



the city just aren't receiving full services from various community agencies which have little contact with each Working together toward a common goal would make for a more even flow of services, and they say that would keep people from falling between the cracks.

r Goulette, it's a heartbreaker. "It's reached the point with me where I'm going to have to be much more selective. We don't have strict admission criteria. We accept a man at face value, but we're getting more and more referrals coming out of mental institutions," he said

The goal of the Open Hearth program is get a man back on his feet and working as soon as possible. The expatient influx is straining the 70-bed mission and

VERNON - Instead of closing a school has the Board of Education considered closing the board administration ilding and putting the offices in a school? This was one of the questions posed to the superintendent of schools at a meeting of the PTO Council.


