MCC given campus funds

MANCHESTER - The State Board of Higher Education and the state Board of Trustees of Regional Community Colleges have approved allocating \$90,000 to Manchester Community College for design changes in its

proposed permanent campus. The BHE voted Tuesday to recommend approval of the funds, while the regional agency voted Monday. The college's request will now go to Gov. Ella Grasso and the state Bonding Commission, which meet Friday. The money is to be used for changes in design of the \$11.5 million campus. Some were interior changes requested by the college, while another major change was the elimination of a courtyard for energy saving pur-

About \$50,000 will be used for the courtyard elimination, while about \$40,000 will be for the interior changes, such as moving administrative offices and the data center into the administration building.

The BHE also approved a \$34.6 million budget for the regional community college system, which is a \$2 million BHE and the regional agency said the portion of the budget which affects MCC will not be recommended until Gov. Grasso makes her recommendations to state

for \$5.09 million. The BHE leaves the decision of where to make cuts in specific community colleges' budgets to t MCC's proposed budget represents a 10.7 percent increase over this year's budget of \$4.19 million.




