

Choral Directors To Meet

HARTFORD — Choral directors from 13 states in the Northeast will convene at the University of Hartford's Hart College of Music July 23-27. Nationally known choral specialists will lead a week long symposium for high school, college and community choral directors.

Registration for the symposium continues through the opening session on Monday, beginning at 10 a.m. at the Fuller Music Center.

Choral specialists who will conduct the workshop and seminars during the week are: Walter Collins, Bert Konowitz, Howard Swan, Gregg Smith and Gerald Mack.

Walter Collins, president of the American Choral Directors Association and of the College Music Society, is associate dean at the University of Colorado College of Music. He will discuss Editing Choral Music, Choral Programming and Performance Practice and the Funding and Support of Amateur Chorus.

Bert Konowitz, Columbia University faculty member, is director of music and the performing arts in the Rockville Center (Long Island, N.Y.) public schools and educational director, Cherry Lane Music Publications.

He will develop the topics: A New Frontier — Choral Improvisation: An Approach to Teaching Musicianship — The Jazz Choir, and Junior High Concert Programming.

Howard Swan, educator, author and choral conductor is retired professor of music at Occidental College, Los Angeles and California State University, Fullerton. He will lecture on Development of the Choral Instrument and Motivational Techniques in the Choral Rehearsal.

Gregg Smith, choral conductor and composer will discuss the Organization and Structure of Professional Chorus; Interpretation of Contemporary American Music; Foundations, Government and Business in Music. His Gregg Smith Singers will present a demonstration of Contemporary Choral Techniques and Concert: "Choral and Theatre."

The symposium, which is under the direction of Gerald Mack, director of choral activities at Hart College of Music, is a program designed to assist directors in improving their choral skills, to upgrade the image of choral music, to organize a cooperative program in choral endeavors regionally, and to educate choral directors in the areas of grantmanship.

The Gregg Smith Singers will give a public concert in conjunction with the symposium on Tuesday evening, July 24 at the University of Hartford's Lincoln Theater. The professional choir will perform music of all periods from Monteverdi to the contemporary, including jazz, popular music, multidimensional sound and theater works. Tickets are available at the door.

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Collectors' Corner Mammoth Catalog Out

Hard on the heels of the new Red Book as reported here last week comes the 1980 edition of the mammoth "Standard Catalog of World Coins" by Chet Krause and Cliff Mishler. This is the sixth appearance of the so-called "phone book." It is fully as large as the Hartford directory or an old-time Sears Roebuck catalog.

The publication describes and lists 71,000 coins with illustrations of 35,000 of them in their actual sizes. Mintage statistics are given when available and the coins are pinpointed by date, mint and variety. In general, each coin is listed in several wear conditions with its present market value in dollars.

There are 1,856 large pages to cover coins from 1,276 countries, states, provinces or cities issued over the past 200 years, sometimes going even farther back into the mists of time. Russia starts with 1762, the Order of Malta with 1776 and the Papal States 1785.

There is a section for United States coins beginning with the 1787 Fugio cents. The pricing seems to compare closely with the Red Book as far as it goes.

Among the special features is a four-page Country Index — Aachen to Zurich — where you can look up the coinage of Tosa, Tonkin, Tortosa, Torsola, Tons, Tunka, Tanquebar and other places.

The editors really try to be helpful. Instead of the frustrating "see so-and-so that we get in some reference books, such as the World Almanac, which lists the names of the countries, the names of the coins and the pages are big and black and the name of the country is repeated on every margin. This is very reassuring in the welter of exotic coins we encounter; i.e., taka,kyat, bir, marka, dalasi, chio, forint, dinar, polaco, kwacha, rringilo, ougou, metica, kina, plos, gisarami, shilling, bahi, pa'anga, dirham, tala and many others.

There are tables for foreign exchange rates and the International Numeral System. A study of the "Standard Catalog Silver and Gold Value Charts" indicates how these numbers have gone up and away. A Russian common date five-ruble gold piece is worth (as this is written) \$38.49 to melt down, while the Catalog has it valued at only \$25.XF and \$35 uncirculated. A British sovereign brings \$68.97 as gold bullion and fine ones are carried in the book at \$60.

Similarly, Canadian coins in 80 percent silver are listed for several dates at 80 cents to a dollar while the metal in them is worth at least \$1.35. This situation may enable an alert collector to pick a steper now and then.

The Krause and Mishler catalog has a sticker price of \$24.50 and is at present in stock at the Connecticut Valley Coin, So-Deb, and the Pet Shop on Main Street.

Collection spots will be set up on at various places in town for donations for the tag sale, Miss Giblin said.

Suggested items for the sale include toys, books, tools, cribs, children's furniture, small appliances, pictures, mirrors, tables, chairs, small bureaus, pots and pans, dishes, vases, candleholders, sporting goods, bicycles, lamps, shoes, coats, jackets, sweaters, coats, scarves, pocketbooks and jewelry.

Miss Giblin said she learned from the 1978 tag sale that items not wanted include mattresses, storm and screen doors and windows, dresses, blouses and belts.

The former Red & White fruit stand on West Center Street is being proposed as the site for the sale, she said.

Although the concerts are open to the public free of charge, voluntary donations are being received at this summer's concerts to help defray the cost of the concerts, Maccarone said.

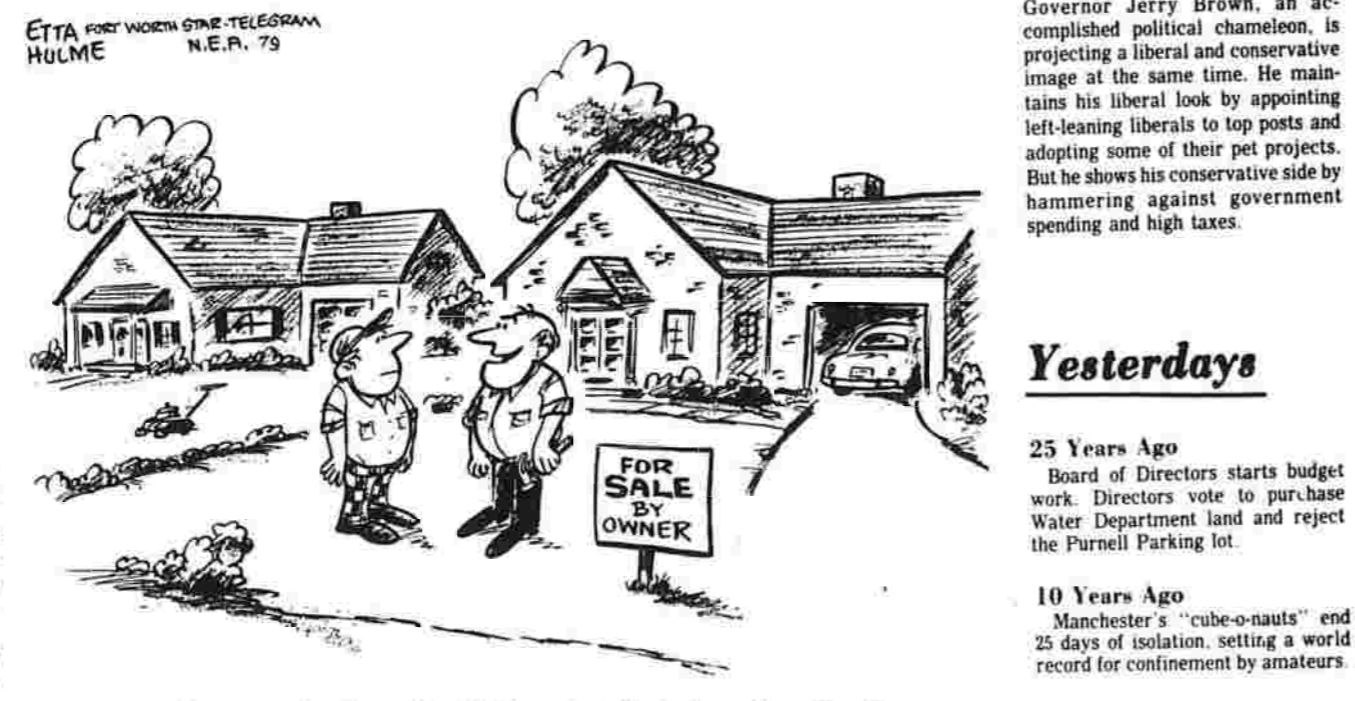

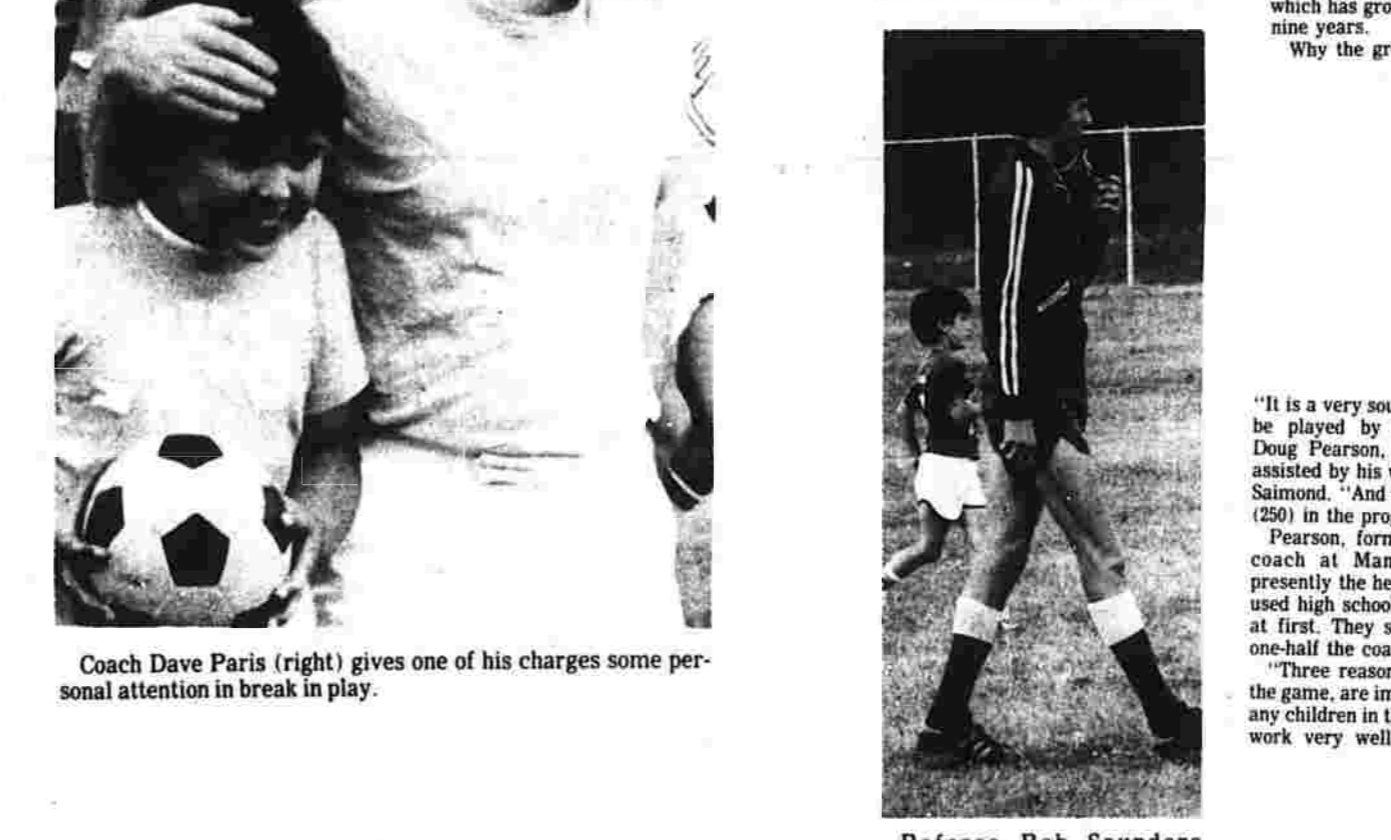

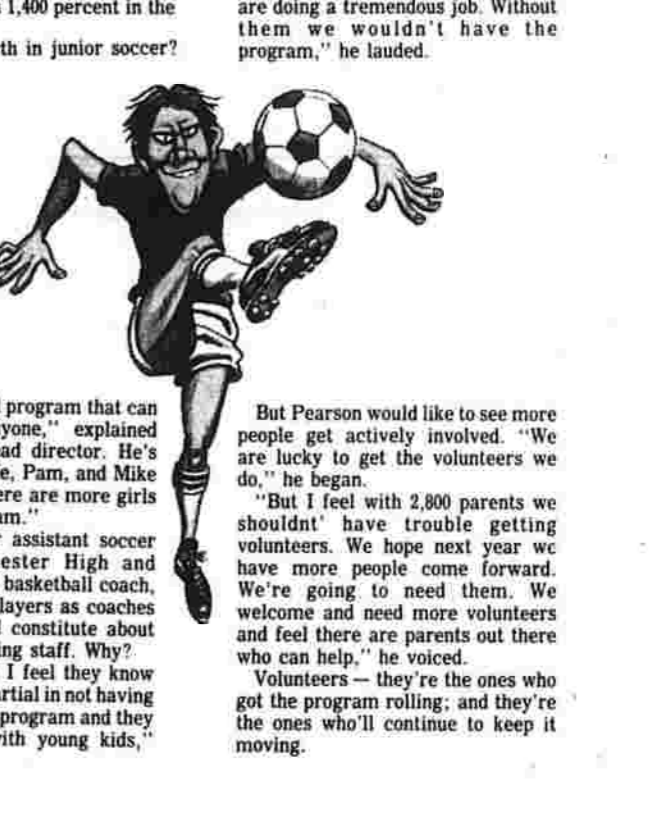

Union Tie Seen in Ambush

MIDDLETOWN (UPI) - Officials now believe the ambush shooting of state employees' union leader Salvatore Perruccio was a union-related - and may have stemmed from a dispute within his union, police chief Eugene Rame said Friday.

Perruccio, 53, president of the 8,000-member Connecticut Employees Independent Union, was gunned down in his front yard late June 18 as he returned home from his union office.

He was released from Middlesex Memorial Hospital Tuesday after a

month of treatment for a shotgun wound in his side and arm.

Rame said investigators had narrowed down both possible motives and suspects in the case and were "actively looking at the activities of certain individuals affiliated with CEIU."

He said police had turned their evidence over to "other law enforcement agencies" for their "cooperation and assistance," but he refused to elaborate.

"We feel we are closer," Rame said, adding that he was encouraged by the progress of the investigation.

Fog Hampers Search Effort

CAPE ELIZABETH, Maine (UPI) - Fog shrouded waters frustrated searchers Friday as officials tried to unravel the mysterious disappearance of a plane carrying two New Hampshire men which apparently crashed miles off course in the ocean.

"It's weird. I can't for the life of me understand it," Maine Civil Air Patrol information officer Raymond said shaking his head. "It's very weird. He was a very experienced pilot. It doesn't make any sense."

She noted the plane apparently went down off Cape Elizabeth about 90 degrees off the course. The pilot had filed only a notification he would be flying from Lewiston, Maine, to Nashua, N.H.

The search was concentrated off Maine's coast after a front wheel assembly belonging to a Cessna 310-D was found washed ashore in a "small cove" in Cape Elizabeth near Portland.

MANCHESTER - Town officials will look into the possibility of hiring part-time employees to assist dog wardens on weekends.

The town now has a full-time dog warden who is an employee of the Police Department and works Monday through Friday.

This presents a problem on weekends if a roaming dog is causing trouble. Persons are told to try to catch the dog and it will be picked up by a police officer.

The directors said they would like the warden duties. Steven Werber, personal supervisor, will look into hiring persons to handle that duty.

The directors said they would like to have a retired police officer or someone else with past dog-handling experience to fill the position.

Werber will meet with the police union to see if any objections it might have to such a proposal.

"The key is to provide a better service to the public," Cassano said.

"That's what we're looking for," Dians said.

Jury Finds Falby Guilty Rejects Insanity Plea

BRIDGEPORT (UPI) - A Bridgeport Superior Court jury Friday afternoon found Westport gardener Edward Falby, 19, guilty of murdering a 9-year-old girl last summer.

The eight-man, four-woman jury rejected Falby's defense of insanity and a possible reduced conviction for manslaughter in the suffocation death of Kari Jo Sparkland.

The girl's body was found face-down in a creek between her home and a shopping center June 13, 1978. She had gone to the field to gather food for a pet pony.

The jurors announced their decision shortly after 12:30 p.m. midway through their fourth day of deliberations.

As the verdict was read, only Falby's uncle, William Oton of South Norwalk, became emotional and began to cry. Falby's parents remained calm and looked straight ahead while the defendant stood with his arms crossed and faced the jury foreman motionless.

Falby appeared somewhat confused, turning to ask defense attorney Richard Mehan what had happened and then beginning to sob cry when the lawyer told him.

The defendant was then led into a conference room behind the defense table and his parents were allowed to go in with him.

Superior Court Judge T. Clark Hull ordered Falby's bond raised from \$100,000 to \$250,000 and set sentencing for Aug. 31.

Hull thanked the jury for its "promptness and personal unity."

"Your job will be long remembered," he said. "Words could not express the great tragedy of the trial but the job had to be done."

Mehan advised the defendant's family to appeal the conviction because "there are very serious issues that should be submitted to the (state) Supreme Court."

He said he felt badly for the Sparkland family and believed Hull had been extremely fair throughout the trial. He said he was also grateful that the jury gave careful consideration to all of the evidence.

But the defense attorney said he was unhappy with the murder conviction and had hoped the jury would return a verdict of innocent by mistake.

Jury members said they were unanimous in their verdict.

Mehan had presented testimony that Falby was frequently beaten by his father as a child and suffered from blackouts.

The lawyer said the key issue which should be challenged in a tape recorded confession the youth gave police three days after the slaying. Jurors heard the tape twice.

The jury would not have listened to two Assistant State's Attorneys who remained emotionless during the reading of the verdict. She said she will remain in Westport and added, "I have nothing to be ashamed of."

The jury began deliberations in the case Tuesday and had been told by Hull that there were five possible verdicts: guilty or innocent of murder, guilty or innocent of manslaughter or innocent by reason of insanity.

Jury members testified during the case from 25 state witnesses, 12 defense witnesses and five prosecution rebuttal witnesses.

Man Jailed in Murder

NEW HAVEN (UPI) - A three-judge panel Friday sentenced a New Haven man to 25 years to life in prison for the July 21, 1978 slaying of a Yale-New Haven Hospital nurse.

The sentence handed down against Raymond P. D'Antonio, 37, in New Haven Superior Court was the maximum allowable for his murder conviction.

D'Antonio was found guilty by the three-judge panel in June for the slaying of Karen Mount, 24, a practical nurse whose mutilated, nude body was found in the bathtub of her New Haven apartment.

D'Antonio was to be transferred to the Connecticut Correctional Institute in Somers to serve his sentence. He had been held at the New Haven Community Correctional Center since his arrest three days after the slaying.

One cure is to get out your readers' guide and see what movies are playing. This week's films range from the 16th-Century costume drama "Anne of the Thousand Days" to the riveting chase film "French Connection II."

All three networks are running films on Sunday, July 22.

On ABC it's "War Games," starring Brian Keith, Tony Curtis and Suzanne Pleshette. The cold war between an Army Base and a neighboring town turns hot and hilarious when two soldiers borrow a tank and wage comic combat with the town's private army.

CBS is reeling the final chapter of "Moses the Lawgiver" this Sunday. The Israelites encounter the final obstacles separating them from their promised land, a resting place their leader Moses is not destined to enjoy with them. Anthony Quayle portrays Aaron, Ingrid Thulin plays Miriam, and Irene Papas plays Zipporah.

Boston Shooting

BOSTON (UPI) — The second shooting in as many weeks prompted complaints by residents of the city's North End about neighborhood violence and recurring youth problems.

Anthony Corlito, 20, was gunned down about 1:25 a.m. Saturday and died a short time later at Massachusetts General Hospital, police said.

The shooting occurred near a small parking lot on Harris street where Joseph C. D'Amelio, 34, Wilmington, was found slumped over the front seat of his car July 10 with gunshot wounds in the head.

Officials said D'Amelio had been involved with organized gambling.

"We don't have any evidence of a connection," said Boston Police Captain Richard F. Leary. "I don't know any motive that triggered these shootings."

Corlito had been in trouble with police in the past, authorities said, and his known former associates were being questioned about his death.

Eva Fighting

TORRINGTON (UPI) — Critics called her a demagogue. Her followers treated her defeat as nothing less than a crucifixion. Eva Hudak lost the battle, hasn't abandoned the war.

This spring, Mrs. Hudak's narrow produced epithets from those who didn't like her, equally loud shouts from those who made her name synonymous with free speech, a hair-tearing indecision from politicians up against the wall.

It was more than three months ago that Gov. Ella Grassie's nomination of the 62-year-old hair commissioner to the state Board of Education was turned down by the Legislature's Executive Nominations Committee.

"I think it was their loss, mine," Mrs. Hudak says now. She's still bail commissioner for Litchfield County, but she's on vacation days to catch two state education meetings — just to keep an eye on things.
