Are there child labor laws in this state? And if so, is what they are doing illegal? SLEEPLESS

DEAR SLEEPLESS: The child labor law states that no minor under 14 years of age shall be permitted to work in any gainful occupation, "provided that this law shall not be construed to apply to work in agriculture, domestic service in private homes or in employment by a parent or a person standing in place f a parent." I share your concern, but it seems that your

grandchildren are exempt from the child labor laws. Sorry. DEAR ABBY: You have said in your column that there is no reason why a man can't be sexually active at 80. My

husband interprets this to mean that a man can be just as good sexually at 60 as he was at 25. Now I have discussed this with my doctor, and he says that as a man grows older his sex drive just naturally diminishes.
