### Gas Lower in U.S., Says Swedish Visitor

HEBRON — Mr. and Mrs. Robert Willis of Gilead Street, Hebron, as members of the American Host Foundation, are being visited by a Brigitta M.E. Nilsson of Sweden. Mrs. Nilsson is a high school teacher of Swedish Literature in town of Bjurås.

Mrs. Nilsson said that this is her first trip to the United States and that she chose to come to New England because of its similarity to her own country. She will reside with the Willis family until Aug. 16 at which time she will continue to Boston to spend the remaining two weeks of her trip.

During the interview which was conducted on Tuesday, Mrs. Nilsson offered some comparisons on prices of vegetables purchased in America (which are lower) as compared to Sweden. Also, our gasoline prices are lower than Sweden. However, the cost of approximately \$2.00 per gallon in Sweden did not seem to affect suppliers, which Brigitta said they seem to have plenty; also the government is starting to tell people not to waste so much. When questioned about the numbers of cars, Brigitta said that most families had one car; in the city, those residing in the rural suburban areas would possibly have two vehicles.

Mrs. Nilsson said she felt that the town of Hebron was much more suburban than her home town which she characterized as rural. Also, she mentioned that we have much more television here, morning to night. In Sweden, the television is viewed for only one hour in the morning, then goes off the air to return at about 5:30 until midnight. She also watched her first

### Sewer Payment Awaits Farnham Estates Work

SOUTH WINDSOR — A \$25,000 payment to sewer contractor Brewer and Horan Inc. will be withheld because of improper cleanup work in the Farnham Estates area, according to a spokesman for the South Windsor Sewer Commission.

The commission voted to withhold payment following failure of a representative from the firm to appear before the Sewer Commission Tuesday night.

The Sewer Commission has been plagued with complaints from residents of the Farnham Estates development because of mud flowing into storm drains, causing backup into basements of area homes. The problem is believed to be caused by improper cleanup by the firm.

Hazel Perkins of the Sewer Commission said that if Brewer and Horan fails to comply with the cleanup demand the town will do the work themselves or hire another firm to complete the job, and bill Brewer and Horan for the work.

Brewer and Horan will be given every opportunity to complete the job, however, according to Mrs. Perkins.

In other Sewer Commission matters it appears either of two Boston firms will be hired to make the federally mandated modifications at the sewer treatment plant.

The commission is considering the hiring of whether SEA, Inc. or Anderson & Nichols to install a second dewatering device in the plant.

A public hearing originally scheduled for Aug. 2 on sewer user fees has been postponed and no date has been set for the meeting.

Postponement of the public hearing came following a complaint from NuWay Tobacco Inc. that their sewer user fees have increased even though the amount of sewage sent for treatment has been decreased.

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**DC-10 Tests**

ROSEMONT, Ill. (UPI) — The Federal Aviation Administration is conducting tests to determine whether to order design revisions for DC-10 jetliners, an FAA official told a hearing Friday on the nation's worst air disaster.

Testimony on an FAA investigation into the design of pylons that secure wing engines to McDonnell Douglas Corp.'s wide-body jets concluded the National Transportation Safety Board's public hearings in the May 25 crash of American Airlines Flight 191.

An FAA official said tests on DC-10 pylons have been ordered and results are expected by the end of the year.

**Carter Aide**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In the White House staff shakeup promised by President Carter, presidential assistant Tim Kraft Friday was named campaign manager of the president's reelection committee.

Chief of staff Hamilton Jordan also announced presidential counsel Robert Lipshitz would return to Georgia to become a co-trustee of Carter's holdings with Atlanta attorney Charles Kirbo and will become chairman of the proposed Carter presidential library.

Jordan said Evan Dohelle, current campaign manager of the Carter-Mondale Committee, will continue as national chairman for fundraising for the president's reelection campaign.

Carter has not yet formally announced his decision to run for reelection, and Jordan said that there is no timetable on when it will be announced.

In addition, Jordan, who said he made all the decisions for staff changes with Carter's approval, also elevated Sarah Wedgwood, 34, to replace Kraft in his political duties at the White House.

**Still Trying**

DETROIT (UPI) — The United Auto Workers Union said Friday it has not abandoned its quest for a \$1 billion tax investment in Chrysler Corp., despite the administration's rejection of direct cash help for the struggling firm.

But a UAW spokesman said the union is encouraged that the government apparently will consider some form of aid for Chrysler.

"We basically take the position that it's a positive step for the federal government to have acknowledged that the Chrysler situation is as serious as it is," the spokesman said.

"The key for us is that the administration appears to have rejected the position that some people have taken that there should be no federal involvement."

**Big Manhunt**

CLEVELAND (UPI) — The FBI, stung by the worst day of violence in its 75-year history, Friday pressed the largest manhunt ever in Ohio for the fugitive accused of killing one of three agents shot down Thursday.

The suspect, Melvin Bay Guyon, 19, eluded capture in the shooting death of special agent Johnnie L. Oliver by jumping through a window and fleeing on a stolen bicycle.

Oliver, 35, married and the father of three children, was the first agent assigned to Cleveland to be killed in the line of duty.

Authorities said federal agents and police numbering about 150 were systematically checking more than 200 leads in Oliver's death with the search focusing on Cleveland's East Side ghetto.

## Big Storms Destructive

A string of severe thunderstorms tore across Connecticut Friday, drenched surprised motorists and pedestrians and cut a destructive path with hail and near hurricane force winds.

There was an unconfirmed report that the storms spawned a funnel cloud in the south end of Hartford, where a church housing the city's second oldest religious congregation lost part of its roof.

Winds reaching 60 mph caused havoc at the Greater Hartford Open Golf Tournament. Play at the Wetherfield Country Club was suspended until Saturday when rain sent players and spectators running for cover.

Robert Johnson, sexton at Hartford's South Congregational Church, was the only one in the building when high winds tore across the capital city and left the church with an impromptu skylight.

"I was standing out by one of the doors," he said. "There was just a quick gust of wind and then the fire alarm went off. All I heard was gushing water. At that time, I didn't even know the roof was gone."

Part of the 60-foot-by-80-foot section collapsed into the church meeting room and the rest of the roof fell across Main Street. No one was reported hit by the debris.

Power outages were reported in a number of towns. Trees were uprooted. Branches were strewn across streets. Police in Torrington, one of the first places hit by the storms, advised residents to stay off the roads.

A police dispatcher in West Hartford answered the department's routine telephone line saying, "If it's not an emergency, hang up."

"We have wires, trees, everything's down," the dispatcher said.

The area's all-news radio station, WPOP in Newington, lost power at 4:30 p.m.

In Waterbury, where the thunderstorms also hit about 4:30 p.m., police were trying to reach electric utility crews to clear away live wires that fallen across roads.

"We have trees down. We have flooding. We have live wires down throughout the city," said Sgt. Edward Apicella. He said there had been no injuries reported by late afternoon.

He said one police officer was trapped in his car when live wires dropped on the road in front and in back of his cruiser.

"He can't move," Apicella said. "We're trying to get a hold of the utility to get them wires out of there."

Northeast Utilities spokesman Emmanuel Forde said virtually all electrical service in northwestern Goshen and Cornwall was down while widespread outages were reported everywhere except in southwestern Connecticut.

### Trees Down, Power Lost In the Area

High winds sweeping through the Manchester area Friday afternoon toppled trees, snapped utility poles and downed power lines.

However, there was no report of injuries in any of the area towns.

Glastonbury police reported that 65 power lines were knocked down and many trees toppled, but by 6:30 p.m. the town's public works crews were working with the Connecticut Light & Power Co. and the fire department to clear the streets.

Robert DiBella, civil preparedness director, said that he had received winds reaching more than 70 miles an hour in Glastonbury, with a one inch of rain falling in a period of five minutes.

A blackout affecting the Glastonbury High School area delayed the summer production of "L'il Abner" more than an hour Friday night. A standing-room-only crowd of about 1,200 persons jammed the auditorium well before the scheduled starting time of 7:30, then waited patiently another hour for the show to go on.

East Hartford was also hard hit by the storm, with wires and trees down throughout the town, police said. At 6:30 p.m., firemen were standing guard over all downed power lines in town and the street department and everyone else was out trying to clean up the mess, a member of the East Hartford Police Department said.

The southern section of Manchester was the hardest hit part of town, according to reports. A numbers of trees were down on South Main Street, and trees and power lines were reported down on Spencer Street, Hilltown Road and Bush Hill Road. Power lines were also reported down on North Main Street.

Two cars, including one on Delmont Street, were crushed by falling trees, but no one was injured, police said.

### U.S. Will Challenge Wide Coastal Limits

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House has decided to reassert the traditional claim to free passage anywhere on or over the high seas beyond the three-mile limit, administration and military officials said Friday.

The decision, resulting from a National Security Council study on navigation rights, could lead the United States into confrontation with the Soviet Union and China, which claim sovereignty 12 miles out to sea.

But the decision was aimed more directly at smaller countries such as Peru, Libya, the Philippines and Argentina, some of which claim sovereignty 200 miles out.

Peru, for example, has frequently seized U.S. shrimp boats working the waters within 200 miles of its coast.

Navy officials said the White House instructed the State and Defense departments last month to have no hesitation about reasserting the traditional claim.

Under a directive from the Joint Chiefs of Staff, naval and air units have been advised to use water and air space anywhere outside three miles offshore, rather than detour to respect sovereignty claims beyond that distance.

As a seagoing nation, the United States has traditionally insisted that travel in and over the "high seas" beyond the three-mile limit should be totally unobstructed.

The State Department's Jill Schubar said Friday, "There has been no change in our policy regarding our three-mile claim in territorial limits or in terms of the enforcement of this policy."

Recently, however, some U.S. ambassadors have urged that U.S. Navy ships and Air Force planes avoid certain disputed areas to avoid international disputes. And American vessels have honored other nations' 12-mile claims so as not to injure relations into Law of the Sea negotiations.

Still, the Law of the Sea conference has been unable to agree on a worldwide coastal limit.

The United States has been prepared to go to a 12-mile limit as part of a comprehensive agreement covering the high seas, coastal waters and development of seabed resources.

The three-mile limit became popular around the 17th century because that was about the maximum range of a cannon in those days.

Political Exiles in the U.S. Do OK With Right Connections

WASHINGTON - Political exiles with the right connections and enough money - like deposed Nicaraguan dictator Anastasio Somoza - can find comfortable haven in the United States. But for those who are on the outs with repressive regimes, refuge here is not so easy.



One of the U.S. government's pet dictators is President Ferdinand Marcos of the Philippines. Ever since he tore up the Philippine constitution and declared martial law in 1972, his undercover agents have spied on and harassed anti-Marcos dissidents who sought refuge in this country.

He had already developed, an influence that would adversely affect the Marcos regime, the report explained. It added ominously that U.S. intelligence agencies "did not rule out the possibility of violence" by the Philippine agents.

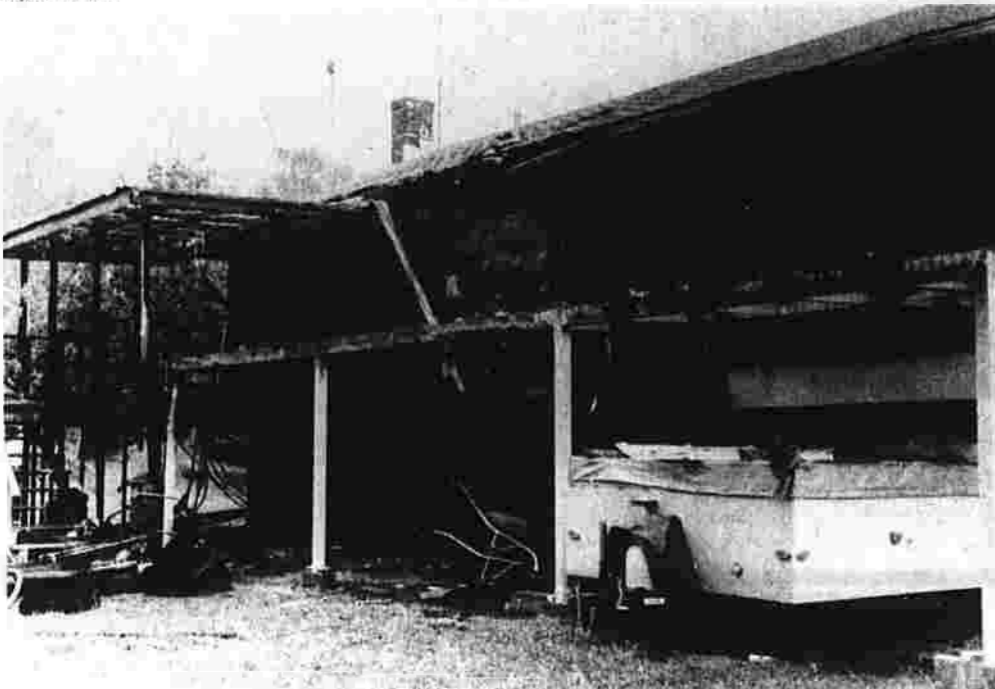

## Alabama KKK Marching In Show of 'White Power'

**ELMA, Ala. (UPI)**—A sweating band of 80 Ku Klux Klan members, Confederate flags flying, straggled down a steaming Alabama highway on a "white power" march Friday shouting insults at blacks and amusing themselves by playing "Amos 'n Andy" tapes.

Thirty additional klansmen joined the ranks of the 50 who set out Thursday on a 50 mile trek from Selma to Montgomery, but there were still far fewer marchers than the 2,000 originally predicted by Imperial Wizard Bill Wilkinson.

Temperatures soared into the 90's both days and with little shade along the route of march, it didn't take the klansmen long to shed their flowing white robes. Friday, some of them began peeling off shirts and shoes.

With one state trooper car running interference, two more bringing up the rear and perhaps a dozen more scouting side roads ahead and behind, the klansmen trudged along

Friday, making no attempt to stay in formation. The route of march is through a mostly rural area, and apart from the slap of their feet against the pavement, the klansmen had little to listen to except the tapes of the old "Amos 'n Andy" shows, steeped in exaggerated black dialect. The shows, popular in the 1930's, were actually done by two whites—Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll.

Passing a field where black farm hands were baling hay, the klansmen shouted: "Work, nigger, work! You want a watermelon? The only response was few smiles and waves.

When they passed a white-owned grocery store that caters to blacks in the tiny community of Benton, they shouted: "Nigger-loving store. There was no one outside the store, and there was no response.

As they broke for lunch under a shade of tall pine trees, a few big drops of rain fell and several bolts of lightning pierced the skies, but there

was no let up to the intense heat.

The klansmen are tracing the route originally taken by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in a milestone civil rights march that resulted in passage of the 1965 voting rights act. They said they chose the route to dramatize their claim that the roles of whites and blacks in the United States have shifted during the past decade.

The Klan marchers plan to reach Montgomery Sunday, but Montgomery officials have vowed to stop them at the city limits because the marchers have no parade permit.

Wilkinson said he and his followers would march into the city anyway.

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## Asherman Case Jury Ordered to Continue

**LITCHFIELD (UPI)**—Jurors debating a verdict in the murder trial of Steven Asherman said Friday they were deadlocked after four days, but the judge ordered them to continue their deliberations.

Asherman is on trial in Litchfield Superior Court for the murder last summer of Michael Aranow, a medical school classmate. Aranow was stabbed to death on his uncle's estate in New Hartford.

The six-man, six-woman jury sent a note to Judge Harold Missal at 4 p.m. Friday, saying they couldn't reach a "unanimous decision" despite "long and hard deliberation."

Missal told the panel that a new trial would create hardship for everyone involved. He said they should respect each other's opinions, yet not waver if they have a firm decision in their minds.

The jurors asked Missal to re-read the section of his charge dealing with the weight they should give to evidence presented in the trial. It was the third time the jurors had asked to have that section re-read during their deliberations.

They then resumed deliberations for a brief time and were excused for the weekend by the judge at about 5:15 p.m. Deliberations will resume Monday morning.

The panel began debating Tuesday whether to return a verdict of guilty of murder, guilty of manslaughter or a finding of innocence.

Aranow's body was found July 30, 1978, on his uncle's New Hartford estate. Medical authorities said the Hastings-on-Hudson, N.Y., resident was stabbed more than 100 times.

The jury, which has been asked to limit the length of its daily proceedings because one of its members is 75 years old, asked for the second time to be reread Judge Harold Missal's charge.

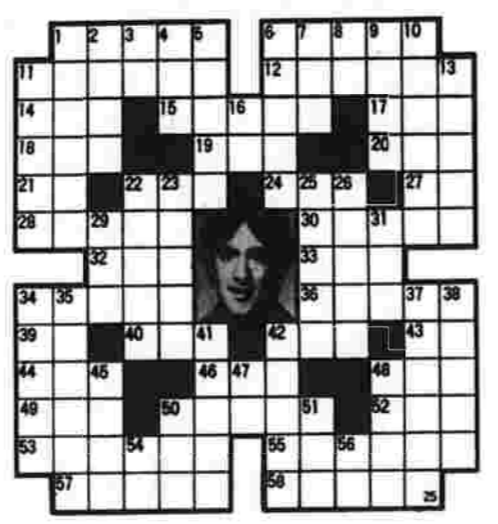

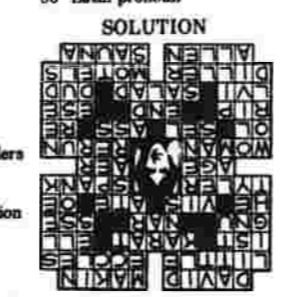

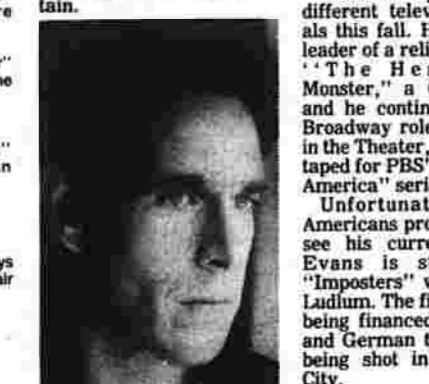

Revenge role is TV first for Evans

The script called for a lot of skiing. But since Evans doesn't ski, a double did the slope work for him. Still, he thinks the cold and the hardships of the location helped unite the film crew. 'It was like an expedition to the Arctic,' he says with a smile. 'I was pleased with the film,' he concludes. 'It's very sensitively done.' How does the young stage actor feel about doing TV movies? 'I'm film oriented,' he explains. 'Nothing is by intention in this business.' Evans believes that diversity is the best aid an actor can have. A graduate of Yale, Evans went on to the Central School of Speech and Drama in London. He maintains that "if you want to be prepared to do everything, you should go to acting school. The more an actor can do, the more versatile he is." Evans will appear on two different television specials this fall. He plays the leader of a religious cult in "The Henderson Monster," a CBS movie, and he continues his off-Broadway role in "A Life in the Theater," which was taped for PBS' "Theater in America" series. Unfortunately, most Americans probably won't see his current project. Evans is starring in "Imposters" with Charles Ludlum. The film, which is being financed by French and German television, is being shot in New York City. "It's a crazy romance," Evans says. "It's about a guy who's obsessed with this girl. He follows her around. In the end, when I realize she loves me, I break it off." Evans has the persistence and talent to be making films for a long time to come.

The character of Phillip Kent in "The Seekers" is much older than young Andrew, so the role will be played by Martin Milner.

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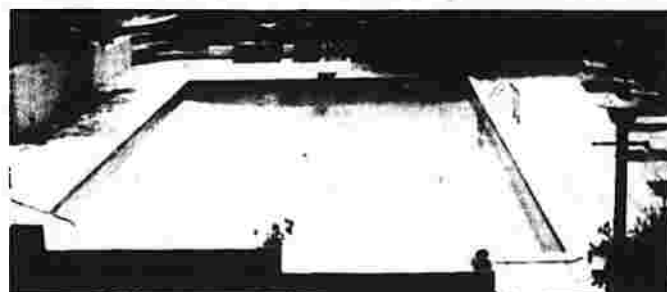
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## Travel Plans

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter, still an unannounced candidate for re-election, will take the White House show on the road over the next several weeks to build support for his energy program - and his presidency.

Carter, taking advantage of the August congressional recess, plans to embark Friday at St. Paul, Minn., on a week-long Mississippi River journey aboard the Delta Queen for a working vacation with his family.

The colorful trip on the historic paddlewheel, which will make stops in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Missouri before winding up in St. Louis, was expected to draw crowds along the banks. On Saturday, there probably will be a celebration aboard the boat to mark Rosalynn Carter's 52nd birthday.

Carter has made several moves in the last few weeks, purging his Cabinet and reshuffling top aides at the White House and on the Carter-Mondale committee, readying his staff for the expected late-fall announcement of his decision to seek re-election.

But in the meantime, he will take a number of "presidential" trips with twin purposes: to urge the American people to pressure Congress on behalf of his energy package, and to give his popularity a shot in the arm.

## Beirut Ambush

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - The Iraqi ambassador to Lebanon, Abdel Hussein Muslem, was wounded today when gunmen raked his car with machinegun fire as he drove up to his embassy on Beirut's seaside highway.

Beirut's state-owned radio said Muslem, his driver and his bodyguard were wounded in the ambush 100 yards from the embassy.

Muslem was shot in the back and legs. "Thank God his injuries are not serious," an embassy official said. "But he is in the hospital."

Beirut Radio said unidentified gunmen fired a rocket-propelled grenade at Muslem's car as it approached the Iraqi Embassy building at 8:30 a.m. (2:30 a.m. EDT). Then they riddled the car with machinegun fire, the radio said.

## Viet Attacks

LANG SON, Vietnam (UPI) - Vietnamese border officials admit they were surprised by the size of the Chinese invasion of Vietnam last winter, but say they will be ready for what many view as the inevitable next attack.

Vi Gia Le, a member of the governing council of Lang Son province, 120 miles northeast of Hanoi, said Vietnamese military forces on the border have been strengthened to face a Chinese attack he feels inevitable.

Vietnamese army regulars strolled through town, heavily damaged in the February war, a evidence of the Vietnamese buildup.

But Le refused to show visiting newsmen any of the newly strengthened defenses because of military security.

"The provincial council was not surprised at the Chinese attack," Le said. "But we were surprised at the size of the attack. Next time we won't be surprised."

Most officials who talked to newsmen said they expected another Chinese "lesson," although they would not predict when.

"We are having a temporary peace," Le said, and the firms shacks and lean-tos set up to serve soup, tea and noodles to the armed forces emphasized the fragile nature of peace along the border.
