





#### Restaurant tees proposal vetoed

MANCHESTER — A proposal to charge fees to restaurants for quarterly inspections was rejected by the Board of Directors Tuesday night.

Town Manager Robert Weiss said the administration had made the proposal to point out that the budget for the Health Department adopted for this fiscal year will probably be insufficient to meet all its charges.

Mayor Stephen Penny, who supported the proposal, said the introduction of fees would have been consistent with town policy, which requires those who benefits

with town policy, which requires those who benefits from a town service to bear part of the cost of its adfrom a town service to bear part of the cost of its administration, such as fees charges for recreation.

Last year, the Health Department spent \$30,000 to conduct the inspections, which are mandated by state law. The proposed fee schedule would have produced revenues equal to 13 percent of that cost for this year. The directors voted to remove the proposed ordinance from the agenda, with the provision that it would be studied again in six months. If the Health Department had a shortfall as anticipated, the majority of directors agreed, the fees would be considered again as a means of meeting it.

In another matter concerning the Health Department, the directors rejected without discussion a proposal to study formation of a health district with Bolton.

A public hearing on the district, which would have added the two towns to a voluntary state program with 49 municipal participants, generated little public comment earlier this month.

Mayor Stephen Penny had expressed reservations about the proposal at its public hearing, saying he was concerned the town would lack sufficient authority over the district, since the district would have the power to say an assessment on residents to pay for services. Penny was told by a state health official at that time, however, that the town would control the district by ap-



#### Flood work to be finished

WEST HARTFORD (UPI) -Engineers and construction employees have been cleared to begin work on one of the final phanes of a 20-year-old flood control project in the greater Hartford

A groundbreaking ceremony was Tuesday held along Trout Brook for the Trout Brook Flood Control project, a three-year, \$10.3 million project designed to rechannel 1.9 miles of Trout Brook from the University of Connecticut's Greater Hartford campus to Park Road.

The South Branch Park River Watershed Project began in 1951 and is at the halfway point with more than four miles of river and streams rechanneled at a cost of \$17.5 million to the federal and state governments.

The Trout Brook section, expected to be completed in three years, is con-sidered a major flooding problem for 258 homes, the UConn campus and a nursing home, causing \$233,000 in damage each

year.

The latest project will include the replacement of five bridges, as well as other rechanneling work. When completed, only 1.8 miles along the Mill and Piper brooks in Newington will remain to be rechanneled.

Stanley Pac, state Environmental Protection commissioner, said two bills pending in Congress would provide the necessary funding for the project, which Pac said be hopes will begin in a couple

The proposed statute says a person is dead if he has irreversible cessation of circulation and breathing; or

irreversible cessation of all functions of the entire brain, including the brainstem The most frequent causes of irreversible loss of the entire brain function are a direct injury to the head such as in a traffic accident or gunshot wound; a massive brain hemorrhage; or a lack of oxygen due to stoppage

The commission report said 10 to 20 minutes of total or near-total loss of blood circulation will cause the complete loss of brain functions.

The report said some sections of the brain are more easily damaged by lack of oxygen than the brainstem, which regulates the breathing process. Loss of blood flow for 4 to 6 minutes from, say, heart failure, will cause permanent brain damage - but the brainstem will continue to function.

In such a situation, the patient may lapse into what is called a "persistent vegetative state".
"The case of Karen Ann Quinlan has made this condition familiar to the general public," the commission

The proposed statute would not define such people as dead. To do so, the report said, would be unacceptable because it would be "a radical change in the meaning of

brainstem functioning because it said even with the rest of the brain irreparably damaged, those with intact brainstems are able to breath, metabolize, maintain body temperature and even sigh, yawn, track light with

the eyes and react to pain or reflex stimulation. When the respiratory control center in the brainstem is destroyed, breathing ceases and thus, "The traditional signs of life, respiration and heartbeat, disappear and the person is dead."

#### Iran rejects 60 as candidates

More than 60 candidates for Iran's presidency were rejected because many of them were illiterate, known communists or pro-shah, a member of the Iranian upper house of parliament said today.

Ayatollah Jannati, a member of the 12-man Guardian Council which acts as the upper house of the Majlis, told

Tehran radio the elimination process left only four can-didates in the race, including Prime Minister med Ali Rajai, 44, the ruling party's nominee. "Some of the candidates could not even read and write and had finished only the third or the sixth grade," Jan-nati said, explaining why 67 of the 71 people who filed nominations for the July 24 presidential contest were

"Some of those had not even read the constitution, Jannati said. "Others were probably provoked (into contesting) or wanted to make a plaything of the presiden-

Jannati said the Guardian Council decided to reject Januati said the Guardian Council decided to reject outright 25 of the candidates who had taken part in the previous elections and gained "between 1 and 28 votes." The elections have been called amid a mounting campaign against opponents of the Islamic regime, in which 195 people have been executed so far.

The new president will replace the three-member provisional presidential council that came into power June 22, when Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini fired fugitive President Abolhassan Bani-sadr in absentia.



# A SNOW CRAB CRACKING PARTY FOR THE CLAN

"S" is for summer, for sun-filled days, for soft nights and simple suppers. It's the perfect time for a Snow crab cracking party. And, no party could be simpler.


Alaska Snow crab is available in the shell year 'round. The showy clusters can be found frozen in local markets throughout the year. In the summer months, however, Snow crab, from the icy waters of central southeast Alaska, takes on added appeal. The delicate flavor is the perfect answer to the light taste summer appetites demand, and the frosty clusters, arranged on a bed of ice, take the simmer out of summer immediately.





BOLTON - The Board of Selectmen July 7 authorized Resident State Trooper Robert Peterson to begin a new parking system to improve the enforcement of parking violations at town parks and during snow removal.


