

# Vernon Council Sets Massage Parlor Moratorium

VERNON — The Town Council Wednesday night agreed to impose a 30-day moratorium on issuing permits for massage parlors to allow time to go through the process of having the massage parlor ordinance amended.

The previous moratorium set by the council had expired and meanwhile the town attorney has been working on writing amendments to the ordinance. Those amendments were reviewed and approved by the council and will now go to a public hearing on July 18.

The ordinance puts stringent regulations on the establishment and the operation of massage parlors. The town now has four such businesses.

One of the amendments calls for the setting up of a Board of Massage Establishment Permit Appeals. It states it should be made up of the town building inspector, the housing code enforcement officer and three members of the Town Council, to be appointed by the mayor, and the decisions are to be made by majority vote.

Another added requirement will be the submission of two photographs of the person who applies for the massage parlor permit plus a complete set of fingerprints. It also calls for the applicant to furnish authorization to the director of health and the police chief, or authorized representatives, to seek information and conduct an investigation into the truth of statements in the application.

The applicant also has to furnish information as to his or her business, occupation or employment for the five years immediately preceding the date of the application.

Previously it was suggested that each application be accompanied by a fee of \$50. The new revisions call for each application to be accompanied by a fee of \$750 and \$75 of this will be non-refundable as a processing fee and the remaining \$675 will be the annual permit fee.

The regulations also outline requirements concerning the moral conduct of the applicant such as the fact he or she has not been convicted of a felony within five years before the application date, or an offense involving the unauthorized practice of the healing arts, any sex-related offense and has not had a similar permit suspended or revoked in this state or any other state.

A controversial section of the ordinance was left in, that of a requirement that the applicant successfully complete a course of study at a school or institution of learning which has as its purpose the teaching of the theory and such of massage.

The council also established fees, in the ordinance, for the issuing of a massage parlor permit. This will be a total of \$125, \$25 for the processing fee and \$100 for the annual permit fee.

Another new section sets forth the type of cubic, booth or room that a massage parlor must have. They have to be equipped with transparent and tinted glass windows and the bottom of such window has to be four and one-half feet from the floor and the window is not to be covered in any manner, at any time.

Persons under age 18 are not to be permitted on the premises of a massage parlor business as an employee or a patron. The amendments also state that alcoholic beverages are not allowed on the premises; and that the establishment cannot be kept open between the hours of midnight and 10 a.m. nor on Sundays. The original amendments called for earlier closing hours.

The council questioned the amendment that states that all rooms in the establishment shall be kept adequately lighted at all times during business hours. Council members said they weren't sure what "adequate" would mean but decided this would come under the area of inspection.

Anyone who administers massages or operates a parlor without first obtaining the proper permit and paying the fee, will be fined not more than \$99 and violation of the provisions of the ordinance will be deemed grounds for revocation of the permit.

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## WHAT'S NEWS

### The Summit

**TOKYO (UPI)**—A summary of the joint declaration by the seven chief executives issued at the completion of the Tokyo summit—

- The United States agreed to freeze its oil imports at 1977 levels, about 8.5 million barrels a day, for the remainder of 1979 and 1980. It also adopted the goal of holding imports to that level through 1985.
- The nine-member European Economic Community agreed last week in Strasbourg, France, to hold imports at 1979 levels through 1985. The four European powers at the Tokyo summit—Britain, West Germany, France and Italy—agreed to recommend to fellow Common Market nations that each country's imports be specified.
- Canada and Japan will hold imports to the levels they have accepted in the International Energy Agency and will maintain their imports in 1980 at a level no higher than 1979.
- Canada also agreed to reduce its annual average rate of growth of oil consumption to 1 percent, reducing oil imports by 50,000 barrels a day by 1985 to 600,000 barrels.
- Japan adopted as a 1985 target 6.3 barrels to 6.9 million barrels a day.

### New Blockades

Striking independent truckers set up new blockades in the East Friday but a back-to-work movement appeared to be emerging in the West, where some truckers voted to end the strike and authorities reported increased truck traffic.

Four strikers, armed with guns and Molotov cocktails, were arrested and charged with vandalizing a truck at a Maryland truck stop but major violence appeared to be declining on the nation's highways.

Grocery chains continued to warn of possible food shortages but no shortages were reported.

### Less Gasoline

Eastern authorities took steps Friday to keep gas stations open this weekend as June gasoline supplies sank to the bottom of the tank. And booming up was a gas-short Fourth of July.

For the average summer weekend tourist, it was the classic good news-bad news.

The good news: Many mountain and seaside resorts had gasoline to get home—if the traveler planned ahead.

The bad news: Where does a city dweller find a tankful of gas to get there?

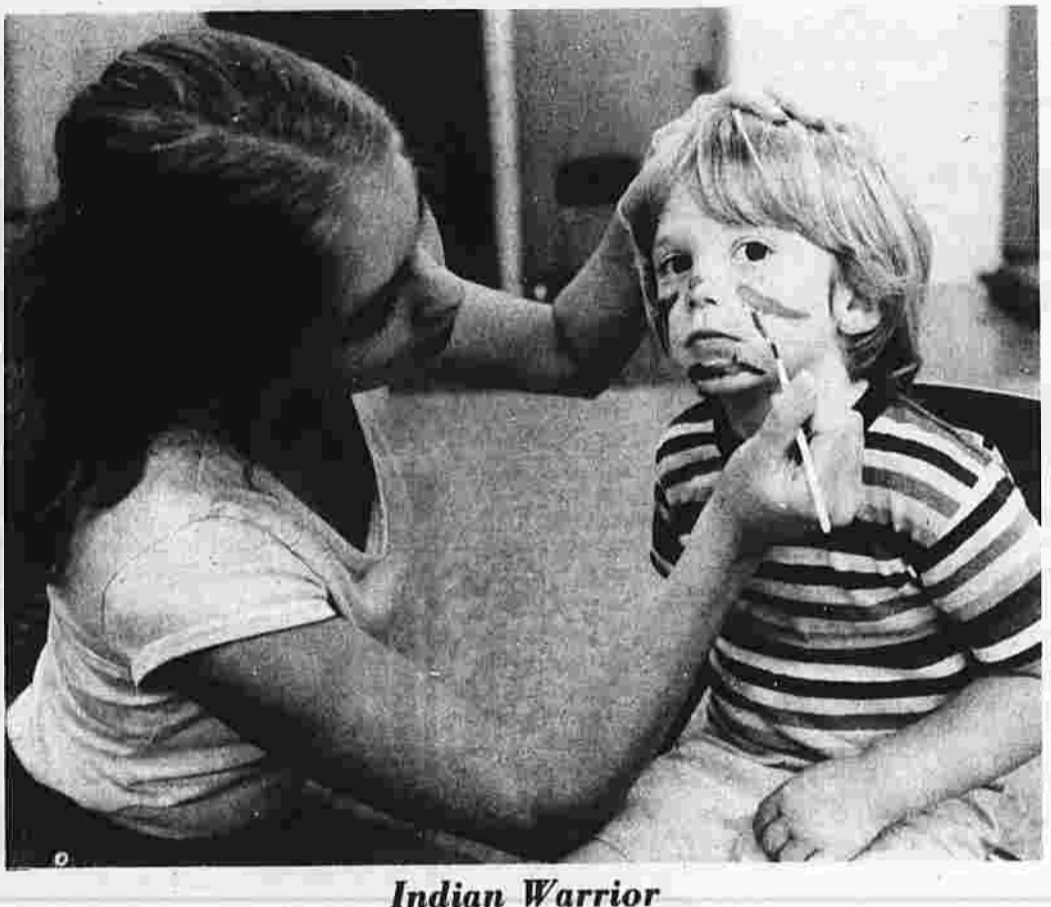

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## Northeast Gets Rate Hike

**HARTFORD (UPI)**—The Division of Public Utility Control granted Northeast Utilities an \$86 million rate hike Friday—the largest rate increase approved in Connecticut history.

A DPUC spokesman said the rate hike will mean an average 12 percent increase in monthly electric and gas bills. Northeast, which has more than 1 million customers and is the state's largest electric company, had 66-page decision is reviewed. The spokesman did say it might change plans for the Millstone III nuclear power plant.

"We will review the construction schedule of the Millstone III unit," which is under construction at Waterford, the spokesman said. "This will include an examination of available options."

He said the options were maintaining the present schedule and completing the atomic generator by 1986 or advancing the completion time to 1984 "with the same or a reduced ownership interest."

"We'll also examine our ability to undertake programs to improve the quality of services to consumers," the spokesman said.

## Energy Officials Have Good News

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—Energy officials Friday promised a new way to beat gasoline price-gouging by mid-July and (2) enough winter heating oil.

The silver-lining items cropped up amid continued grumbling from congressmen and the public about fuel allocation policies and the performance of the Energy Department.

Jack Vandenberg, a spokesman for the department's Economic Regulatory Administration, said officials hope to select an easy-to-follow gasoline pricing system—designed to thwart price-gougers—by July 16 or soon thereafter.

Vandenberg told UPI the public will get to comment on the four competing plans at a July 19 hearing in San Francisco and one July 16 in Washington.

All four would vastly simplify the way a gasoline retailer determines his maximum allowable pump price. The current formula is so complex it baffles dealers and motorists alike and has saddled hundreds of retailers with over-charge citations and fines this year.

Vandenberg said two of the proposals would simply require dealers to add a fixed cost per gallon to their wholesale price.

The third would establish fixed national or regional ceiling prices. The last envisions an unspecified, fixed increase in the 3-cent-per-gallon allowance dealers now get for operating overhead.

Publicity for the chosen formula will help solve the mystery of how to figure the legal maximum price of a gallon of gas.

"If it's a fixed cents-per-gallon cost," Vandenberg said, "all you have to know is two things: the wholesale price and the retailer markup."

"If the papers publish the wholesale prices, anyone can determine whether or not the gas at the gas station is legal in a few seconds."

The assurance on home heating oil came in congressional testimony from Deputy Energy Secretary John O'Leary.

O'Leary said his department has set heating oil inventory goals that will accommodate a colder-than-normal winter and expects to meet those goals without arm-twisting—partly because Americans seem to be accepting the reality of lower gas prices.

"The public appears to have accustomed itself to a summer and fall of gasoline supplies at levels which will permit retailers to maximize their yields of middle distillates, if crude oil supplies remain at current levels," he told a House hearing.

Heating oil is derived from middle distillates.

O'Leary said no American home lost its heating oil supply due to shortage last winter. He predicted the same standard will be met this year.

## MDC Offer to Expand Takes Town Off Hook

The Metropolitan District Commission Friday presented a plan for providing water service to most of the Glastonbury customers now served by the Town of Manchester.

The plan, which will require further review and negotiation, could reduce Manchester's cost for water renovations needed to improve service to the approximately 250 Glastonbury homes it serves.

Under the proposed plan, the MDC would expand to include most of those 250 customers, Manchester, however, would continue to serve those customers in fringe areas, Manchester Town Manager Robert Weiss said.

These would include persons living near the town line—those on Shallowford Lane and Manchester Road—and those near the Buckingham Reservoir, which is in Glastonbury but is owned by

Manchester, Weiss said.

The MDC proposal also would have Manchester continue to serve some of those customers on Hebron Avenue.

Robert Pryby, Glastonbury's director of public works, said there are 12 homes on Hebron Avenue that Manchester still would be obligated to serve. Manchester, however, hopes to negotiate this part of the proposal.

Frank Jodanis, water and sewer administrator, agreed Manchester should continue to serve those customers in fringe areas, which Manchester lacks. This means the cost can be spread among all affected households whether they decide to hook into the system or drill their own wells.

Pryby said that there are two major alternatives to the proposed plan.

He said Manchester can continue work on its \$1.5 million plan, which would include installation of a line to Mimschaug Mountain and construction of a new pump station to provide water main service.

## Indicators Showing Business Slowdown

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—A major government economic barometer skipping April, a month that saw the average production work week cut by signaled what at first glance appeared to be good news Friday, but a second look pointed to a business slowdown—and maybe even a recession.

The Commerce Department said its Index of Leading Economic Indicators, which is used by economists to anticipate business booms and busts, rose 0.4 percent in May.

The hike in the index, which plots a dozen economic factors thought to rise and fall in advance of the economy as a whole, at first seemed to be pointing to a business rebound.

But Commerce Department officials said analysis indicated the May rise was small in comparison to the unusually large 2 percent plunge in April, and overall the index appeared to be pointing down.

Commerce Department economist Feliks Tarnam said the significance of the barometer could best be seen by

# Collectors' Corner Rare Coin Auction Set

This week's column should be of special interest to high-rollers on the gold collecting scene.

The 1979 \$10 gold piece is an example of what will be offered by NERCA (The New England Rare Coin Auctions) at the ANA Convention at St. Louis, July 29 through Aug. 1. (American Numismatic Association.)

This coin in its uncirculated condition is listed at \$18,500 in the Red Book but the way gold has been acting lately—who knows? Like all the United States \$10 pieces for 1955 to 1964, it is of .9167 fine gold. The weights then were all 17.50 grams and the diameters about 33 millimeters. In 1958 the composition was changed to 900 fine, the weight 16.718 grams and the diameter 27mm.

The coin shown here has the lifelike small eagle flaunting a wreath. (The impossible "heraldic" eagle appeared on some later 1797-10 dollar gold.) It is one of the 166 rare United States gold coins to be sold from the Mocatta Metals Corp. collection. Mocatta is one of the world's largest dealers in precious metals (Mocatta & Goldsmid Limited was founded in London in 1884). Another part of the auction will offer more than 200 of their gold pattern coins.

Some examples of what they are putting up: A United States \$1 1864 proof, very rare with only 50 minted; an 1834 quarter-eagle with motto, showing the rarest gold coin of this denomination. It has the words "U.S." on the reverse at least five years. Another quarter-eagle is an 1848 "CAL. Above Eagle Liberty," said to



be "sharply struck and absolutely dazzling." Coin catalogers fall easily into (dithyrambs). Then there will be an 1872 full strike proof of which only 30 were minted.

Among the half-eagles is an 1858 Liberty of which only four specimens are known, and an 1878 proof Liberty, "a glittering frosty jewel... This coin is presently in frantic demand!"

The 10-dollar coin in the photos... a great rarity... "is described as being somewhat weakly struck on the front and lightly cleaned." The reverse shows virtually full breast feathers. "Another offering in this group is an 1875 Liberty, the rarest of all U.S. \$10 gold pieces with fewer than 20 known in any condition."

The double eagles are well represented with a "braided-tail" proof 1864 No Motto, one of 60 specimens minted. And Lot 469 is said to be a spectacular 1865, "fully struck with dazzling profile and surfaces... this is an aweome coin!"

Getting our breath back, we find that besides the Mocatta golds there will be a full gamut of other U.S. coinage and also considerable currency including several sheets of uncut small size bank notes.

There is a Foreign Section important enough to be separately cataloged by Europe's famous Galerie des Monnaies de Geneve.

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## Bletchman Raps Lasso for District Meeting Error

MANCHESTER — The campaign manager for one of the candidates for Eighth District, Bletchman, has attacked incumbent District President Gordon Lasso for not taking the responsibility for the error that was made in announcing this week's annual meeting.

Robert Bletchman, campaign manager for board member Lawrence Noone, who is running against Lasso for president, Friday said that under the by-laws of the Eighth District, Lasso assumed a power to provide the notice for the annual meeting, he also had the further duty to assure that the power be assumed was "faithful, loyal and legally discharged."

Bletchman was referring to the annual meeting notice which was published in The Herald June 23 for the annual meeting to be held June 27, four days instead of the five days required by statute between the date of notice and the meeting.

About 300 Eighth District residents turned out for the meeting last Wednesday only to be told by Eighth District attorney John Labelle Sr. that the meeting was void because of the error between the notice and the meeting date. The meeting has been rescheduled for Thursday, July 5, at 7:30 p.m. in Bentley School.

"Personally, I am very distressed that the blame for failure of proper notice will fall on anyone but Gordon Lasso," Bletchman said. "The notice warning was signed June 19 by Gordon Lasso."

With reference to the statutory requirement for the five-day interim, Bletchman said he thinks Lasso is 100 times unfamiliar with the law that the Eighth District leaders are supposed to know.

He read part of the statute which says, "The warning and notice of the (annual) meeting shall be given for publication in a newspaper at least five days previous to the meeting, not including the meeting date."

In addition to election of a district president, board members will be elected and the proposed budget will be approved.

## Grasso Fills Housing Post

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. Ella Grasso Friday appointed Joseph Canale, head of the Danbury Housing Authority, to serve as executive director of Connecticut's new, cabinet-level Department of Housing.

Canale, 63, a native of Danbury, also is president of the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials. His new post, effective July 13, will pay \$22,900 a year.

"Joe Canale is a nationally recognized leader in the housing field," said Mrs. Grasso. She had promised during her 1978 campaign to establish the new agency. The Legislature passed the law this year.

Housing matters previously were under the jurisdiction of the state Department of Economic Development.

## Court Workers Protest

HARTFORD (UPI) — Connecticut court administrators, said there were some disruptions but court business did continue.

A Man on the Moon

Time flies, memory fades. It is a full 10 years since man first walked on the moon, yet it does not seem like yesterday...

They named 12, and if 11 of their numbers could be recalled, one can Neil Armstrong. He was the first. And not the least noteworthy aspect of the ceremonial events to be staged by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration...

The lunar experience and enduring fame of the Apollo mission was difficult, leading in a few cases to psychological breakdown and shattered lives. One moon-walker found in it a lasting religious experience...

But of all the reactions to the experience and subsequent histories of the lunar astronauts, Neil Armstrong's may be the most unusual.

His is a name that will share a place in the chronicles of mankind with only a few others - Christopher Columbus and Charles Lindbergh being the first to come to mind and perhaps the only others to be commemorated in the history of man.

K Vetoes Query to Russians

WASHINGTON - Documents buried in government archives disclose that former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger brazenly vetoed a State Department move to help an 80-year-old Swedish woman learn the fate of her son, a heroic diplomat who disappeared into the Soviet prison system at the close of World War II.

The missing Swede is Raoul Wallenberg, who as a 31-year-old diplomat stationed in Budapest, was credited with having saved thousands of Hungarian Jews from Hitler's extermination camps. Such selflessness was apparently incomprehensible to the Russians. When they overran Hungary they promptly arrested Wallenberg, whisked him off to Moscow and sentenced him to prison without trial on charges of espionage.

That may be the significant fact in his own reading of the nature of his subsequent actions. After a brief period in the public spotlight that included a showbiz turn in one of comedian Bob Hope's ritual tours of American fighting fronts - this one Vietnam - Armstrong turned his back on fame. He withdrew from public life to the University of Cincinnati, determined, according to spokesmen for that institution, to be not a celebrity but a university professor.

Armstrong has largely avoided public attention since, refusing to participate in fifth-anniversary observances of the moon landing. His participation in the July 20 ceremonies, therefore, may be presumed to lend additional luster and interest.

The probably will not, however, provide the answer to why having participated in the making of history, he has chosen to withdraw from his own times. He did not have to be the first man to set foot on the moon, but as commander of the Apollo mission, he was the first to be there.

However reluctant he may be to exploit his role in history, Neil Armstrong cannot, however, withdraw from it. History will have none of that.

After all, it was he who said it first. It may have been a small step for the man who actually took it, but it will forever be recalled as "one giant leap for mankind."

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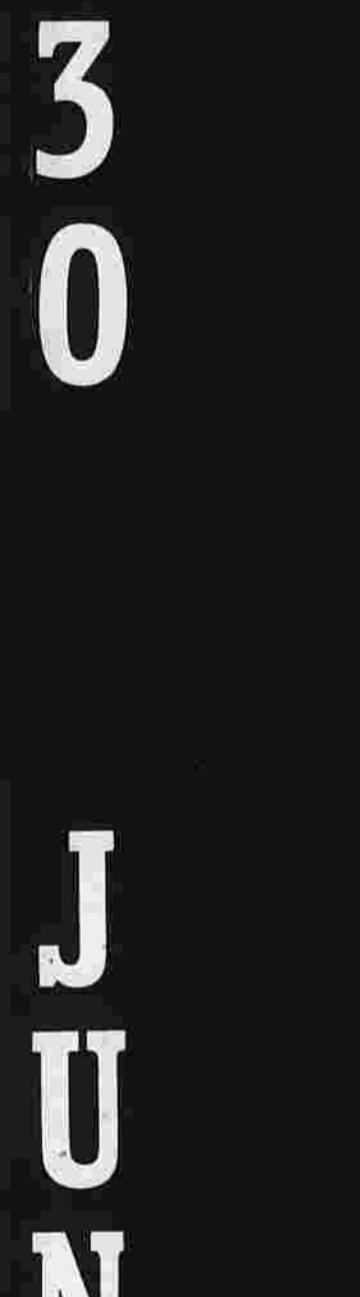

The other alternative would be for Manchester to petition the General Assembly to release the 250 customers so that the MDC could pick up those people, Pryby said.

"For those already on existing iron pipe, the charge could be \$2 to \$3 a foot. For those on the old wooden main, it could cost \$2 to \$3, plus another \$10.90 per foot to have the new main installed," Pryby said.

Pryby estimated that the highest cost to the individual consumer would be \$1,800.

He said that MDC cannot pick up the whole charge of installing service to these people.

"The MDC can recoup all but \$400,000 and they said they would not proceed until someone pays for it. This is really Manchester's problem if they want to get rid of that costly service," Pryby said.

"Manchester is going to have to take the first action for this thing to get off the ground," Pryby added.

Mrs. Lawson said the planning office differs from others she has worked in. In other offices, the callers often ask the same questions again and again.

In the Planning Office, each caller seemed to have a different question or problem.

"That's the hardest part. You don't get the same questions over and over," she said.

## Simple Foam Is Blamed In Sewer Tank Problem

**MANCHESTER** — Foam usually is associated with beer or rubber, but it also has been pinpointed as the probable reason why the cover of a town sewage treatment digester was knocked out of place last December.

The cost of repairing that digester will be about \$70,000, the study, written by the Metcalf & Eddy engineering firm, said.

The study also said that some problems at the plant — its gas piping system and corrosion to part of the cover's attachment system — could have been detected earlier.

The study was required after the incident at the digester. The tank's 30,000-pound cover was lifted out of place after gas built up inside the tank.

The study said foam may have formed inside the tank, which holds sludge, a product of the sewage treatment process, for further treatment.

This foam apparently entered gas piping in the system and may have caused pressure switches and regulators to malfunction, the study said. It also may have affected a pressure-vacuum relief system.

These parts of the system might have helped regulate the gas buildup or at least given a signal to workers that the problem was developing.

But, the parts apparently were thrown out of kilter by the foam in the system, the report said.

Jay Giles, director of public works, said the reason for the foam has not been determined, but it might have been caused by excess air in the tank.

Foam is a problem that does occur at times in the sludge-treatment process, Giles said.

The study also said, "The entire gas system should be examined and checked for proper operation."

Giles said the system probably should have been given a thorough examination about 10 years ago, but it was not done at that time to save money. The examination would cost about \$5,000, Metcalf & Eddy estimated.

The firm's study also said some of the welds that broke when the cover shifted had been corroded.

"This suggests that the cover may have been damaged and weakened prior to the failure in December," the study said.

It said cost of repairing the cover will be \$60,000 and will take one to two months once construction starts. Engineering costs will be another \$6,000 to \$7,000, the firm said.

## Development Chief To Take Bank Post

**EAST HARTFORD** — Development Director Warren H. Sullivan has resigned his position with the town to become vice president of the Connecticut division of Hartford National Bank.

Sullivan has been the town's development director for two years.

During that period, he has seen developers snap up all but one parcel in the South Meadows, a redevelopment area under the federal Urban Renewal program.

Sullivan also coordinated the expansion and addition of businesses in the town.

He described his two years as "an extremely active and fruitful period for the town."

He credited Mayor Richard H. Blackstone for his "guidance and direction" in helping him bring new development to the town.

Blackstone said he accepted Sullivan's resignation with sadness. He said he hopes to recommend Sullivan for an appointment to a board or commission.

New businesses which have come into the town during the past two years include High Standards, Hall Brewery and Storage World, he said.

Also, Kenworth Trucking and Pratt & Whitney division of United Technologies have expanded their local facilities, he said.

Pratt & Whitney added a \$10 million lab facility and recently broke ground on a \$7.5 million office building.

Sullivan said the development office has many other projects which it is working on. These include an areawide transportation study, the Community Development program, the implementation of the North Meadows study and coordination of the sale of the remaining South Meadows tract.

South Meadows development has spurred interest in tracts of land south of the redevelopment area, he said.

Howden Inc. has moved into a building off the Meadow Street extension and there is renewed interest in the abandoned Marina Towers area.

## Art Goes to School

School's out — but the memory lingers on at least for some third and fourth graders in Manchester who were exposed to a unique art program from October to May.

"Art Goes to School," a dialogue presentation of art to children, made a hit with youngsters at Martin, Buckley and Highland Park schools.

According to Rosemarie Papa, one of three volunteer teachers participating in the program, "the children discovered the painting through questions and answers. The program is a window to the world of art."

"The Junior League initiated the 'Art Goes to School' program five years ago. This year the training program was open to nonleague residents of Manchester in an effort to evolve it into a community project which would eventually be self-sufficient," she said.

"The program was so well-received by the individual schools, as well as by the Manchester Board of Education that it will be offered to all schools in September 1979. Susan Plesse, coordinator of volunteers, will be coordinating the program."

Another volunteer teacher, Ronnie Kim of Manchester, agrees that the program was eagerly accepted by the youngsters, but feels that the administration should have acknowledged it.

"As far as we know, it's the only such program east of the river. The reason I would like acknowledgment from the administration is because it is a free piece of teaching with a bone line budget."

"All of the prints were provided by other prints by the same artist, art books, etc. The children loved to know where the original is, love to hear little stories about the artists. The art teacher for the town schools is supplementing Mrs. Wichman's course. "She is taking the fourth week of my category and giving the children a project with the month's category. For example, one month will be the subject abstracts with three different prints of three different artists."

Teaching can be fun, according to Mrs. Wichman. "We were discussing the artist, Joan Miro, and the category portraits. I was explaining to the class that the children could actually paint me a Joan Miro — like the one we were studying — Portrait 1938. One of the youngsters, his eyes dancing, asked me if he could do just that. Sign Joan Miro's name to the painting and sell it for a small fortune. Thus, my discussion became one of the law, ethics, forgery, prison sentences, etc."

Among the paintings studied were "The Blue Boy" by Gainsborough; "Don Manuel Osorio" by Goya; "Dancer with Bouquet" by Degas; "Music at the Tuileries" by Manet; "By the Seashore" by Renier; "Purple Robe" by Matisse; "George Washington" by Stuart; and "Maestro" by Dalí.

So, if your youngsters startle you this summer by exclaiming on just what colors Whistler used when he painted a portrait of his mother, stay tuned in. They may just have been among the lucky students who participated in "Art Goes to School" in Manchester.

## Council Votes Shifts In Town Budget Items

VERNON — The transfer of funds from one account to another is some of the department budgets, and additional appropriations were approved by the Town Council Wednesday night.

The transferred amounts totaled about \$25,000 and the additional appropriations, about \$466.

Town clerk Henry Butler asked for an additional \$110 from the general fund of the town for his office supplies budget for additional duplicate copies and legal advertisements.

Robert Dotson, director of administration, asked to transfer \$2,200 from the executive and administrative utilities account. He said current bills due amount to \$3,827.38 which would leave a balance of \$1,627.38 in the account for miscellaneous billings arriving after the transfer.

The town clerk also asked for an additional \$124.50 to pay part-time help hired due to the extended illness of one of his employees.

Police Chief Herman Fritz received permission to transfer \$1,000 from his salaries and wages account

to office supplies to buy flares, pay the monthly rental on the copy machine, to pay for food for prisoners, and for office supplies.

Fritz also asked to transfer \$3,500 from salaries and wages to the operating supplies account to replace damaged items, and for parts and repairs to the cruisers, for a fire extinguisher to be refilled and an extra refill and rental on oxygen.

He also asked for the transfer of \$22.76 from equipment and buildings or additions to school police salaries and wages to complete the school crossing guard payroll for this school year.

A request was made to transfer \$1,100 from the executive and administrative utilities account to the Traffic Authority to cover the anticipated shortage due to the installation of additional lights around town.

Ronald W. Hime, director of public works, asked to transfer \$12,234.74, \$4,076.80 from general government buildings salaries and \$8,837.94 from refuse salaries, to the general maintenance salaries account.

Hime said that the additional funds

are need to cover payroll for the remainder of the year due to both overtime on sewer problems and emergencies after hours and weekends, plus unfunded severance pay, sick pay, vacations and such for one of the acting foremen, which was not anticipated.

Hime said that there was a surplus in the general government buildings and refuse salary accounts because several periods of time went without some positions being filled. He said this was because some men left the department and the fact that there were several changes in positions.

Mrs. Jean Pearsall, director of social services, asked to transfer \$200 from the social services general assistance fund to River East Homeaker Service rentals and contractual.

She said that the original appropriation in the account was \$5,500. However, she said, River East is presently assisting five Vernon families and there is presently only a \$70 balance for the remainder of this fiscal year.

# Borg Shakes Off Injury to Win, McEnroe, Connors Also Advance

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) — Bjorn Borg, the stoic Swede often accused of being emotionless, had his little joke on Wimbledon Friday, and was the only one who came away laughing.

Reacting to rampant rumors that he not only was suffering from a high injury, but that he might not even show up for his third-round match, the defending champion ran free with the wind and crushed American Hank Pfister 6-4, 6-1, 6-3 for his more effortless victory thus far.

"I did not feel my injury that much," Borg said, with little emotion. "It only hurts a bit when I have to reach way out. I was moving very

well and playing very well. If it is like this in my next match, I won't mind."

"If I lose I am going to lose on the tennis court. I don't matter if I am going to be dead or whatever. I am going out there and play. But for the moment I feel very good and there is no problem."

The other two members of the Big Three also won with relative ease, peaking in time for next week's run for the championship.

Second seed John McEnroe beat fellow-American Tom Gullikson 6-4, 6-4, 7-6 and next has to contend with Tom's twin brother Tim while No. 3 seed Jimmy Connors defeated South African top player, John Kriek, 6-4, 6-1, 7-6.

However, three more seeded players were bounced from the

men's singles, leaving only six seeds in the round of 16.

The biggest shocker of the day was the dismissal of French Open finalist Peter Pecci, the 8th seed from Paraguay. Pecci, 29, who beat Connors and Guillermo Vilas before losing to Borg in the Paris final, was stunned by Brad Drewett of Australia, 4-6, 7-6, 7-6, 6-4.

Drewett, who had a quality for Wimbledon, is unranked at home and is only 14th in the world.

The 20-year-old left-hander won the tiebreakers 11-9 and 10-8, and received a standing ovation when he walked off the No. 1 court.

"I don't think he played as well as he can," Drewett said of Pecci. "I thought if I could just hang on there a bit and see what happens. I had nothing to lose."

Martina Navratilova, the defending champion and top seed, beat Rosemary Casals 6-3, 6-3. No. 3 Chris Evert beat Kathy Teacher, 6-4, 6-3. No. 3 Evonne Goolagong Cawley beat Cynthia Doerner, 7-5, 6-2, and No. 4 seed Tracy Austin defeated Betty Ann Stuart, 6-2, 6-3.

Controversy has surrounded the last two major road races in Manchester, the traditional Five Mile last Thanksgiving and the 12-mile Connecticut AAU championship last Sunday as part of the New England Relay.

Charlie Duggan figured in both. Last November, he placed second in the holiday run to John Treacy of Providence, the world cross country champion.

Treacy never filed an official entry but was awarded first place and the No. 1 prize.

"Maybe I should have filed an official protest," Duggan said after Sunday's run in a joking manner.

Two years earlier, in the Five Mile, Bob Hensley, then with the University of Oregon, did not file an entry but ran and finished behind Amy Burfoot but was not listed as an official finisher.

Sunday, Duggan had his heart set on a record-breaking performance in the 3-mile run. Holder of the record, he was an absentee a year ago when Bill Krohn of Manhattan College won and erased Duggan's standard.

Due to a mixup, just where the finger of blame should be pointed is not known, in the first mile of the run, Duggan, who was leading by a wide margin, was diverted off course and onto the 12-mile run.

The rest is now history. He won the 12-mile although not an official entrant.

Second place finisher and defending 12-mile king George Strenz-nikas was not too pleased with the turn of events but indicated that he would not file any protest with the sanctioning Connecticut Amateur Athletic Association.

Stramitakas was apparently happy being crowned the subsequent division champ and he held his 12-mile title due to his Connecticut residency which was a must to qualify.

**Jabbar Realistic, Best Games Past**

NEW YORK (UPI) — The toughest admission for any athlete to make is that he's through. The next most difficult one is for him to concede that the biggest part of his career is behind him.

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar doesn't have that kind of hangup.

His basketball career isn't finished yet by any means but he's honest enough to tell you the major portion of it is over, the moon is in the last quarter, so to speak, and quite likely something entirely different is in store for him up the road, possibly in the music industry or maybe in the movies.

"I've definitely played more seasons than I'm going to play," says the Los Angeles Lakers' center, who has put in 10 years in the NBA.

"Professional sports are unique in that you're at the end of your career before you're 40. I'm 32. I'd like to fulfill my present contract which runs until I'm 35. What I would like to do is keep playing as long as I have the physical and mental capacity. Who knows when that will give way?"

For years, Abdul-Jabbar was the most dominant one-man force in professional basketball. Some say he still is on given nights. Measured by any yardstick, Abdul-Jabbar has come a long way since the days when he was known as Lew Alcindor. Sheltered and protected to a large degree because of all the publicity he generated in high school and college, he never had too much to say and was thought of being withdrawn.

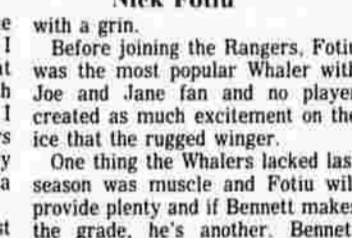

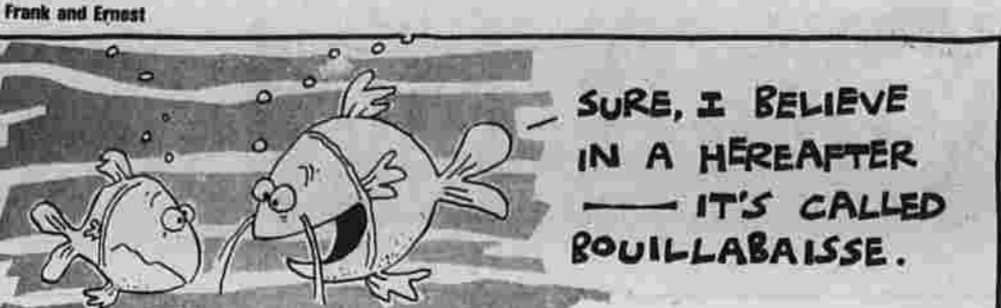

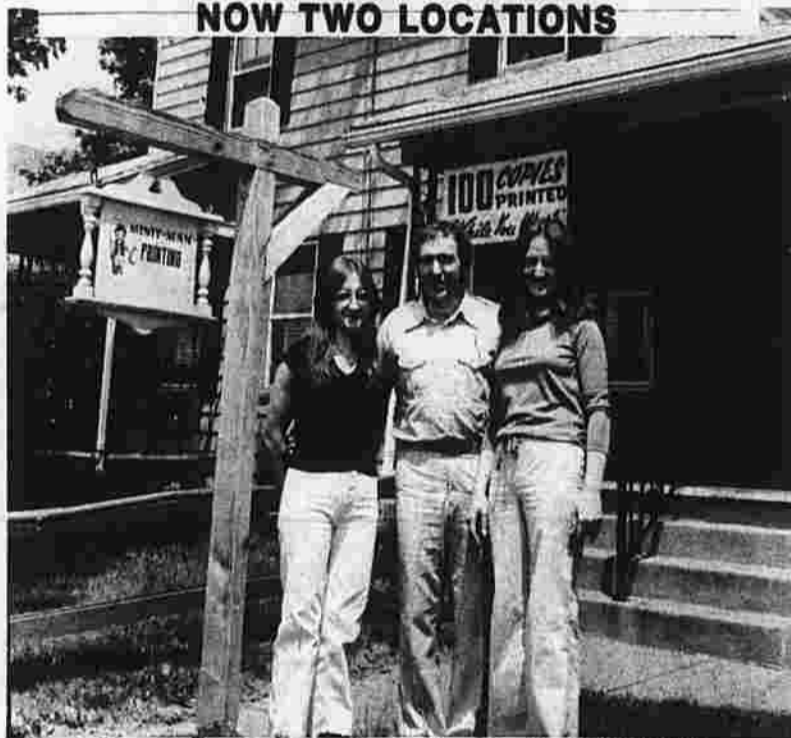

**HOLLYWOOD (NEA)** - Is there a door around here marked "Maureen O'Sullivan"?

She is one of Hollywood's veterans, a lady known for years as Tarzan's Jane, unfortunately, because there was a lot more to her than that.

Now she's known mostly as Mia Farrow's mother, which is again unfortunate, because she's still a great lady in her own right.

She is troubled because she can't seem to get any movie roles today. That's the most unfortunate thing of all. Other actresses her age — she's 68 — work but she can't seem to find jobs here. She looks marvelous and is, as always, witty and wise and warm.

"I have seen Hollywood through many doors," she says. "Each one opens on a different view. The first one I came through was the door for the young Irish girl. Then there was the door marked 'Star.' Then the one as Frank Sinatra's mother-in-law (when Mia was Mrs. S.) and the one as Mia Farrow's mother. And so many others."

"I certainly hope there are a few more doors I have left to open."

She works steadily — but on the stage. She just finished a much-praised "Pygmalion" here, and is moving on to Illinois for a brief engagement in "Morning's At Seven." She says she has been doing stage work pretty steadily now for the past 17 years. The last movie she made was "Never Too Late" in 1962.

"I just can't understand why I can't get any movie roles now," Miss O'Sullivan says. "Other ladies my age — Myrna Loy and Mildred Natwick — work in films. I'm going to have a very serious talk with my agent about that. If he can't get me

some parts, it's time to change agents."

Maureen O'Sullivan first set eyes on Hollywood, and vice versa, in 1931. The vice versa may have been better, because she was a beautiful 20-year-old colleen and quickly shot to the top of the Hollywood bunch.

"It was lovely here then," she says, somewhat sadly. She married director John Farrow and they had seven children — "but I lost one" — including Mia and Tisa, the two actresses in the brood.

"I realize," she says, "that because of the Tarzan films, I became part of the folklore of the world. Jane is as much a folklore character

now as Cinderella. But, do you know, we only made five or six pictures together, Johnny and me — I never can remember if it was five or six — but they were spread over several years, so people think there were more."

She recently went out to the hospital to see Johnny Weissmuller, her Tarzan, and she says the reports of his condition are exaggerated. Many stories indicated he was senile and unable to take care of himself.

"He isn't senile," she says. "He recognized me and was glad to see me. We've gotten closer, over the years."

"He was always a very

wonderful and a unique person — he actually did not know how to be unhappy when he was younger. But now, after several strokes, he is unhappy. But he is not as bad as has been written."

She says she has no idea where Johnny Sheffield, the boy who played Boy in the movies with her, is today. She says the last she heard he was in Baja California, where he had made a lot of money running a fleet of shrimp boats. She says that Weissmuller hasn't heard from him since he was hospitalized, and that has saddened him because they were very close.

The O'Sullivan-Farrow acting dynasty may go into a third generation, she thinks. She has a granddaughter named Brittany Farrow, the 9-year-old daughter of her son, Patrick, a sculptor. And she believes Brittany has it.

"She is a fiery little girl," she says, "and very smart and she is already acting and doing it very well. For one thing, her name is really Melissa, but she isn't a Melissa, so when she was 2½, they changed her name to Brittany."

Among other projects, Maureen O'Sullivan is currently writing her autobiography. She's taking it slowly. That's probably just as well — there is sure to be another door, and she should wait and see what's behind it.
