

WASHINGTON (UPI) -American Telephone and Telegraph Co. said it will build the world's longest laser communications system, capable of 80,000 carrying simultaneous telephone calls on beams of light shot through threads of glass. The 611-mile system will







In 1859 Edwin Drake started producing oil from a well in Pennsylvania, and the world has been running out of oil

Oil is a "nonrenewable" energy source; there's only a certain amount of it on earth. The same goes for natural gas, coal and uranium.

In 1978, these four finite sources supplied about 96 per cent of U.S. energy consumption. Almost half came from oil and a fourth from natural gas. Coal accounted for 11 percent and nuclear 4 percent. Hydro (water) power and other renewable resources supplied only about 4 percent

of U.S. energy and 6 percent of the world's energy. The current energy shortage, however, is not the result of the limited supply of nonrenewable fuels. Rather, it results from the failure of production to keep up with growing demand because of economic, environmental

These constraints make it impossible for the United States to produce its way out of the energy shortage u less we curb our demand.

#### **Productive Capacity**

Energy supply is usually discussed in terms of the quantities of discovered fuel remaining in the ground, called "reserves," or the ultimate size of the energy source, called "Resources."

However, it is productive capacity - the amount that can be delivered to each home or car or industry each day - that is the key figure. Oil in the ground might just as well be mud if the capacity and incentive to produce and

The pace at which wells, mines, refineries, and other links in the energy chain are developed depends partly on the price paid by consumers. As long as Middle Eastern oil was selling at low prices that reflected its low production costs it was readily available. Now that availability is unreliable and it is necessary for us to use less and to produce more costly domestic energy. But since no one guarantees future prices, investments by private companies for higher-priced sources will lag.

Price alone doesn't govern the rate of oil production. Environmental laws and impacts on nearby communities rightly place constraints on the rate of energy produc-

The world's proven reserves of crude oil total about 650 billion barrels, enough to last about 30 years at current ra e of consumption. "Estimated reserves," those thought to exist but not yet discovered, may total roughly three times as much.

et, even if we created an energy company's dream world - high prices, no environmental laws, and lenient government policies - the rate of growth in energy production, especially petroleum, would still be constrained because existing fields are being depleted; new ones will be smaller, and more difficult to locate.

nations have learned that holding back on oil production enables them to keep increasing prices as consuming nations bid ever higher for limited supplies.


But domestic production can't grow fast enough to meet growing demands. The United States now imports almost half its oil; if we are to cut back on imports from an oil-short world market, we must practice conservation and develop substitutes for oil.

Most of the problems of oil production also apply to natural gas, except relatively little natural gas is imported. The "easy to find" reservoirs have been discovered and are rapidly being depleted. Even without price controls, which dampen the incentive to explore for new sources, it will be difficult to find the remaining gas as rapidly as existing reservoirs are depleted.


The world's proven reserve of natural gas is about 2,200 trillion cubic feet; its estimated resource, about 8,150 trillion cubic feet. Proven reserves of gas in the United States are about 200 trillion cubic feet, enough to last only 10 years at present consumption levels. Even if the most optimistic estimates of undiscovered gas reserves prove true, U.S. production of natural gas will be severely curtailed in 30 to 50 years.

#### Coal and Nuclear Energy

Coal also illustrates our frustrating energy dilemma. Coal resources are large, compared to petroleum. The proven U.S. reserves could last about 700 years at present consumption rates. But obstacles to mining it and burning it in a socially acceptable manner have limited its use, and new technologies to convert coal to electricity

and synthetic fuels need perfecting. If we can solve these environmental and technical efficiency problems, coal could supply a growing share of our needs well into the

Nuclear energy is a question mark, largely because the public fears it, especially after the Three Mile Island incident. In the next two decades the amount of uranium in the ground isn't likely to be a limiting factor. But, if more efficient nuclear plants cannot be perfected, nuclear fission is a relatively small source of energy, no larger than our oil and natural gas resources.

The United States could get energy from nonrenewable sources yet to be developed, such as shale oil or tar sands. It is estimated that we have 2,000 billion barrels of oil in shale, more than all the crude oil in the Mideast. But the shale oil poses awesome environmental problems, and other sources are untested and likely to be very expensive.

#### Renewable Sources

Obviously, our nonrenewable energy sources are going to run out some day. The problem then is to develop fuels and uranium wisely to bridge the gap in the mean-

These are four potentially major sources of "durable energy" that should be pursued: the nuclear breeder, fusion, geothermal power, and solar energy.

The nuclear breeder holds promise of energy abundance. A breeder reactor is fueled by plutonium-239 instead of the uranium-235 used in today's reactors. While a breeder reactor operates, it "breeds" more of this plutonium fuel from uranium-238, which is abundant. This "breeding" of fuel could allow the known reserves of uranium to fuel breeder reactors for many centuries. But development of the breeder is clouded by concerns over safety, proliferation of atomic bombs from its fuel, and escalating costs.

Fusion power is, in a sense, an energy source as powerful as the sun in a reactor here on earth. Fusion could supply an almost unlimited amount of energy. But after 30 years of intensive effort, the scientific feasibility of fusion has yet to be established. For now, it's a long shot.

Geothermal power, using geyser steam, seems more diffuse and difficult to harness than the sun. Geothermal sites in the United States are scattered, and harnessing them presents major engineering and environmental

Solar energy offers the best possibility for our highenergy civilization to continue. Using the sun to heat buildings is practical today, but harnessing the sun to generate electricity on a large scale will require all our ingenuity. Whether the nation rises to that challenge may well determine our fate in the next century

For the moment we are short of energy and new sources are many years away. And the shortages will grow if-we don't curb our wasteful appetite for energy. Any policy not rooted in programs to conserve energy by making the American economy more energy-efficient is

### **Buddy Ebsen Races Against Time**

By DAN LEWIS

HOLLYWOOOD - Buddy Ebsen, who has worked in the entertainment industry for a half a century, loves to use his wit when asked if he's becom-

"How are you ever gonna get tired of a job that requires you to work only six months of the year?" he says rhetori-He likes to refer to himself

as the "hero of the geriatric set." This tall, slender man began as a dancer in the cho-rus line of "Whoopie," a Broadway musical, that starred Eddie Cantor, in 1928. That event was momentous -especially because he had to overrule his parents in order to attend rehearsals at the Amsterdam Theater. His par-ents had hoped Buddy would continue studying medicine. Now, in his 70s, and with no sign of easing up, Buddy Ebsen continues as one of

television's popular personali-ties. He is remembered fondly as Jed Clampett, the patri arch of the Ozark family, who came into sudden millions and moved to Beverly Hills in the rural comedy, "Beverly Hillbillies." The series ran for nine seasons on CBS, until Bob Wood, president, and Fred Silverman, vice president, decided to change the network's rural, "hayseed"

image.
"I didn't like Silverman for a while (when the show was cancelled in 1971)," Ebsen jokes, "but when he picked up 'Barnaby Jones' (in Jan., 1973), I liked him again." "Barnaby Jones" cast the former hoofer, musical come-

dy star as a private detective. It seemed like an unlikely role, but it promised to extend his television appeal. Why is "Barnaby Jones" such a con-

tinuing success?

that," Ebsen answers with a smile, and then adds philo-sophically, "I have a policy about delving too deeply into reasons for my success. I just' accept the blessing and try not to become too analytical."

He does believe, at least he says so publicly, that "Beverly Hilbillies" might be on the air today, if CBS had not decided to get a little more sophisticated. In 1971, the sophisticated. In 1971, the rural comedies disappeared from the network lineup, and were replaced by the Norman Lear series, "All In The Family" and "Maude," and the more sophisticated "Mary Tyler Moore" series, plus its spin-offs, "Rhoda" and "Phyllis."

"I have fond memories of the Beverly Hillbillies," he reveals. "I still get residuals from it. I was planning to

semi-retire in 1962, and intended to write and just act in things I wanted to do. Then my agent handed me this script, and I started reading, and laughing, and by the time I finished laughing, I had

signed a contract."

Now, Ebsen is hoping for a special based on Clampett's union. Missing will be Irene Ryan, the wonderful actress who played Granny. She died

who played Granny. She died several years ago.

"Barnaby Jones" has been such a strong show, CBS intends to use it as a lead-in on Thursday nights. Consequently, the show will be moved up one hour to accommodate a new show, "Knots Landing," which is a spin-off of the popular "Dallas."

Although his job requires only six months of his time, Ebsen doesn't rest the

Ebsen doesn't rest the remaining months. He intends

to produce a musical, "Nine Bells," as a movie, with his old writing partner, Bonnie Lake. He describes the property as a fantasy about a mer-maid and a sailor. The silver-haired Ebsen and

Miss Lake once collaborated on a song, "I Own Palomina and He's a Pal of Mine," which Ebsen recorded many years ago. It was supposed to be part of the score for "Girl of the Golden West," but it never made the film. Ebsen also intends to mount

a stage production, a comedy titled "An Armful of Warm Girl." His wife, Nancy, acquired the property as a

present for him.

Ebsen has a long list of pleasant memories, pleasant memories, which represent his half-century in the business. As a singer-dancer, he played opposite Shirley Temple ("...she was a darling girl") and Judy Gar-land ("...she never had a childhood. She became a 'property' and I always felt that her resentment manifested itself in her rebellion. I always felt sorry for Judy.").

He likes to tell a story about the late tyrannical mov-ie mogul, Louis B. Mayer, who once demanded that Ebsen sign a two-year contract with him. Mayer had explained the contract by saying, "We can't contract by saying, "We can't give you the kind of roles you deserve unless we own you."

Ebsen recalls responding, "Mr. Mayer, the kind of guy I am, I can't be like a roll of material you cut off for 15 cents a yard." He didn't sign, and instead

He didn't sign, and instead went on the road in a club act with his sister, and one night, driving their car to an engagement in the freezing Northeast. Ebsen remembers breaking out in laughter, and shouting, "Louis B. Mayer—you ain't going to tell me what to do."
