





Iran's Revolutionary Guards arrested and executed more leftist opponents and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat predicted the government of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini will be overthrown because of its "darkness and terrorism." The crackdown following the bomb assassination of 74 fundamentalist

leaders a week ago continued, with the Iranian media announcing that three leftists were killed in a shootout and 15 others captured in a sweep Sunday through Tehran. Firing squads executed 46 other peo-

ple, including two men and two women from the group blamed for the blast, raising to nearly 120 the number put before firing squads since President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr was dismissed "When darkness and terrorism reign supreme, anything may happen," Sadat said in an interview published Sunday in e weekly newspaper Mayo. He terme

the bombing a warning to Khomeini of leftist strength. Khomeini will "taste the same cup" from which he forced the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi to drink when the shah was overthrown in 1979 and forced to flee, Sadat said.







Cotter criticizes benefit reduction

HARTFORD (UPI) — The Republican congressional effort to cut Social Security benefits for four million recipients could "cripple" the program, Rep. William Cotter, D-Conn., has charged.

Cotter said Saturday the so-called "Gramm-Latta" proposal would retroactively eliminate the minimum benefit payments for present and future retirees and phase out the student benefit.

"The Rapublican-backed Gramm-Latta vote last week will abruptly cut off benefits to thousand of Social Security beneficiaries, reduce benefits for others and could cripple the administration of the Social Security program," he said in a weekend news release.

Cotter, a member of the Social Security subcommittee, said two-third of the benefits go to citizens over age 70.

Divestiture bill: Practicality, ideals square off

square off in the Legislature this month when law-makers debate whether to revive a bill to force Connec-ticut into selling stock in any company with South

African ties.

Gov. William O'Neill said in defending his veto it didn't make any sense to divest the state's portfolio of all stock in companies, including those headquartered in Connecticut, which have even remote links to South

"That's just a little bit too much," he said. The governor instead advocated a study of what the sale would mean to Connecticut's \$1.6 billion portfolio. About a third of the portfolio is stocks.

Black legislators complained O'Neill was misguided in his interpretation of the bill and said they would lobby to have their colleagues override the governor's veto when the trailer session is held later this month.

However, House Speaker Ernest Abate, D-Stamford, said he doubted the override attempt would be successful — even though the bill passed the House 101-35 and the Senate, 26-10. A two-thirds vote is needed to override.

"My guess is a lot of legislators who are very responsible to business interests who might have supported it the first time, will not the second time," Abate said. "The chance of picking up enough support to offset legislators who will be opposed to the bill because of what they've learned from business is not likely."

State Treasurer Henry Parker, the state's highest elected black official, tried to placate both sides. He said that as a black he supported the bill, but as treasurer, he believed caution was needed before selling

The original six guidelines called for non-segregation in all eating, comfort and work facilities; equal and fair employment practices for all employees; equal pay for equal work; training programs to prepare blacks for managerial jobs; increasing the number of blacks and other non-whites in supervisory positions, and improve-







Interviewed by John Bacchia

Dick Howser managed the New York Yankees and was head coach at Florida State University. Now he is a color commentator for ESPN.

I'm not sure. I'll just have to wait and see what happens. I'm doing some scouting work and I'm doing some color commentating for ESPN, College and Triple A baseball. I'm not going to do anything this current season. I'll have to wait and see. This winter I'll re-evaluate what's going on, take a look at the opportunities and take a hard look at it.

If George Steinbrenner was a little less outspoken, would you still be managing in New York?

George Steinbrenner is going to be George Steinbrenner no matter who manages there. I'm not going to rip George Steinbrenner. He's done a good job with the Yankees. They're leading the American League East and they've got a good ball club.

Do you wish you had done anything differently during your stint with the Yankees?

No, I couldn't have done anything differently. We had a decent season. We scored six runs in the three games in our league championship series against Kansas City. You can't beat a club like that averaging two runs a game. No, I don't think I would have changed a thing I did.

What do you think of college baseball's future?

I think college baseball is definitely on the move. I broad-cast the college World Series for ESPN, and there was a tremendous turnout there. I don't know how far it can go, but with the new facilities, better coaches and more good play-

What goes into the decision of high-school players when they are faced with the choice of turning pro or going into college ball?

A lot of it depends on the money they are offered. Can minor-league ball ever be replaced by college baseball to any extent?

No way. There's no way it could replace Double or Triple A baseball because they don't play enough games. There's a possibility if they ran their games through the summer and had some games in the fall they might replace the rookie league or Class A ball, but never Double or Triple A.

What's the key to programs such as those at Arizona State and Florida State, as opposed to Eastern college baseball?

Tradition is one thing. You check out the players that have signed out of there and into pro bail, and that's impressive.

The weather, the facilities and the coaching are the things the young players look for. If a guy wants to be a baseball player and a student, it's tough to turn down an opportunity

player and a student, it's tough to turn down an opportunity to go south and play.

As for the Eastern schools, the only problem they have is weather. They'll never have the exceptional teams, but they'll have good solid teams. When you take teams like Florida State, Arizona State, Southern Cal or Texas and they're playing in that weather that you can play year-round in, it's quite an advantage. A lot of players come south to play because baseball is a skill sport and you have got to go

While your eyes have been diverted to the problems of our Social Security system — which can and will be solved — the 33 to 44 million of you estimated as "covered" by private company pension plans may really be trusting in a mirage. And the 6 to 7 million of federal, state and local government employees in special retirement schemes are participating in a disgrace.

Consider our civil servants — the "double dippers."
While they work for any level of government, they can
be covered under 21 separate, and usually better, retirement programs, instead of Social Security. These special programs range from congressmen and their staffs, Postal Service workers and ex-CIA operatives to

WASHINGTON - Sales of mutual funds other washing ton — Sales of mutual funds other than short-term funds fell slightly in May to \$937.9 million from \$948.6 million in April.

Bur redemptions of these funds dropped more rapidly to \$637.3 million from \$736.9 million, according to the Investment Company Institute, the national association of the mutual fund industry. Thus, net sales rose to \$290.6 million from \$211.7 million in April. A year ago May sales were \$783.7 million, redeptions were \$485.4 million, resulting in net sales of \$296.3 million.

The small drop in sales was spread across the board. Sales of equity funds — aggressive growth, growth, growth-and-income, and balanced dropped to \$624 million from \$630 million in April. Corporate bond funds fell to \$99 million from 107 million and longterm municipal bond funds dropped to \$130 million from \$143 million. But income funds rose to \$62 million from \$57 million.
