Doctor Advises Running To Slow Aging Process

ST. LOUIS (UPI) - Satchel Paige, the legendary pitcher who played at a fountain of youth, had this rule for outlasting the ravages of age: "Don't look back - something might be gaining on you."

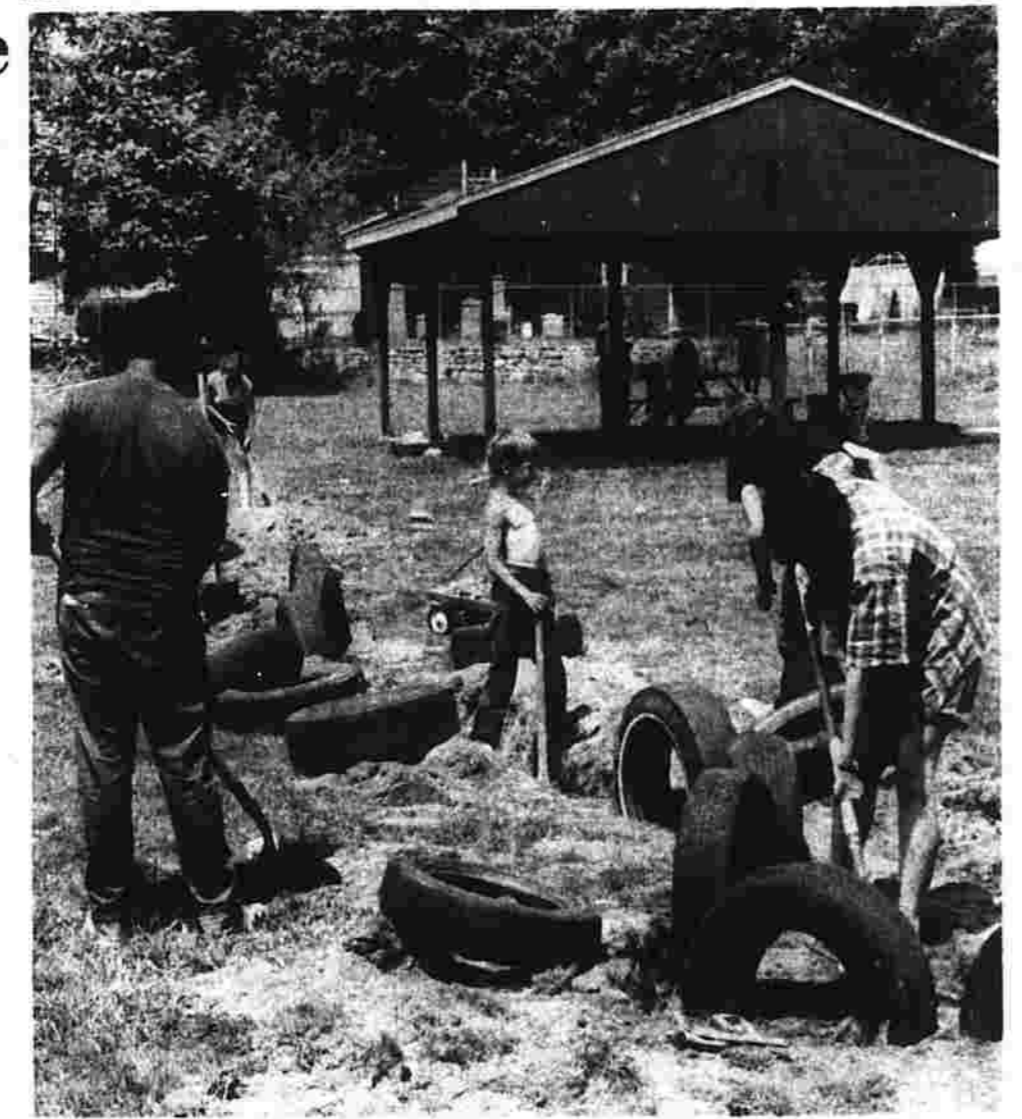
Dr. Gregory W. Heath adds this: "Keep on running and old age will fall farther behind." Heath and a research team at Washington University are studying older athletes to determine the effect of exercise on aging.

So far, a total of 22 older athletes, from ages 50 to 77, have run on a treadmill while Heath and others measured their capacity to use oxygen.

The study, conducted with a grant from the American Health Association, shows for those men who kept themselves in shape, the cardiovascular and respiratory systems declined only 4 percent per decade - half the rate for other men.

Rather, he theorizes, the steady exercising has helped the rate drop more slowly.

Heath is excited about what his results mean for the aging process in general and for the benefits of exercise.

If Your Zip's Wrong, Amoco Zaps Your Credit

WASHINGTON - The computerized letter from Amoco Oil Company was brief and to the point. Chery of Atlanta, Ga. had been rejected for a credit card because of income level, type of bank references and the company's credit experience "in your geographical area."



It wasn't the Deep South, or Georgia, or even Atlanta that Amoco disapproved of, it was Chery's neighborhood, as disclosed by her postal zip code. She is a white divorcee who makes about \$14,000 a year, which should be ample to pay her gas bills. But she lives in a zip that has been zapped by Amoco's credit analysts as a neighborhood of poor credit risks. So, no credit card.

Amoco's concern is that the use of zip codes, particularly in urban areas that are still largely segregated, is just a sneaky way of discriminating against minorities. Amoco insists that an applicant's location alone is never the main reason for refusing a credit card. The zip code is only one of 14 criteria on which applications are judged. On the other hand, Amoco told its associate Tony Capaccio that their system works—that zip codes can indeed be used to predict high credit risks.

Few creditors use the zip code in their scoring system, and Amoco is apparently the only major oil company that does. Under the Amoco system, the nation's 39,482 zip codes are classified on a scale of 1 through 5, applicants in Class 4 or 5 have the best chance of approval, those in Class 1 or 2, the worst. Amoco puts only 85 zip code areas in "Class 1 or 2" in the entire country, but the credit can be significant on a credit card applicant's rating. In most states where Amoco does business, a minimum score of 55 points is needed for approval. An applicant who lives in a Class 1 zip area is automatically penalized 17 points, no matter what his or her credit history may be; for a Class 2 neighborhood, the penalty is eight points.

The FTC's investigators have found a nationwide pattern in the zip code users. As a general rule, the greater the percentage of minorities in a given zip code area, the greater the likelihood that it will get a low classification. In Atlanta, for example, a Georgia State University sociologist analyzed city zip codes that Amoco had relegated to Class 1 or 2. He found that 23 percent of the city's whites, "It was found that as the percentage of non-whites in each zip code was increased, the percentage of credit applications approved decreased," the analysis showed. "The above data indicates that the denial of credit is strongly and significantly related to the nonwhite racial composition" of the zip code zones.

In Massachusetts, the state attorney general's investigators found a similar pattern in the zip code neighborhoods that Amoco had in fact blacklisted. The findings particularly incensed Sen. Paul Tsongas, D-Mass., who feels the Amoco's system of "neighborhood slight" strongly discourages restoration of rundown urban areas.

The FTC is quietly working on a consent agreement for Amoco's credit rating; the company would agree to stop using zip codes in its credit scoring system, without admitting any wrongdoing in the past. Massachusetts has filed suit against the oil company, charging that blacks are twice as likely as whites to be rejected for credit cards under the Amoco system. For its part, Amoco claims that if it is forced to abandon the use of zip codes, it would have to turn down about 200,000 more credit applications a year than it does now. "He said he did not believe that American security services were this inept."

His office is 1625 I St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006—two blocks from the White House.

Maine Solons Confused When Agreement Fails

AUGUSTA, Maine (UPI) — Members of Maine's congressional delegation said Friday they were surprised and confused that an agreement to settle the Indian lands claim case had fallen apart.

But White House aide Robert Lipshutz said the president will not sway from his already agreed-upon new funding of \$37 million, an amount to be appropriated by Congress to allow the Passamaquoddy and Penobscot Indians to purchase a least 200,000 acres of land from the state's largest landowners. Changes to the proposed plan presented by Tureen could raise the value of the total package offered to the Indians to \$73 million to \$86 million said Sen. William S. Cohen, R-Maine, in Oct. 1978.

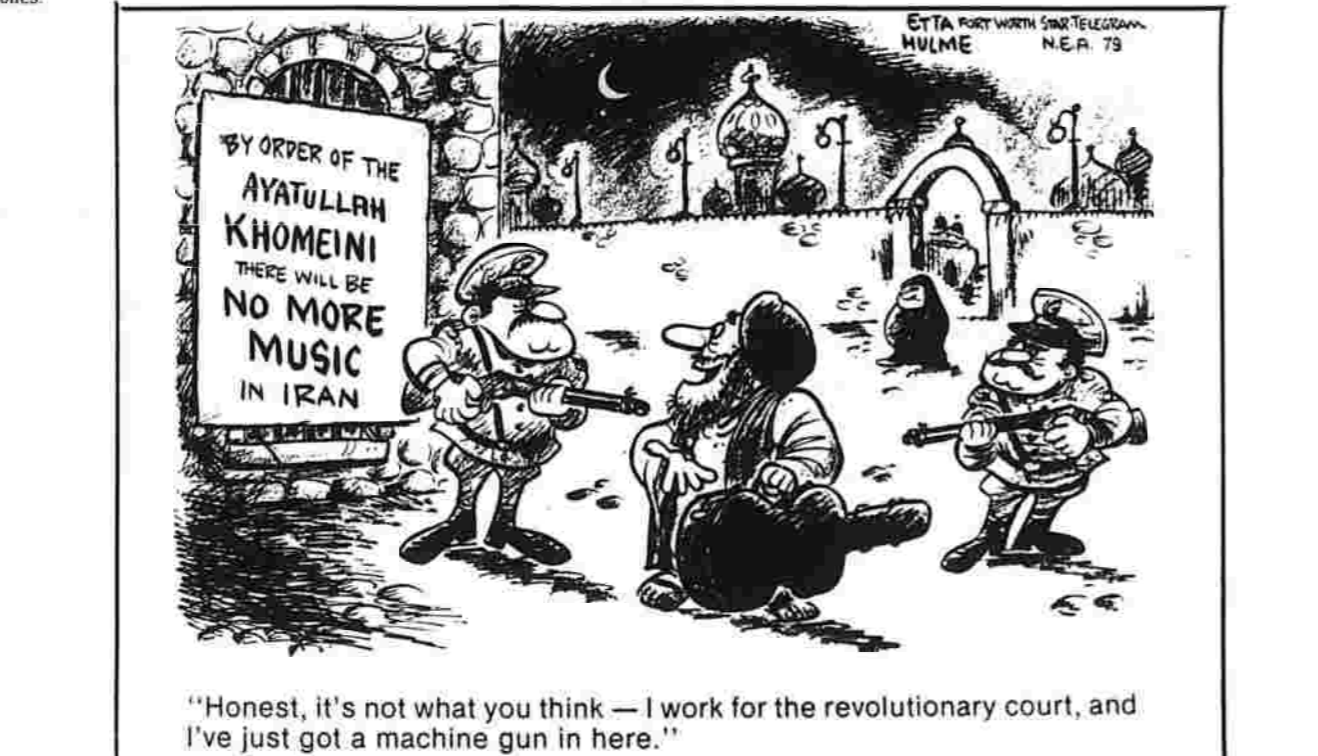

General Foods, in turn, will purchase air time from CBS.

Halmi explains that this is a "new approach, to bring a quality product to a sponsor, not a network. If you let the sponsor get the time, you can get more quality."

"If I could afford it," Halmi half-muses, "I'd go straight documentaries. I'd go to some weird place. I'd probably go to China and film Panda bears. At this point I can almost afford to do home movies."

In one episode of The Mary Tyler Moore Show, newsman Ted Baxter was offered a lucrative contract to emcee a game show. He declined when his boss ridiculed the quizmaster job.

For Canadian-born Alex Trebek, no such stigma exists. He's living proof that being a game show host can have its rewards.

Trebek is currently the popular host of the American program *High Rollers*. He previously presided over the activities on *The \$128,000 Question*, *The Wizard of Odds* and *CBC's Reach For the Top*. He'll return this fall as master of ceremonies on *CTV's* weekly skating extravaganza *Stars On Ice*.

Game shows are fun, says Trebek. The pay is good. The work is relatively easy, and it is not usually affected by layoffs — unless your show is cancelled. Also, it gives you a lot of spare time to devote to other things. I'm hoping to get into production and maybe some acting. Producing appeals to me more, because that's where the big money and power is. Films, television shows, it doesn't matter. If you want control, you become a director or producer.

Alex Trebek has spent 18 years working toward that goal. He started at 21 at *CBC Radio* in Ottawa, then moved to Toronto two years later. During the following 12 years, appeared on a variety of

I mean, if you're a fantastic success at the age of 25, what do you do then? You drive yourself nuts trying to match that success. I'd rather just keep building, building and building.

With this attitude, Alex Trebek intends to pursue his wish to start his own production company and make films in Canada. He feels that the Canadian film industry is on the upswing and he has several story ideas in mind.

What if things take too long to come together? I'm not too worried," he says. It's a question of getting the initial break, like anything else. Once you get that break, you coast along. It develops momentum on its own. If it doesn't happen, something else will be happening. As someone once said, The secret to happiness isn't getting what you want, it's wanting what you get.

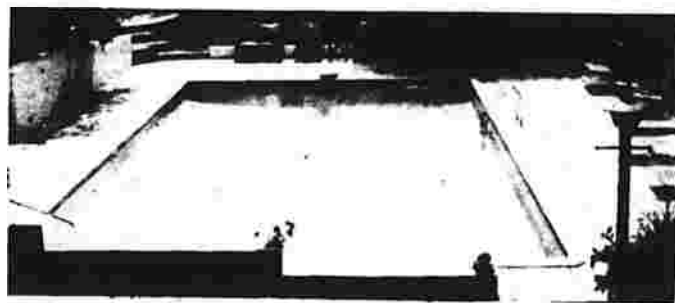
