

Community not a block to Stringfellow

GLASTONBURY—It's not very easy to begin working in a new community. There are certain people to meet and local unwritten rules that need to be learned. Occasionally it can be difficult.

However, that wasn't the case with Tom Stringfellow, a student intern at the Youth Services Bureau for nine months.

Along with having to get to know the town, he had to adapt to a place where there are very few minority residents.

"At first, I do admit that I stood out in the crowd, but I didn't let the color issue bother me. People accepted my ideas," the black University of Connecticut graduate student said.

"I think these people realize that there are black persons who are dignified. I tried to promote the positive black image," he said.

In September of last year, he joined the staff at YSB under the direction of Clinical Director Thomas Gullotta. He worked at Youth Services as part of his study towards a master's degree in social work from UConn.

Last week, he finished his duties at the bureau and now he is awaiting graduation on May 18 at the Storrs campus.

The 23-year-old student has resided in Manchester for 17 years. He attended Manchester High School, Manchester Community College, and the University of Connecticut for his undergraduate degree in sociology. He has worked at the Hartford

Neighborhood Agency and last summer he worked as a counselor and coordinator with the Summer Activities in Manchester program.

While serving his nine-month stint at the Youth Services Bureau, Stringfellow served on the Community Consortium on Positive Behavior and the town Human Relations Commission. On both panels, he served as a researcher and resource person.

"The consortium was effective because it got information to the community on drug and alcohol abuse. With their panel discussions, they presented a lot of good professional opinions," Stringfellow said.

Stringfellow said drugs don't appear to be a major problem in Glastonbury.

"This is not a widespread problem, but the community is aware of it and trying to face it," he said.

He said the consortium will be trying to achieve more youth involvement over the next year.

The thin, but tall graduate student served as the resource person to the Human Relations Commission.

He said he gathered information about the town's problems in dealing with state handicap regulations.

"The town is about three years behind on following the handicapped regulations for its buildings," he said.

Gullotta said Stringfellow was an asset to the commission.

"He gathered more information for the commission than I could have. He put in many hours of work for the commission at no cost to the town," Gullotta said.

Stringfellow said he is concerned

about the lack of low and moderate-cost housing in the town. He said the town should pursue obtaining more U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Section 8 funding for housing projects.

"The town wants to keep a good image and it has remained a white, middle class town," the Manchester resident said.

He said he really enjoyed working with the staff at Youth Services.

"They are a warm group of people. They are also willing to help people from different income levels," he said.

"I guess this happens to be one of the best youth services agencies in the state," he said.

Stringfellow said the Human Relations Commission should try to achieve some minority representation.

"I think they should actively recruit some minority persons for the commission," he said.

"Glastonbury should be promoting interracial harmony. It's a classy place and people want to come here.

Most oppose nuclear plants

WORCESTER, Mass. (UPI) — Nearly 60 percent of Massachusetts residents oppose the construction of new nuclear power plants, but few would shut down plants already in operation, a poll shows.

The survey by Clark University's Public Affairs Research Center, said 34 percent of the 1,065 adults questioned favored construction of more nuclear power plants and 6 percent had no opinion.

The survey was conducted in March, one week before the first anniversary of the accident at Pennsylvania's Three Mile Island nuclear power plant.

The results contrast with those of a Clark poll conducted in February 1979, just before the accident, when 54 percent of Massachusetts residents favored continued nuclear power plant construction.

Twenty two percent of those questioned in the latest survey said they would shut down all nuclear plants "as soon as possible."

Ship smashes bridge; at least 32 die in fall

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI) — A freighter caught in a hurricane-force squall tore a thousand-foot section of the Sunshine Skyway bridge Friday, sending a Greyhound bus, three cars and a pickup truck hurtling into Tampa Bay 150 feet below. At least 32 people were killed.

Rush-hour motorists who saw the southbound span collapse leaped from their cars in the blinding rain to try to warn those behind them. One screamed over his CB radio that the bridge was gone.

But the Chicago-to-Miami bus carrying 22 passengers and its driver, the three cars and the truck drove past them and toppled off the ragged end of the towering interstate highway span. All nine people in the three cars died. Only the driver of the pickup survived.

"I couldn't stop," said Wesley McIntyre, the truck driver. He said he was struggling through the storm when "the whole bridge started to sway. I could see the ship and the end of the bridge was breaking off. Just slid and I hit the ship, then I dropped into the water."

McIntyre crawled out of his sinking truck and swam to the freighter Summit Venture, whose crew threw him a line and hauled him to safety. He suffered only minor injuries.

Capt. Marshall Gilbert, Coast Guard commander at St. Petersburg, said divers working in the 50-foot-deep bay recovered 18 bodies, but had sighted other victims trapped in the underwater rubble of twisted girders and concrete slabs.

"We understand there are bodies inside a number of cars entangled in the bridge work," Gilbert said. "We have physically seen three cars, a pickup truck and a bus. There possibly could be more."

Gilbert said a bus containing migrant workers was reported missing after the bridge collapsed at 7:38 a.m. EDT, but divers had not spotted a second bus.

"We haven't been able to confirm it," he said.

Peter Corra was driving along the northbound span of the bridge when the 606-foot freighter Summit Venture rammed the center support of the southbound span, dropping an enormous chunk of the bridge into Tampa Bay.

"There was a car dangling off the southbound lane," he said. "It was apparent the ship had collided with the skyway and toppled it into the water."

His car was driven by Richard Hornbuckle, 60, who said, "Cars and the bus went by me. I was driving very slowly with my flashers on because of the weather conditions. Then I saw the bridge was gone and immediately applied the brakes and skidded within 2 feet of going in."

Hornbuckle scrambled out of the car to safety.

Authorities said the dead included men, women and at least one small child.

Sending sludge to MDC is cheaper than landfill

GLASTONBURY — It would be cheaper to send sludge to the Metropolitan District Commission's incinerator in Hartford than what it currently costs to bury it at the landfill, according to Public Works Department Director S. Robert Pryby.

The closing of the town landfill will be discussed by the Town Council Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Office Building.

The town is facing serious waste disposal problems because the landfill will have to be closed within the next year, according to Pryby.

About 26,000 tons of refuse have been buried at the landfill each year since 1975.

According to Pryby, it would be \$4 a ton cheaper to truck the sludge to the MDC incinerator in Hartford than what it currently costs to bury it at the landfill.

The town would have to purchase a 6,000 gallon tanker truck or a tractor-trailer truck to transport the sludge. The truck would make two trips a day and the tanker truck would cost about \$35,000, according to Pryby.

Town Council Minority Leader Henry Kinne said he is supporting the move to take the sludge to the MDC site.

"I would recommend that we take the sludge to the MDC incinerator until 1985," Kinne said.

According to Kinne, the Connecticut Resources Recovery Agency is expected to have a new plant opened by 1985. The CRRRA site will burn the garbage and sludge and convert it into energy, Kinne explained.

"We will probably take the sludge to the pumping station in East Hartford where it will be piped to the MDC incinerator in Hartford," Kinne said.

Kinne and Democratic Councilman James McIntosh are sitting on the subcommittee that is researching the problem.

Pryby said the move to take the sludge to MDC is being considered along with other alternatives.

The sludge represents about 1 percent of the 26,000 tons of waste generated by the town each year.

Three banks drop rate on mortgages

MANCHESTER — Three local banks have dropped their mortgage rates, and one of them, the Heritage Savings and Loan, is offering 12 percent variable rate mortgages.

Contacted Friday afternoon, officials for Heritage, First Federal Savings and the Hartford National Bank all announced a drop in rates largely due to lower money market costs.

"If you really believe in the variable rate mortgage, you have to get out of the pattern of averaging portfolios over a 25-year period," William Hale, president of Heritage said. Although his bank's rates were as high as 15 1/2 percent, it announced the new 12 percent rate plus two points Friday.

"We've always written fixed rate mortgages," he said, "but the money market (the cost of new money to banks) has been dropped to nine and a half percent allowing us to come down on our mortgages."

Unlike the fixed rate mortgages which carry a certain percentage over 20, 30 or 40 years, Heritage's variable mortgage is adjusted on a yearly basis with a 2 percent ceiling per annum.

Agreeing with Hale was Charles Cox, a mortgage officer with First Federal Savings in East Hartford. Unlike Hale, however, his bank's rates fell from a high of 15 percent and three points to 14 percent and two points. His mortgages are a fixed rate with a difference in the way we look at mortgage applications," Cox said. "I can't say for certain if it will get lower but we're watching the market."

MMH to buy CAT scanner

MANCHESTER — Long range plans for Manchester Memorial Hospital made public this week included the purchase of a \$900,000 CAT (computerized axial tomography) scanner within the next four years.

The machine combines computer and X-ray technology, producing some of the most advanced and expensive medical data available. The scanner was awarded the 1979 Nobel Prize in medicine for its diagnostic capabilities.

A \$400,000 radiation cancer center for cancer patients would also be constructed soon. The hospital is expected to begin within six months to become the first treatment center in the area.

A \$500,000 linear accelerator-what hospital officials call the most efficient instrument used in radiation therapy-would be required to make the center operational. Its operating costs would add \$200,000 to the hospital's annual budget (budgets must also be approved by the commission).

Also from the plan would come development of a town-funded paramedic service. The hospital earlier this year prepared a \$668,000 three-year proposal which the town has referred to a special steering committee.

The committee of hospital, health and town officials are working on a proposal establishing an Emergency Medical Services council to coordinate development of the special service. The committee plans to deliver its report within a month to the board June 10, one member said.

The report shows the hospital becoming more specialized, incorporating new treatment methods, and attracting new physicians with expertise in illnesses associated with older populations.

Hospital data shows decreases in the size of the youth population and increases in older age groups. Between 1970 and 1985 the report shows the group aged 45 to 65 increasing by 36 percent.

The major causes of death are expected to remain heart and cancer related. Heart disease, at present, accounts for about half the deaths in this region, cancer almost a quarter.

Lottery director resigns

HARTFORD (UPI) — John F. Winchester, head of Connecticut's lottery division, resigned unexpectedly Friday to take a job with a Georgia firm which has handled all but one of the state's instant lottery games.

Winchester said in his letter of resignation to John Devine, executive director of the Division of Special Revenue, he will leave his post May 22. He's held the job since the lottery's inception in 1971.

He said his new job will be as a vice president of special projects for Scientific Games Development Corp. of Atlanta, Ga., where he will be in charge of games and "any other ventures that he might be getting into."

Winchester earns \$36,000 as lottery unit chief, but declined to disclose his new salary with Scientific. He said as far as he knows, he will not have to move from his home in Torrington when he begins work for Scientific May 25.

Horton renews challenge on education financing

HARTFORD (UPI) — Wesley Horton, the man who won the landmark case striking down Connecticut's system of funding public schools as unconstitutional, Friday renewed his legal challenge against the state. Horton, whose suit led to the Supreme Court order for the state to revamp its school aid plan, filed a motion in Superior Court for the state to show that changes in the formula met the high court's mandate. Gov. Ella Grasso Thursday signed a law which changes the distribution formula for the five-year, \$391 million funding program and saves the state about \$30 million in the coming fiscal year. "The rules are being changed in the middle of the proceeding," said the attorney who first filed the now famous Horton vs. Meskill suit in 1973 on behalf of his son Barnaby, then age 4, and two other students in Canton. "We feel the statute passed yesterday (Thursday) does not comply with the Supreme Court mandate," Horton said. But a spokesman for Mrs. Grasso defended the state's actions as a

Chief hopes volunteers finish historical survey

By PATRICK REILLY Herald Reporter EAST HARTFORD — Mary Goode, volunteer coordinator for the town's historical survey, would probably rewrite the biblical passage "many are called but few are chosen" this way: "many volunteer but few stick around to do the work." Ms. Goode will attempt to marshal the anticipated large number of volunteers at a training session May 20 from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the Raymond Library. She will guide the volunteers through the first and only session with the help of George Murry. Murry is a professor at the University of Connecticut Institute for Public Service and at that meeting he will try to show volunteers what to look for when they look at the houses and buildings that will be chronicled in the survey. The federally-funded study is scheduled to begin June 2 and end Aug. 15. Ms. Goode will be the temporary coordinator until the survey's director, Ellen R. Miller, a Cornell University graduate student, arrives to take control of the survey. The survey will involve the study and recording, in words and photographs, of the towns historically significant structures. Ms. Goode estimates the survey will be of about 300 such structures. And the researchers and volunteers will be concentrating on four areas in town that local historians have deemed to have special historical significance. The areas are sections of Main Street, a section of South Main Street and Silver Lane, the Naubuc Avenue area and the Mayberry Village area. Ms. Goode said she hopes a large number of volunteers turn out for the May 20 meeting because she anticipates "a lot of people will drop out." 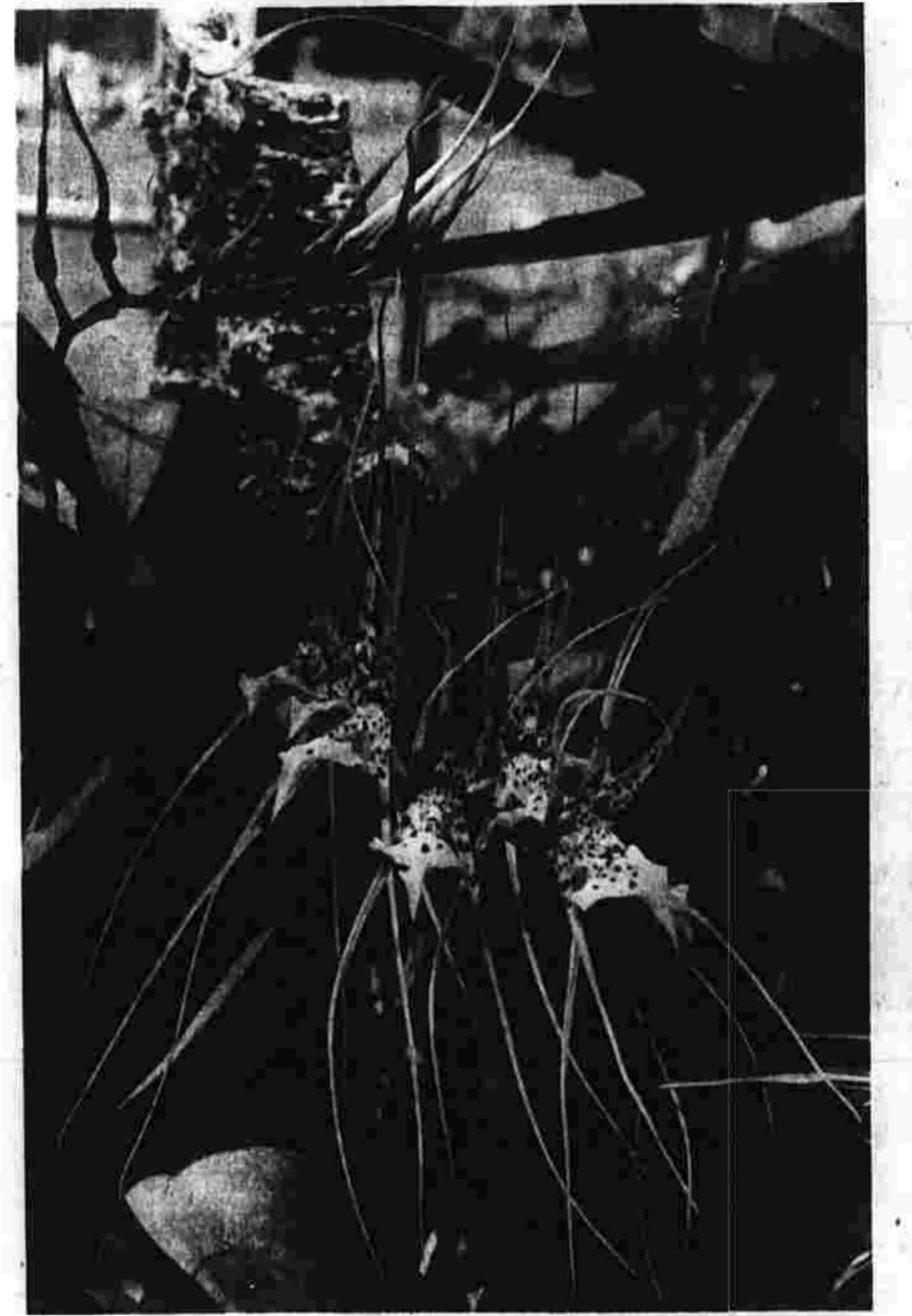

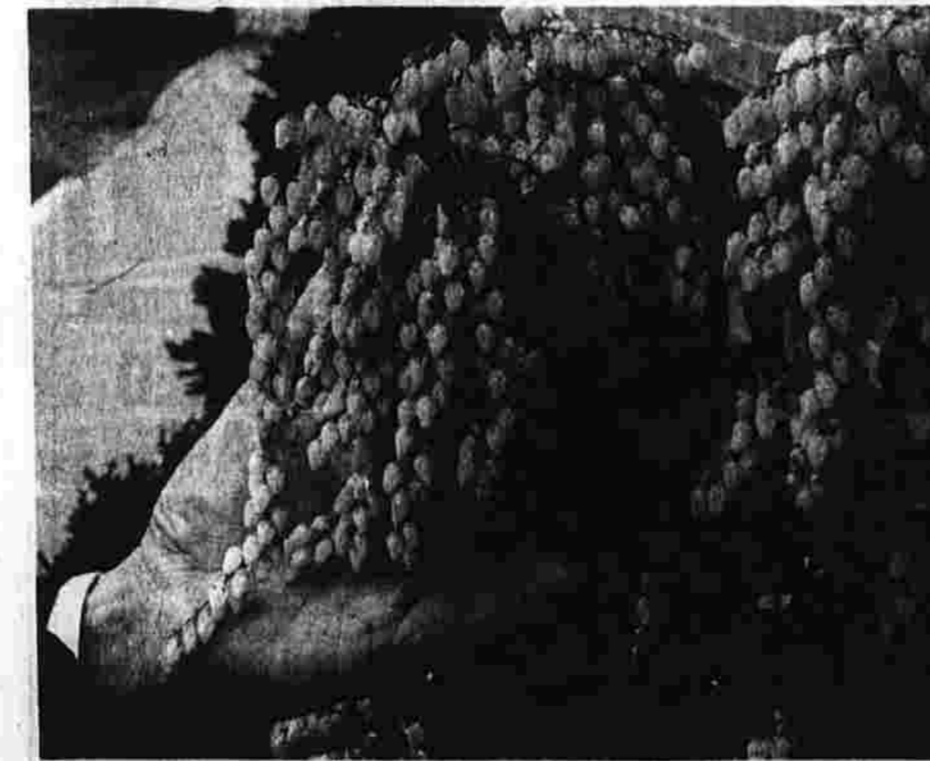

ANSWERS TO PRIZE CROSSWORD PUZZLE for Weekend of May 3-4, 1980

- CLUES ACROSS:**
- REQUEST not bequest. One can well view a "special REQUEST" (e.g., to sing something) as being appreciably complimentary in the manner suggested by the clue. Although a bequest may be a mark of appreciation, it is hardly in the category of things aptly said to "better."
 - BEARD not bears. The idea of a handsome white BEARD is fully apt. One refers to bears as handsome polar ones, rather than "white."
 - POINTED not printed. "POINTED" is the more fitting word in the context given, it being hardly relevant whether the criticism be printed or verbal, etc.
 - BLAND not blank. A blank face has no "expression."
 - BITE not mite. A BITE (of an insect, for example) is something specific and is plainly an annoyance. A mite can be so small its whereabouts can go undetected.
 - CUP not pup. Apply the use of both hands to hold a CUP is typical of small children. The clue's specifying "little girl" (rather than practically anybody) has less point for pup.
 - SNOB not slob. "SNOB" is a candid statement of opinion. "Slob" is simply an insult, not a question of candor.
 - LAKE not cake. "Picnic" (rather than "snack," say) suggests an outdoor location, e.g., a LAKE. Cake is a trivial answer anyway.
 - DUKE not dude. The idea of "fashioning attire" (associated with landed gentry) links up well with DUKE. A dude, as such, would simply "look very smart" regardless of what occasion he might be dressed for.
- CLUES DOWN:**
- ZEALOUS not jealous. Because he's "too ZEALOUS" (i.e., more than suitably ZEALOUS), yes; but there is no need to say "too" jealous.
 - TRUNK not drunk. TRUNK is more natural in the context given. A heavily built man who happens to be drunk is hardly termed "a heavy drunk."
 - QUIT not quip. It's no time to QUIT, certainly; but to quip may help raise morale.
 - SWELTER not shelter. A person can seek shelter from hot, cold or any kind of weather because shelter means refuge. SWELTER is associated only with heat.
 - WORK not pork. One complains that pork isn't "done" (properly cooked) rather than that it "has not been properly done" — a usage better suited to the case of WORK.
 - PARTING not patting. One hardly visualizes a rough and ready type patting his hair at all, much less "very tussy."

Linda Kelsey Advocates Solar Energy

It's a story television reporters hear frequently. "I had been avoiding a series," says the co-star of a new series, who then explains her reasons: "Sixty percent of television makes you want to throw up."

This pretty, petite and demure new co-star is Linda Kelsey. She wants to explain why she accepted — was even willing to audition — for a principal role in "Lou Grant," CBS's Monday night series, which has just completed three productive seasons.

She is part of the editorial staff of a newspaper. The series stars Ed Asner as Lou Grant, the same lovable, tough character he originated in "The Mary Tyler Moore Show."

Until "Lou Grant" came along, Miss Kelsey was content to take supporting, guest roles in episodic television. She had no interest in a continuing role.

"Every time I would guest in a series, I would see the battle fatigue the regulars were suffering," Miss Kelsey said. "It didn't seem like a good thing to work in a series."

She didn't feel it served personal growth. Consequently, she revealed, she never was interested in seeking roles during the pilot season.

She says she was blasé about being offered the role of the gal reporter in "Lou Grant" — at first. Where others might have jumped at the opportunity, she requested time to consider the offer. She remembers mulling it over during a weekend.

"The big consideration was whether or not I was ready to accept a long-term commitment — a contract for seven years — if the series was picked up."

Obviously she was ready for the commitment; she is about to begin her fourth season.

"My character was in full bloom from the first day," she says firmly. "I would have been an idiot to turn it down."

Oddly, she experienced a recent period when she wondered about her future. Her role was reduced considerably during the second season.

"But this past season," she says, "I went for almost four months without a day off."

The sign of success is that her contract was rewritten, which obviously pleases Miss Kelsey.

She keeps busy during hiatus, but not with show business. She and her husband are building a house on Martha's Vineyard on a 32-acre tract of land they purchased several years ago.

"It will be an experiment in solar energy," she says, revealing that she and her husband are active environmentalists.

Her husband, a carpenter with his own business in California, started as a set-builder. They met at a summer theater in Dennis, Mass.

"I was going out with his friend," Miss Kelsey recalls. "Seven years later, I got a call from him in Los Angeles. He invited himself over for dinner and never left." They were married a year later.

They bought the Martha's Vineyard property from friends who were getting a divorce. It is a wooded tract ("I'm not a beach person," declares Miss Kelsey), where she someday hopes to raise sheep. That's because she likes to weave.

Miss Kelsey is quite serious about the solar energy experi-

ments. She's trying to get the Department of Energy to allocate some of its budget to produce commercials promoting solar energy.

She's also active in the anti-nuclear movement.

"But I decided not to be just anti," she explains. "I wanted to be pro something. So many of the anti-Vietnam energies have now been channeled into the anti-nuke movement. I felt there was too much anti-movement. I decided to put a lot of energy into something positive like advocating solar energy."

"A lot of us came out of the Vietnam era with the residue of excitement. We were going to save the world and hand out flowers," she said softly. "But we didn't have any alternatives. So a lot of those people quietly pulled up. They went to grad school. Now, they're lawyers, doctors and professional people like architects and writers. Their old philosophies have survived, but they're fishing in a new way — within their professions."

When she is interviewed, she makes her sentiments known. She finds it ironic that, playing the role of a newspaper reporter, she is often the interviewee.

Since taking the role, her opinion of newspapers has altered "entirely," she says.

"I have tremendous respect for good journalism," she notes. "I didn't read newspapers that much. You know, it's the old story about not believing what you read in the newspapers. I now follow the beat reporters. And since I'm now written about, I know both sides. I know what it is to find my words distorted and out of context. I can recognize good journalism."

That makes it treacherous interviewing her. You wonder if you have passed her test.

TV sports calls shots radio can't

Lately radio has become prominent in my life. I listen to it every day while driving.

Radio is great for the imagination, but in the area of sports sometimes it is a tool for too great an imagination.

Recently talks with Richard Crenna, who began in radio, and seeing an enjoyable musical called "Big Broadcast of 1944," inspired reflections on those days of staring at the radio and the differences between what we heard about sports and what we now see on TV.

There is a difference in reliability — and accountability.

TV has made it necessary for sportscasters to be more accurate. In the days of radio when a famous announcer doing a football game made a mistake, we listeners were his patsies. We believed that the team had actually advanced whatever yards he established. Of course, he couldn't admit the mistake, so he would hastily make up a play that showed the team losing some ground until he placed the team on the proper yard line.

There is a famous story of a sportscaster with a beautiful voice (the voices were particularly lush in the days of

radio), who ecstatically described a field goal attempt by screaming, "and it's a beautiful high spiraling kick, spinning, spinning, spinning..." and his voice took on a more golden glow with every succeeding syllable as he built to the climax of the field goal. But the football didn't cooperate and after building up, the announcer had to drop his voice and say, "and it's no good."

Years ago, one of the stars of the New York Rangers hockey team told me a trick pulled on the announcer of the New York Rovers Sunday afternoon games at Madison Square Garden. The Rovers were an amateur "farm" team for the pro Rangers who played Sunday nights at the Garden.

The announcer, who had a big ego but not too great a knowledge of hockey, bugged a couple of the players. So they made up a play that didn't exist and gave it a strange name, and talked about it when he was around. Sure enough, his broadcasts were filled with descriptions of the play.

On television, that would have been impossible.

See? Who says I don't compliment sports coverage on the tube?

Memorial Fund

NBC News and Constance Brown, widow of NBC News cameraman Bob Brown, have established the Bob Brown Memorial Fund at San Francisco State University.

Brown, NBC News Correspondent Don Harris and two others were killed in an ambush near the People's Temple in Guyana Nov. 18, 1979.

The fund will provide annual scholarships of \$1,000 to \$3,000 to meritorious students interested in pursuing a career in broadcast journalism.

Indians Sought

A nationwide search for native Indian actors of all ages will be conducted in connection with the filming of "Hanta Yo," a ten-hour epic drama to be aired on ABC.

The Wolper/Margulies production company has hired Liz Keigley and her associate, Shari Rhodes, to select a cast of more than 120 speaking parts — all of the roles are American Indians — with 25 or 30 of these to be major as well as starring roles.

"Hanta Yo" is an epic story of traditional Indian family life during the late 1700s and early 1800s.
