

# To End Highway Deaths SHARON (UPI) — A group of citizens concerned with the slaughter on Connecticut highways has formed a Regional High School, said he was trying to recruit

The two communities, made up of about 6,000 residents, have had 11 highway deaths in less than a year, a rate that is about 10 times higher for its population size than any other erea in the state. State highway officials said the state is closing in on the

record of 513 highway deaths set in 1973. The Rev. Phil West, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Sharon, chaired the meeting. He said parents were concerned with drinking by young people.
"There was concern throughout the meeting on how

can we involve our teen-agers. A number of adults were very candid. We can't ask teen-agers to change their patterns unless we change ours. Too many adults get drunk, how can we expect teen-agers to do otherwise? He said the group voted to set up a steering committee to meet next week with teen-agers and seek out their comments and concerns regarding drinking. The committee of supporting parents will also look for

ways to improve communications with young people and set up safety programs through existing organizations. Other speakers said the courts are not strict enough in dealing with persons brought up on drunken driving
