Faster Tempo

President Carter's Middle East envoy Robert Strauss and Egyptian Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil reported a general accord today to "step up the tempo" of the negotiations with Israel on Palestinian autonomy.

Strauss, who returned to the Middle East Sunday for his second visit in less than a month, met for three hours in Cairo with Khalil, who leads the Egyptian side at the autonomy negotiations.

Strauss, who leaves Tuesday for Israel, said afterward: "I think we leave here with a general accord that will serve us well."

"This is the time for our continuing, stepping up the tempo, if you will, for actions around the (negotiating) table between now and next May," he said.

Negotiations on autonomy for the 1.1 million Palestinians who inhabit the Jordan West Bank and Gaza Strip opened last May 25 and have a target duration of one year.

Storm Stalls

MIAMI (UPI)—Tropical Storm Frederic was stalled over Cuba early today and hurricane forecasters quickly revised their advisories to tell the Florida Keys and southwest Florida to be especially watchful.

"The threat to the Keys was decreasing as the storm moves west-northwest," National Hurricane Center Forecaster Miles Lawrence said Sunday night. "That's not the case anymore. That doesn't mean it's increasing -- we're in a holding pattern. We just don't want to let the Keys off the hook."

Once Frederic, which has 50 mile an hour winds, clears the coast of Cuba "I see no reason why it couldn't intensify into a very respectable hurricane," Lawrence said.

Long Record

NEW YORK (UPI) — A Manhattan man arrested for slaying one police officer and wounding another during a highway shootout already had served 27 years in jail for homicide, rape and robbery and was wanted for a parole violation, police said today.

Police said Argentine Hodges, 52, of Manhattan, was arrested Sunday in the fatal shooting of Officer Edwin Fogel, 39, and the wounding of Fogel's partner, John Huvane, in a shootout on the Harlem River Drive.

A Police Department spokesman said a check on Hodges showed a warrant for him had been issued by the state Department of Parole. The exact reason for the parole violation warrant was not immediately known.

Reunion Due

CHICAGO (UPI) — A Puerto Rican nationalist imprisoned for the attempted assassination of President Harry Truman and three others convicted for a shooting spree in the House of Representatives were to reunite today in Chicago's Puerto Rican Humboldt Park area of the city.

The plans for the reunion and rally in Chicago were announced Friday in Washington by Nelson Canalis, president of the Ad Hoc Puerto Rican National Committee to Free the Nationalist Prisoners.

Wardens in four federal prisons will be served with the clemency papers Carter signed Thursday. Following the reunion, Canalis said the nationalists will return to Puerto Rico Tuesday or Wednesday.

Dragnet Hunts Escapee

NEW HAVEN (UPI) — State police today threw out a dragnet for escapee Lawrence J. "Buddy" Pelletier, charged in the slayings of three guards in an armored car heist.

Pelletier, 36, squirmed his way through air ducts at the New Haven Community Correctional Center Sunday night, dropped down into the guarded lobby in a shower of ceiling fragments and fled into the night.

"We are looking for him, but I don't want to give any details of exactly what we are doing," said state police spokesman Adam Berluti. He said there was no specific search planned "because we don't know where he is."

"It's not a question of cordoning off a wooded area and going in with police dogs," Berluti said. State police called off a search in the immediate New Haven area after tracking dogs failed to pick up a scent.

Pelletier, as well as three other suspects, was being held on \$750,000 bond in the April 16 robbery of a

Purolator Security Inc. garage in Waterbury. If convicted, he faced electrocution under the state's new death penalty statute.

He, his common-law wife Evelyn Vega, and Donna and Donald Couture were arrested within 24 hours of the pre-dawn raid. Most of the money, jewelry and checks were recovered at Couture's home in Wallingford.

Pelletier was returning from the hospital section of the Whalley Avenue jail at 10:30 p.m. Sunday when he went into a utility room to wash clothes. He pried open a door underneath a sink and knocked out a plasterboard partition.

The 6-foot-6 suspect crawled through a maze of ceiling air ducts and dropped into the jail's lobby, using blankets tied together as a rope. He ran through the lobby onto County Street, disappearing in the darkness.

Ellen Flagg, an employee who was sitting in a glassed-off section 20-feet away from where Pelletier dropped from the ceiling, said he fled in a

matter of seconds and made no move to threaten her.

It was "scary to see him drop down," she said. A correctional guard tried unsuccessfully to catch him. Local and state police and FBI fanned out in the neighborhood.

"Everybody's out looking for him," said a police detective in Waterbury, Pelletier's hometown. "We're all on the lookout, all the men have pictures of him."

His lawyer, public defender Raymond Quinn, said Pelletier had been very depressed recently, mostly because of a court order forbidding him from seeing Ms. Vega.

"He had been in the hospital facility, he lost 45 pounds," Quinn said. "My understanding is that he couldn't keep any food in his stomach and had no appetite."

"It certainly is a surprise, but this type of thing happens and it's unfortunate thing all around," he said. "I don't know what bearing it will have on my case."

Pelletier and Couture, 26, were

charged with one count of capital felony murder because one of the guards killed in the ambush was an off-duty Hartford police officer. They also were charged with three counts of felony murder.

Ms. Vega, 26, and Couture's wife, Donna, 23, face three counts of felony murder, which is not a capital offense. Both women testified before a grand jury and are free on bond.

Waterbury police declined comment when asked if they were guarding Ms. Vega, who reportedly "told everything she knew" to the grand jury that returned the capital murder indictment against Pelletier and Couture.

Pelletier, who now faces an additional charge of unlawful flight to avoid confinement, escaped from Norwich State Hospital — a mental institution — in 1965. He has been in and out of jail since he was a teenager.

Currently, Pelletier was awaiting tests by a psychiatrist to determine if he was mentally competent to stand trial in the Purolator case.

Cuba Diplomacy Faces Test

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The "firm diplomacy" President Carter said he would employ to deal with the Soviet troops in Cuba was to have its first real test with the return to Washington of Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin.

Dobrynin has been in Russia, where his father recently died, but he returned Sunday and was called to a meeting today with Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, signaling heightened negotiations over the troop issue that is clouding prospects for SALT II ratification and U.S.-Soviet relations generally.

A U.S. spokesman announced Dobrynin's return and said he would meet Vance today at the State Department. The time of the meeting was not announced.

The United States had requested Dobrynin's early return in order to push forward with the "firm diplomacy" President Carter said he planned to use to resolve the issue of the Soviet combat brigade from Cuba.

A Soviet correspondent at the daily State Department news briefing last week hinted his country might propose a withdrawal of U.S. troops

from the naval base at Guantanamo Bay in return, but any such proposal is likely to fall on deaf ears.

The correspondent questioned a State Department spokesman about the numbers and rationale for U.S. troops at Guantanamo.

But the United States has made clear over the years the only American military installation on communist territory is not negotiable, and the spokesman said that position is unchanged.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said Sunday the ad-

ministration not only would endanger ratification of the arms limitation treaty, but would invite trouble in other parts of the world if the Soviet troops were not withdrawn.

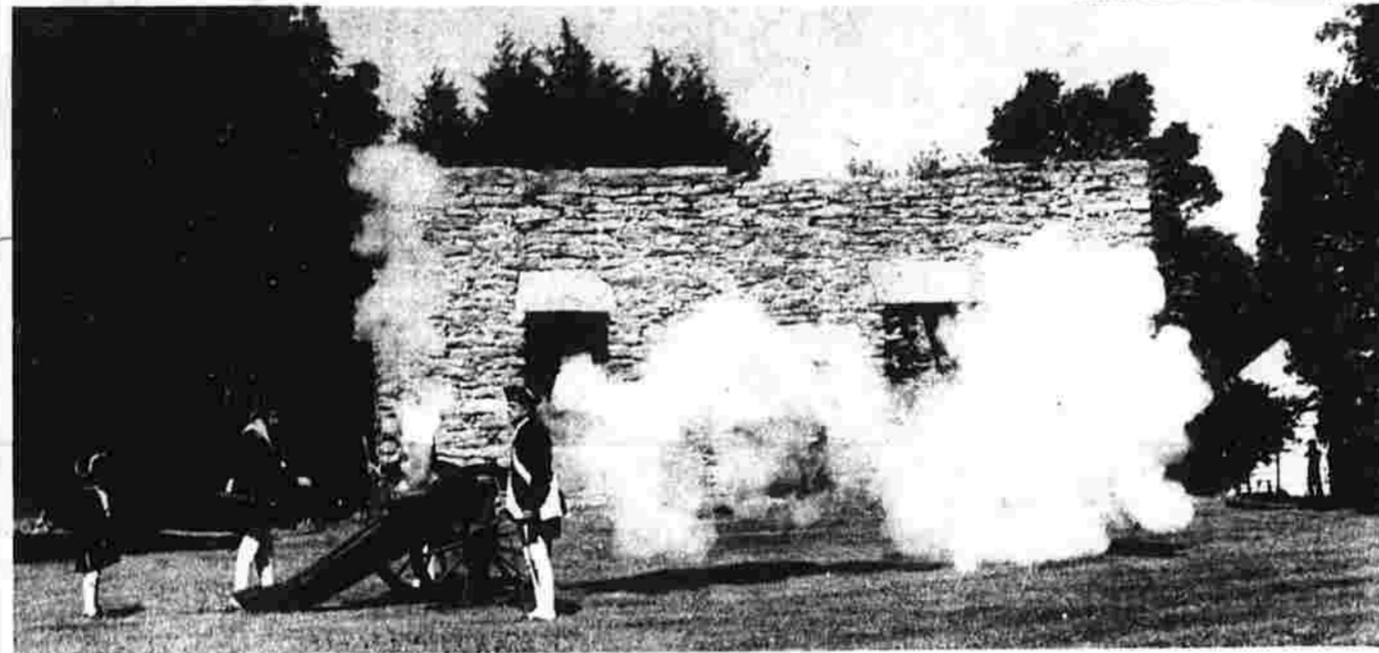
"I think they must be withdrawn," Church said in a television interview on CBS-TV's Face the Nation. "In my judgment, the Senate will not ratify the SALT treaty while Soviet combat troops remain in Cuba. That is just a truthful assessment of my reading of the mood of the Senate."

Church said he had hoped the arms treaty could be considered on its own merits, but agreed with Senate Democratic Leader Robert Byrd that

SALT II would be defeated if it came up for a vote now because of the Soviet troops.

"If we do not insist the combat troops be removed, then I think we're borrowing trouble against the future," Church said. He said an insufficient U.S. response would invite "further adventurism" by the Soviets and the Cubans.

He said the method used to persuade Moscow to remove the troops must be left to the president, but suggested the United States could use favorable trade status or the deployment of U.S. troops elsewhere in the world to put pressure on the Soviets.

Bank Will Expand Parking

MANCHESTER — Heritage Savings and Loan Association has signed an agreement to buy the half-acre parcel at the corner of Cottage and Oak streets for its own parking facility, President William Hale said this morning.

Hale said he signed an agreement last Thursday to purchase the property for \$35,000 and also put down a deposit. He said the spot is an attractive area and would provide excellent parking facilities for the financial institution's employees.

The decision adds a new wrinkle in an attempt by town officials to secure the property for downtown parking. The Manchester Parking Authority had wanted to buy the property for \$35,000, but the acquisition was delayed because some persons questioned Carl Zinsser's position in the matter. Zinsser is both a Republican member of the Board of

Directors and head of the real estate agency handling the acquisition. The board would have had to vote on any purchase by the Parking Authority.

The Ethics Commission ruled Aug. 30 there was no conflict on Zinsser's part, but that issue will become moot if the Heritage sale is completed.

Last week, Town Manager Robert Weiss disclosed that Savings Bank of Manchester wanted to buy the property and perhaps lease it to the town. However, Hale said this morning SBM did not want the property and that his organization was eager to obtain the parcel.

Hale said he would like to meet with town officials to consider some arrangement for providing downtown parking. "When we put a deposit down for the land," he said, "we didn't realize we were getting into a rubeubarb. I was telling one of our employees how we needed parking space, and he said, 'Did you know that lot at Cottage and Oak street was for sale?'"

"I said 'that's great' and then I read an article in the Manchester Herald Wednesday night that the Savings Bank of Manchester wanted to buy the land. If they were going to buy the land, I saw no need for us to get it."

However, he said, SBM declined to buy the property and Heritage placed a deposit for the acquisition.

At last week's meeting of the Board of Directors, Weiss revealed that SBM wanted to buy the property, make improvements and then sell it to a town under a lease-purchase agreement.

Asked if Heritage would follow the same procedure, Hale did not rule out the possibility, but said he would like to talk with town officials to see if some agreement could be reached. "We need more parking," he said.

"If (the lot) holds 40 cars, there's no way we need 40 spaces. Maybe we can work out something with the town. Any more parking downtown will help us all out."

The Parking Authority and the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce urged the Board of Directors to decide on the parking issue before the Christmas shopping season begins. However, the ethics question and the possible sale to SBM delayed the matter.

Joseph Garmen, a member of the Parking Authority, said Heritage had every right to buy it, but expressed disappointment that the Authority would not buy the land outright. "It kind of locks us out of the property we were looking at," he said.

Garmen said he talked with Authority chairman Robert Gorman last week and a meeting will be scheduled soon to plot the next course of action.

However, he had sharp criticism for town officials and the Ethics Commission, saying they needlessly delayed a decision on the authority's

Teacher Hearing Delayed

HARTFORD (UPI) — A court hearing on whether striking Southington teachers should be jailed for their illegal walkout was postponed today while the two parties met in the state education commissioner's office.

A spokesman for the Southington School Board, attorney Lawrence Campana, said union and board negotiators were talking about protecting the striking teachers from retaliation and submitting the contract to binding arbitration.

A walkout by New Britain's 660-member Federation of Teachers was averted by a matter of hours today when negotiators reached a tentative agreement at 4 a.m. A vote on whether to ratify the pact has been set for Wednesday.

Hartford Superior Court Judge John Daly indefinitely postponed a court hearing with the Southington teachers that had originally been scheduled for 10 a.m.

SEA President Donald Demers and four other union officials were served subpoenas Friday, telling them to go to court to explain their defiance of a Superior Court back-to-work order.

Negotiators for the 470-member Southington Education Association and the School Board were meeting in the office of Mark Shedd, commissioner of the state Department of Education.

Bargaining talks had broken down Sunday after 28 hours. Shedd has urged both sides to continue talks throughout the strike, which is the first teachers' walkout in Southington's history. The teachers refused to return to work Sept. 4.

Campana, the lawyer for the School Board, said the teachers want a two-year contract and the board wants a three-year agreement. Southington shut down its two junior high schools and high school today because they couldn't find enough substitute teachers to staff the classrooms. Only three of 470 teachers have been working during the strike.

Carter Denies Reports Ted Asked Him to Quit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter sharply denies Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's report that he had asked him to pull out of the 1980 race — and Carter's wife and aides leave little doubt the president will seek re-election. "No, that's silly," Carter replied Sunday when asked if the Atlanta Journal and Constitution report was true. "I'm not a candidate — yet," Carter added, over his shoulder, as he walked away from reporters at a gospel music sing-in on the White House South Lawn. The Atlanta Journal and Constitution carried a page-one story Sunday with the banner, "Kennedy suggests Carter withdraw from '80 race." The request supposedly was made at a private White House lunch of the two men Friday. Democratic National Chairman John White also told reporters at the sing-in any hint Carter would

denied suggestions that Sen. Edward Kennedy had asked him to pull out of the 1980 presidential race. (UPI photo)

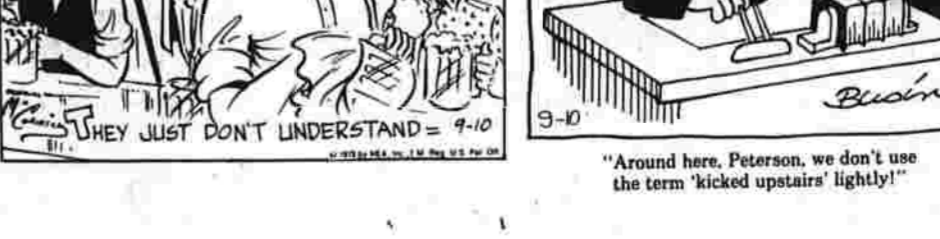

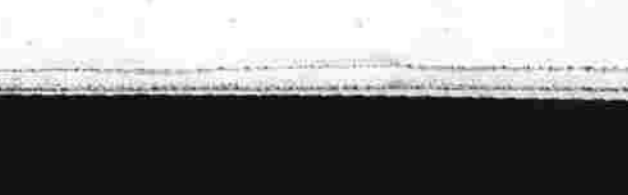
