Federal budget backs military

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress has passed a \$613.6 billion technically balanced budget for fiscal 1981 containing the largest peacetime military increase in U.S. history, but it could wind up unbalanced if the economy

The spending plan narrowly passed the House Thursday and sailed through the Senate amid growing sentiments

the recession and the extra government spending on aid programs would lead to another budget deficit. It calls for \$613.6 billion in federal spending and shows a \$200 million surplus, and includes the largest peacetime military increase in U.S. history - \$18 billion.

The spending plan was accepted only after House and Senate negotiators broke a two-week deadlock over defense vs. social programs. "The economy may upset our plans for balanced books. But we can hold the line on discretionary spending," said

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., chairman of the Senate Budget Committee.

"Some are saying the fight for a balanced budget is already lost—that we should drop our effort to beat inflation and flail our arms to scare away the recession," he said. "We can't afford to abandon the battle just as the
