Reagan rests; Carter back on trail

North Carolina in backwaters

RALEIGH, N.C. (UPI) - North Carolina is in the backwaters of the presidential campaign. In all of their travels this fall, President Carter has spent two hours and 50 minutes in the state, independent John Anderson has put in four hours and Ronald Reagan has yet to come.

Carter scrambles in New York

ALBANY, N.Y. (UPI) - President Carter holds a fragile lead over Ronald Reagan in New York, but with one-fifth of the voters still undecided, the president is scrambling for New York hearts in an eager young suitor. Carter, who has declared New York crucial to his re-election hopes, has pumped large amounts of precious time and money into the state, personally hopping into New York at least twice weekly during October.

Still, Republican insiders say their candidate has elected not to go for broke in New York, preferring to focus his energies in states where his chances are better. "Reagan's people assume New York is borderline, leaning to Carter," explained State GOP Chairman Bernard Kilbourn. "They would like to prioritize their media money and time in states where people are leaning to Reagan. I can buy that."

State Democratic Chairman Richard Davis predicted Carter will carry the coal region by about what he did in 1976 - 51.3 percent. Republican chiefs will say only that they expect it to be close. "The money is important," said Hausenfluck. "Where it really counts is in voter identification and turnout. If we can get a few extra phone calls made on election day and get out a few extra pieces of mail to people who are undecided, it could make a big difference."

President has chance in Virginia

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) - Statewide polls, finances and domination of news reports point to victory in Virginia for Ronald Reagan on Nov. 4. But no one is writing off President Carter's chances to win the only Southern state he lost in 1976. There are several key reasons for this: Carter's and the Democrats' slim losses in other elections; an unpredictable bloc of ticket-splitting voters in either Reagan or Carter; and Carter's showing in Virginia polls - behind Reagan, but stronger than most experienced politicians expected.

(UPI) - There have been no offers from other airlines to replace the Boston run from Nashua and Concord, which Precision Airlines will fly for the last time today, a state aviation official said. The cutback follows a decision by Air New England earlier this week to reduce its air service from Keene and Lebanon to New York, a move city officials vowed to fight. "Precision Airlines is through at Concord and it's through at Nashua, and that is a free enterprise decision and we can't do a darn thing about it," said state aeronautics director John Sweeney.

VERNON — "To my knowledge, South Windsor is the only town bordering on Hartford that doesn't have cable TV," John Woodcock III of South Windsor said at a public hearing conducted Thursday night by the Department of Public Utilities Control (DPUIC). The commission conducted the hearing in Vernon on the request of Mayor Marie Herbst and State Sen. Michael Skelley after being asked by many area residents why they couldn't have this service. Zitzer said these goals are even more important because of the unique nature of the state's franchise laws.

He cautioned that cable TV franchises are granted exclusively and for indefinite terms noting that this means that a mistake in a franchise design or award could have adverse consequences for at least decades. Barry Zitzer, of the Division of Consumer Counsel, said it was the intent of that department to make specific recommendations regarding the establishment of new franchises and addition to existing franchises. "These recommendations will not be made until all proposals and statements to be made in this proceeding are received and evaluated," he said. Several South Windsor and Vernon residents appeared at the hearing along with a scattering from other area towns such as Bolton, Tolland, Hebron and Marlborough. Woodcock, an attorney, who is running for state representative from the 14th District, has been pushing for the cable service since before he was nominated. Peter Boucher of the DPUIC, said there are 48 towns in Connecticut that are unfranchised. He said the hearing in Vernon was the first of five panel plans to hold in unfranchised areas. Zitzer said the Consumer Counsel believes that the DPUIC should be guided by several goals in drafting its final decision.

Zoners vote condo complex

VERNON — Despite objections of the Planning Commission, the assistant town planner, and several residents, the Zoning Commission unanimously approved construction of a condominium complex on Old Town Road. The application for the 224-unit complex was filed by developer Werner Kunzli for the former Rockville farm property which he now owns. It is expected it will take from two to three years to complete construction. The Zoning Commission conducted a public hearing on the application last week and continued the meeting until this Thursday to make its decision.

At last week's meeting residents living in the area of the Kaminsky farm, expressed fears about the development creating more traffic problems, noting problems that already exist at the intersection of Town Road and Rt. 30. Kunzli initiated the changes in the zoning laws that now allow construction of condominiums in certain areas which they questioned the possibility of condominiums going up on the Kaminsky property, even before Kunzli had made plans. The proposed units will have one and two-bedrooms. The commission has approved one other condominium complex to go up on Route 30 but cut down on the number of units A&B Developers asked to build.
