

Our Energetic Lifestyle

Americans are the world's most gluttonous energy consumers. With about 5 percent of the world's population, we gobble up one-third of all energy used in the world. We self-righteously chide Third World countries for too rapid population growth, while if we add our cars to our human population, the total is increasing much faster than are Third World populations.

Adding cars to people for assessing growth may seem outrageous. But cars use far more nonrenewable organic materials per year than people do. Besides, cars are extensions of Americans; adding them to people is merely giving cars their rightful place in our culture.

Furthermore, this arithmetic emphasizes that our energy use is directly tied to our lifestyles. Publicpolicies to save energy must therefore take into account whether or how to change lifestyles, for the evidence indicates that those Americans who use most energy are unwilling to make voluntary sacrifices for conservation. Conservation has been effective only when backed by

How Much We Use

The things we buy, use, and repair, and the services we demand for our communities, consume huge amounts of energy that do not appear on household utility bills or on gas pump meters, which measure direct energy use. But we use four times as much indirect energy to maintain

You can figure out your own energy consumption by using a Lifestyle Index, developed by Albert J. Fritsch of the Center for Science in the Public Interest, which provides an energy factor for every item one uses, each activity engaged in, and each service provided For instance, clothing involves energy costs in making

the fabric, and designing, sewing, and shipping the garment. If you charge it instead of paying cash, the costs in billing machine usage, paper, and postage must be added Or take government services: We must assume our share of energy use in keeping offices running, roads repaired, police on the beat, and trash removed.

Food and grocery packaging is especially energy intensive. We must account not just for soda pop, but for the bottle and everything that led up to the final product, including the ads and neon signs that say it's refreshing. And it's not just running an automobile that we must consider, but the steel, chrome, rubber, plastics, glass, upholstering, and the energy used to make all the other part and extras.

Who Uses Most

Sciondary energy use - what goes into making and maintaining our goods and services - matches the pattern of primary or direct energy use in our homes and

Several recent surveys show that primary energy use varies according to income and location. The better off you are, the more energy you use both inside and outside the home, especially in transportation.

In 1975, after the Arab oil embargo, the well-off (\$25,000 or more income) used 73 percent more natural gas than low-income families (\$6,000 or less for a family of four). more than twice the electricity, and over four times the

Households differ widely in the kind of house and the number and kind of conveniences they have. The well-off live in big homes, exposed on four sides to the weather. with large windows, more than one bathroom, and central air conditioning. Such homes use large amounts of energy for heating space and water, and for cooling - the most energy-intensive requirements in a house.

The well-to-do also have many more electrical applances than lower-income households, including such large energy-intensive kinds as frost-free refrigerators. color TVs, and self-cleaning ovens.

In contrast, most low-income households live in small homes or apartments with one bath. Many have only a black and white TV; their refrigerators are not automatically defrosted, their ovens are hand-cleaned, and they are usually without air conditioning.

Using an appliance index that weights household appliances according to their average energy use, we find that two-thirds of the low-income households had very low appliance index scores in 1972-73, and two-thirds of well-off households had very high scores.

features others enjoy. All appliances together, however, use only 15 percent of the energy Americans consume

The not-so-obvious significance of the appliance index is its almost perfect correlation with total energy use by the household. It is a symbol of lifestyle. The high appliance index household tends to be an energy gobbler; the low appliance user is an energy conserver.

Such a conserver, however, uses energy sparingly, not with the goal of energy conservation, but because the household cannot afford the cost of energy - even of enough energy for health and minimal comfort

Conservation Problems

This is a critical distinction. It is evident in the paradox that the rich conserve the most energy by adding insulating features to their homes, but they also use the most energy. Low-income households, on the other hand - called "nonconservers" by some - are most often renters; they have no opportunity for such conservation measures, or they cannot afford the inital expense of even fundamental weatherizing in anticipation of future

A comparison of households before and after the oil embargo shows those most likely to have reduced their heating and cooling loss made energy-consuming additions simultaneously, thereby cancelling their energy savings. These are the very households where conservation can make the most difference, but their voluntary energy saving appears inextricably mixed with the appeal of greater comfort and ostentation in living stan-

The automobile is a good example. About half of all energy households consume is for transportation, mostly by auto. Half of all low-income households have no car: those who have, use it chiefly to get to work. Jobs have spread out, making it more evident than ever that public transit systems have earned the jibe, "You can't get there from here."

Upper-middle and high-income households have two or more cars, use several times the amount of gasoline others do, drive larger and newer cars more miles, and take more long trips, by air as well as by automobile. The energy-intensive transportation lifestyle of the well-off did not decline after the oil embargo. Only those with few resources use energy sparingly.

They cannot conserve very much on their own, and they need help to protect them from energy disadvantage

Policy Implications

So far, major changes in energy policy stress making everything more costly, but high prices alone do not deter the American high energy consumer, who has the most leeway for spending or saving both energy and money. Such policies only perpetuate our current energy lifestyle.

How, then, can lifestyles be changed? Conservation must begin where lifestyle is shaped - where wrappings become fancier, car styles numerous and ever changing, apartments and houses advertised for thier "luxury" eatures, and new buildings constructed and furnished to mpress us with their opulence


Energy-saving is a hard-sell to Americans. Such a hard-sell requires hard-nosed policies that are clear and fair, including gasoline rationing; a federal tax on inefficient and nonessential vehicles, with proceeds to be used for developing community-connecting transit systems; tax advantages for building or retrofitting structures according to energy conserving standards; and mandatory building codes. Additionally, more federal funds are needed for research and technological development in the energy field

In this "moral equivalent of war," our first priority is to create and save energy. The dollar cost is high, the benefits higher.



Oil Seen As Goal

HARTFORD (UPI) — A top state business executive Friday said World War III may have started with a Soviet push in the Middle East to control the remaining non-Communist world's oil supply. Richard Bowerman, chairman of the Southern Connecticut Gas Co., said the apparent intention of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan was to control 68 percent of the world's oil supply.

He said Russia also will become an "energy importer" in a few years and was behind "the stirring up of Iranian radicals" to gain a foothold in the oil-rich region.

Bowerman told a business outlook conference "World War III may have already started, and with the U.S. importing about 50 percent of its total oil needs, one must seriously ask how we could expect to engage in a prolonged military conflict with its enormously accelerated demands for energy.

He said American businessmen must recognize that the entire energy problem "is largely dependent on political decisions" and the U.S. can best assert leadership by showing uncommitted nations that free business enterprise is the best weapon against Communism.





Potter contends that Americans could perhaps learn a lot from the Pueblo dwellers, particularly in these days of energy curtailing, and population growth.
"They faced the same kinds of

problems thousands of years ago which we face today and it would be interesting to find out how they solved them and how technology, which has been around as long as man himself, related to other aspects of their life," he said. At 25, Potter plans to continue his research and perhaps one day teach. "Archaeology is not a career field

Abby Mann Ponders Lies, Illness and Fate

HOLLYWOOD — Is multi-award winning Hollywood writer, Abby Mann, a study of contrasts? Take his home, for exam-

ple: A winding, long road leading to his cozy home, is nes-tled in a beautiful, natural setting atop the Hollywood Hills, overlooking Los Angeles A butler, who opens the door, soon doubles as a bartender. Mann's chef. whom he lured from one of Los Angeles's leading restaurants, pampers his and his frequent dinner guests' tastes

In this circumstance of luxury and affluence, Mann has created the concept and first five hours of a new television series about a blue-collar family and its struggles for survival

The series is titled "Skag," and its star is respected actor Karl Malden, a much decorated performer in films and television. Malden portrays the ailing, aging father of a middle-America family. The show is about the fate of a spirited steelworker who is accustomed to taking care of his family, and can't, when he is striken by illness.

'I have never done a subject without thinking I had a shot at changing the world." Mann says genuinely. He recalls his past writings

of social and political signifi-

'My first movie was about the Nazi trials ('Judgement at Nuremberg'). 'Ship of Fools' was a story of displaced peo-ple aboard an ocean liner looking for a new homeland. I did 'Holyak' about an unsentimental preacher who doubted his own feats. But I was so upset with what the network tried to do that I took my name off it.

"There was 'Medical Story wanted it to be a hardhitting, uncompromising series about the medical profession, but it wound up watered-down because the networks preferred it that

He was disappointed again with the network treatment of

"Kojak," the outgrowth of his "The Marcus-Nelson Murders," for which he won an Emmy. Starring Telly Savalas, Mann complains that Universal Television produced it as a formula cops story - with the cops solving all the crimes. "I wrote it originally to show that cops should be watched," Mann declares.

He has very strong feelings. despite his previous disap-pointments, about the importance of television.

"In getting a point across," he maintains, "television can be very seductive with its mass audience potential."

Mann labors at delivering

messages, making points.
"I write a lot about how

society lies to us, and how we accept it," Mann explains. His goals are more accessible as his prestige soars. He has a three-project commitment currently with Lorimar Productions, in which he has total creative control.

"Skag" is not part of that three-film commitment, but Mann is very close to the project. He created the concept, wrote the first three hours, which aired in early January, on NBC. The rest of the nine hour series airs Thursday evenings. He will not direct the

series, although he acknowledges that, for him, directing is the most fun.

"Writing is the most work. Producing is highly over-rated," he concedes.

His first directorial effort was the mini-series, "King," a project that was a labor of love, which had disappointing ratings. It was the story of Rev. Martin Luther King, for whom Mann had deen feelings whom Mann had deep feelings

and a close friendship.
"It bothered me that for so many years, I couldn't get financing for a movie based on the life of King, and I had to tell him that no one was willing to spend money to film his life," Mann reflects. "My great regret was that it final-ly materialized, but not before

s death." He says most of the ratings problems with "King" was stiff competition — ABC's "Battlestar Galactica" movie, and a Burt Reynolds film on CBS. "People didn't under-stand King," Mann laments, explaining that this might have caused the low ratings.

As for "Skag," Mann sug-gests that more people will relate to it because of its reality. Mann says Fred Silverman, president of NBC, told him to be "bold and do what I want. He gave me complete

The idea of the blue-collar family came to him in reflections over personal problems. His father and brother-in-law, both middle-class business

"They really thought they had the world in their hands, and suddenly they were both struck down. Both could provide comfortably for them-selves and their families. But I got to thinking about what happens to the blue-collar worker in similar circum-stances. Suddenly, he can't put bread on the table, and can't make it in bed. Will the family love him as much? I'm afraid the answer is 'no."

So Mann says "Skag" will ask the hard questions about the basis of society.
"Do we really have a family in today's society, or is it role playing?" Mann inquires.
"I'm not so sure this series

will change the world," he continues. "But I would like to put the working man in proper perspective. It's not like what we've seen in films or television — it's not 'Joe' or Archie Bunker. It's not enter-tainment, or comedy."

Mann says his own upbringing has provided him with a "gut reaction" for the series, which made it easy for him to write. He did revisit his childhood town, East Pittsburgh, bringing Karl Malden along with him. Malden stayed a week, visiting the steel workers and others in the area Mann remained for several weeks. Then he returned to his hilltop retreat in Hollywood Hills to write, dictating a good part of it to three secretaries.
