The latest estimate from the North American Air Defense Command is that Skylab will reenter the atmosphere within a six day period centered around Thursday, July 12.

MANCHESTER - The town has filed liens against 136 property owners who owe a total of \$310,651 in real estate taxes for the 1978-79 fiscal

The liens were filed today against those owners who failed to pay taxes on property for the last fiscal year, Re venue James Turek said.

More than \$80,000 in real estate taxes were collected Friday, and the tax collection total for the fiscal year will exceed 100 percent of estimates,

Town officials said this year is the first time in several years that collections exceeded estimates for the year. The Board of Directors bases its tax collection estimates on a percentage - usually about 98 per-cent - of the total amount of taxes

Friday was the last day to pay at the office to avoid the placement of a lien on property, Turek said. This led to the last-minute flurry, which pushed tax collections for the year

above the estimated revenues. The liens were filed against 136 property owners who own a total of 377 different pieces of property. Many of those property owners have appealed their tax assessment, so hey only paid 75 percent of their



Warrant To Charge Hamden Police Chief

HAMDEN (UPI) - Arrest warrants have been signed for Hamden's police chief and two sergeants who were suspended as the result of a grand jury probe into alleged wrongdoing in the town's police department, a spokesman for the chief state's attorney's office said

The warrants were signed last week in Meriden Superior Court for Plice Chief John P. Ambrogio and Sgts. Frederick Morro and Robert Nolan by Judge Thomas J. O'Neill, the spokesman said. The three were among the six policemen and one prosecutor named in Superior Court Judge George A. Saden's one-man grand jury report of alleged

irregularities in the department.

The specific charges weren't disclosed but Saden's report concluded there was ample evidence to arrest the three on various charges including tampering with evidence, unlawful removal of records and conspiracy to

cover up an arrest.
Also named in Saden's report was Meriden prosecutor Charles K. Thompson, who resigned from his post. Chief State's Attorney Austin McGuigan earlier said there were no grounds for criminal prosecution in Thompson's

The probe followed a complaint to a state's atrorney in March, 1978, that the officers attempted to cover up the arrest of Hamden Mayor Lucien DiMeo Jr.'s son on

shopiliting charges.

The grand jury probe ventured into other areas, including the alleged mishandling of confiscated weapons by the department.
