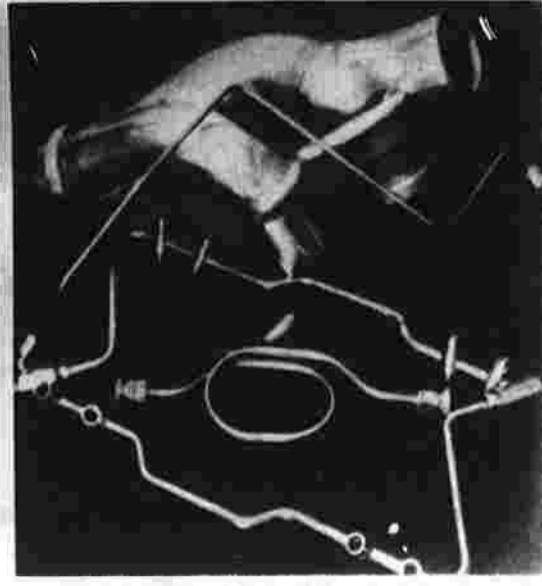

'79 Prices The Worst In Decades

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Consumer prices rose 13.3 percent during 1979, making it the nation's worst inflation year in three decades and giving little hope of improvement in early 1980, the government reported Friday.

Home financing costs, which rose 34.7 percent during the year, and house prices, which rose 15.8 percent, together accounted for a third of the overall yearly increase, the Labor Department said.

Energy costs, which rose 37.4 percent, accounted for one-fourth. The price of gasoline rose 52.2 percent during the year.

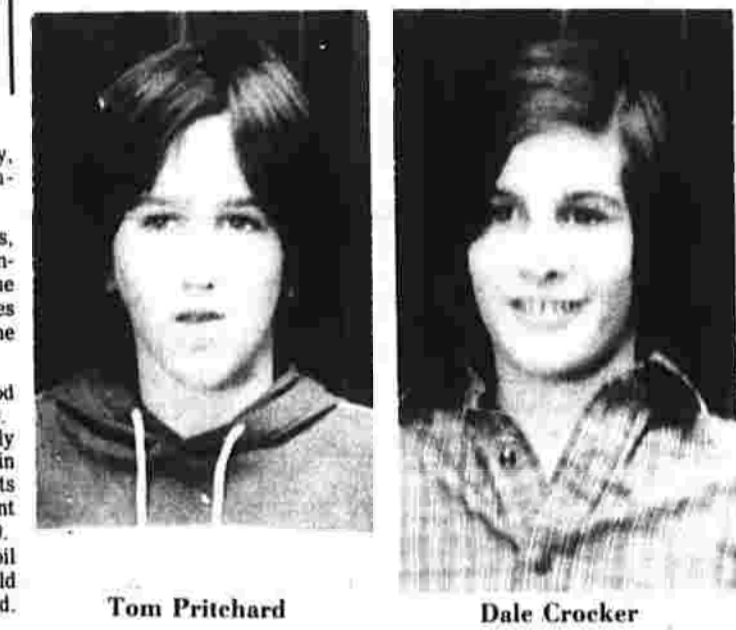

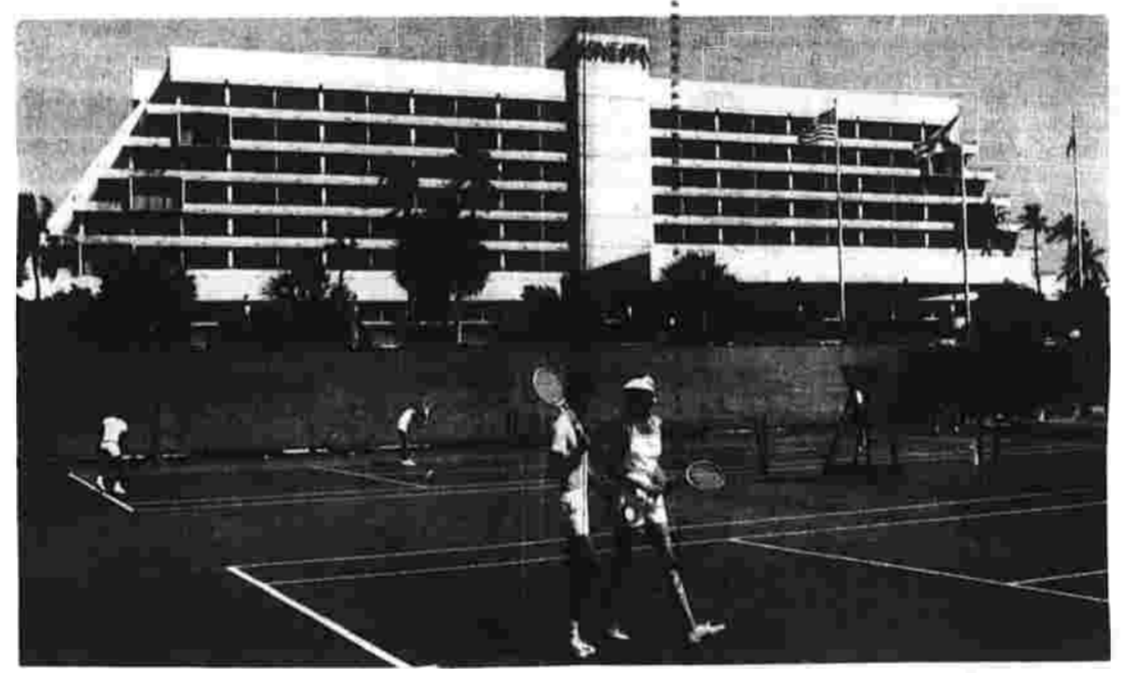

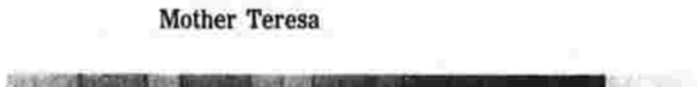

Let the Chips Fall Where They May
Creating Images in Wood

When Fred Henson of 181 McKee St., Manchester, isn't working as a lineman for the Hartford Electric Light Company out of its Simsbury office, he can usually be found in his basement workshop pursuing his hobby - woodcarving.

Henson has been carving for two years and has completed some 40 pieces. He used to draw and paint portraits, he says, and took courses at the Hartford Community College, where he studied oil painting and art history. Later, he took a course in figure-drawing at the University of Connecticut.

"I usually look carefully at the grain of the wood then make a composite sketch of the figure I have in mind. For example, for the one of a Christ-like figure, I wanted to leave the knot holes so as to resemble the nail holes in Christ's hands," he said.

Henson now uses discarded telephone poles, some dating back as far as 1920. "A few of the old poles were chestnut but most of them are cedar which resists rot and fungus."

A modest man, Henson was nevertheless pleased that he had completed a bust of Mother Teresa in April, before announcement was made that she had won the Nobel Peace Prize. "I had originally named the piece 'Unexhausting Love' but changed it to 'Compliment to the Prize'."

Henson says he tries to spend time each evening with his wife and three youngsters, but admits that the workshop begins to lure him around 7 p.m.

"I spend a few hours there, unless of course I'm really into a particular piece and then I just can't leave it. Sometimes I work till 1 or 2 a.m., but I try to limit it. Actually, it takes between 35 and 75 hours to complete one depending on the number of sketches required."

Commenting on his statue of an Indian chief, he said the piece of wood from which it was carved weighed nearly 300 pounds, but five barrels of chips later, it now weighs only 165 pounds.

Currently, Henson has the bust of a Japanese chef on exhibit in the lobby of the Benihana of Tokyo Restaurant in Farmington, similar to the one appearing on the restaurant's menu. He has also presented a bust to the Holy Apostle Seminary in Cromwell. However, Henson is not interested in selling his sculpture which he says, if for sale, would range in price from \$350 to \$1,300.

"Maybe someday, when I retire I'll consider selling some of the pieces; when I have all the time to work on them that I need," the 38-year-old craftsman said.

His collection includes, among others, busts of a Southern gentleman, a massive American eagle, an oriental philosopher, a gospel singer, one entitled "Vietnamese Waiting" and one of the late Golda Meier, former prime minister of Israel.

Henson, who spent his early life in Hartford and East Hartford, displayed his carvings in several places, including an exhibit one Labor Day weekend in Mystic. "There were a lot of real professionals and I enjoyed the association," he said.

"I like to carve faces of people other people may not care to do; some are popular, others are not."

Sunday supplements, tear pads in grocery stores, magazines and on our products. We do not have a supply in our office. When you watch these sources, you will find many opportunities to save money on the purchase of our products. The address that is part of each refund listing is usually that of clearing house employees by the manufacturer to process refund forms to distribute to people who write for them. — All 10 Percent Refund Offer, PO Box 98-764, El Paso, Texas 79977. Receive a refund of up to \$3. Expires Dec. 31, 1981.

special addresses where shoppers can write for forms that they cannot find in their stores. These addresses are usually found on the cardboard backings under tear-off pads of refund forms. There you will find a notice similar to this one: "Sorry, all the forms are gone. You can obtain a form by writing to..." Once a month I publish a list of these special addresses to which you can write for refund forms. Especially if you are new to refunding and don't have many refund forms, it is worth spending 10 cents for a postcard if you think you can take advantage of it of these offers. Ask for the refund form by specifically naming the offer. For example: "Please send me a refund form for the S'Mores \$1.50 Refund Offer."

Heating Oil Prices Spark Stove Sales

The sudden jump in home heating oil prices last fall has led to a surge in woodstove sales and record prices for firewood. But, from Vermont to Oregon, public officials say the boom has also led to rising concern about wood smoke pollution, an increase in stove-related forest fires and the depletion of America's forests. "The price has gotten so high for some firewood that people are literally coming in with semis (trucks) to take it out," said New Mexico Executive Extension Supervisor Bob Plunkett. "They're cutting anything they can get their hands on."

In Connecticut, state officials said there is now a 2 year wait for the 10,000 people who have signed up to cut firewood in state forests, while in Vermont the price of a firewood cord has risen from \$45 in 1978 to as much as \$100 last fall. "The number of American homes with woodstoves has increased from under 200,000 before the 1973 Arab oil embargo to more than 2 million, according to the Northeast Solar Energy Center in Cambridge, Mass.

In Massachusetts, the huge demand for wood has led to a new breed of thieves: wood poachers. Part-time logger Rep. Walter Bickford, D-Berlin, recently found four men struggling to cut two trees he had felled. "These guys were cutting them all up into firewood — and they weren't even apologetic about it," Bickford said.

In Illinois Conservation Department Forester John Sester said a more serious problem is the indiscriminate cutting of firewood. "Quite frankly, we are concerned that this is another drain on our woodlands," Sester said. He said firewood use would have to increase greatly to seriously deplete Illinois forests.

In New Mexico, the U.S. Forest Service has reduced woodcutting permits in areas near Santa Fe, where demand has been

Buddy Ebsen Races Against Time

HOLLYWOOD — Buddy Ebsen, who has worked in the entertainment industry for a half a century, loves to use his wit when asked if he's becoming tired of working.

"How are you ever gonna get tired of a job that requires you to work only six months of the year?" he says rhetorically.

He likes to refer to himself as the "hero of the geriatric set." This tall, slender man began as a dancer in the chorus line of "Whoopie," a Broadway musical, that starred Eddie Cantor, in 1928. That event was momentous — especially because he had to overrule his parents in order to attend rehearsals at the Amsterdam Theater. His parents had hoped Buddy would continue studying medicine.

Now, in his 70s, and with no sign of easing up, Buddy Ebsen continues as one of television's popular personalities. He is remembered fondly as Jed Clampett, the patriarch of the Ozark family, who came into sudden millions and moved to Beverly Hills in the rural comedy, "Beverly Hillbillies." The series ran for nine seasons on CBS, until Bob Wood, president, and Fred Silverman, vice president, decided to change the network's rural, "hayseed" image.

"I didn't like Silverman for a while (when the show was cancelled in 1971)," Ebsen jokes, "but when he picked up 'Barnaby Jones' (in Jan., 1973), I liked him again."

"Barnaby Jones" cast the former hooper, musical comedy star as a private detective. It seemed like an unlikely role, but it promised to extend his television appeal. Why is "Barnaby Jones" such a continuing success?

"I was just about to ask you

that," Ebsen answers with a smile, and then adds philosophically, "I have a policy about delving too deeply into reasons for my success. I just accept the blessing and try not to become too analytical."

He does believe, at least he says so publicly, that "Beverly Hillbillies" might be on the air today, if CBS had not decided to get a little more sophisticated. In 1971, the rural comedies disappeared from the network lineup, and were replaced by the Norman Lear series, "All In The Family" and "Maude," and the more sophisticated "Mary Tyler Moore" series, plus its spin-offs, "Rhoda" and "Phyllis."

"I have fond memories of the Beverly Hillbillies," he reveals. "I still get residuals from it. I was planning to

semi-retire in 1962, and intended to write and just act in things I wanted to do. Then my agent handed me this script, and I started reading, and laughing, and by the time I finished laughing, I had signed a contract."

Now, Ebsen is hoping for a special based on Clampett's union. Missing will be Irene Ryan, the wonderful actress who played Granny. She died several years ago.

"Barnaby Jones" has been such a strong show, CBS intends to use it as a lead-in on Thursday nights. Consequently, the show will be moved up one hour to accommodate a new show, "Knots Landing," which is a spin-off of the popular "Dallas."

Although his job requires only six months of his time, Ebsen doesn't rest the remaining months. He intends

to produce a musical, "Nine Bells," as a movie, with his old writing partner, Bonnie Lake. He describes the property as a fantasy about a mermaid and a sailor.

The silver-haired Ebsen and Miss Lake once collaborated on a song, "I Own Palomina and He's a Pal of Mine," which Ebsen recorded many years ago. It was supposed to be part of the score for "Girl of the Golden West," but it never made the film.

Ebsen also intends to mount a stage production, a comedy titled "An Armful of Warm Girl." His wife, Nancy, acquired the property as a present for him.

Ebsen has a long list of pleasant memories, which represent his half-century in the business. As a singer-dancer, he played opposite Shirley Temple ("...she was a darling girl") and Judy Garland ("...she never had a childhood. She became a 'property' and I always felt that her resentment manifested itself in her rebellion. I always felt sorry for Judy.")

He likes to tell a story about the late tyrannical movie mogul, Louis B. Mayer, who once demanded that Ebsen sign a two-year contract with him. Mayer had explained the contract by saying, "We can't give you the kind of roles you deserve unless we own you."

Ebsen recalls responding, "Mr. Mayer, the kind of guy I am, I can't be like a roll of material you cut off for 15 cents a yard."

He didn't sign, and instead went on the road in a club act with his sister, and one night, driving their car to an engagement in the freezing Northeast, Ebsen remembers breaking out in laughter, and shouting, "Louis B. Mayer — you ain't going to tell me what to do."

WAR LORDS — When is the James Clavell story, "Shogun," going to be on the air? If I'm correct, Richard Chamberlain is starring. — Frank Debin, Grand Rapids, Mich.

The \$18 million-plus production, which just finished film-

ing in Japan (including during a typhoon), should be ready to air in the fall of 1980. You are correct about Chamberlain playing the lead of the English sea captain.
