules and regulations for use of the town parks and recreation areas were adopted by the selectmen. An ordinance which calls for a \$25 fine for violations in the parks, was recently adopted. Bates told the selectmen that he received numerous complaints that the Herrick Park building is "dirty and neglected" and that tenants objected to cleaning it before and after use. Bates said the building is also used for various sports activities but those using it do not have any responsibility for clean-up and security. At the Herrick Park Building more than the floor become loose each time the floor is washed, Bates said. He also said holes were punched in the plasterboard walls and new tables have been damaged so they can't be used. In addition, Bates said that the roll-up door to the basement has been broken and forced off its rollers, security lights have been broken out of their sockets, electric meter covers are broken and the meter is jammed, newly installed the outside pay telephone has been ripped from the booth and is missing, shrubs have been torn out and several of the expensive shrubs and trees have been run over by cars and broken off at the ground, Bates said. Bates also said that a padlock on the new gate at Froja Park was completely destroyed within two days and that the gate at Indian Notch Park was severely damaged by vehicles pushing into it.

## Tomko Electric Buys Industrial Property

MANCHESTER - The town Friday sold its second parcel of property in the 393-acre Buckland Industrial Park. The two-acre parcel was sold to James A. and Thomas A. Tomko, owners of Tomko Electric Inc., which now is located at 24 Kenwood Road, Vernon. The firm will relocate in the industrial park and plans to build a 30,000-square-foot building. It will rent part of that building to other commercial enterprises interested in locating in the park. The town last year sold about 160 acres to the J.C. Penney Co. the major occupant of the industrial park. Penney now is constructing its huge catalog distribution center near Exit 93 of Interstate 86. Tomko Electric Inc. paid \$50,000 for the two-acre site. It expects to begin construction soon. The firm has been in existence for about two years. It does electrical contracting work across the state and in parts of Massachusetts. Town Manager Robert Weiss attended Friday afternoon's signing of the property transfer along with the Tomkos, the attorneys representing both parties and Barbara Weinberg, the real estate agent who handled the sale. "As you get into the park, if you have any problems, contact your lawyer," Weiss joked. "All closings should be this peaceful and quiet," Weiss said after the uneventful contract signing.

## Ted Doesn't Agree

Considered in many circles as baseball's greatest all-time hitter, Ted Williams doesn't agree, at least that's the way he expressed himself during his visit to East Hartford Thursday in behalf of the Jimmy Fund to headline a baseball clinic and then speak in the evening at a dinner in his honor.

"The best hitters today, in my book, are the guys who have impressive figures in home runs, runs batted in, extra base hits and slugging percentages, not just averages. Williams excelled in all these categories."

"Jim Rice (Boston), Dave Parker (Pittsburgh) and George Foster (Cincinnati) are my choices as the most productive hitters in the game today."

"Rod Carew is a singles hitter, and a damn good hitter, but not like the other guys," he added.

The last of the 400 hitters, Williams batted .406 in 1941, fell to .344 in 1969.

A group of the fishing regulars were visiting in the back of the store the other night, and the conversation moved around to strange fishing experiences. It brought to mind an unusual happening I witnessed many years ago, that was both an experience and a lesson.

About 15 years ago my wife, Joyce, and I were fishing our favorite lake in North Central Maine on our annual vacation.

We had hit a streak of good fishing the whole week and especially the night before the incident I am about to describe took place.

That evening, the sun was just dropping behind the purple mountains surrounding the lake, and that beautiful rose amber luminescence, when the great green drake manly hatch started at our end of the lake.

The brook trout swarmed in, surging, swirling, and just gorging themselves in a frenzy of feeding. It was a sight to set a fisherman's blood racing, and the fishing was fast and furious. I was starting to move back toward the boat, still fishing.

After 7 or 8 fruitless casts, I quickly reeled in my fly and switched to a bucketful figuring this imitation of a bait fish was what they were really feeding on. Same as schools of fresh water fish. Forget it! They wouldn't touch the bucketful with a ten foot pole.

Moving along with the school, I even saw chubbed flies at least 50 times in the next hour and a half. I went from large Wulfs to tiny size 22 dries, terrestrials, nymphs, etc., because I just could not see what the devil those trout were in such a frenzy over. Each cast with each new fly produced an great big nothing... not even a roll or "hook set" as the fly rises from the lake. I saw a sight that absolutely dumfounded me.

The boys were fishing the water all around me in school fashion, splashing and feeding in the manner of a school of fish. This fishing process, this beautiful lesson in humility packs to my mind and brings me back to nature. You really can't fool Mother Earth... Thank Goodness!

# High May Water Use Shows Demand Rising

MANCHESTER - Water use in town was very high during May - a sign that this summer could place increased demands on the local water supply. Bob Young, water treatment manager, said the town's Water Department used a total of 174 million gallons of water to supply customers last month. Some of that decrease in quality is starting. Young said the use of chlorine to combat bacteria growth has been increased in the past few weeks. There was only one violation of water standards reported in May. Young said the turbidity level at the Lyall Street reservoir was 2.06 for the month. This is well above the 1.0 permitted standard. He attributed the high turbidity at the reservoir to the heavy amount of rain during May, but there were no turbidity problems at any of the other reservoirs, he said. The town has received an extension before it must start meeting the new, tougher standards for water quality, but any violations of these standards still may be reported. May marked the second straight month of one or no violations. In April, there had been no violations, Young said.

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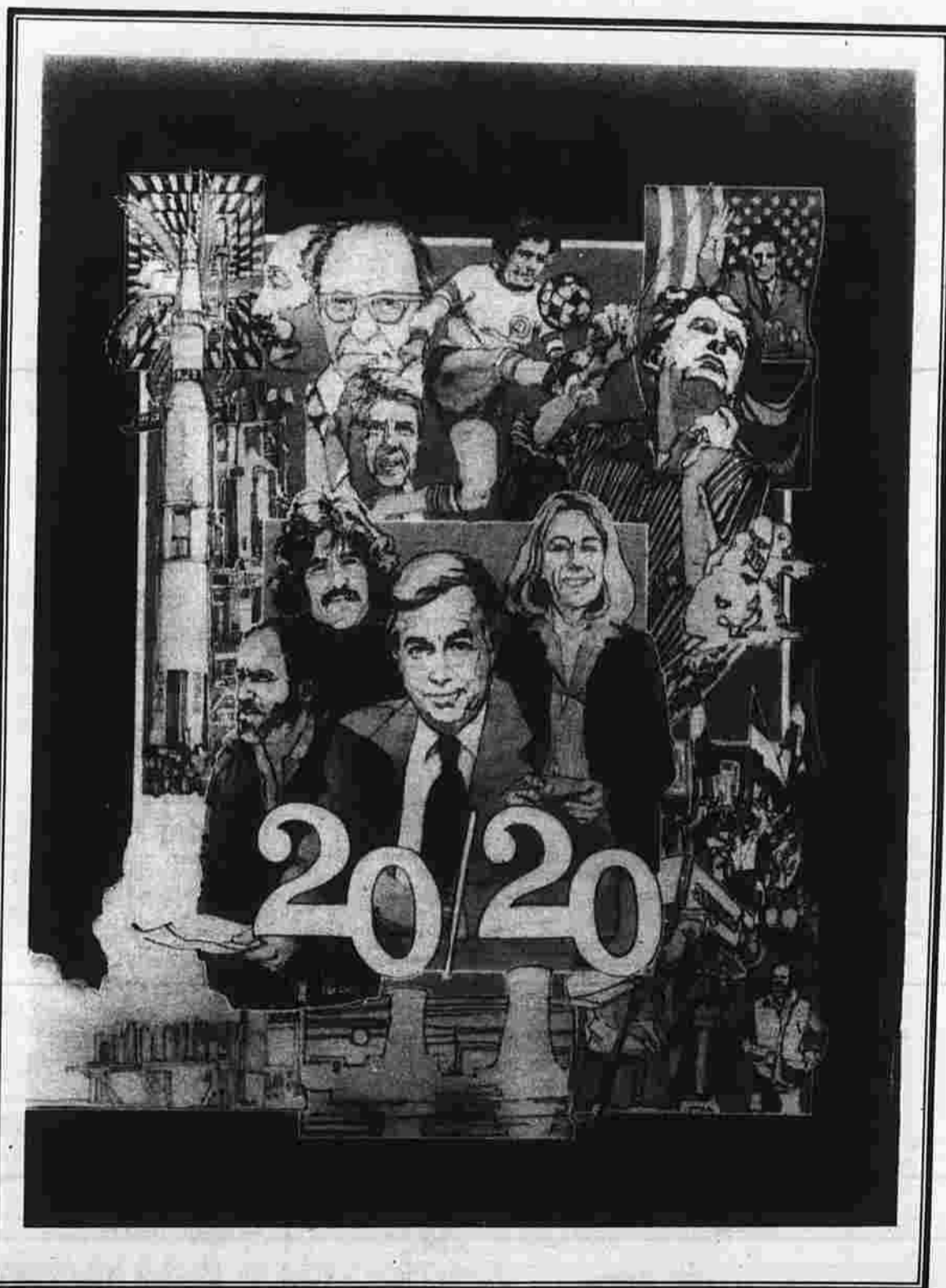

Then there was Chevy Chase, who left the show after two seasons to make films in Hollywood.

To date, Chase is the show's only defector. Since the cast members hold five-year contracts, which expire after the 1979-80 season, it's anyone's guess what will happen after next season, especially since so many repertory members are branching into film and stage careers.

This summer Gilda Radner will star on Broad-

way in a one-woman show, "Gilda Radner Live From New York." Series producer Lorne Michaels will produce it, and Don Nozello - better known as father Guido Sarducci - will open. Nozello, a writer for "Saturday Night Live," often doubles as the wise-cracking priest on the show's Weekend Update.

Dan Aykroyd and John Belushi will be winding up the Stephen Spielberg film, "1941," which is about a Japanese attack on Los Angeles during World War II.

And, Aykroyd is putting the finishing touches on the script of an updated version of a Bob Hope-Bing Crosby "On the Road" picture. John Landis, who directed "Animal House" will direct Belushi and Aykroyd in this traveltogue take-off.

Bill Murray has wrapped shooting of "Meatball," also directed by John Landis. It's all about hijinks at an incompetently run summer camp. In his second film, "Where the Buffalo Roam," to shoot this summer, Murray will play Hunter Thompson, author of "Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas."

Garrett Morris will try to launch a publication, "Mahogany," during the hot months, while Laraine Newman and Jane Curtin will spend their summers quietly - Laraine in Los Angeles and Jane on Cape Cod.

The "Saturday Night Live" repertory is spinning off some of the hottest comedians in television or film. This summer may see several duplicates of John Belushi's success in "Animal House" last summer.

Lynda Goodfriend is the chirpy all-American girl next door: she jogs, she flies airplanes for a hobby, and, as Lori Beth Allen on ABC's "Happy Days," she plays the girlfriend of Richie Cunningham, America's perennial teenager.

"It's hard being the girlfriend of America's sweetheart," the animated brunette explains. "You have to be a good person. You have a fight with him, and you can't be mean. Yet, you still have a conflict."

"Richie wouldn't go with a girl who wasn't a nice person. So I change the idea from being angry to being confused."

Lynda came to "Happy Days" as Richie's first steady girl. Where most girls look for the approval of their boyfriend's family, Lori Beth had to win the approval of 140 million devoted viewers.

Lynda had appeared on "Happy Days" as the girlfriend of several cast members before producer Gary Marshall called her in to play Lori Beth.

Ronnie Howard, who plays Richie, felt his character needed a steady girl. "There's more freedom of concept, more story possibilities with a girlfriend," Lynda explains. "We're in the early '60s now."

Richie Cunningham also needed someone other than the guys to relate to.

When asked about the rumors that "Happy Days" might pack up its cast and fold after dropping from the No. 1 Neilson position this past year, Lynda rises to the series' defense:

"Happy Days" didn't go below No. 7 this year. This will be the show's seventh season coming up. Ronnie doesn't want to act that much longer. Winkler wasn't going to sign, but now he is."

Lynda adds that although "Happy Days" may not enjoy the one-two punch it previously shared with "Laverne & Shirley," ABC isn't about to drop a series with a seven-year, top-10, Neilson-ratings record.

## Breaking Broadcast History

# Hugh Downs Scuttles Coast-to-Coast

Hugh Downs, who thought he had gone into semi-retirement several years ago, commutes cross-country as easily as some people travel cross-town.

Like clockwork, Downs boards a New York-to-San Francisco flight each Friday morning. There, he tapes six episodes — two a day — of his PBS series, "Over Easy," a weekday strip on PBS.

Monday morning, Downs is back on a commercial jetliner, bound for New York. For the next three days, he prepares himself for his now-weekly stint as host of ABC's "20/20," the Thursday night, prime time news magazine. Downs appears live on the show, which means he can't get a flight to San Francisco until the next morning.

Ironically the cross-country flights may traverse the area some 40 miles north of Phoenix, Ariz., where Downs officially resides, but rarely visits. Instead, he and his wife maintain two apartments, one in New York, the other in San Francisco.

The man who thought he was in partial retirement three years ago finds himself today on more television stations than any other performer, series or game-show host. His "Over Easy" series, which is geared to the interest of elderly citizens, appears five afternoons a week on 272 PBS stations. "20/20," in prime time, reaches the 200-plus affiliates of the ABC network.

In addition, Downs hosts three other specials a year, titled "American Lifestyle," which are syndicated to 54 stations.

"There is almost no overlap," Downs says with justifiable pride. "I'm on more stations than anyone in the history of television."

This is his 40th year in broadcasting, and he's done everything in the business, including round-by-round coverage of a boxing match in Lima, Ohio, back in 1939, when he first started out.

"I'd love to hear that tape," he reflects with a broad grin. "But I've really done everything. I've acted, sung with Perry Como, I even danced — years ago on a network daytime show called 'The Home Show.'"

Now, he has found his Utopia in broadcasting — "20/20."

"If anyone had asked me last June 5 what would be my Utopia in broadcasting I would have said a prime-time commercial network magazine of the air show."

The date was significant. After a number of delays created by a busy schedule, Downs was able to accept a standing offer from ABC to host the "Good Morning America" show in place of a vacationing David Hartman. He came to New

York June 4 to start a week's replacement run.

The following night, June 5, ABC premiered "20/20." The executive producer left shortly thereafter, and two hosts departed even sooner — the next day, in fact. Downs was signed to take over, starting with the second show, as the anchor.

"I had even considered, before that, to finance a pilot for a magazine show, using my own money," Downs recalled. "And here, it fell out of the sky and into my cap."

Downs adds that he wasn't looking, at the time, for any network shows but when it happened it was wonderful. The problem was, and still is, the traveling between the two coasts.

"More than once I've awakened in the middle of the night and bumped into walls — not realizing for the moment where I was," he notes, then continues, "but I feel better working."

He'll continue this grueling schedule through Dec. 16. By that time, he will have completed the year's production of "Over Easy." Then he hopes that, with "20/20" continuing, of course, he can consolidate and do both shows in New York.

"Over Easy" is a production of San Francisco's Public Broadcasting station KQED, which owns the title. The station may not be eager to see it all transferred to New York.

He believes the news magazine is where television is going in prime time.

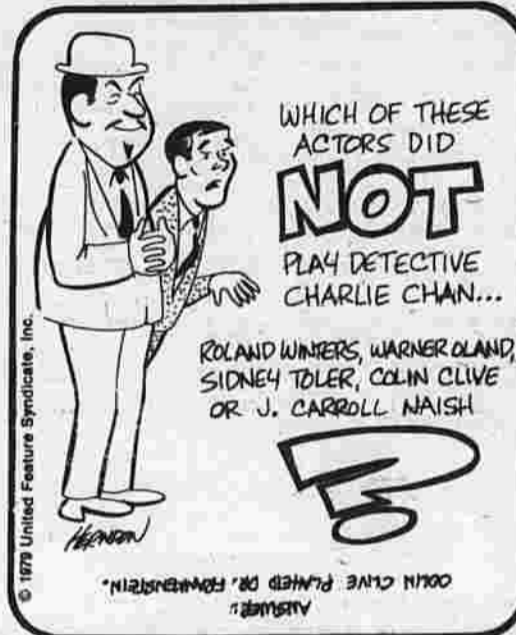
"Entertainment can be

put on cassettes," he observes, acknowledging the new technology that is making major inroads. He doesn't think that a prime time news magazine would have been possible 15 years ago.

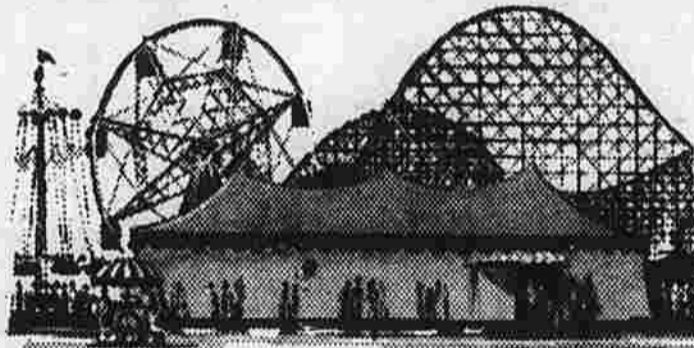
"But CBS had the guts to stick with '60 Minutes,' and I'm grateful for that," Downs says generously of the opposition. "People are thirsty for reality. There's a shift away from the frivolous to thought-provoking television."

Downs intends to get out of the studio for some features. He doesn't want to be just "mortar between the blocks," he says. Although he doesn't see himself doing investigative reports, "neither am I going to sit in the studio and just do lead-ins."
