Efficient driving boosted

MANCHESTER - Along with concars, applicances and offices, comes the individual effort to conserve. Under a Department of Energy offer, town management is considering teaching employees to drive fuel ef-

The proposal was brought back by Charles McCarthy, assistant town manager, and Police Oficer Gary Woods, after they attended a seminar in August. At the seminar they learned methods of conserving fuel through driving methods, and about the Department of Energy program. "There are many ways to conserve

gasoline that just are not known until you become aware of them,' McCarthy said under the federal department's program, Manchester would spend about \$1,000 to send an

employee to a two-day training ses-sion in Nevada. The employee would then train those town employees who are using the town vehicles the driving methods. About 50 town employees use the vehicles. Those McCartny remembered included avoiding

sudden stops and starts, spinning

wheels, and coasting. Through fuel efficient driving McCarthy estimated 10 to 20 percent saving in consumption. In 1978-79, the saving in consumption. In 1978-79, the town used 250,000 gallons of gasoline. Although this has since been reduced through instituting several conservation measures including a four-day work work for some employees and shutting police cars off 15 minutes an hour. McCarthy estimated about \$75,000 could be saved on the town. \$25,000 could be saved on the town's gasoline bill through fuel efficient

McCarthy and Woods have recommended the program to Robert Weiss, town manager, who is con-sidering it. As the program is managerial, it would not require the approval of the Board of Directors, "One advantage of this type

program is, after the intial fee, we should see immediate results, McCarthy said. He noted the training program would include taking town employee out in vehicles and demonstratin fuel efficient driving methods, along

with explanations. There is also a "gadget" which can be attached to a car's dashboard which shows when someone driving fuel efficiently. A side benefit is once they learn how to drive fuel efficiently, they



dowment funds, including appreciation, dividends and interest during the 1979-80 fiscal year, was 18.5 percent compared to 10.6 percent for the previous fiscal year.

Ex-gold town restores its boom

NEVADA CITY, Calif.-Just a decade ago, quaint, old Nevada City was a moldering and decaying virtual ghost town in the gold country of California. The local economy had been hit hard when the gold

mines in nearby Grass Valley closed for good after the miners went on strike in 1955. Some 55 miles northeast of Sacramento, Nevada City scraped by mainly because it was the county seat - ac-

counting for the biggest part of its work force. One of the local Victorian houses could be bought for \$10,000; there was declining sales tax revenue; the federal government wanted to move the post office out of the downtown area; and the Bank of America threatened to vacate, too. "The town was dead," admits city manager Beryl

Robinson, Jr., a third-generation local resident (on his mother's side). "There wasn't anything there." But the construction of a portion of the Golden State Freeway - from just south of Grass Valley to the north edge of Nevada City, five miles in all - changed the nature of the stagnant town. "It caused the community to stop and take a look at

Nixon factor in trial

-WASHINGTON (UPI) - Richard Nixon may be the deciding factor in the FBI trial that tests the fine line between the government's rights to investigate national security risks and a citizen's right to privacy.

R Stan Mortenson, one of Nixon's Washington lawyers, said in a weekend statement the former president "has been interviewed by both the government and the defense and he indicated to both of them he would

The federal court trial resumes today with Bill Gardner, a former Justice Department attorney, to continue his testimony for the prosecution on what he uncovered about a series of FBI break-ins into private homes in the early 1970s when Nixon was president.

The government's case is against W. Mark Felt, the FBI's former No. 2 man, and its former intelligence chief, Edward S. Miller

They, along with former FBI acting-director L. Patrick Gray, were indicted on April 10, 1978, for approving break-ins, wiretaps and mail openings in a search for fugitive members of the Weather Underground terrorist organization.
