Athanson pleads for truce

HARTFORD (UPI) - Mayor George Athanson is pleading for a truce in the escalating political battle over City Manger Donald Heach's future, offering himself as a "bridge over troubled waters."

Athanson said Tuesday the city was looking for "a voice of compassion, of love, of unrstanding" and he had to speak to that need "Hive got to be a bridge over troubled waters,"

The mayor said City Council in-fighting was "polarizing and segmenting" the community and would, if it had not already, cripple the delivery of city services. "I think the time has come to stop because we're going to ruin this city," said Athanson.

The council voted 5-4 Friday to seek Peach's resignation but the manager said community and staff support had convinced him to stay Six votes are needed to dismiss the manager. Last week, an enraged Athanson charged the council had ridden his coattails to an enormous election victory last year and now was overlooking Hartford's real problems to

that his latest tack was an attempt to rally community support behind him at the expense of city councilors who want to force Peach's

He said he was prompted in part to move for

'I don't want to show anybody anything, said the popular Democrat. "All I'm trying to do is bring people together in a spirit of recon-

reconciliation by community sentiment. "I've had a lot of calls. A lot of calls. And they're disturbing. But the point is that nobody's going to run for anything the way we're polarizing people," he said in an ap-



Killer fire was arson

NEW HAVEN (UPI) - Officials say a fierce fouralarm fire Monday that killed three persons, including two children, was deliberately set. Four firefighters were injured when the stubborn four-alarm fire roared through a recently renovated apartment building early Monday.

"It apparently was set. That's our feeling now, Fire Marshal Thomas Lyden said Tuesday. "There's no other explanation for how it sprea so fast. God only knows what was used. It spread so fast it was unbelievable," Lyden said. He said the blaze apparently was set in a hallway with some

form of flammable liquid He said authorities had no suspects. Lyden said neighbors still were being questioned for clues.

The smokey fire brokeout about 2:45 a.m. and burned out of control for more than two hours. Authorities said Alfred Harris, 11, and his nephew, Jamil, 2, were found in the rubble of their amily's third-floor apartment shortly after the fire was brought under control about 5:30 a.m. Jami originally was identified as Harris's younger sister.
The childrens' bodies were found within a few

feet of the apartment's front window, fire officials The third victim. Alvin Waller, about 40, was found dead in the fourth-floor apartment of the brick structure located in the city's aging Fair Haven section, authorities said.

At least three firefighters were treated at the scene for smoke inhalation and cuts and bruises and a fourth was taken to the Hospital of St. Raphae after a wall collapsed on him, authorities said. A hospital spokesman said Thomas Bullock, 38 was listed in fair condition with broken bones after







Let Your Easter Menu Sing of Spring




