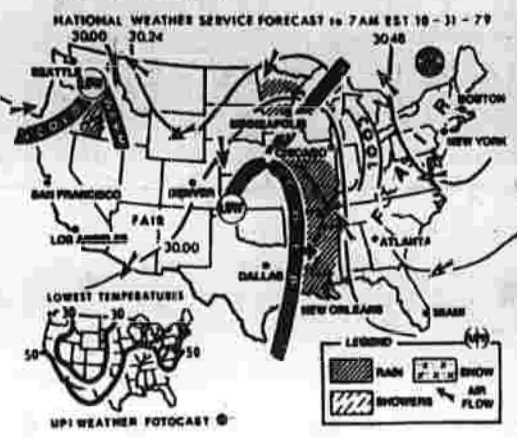




### The Weather

## Boston Church Leaders Attempt to End Strike

BOSTON (UPI) - Protestant and Catholic leaders, hoping to end a month-long outbreak of racial unrest in Boston, urged residents of all races Monday to sign a covenant of harmony, and work for a "new day of peace" in the city. The ecumenical group, headed by Roman Catholic Cardinal Humberto Medeiros, will also distribute thousands of buttons bearing an olive branch with black, brown, yellow, red and white leaves symbolizing "the major races of humankind."

## Nuclear Protesters Claim Exchange Siege Success

NEW YORK (UPI) - Anti-nuclear demonstrators claim their siege of the New York Stock Exchange was a success even though they failed to acquire their aim of shutting it down on the 50th anniversary of the Crash of 1929. Police said 1,945 protesters who tried to break barricades in the exchange were arrested or given summonses during the nine-hour rally Monday, the most ever taken into custody for the anti-nuclear demonstration in New York City.

## Citizens Form Committee To End Highway Deaths

SHARON (UPI) - A group of citizens concerned with the slaughter on Connecticut highways has formed a steering committee to develop ways to deal with the growing problem of traffic deaths. About 200 persons mostly from Sharon and Salisbury, including town officials and clergymen, Monday night aired their frustrations and ideas regarding highway deaths, especially those caused by drunken driving. The two committees, made up of about 6,000 residents, have had 11 highway deaths in less than a year, a rate that is about 10 times higher for its population size than any other area in the state.

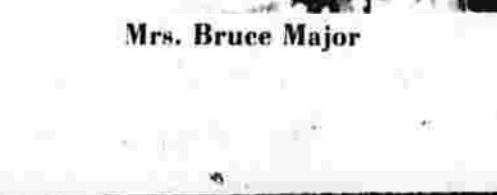

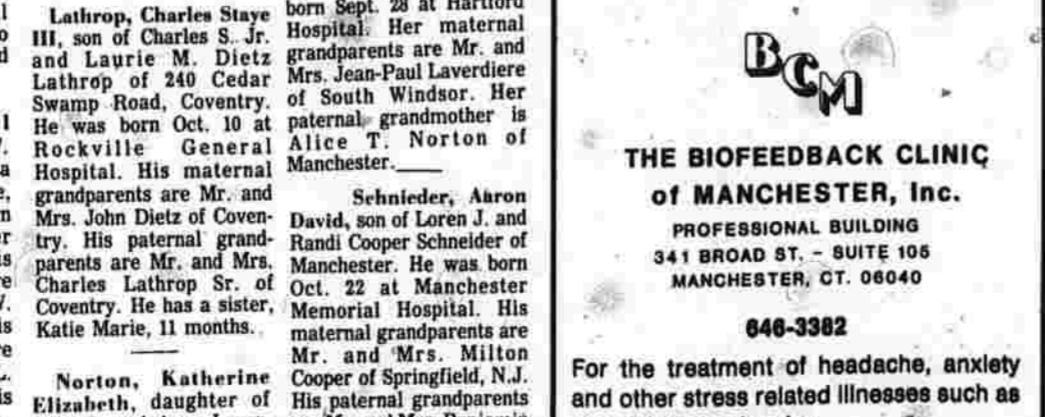

## Vance-Brzezinski Conflict Resurfaces in Washington

WASHINGTON — The "odd couple" of American foreign policy are at it again. One of the worst-kept "secrets" of the Carter administration is the friction between Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and the presidential national security adviser, Zbigniew Brzezinski.

Henry do?" a top official told us. The most recent surfacing of the Vance-Brzezinski policy feud involved the government of Chilean President Augusto Pinochet and its responsibility for the brutal assassination of Chilean exile leader Orlando Letelier in Washington three years ago last month. One of the convicted hit men in that brutal murder, expatriate American Michael Vernon Townley, testified that he wired Letelier's car with explosives on orders from the head of Pinochet's secret police, Gen. Juan Manuel Contreras.

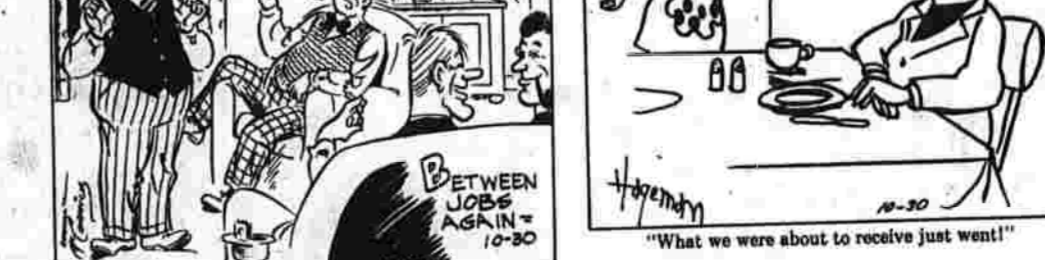

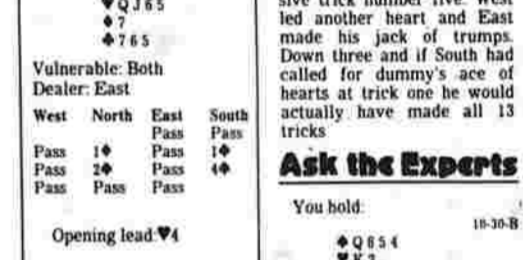

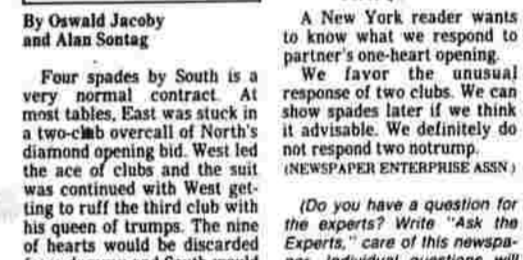
