BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — IRA hunger striker Kevin Lynch slipped into a coma with the latest appeal to end the fast rejected by seven inmates fasting Lynch entered the 70th day of his hunger strike for

political prisoner status much weaker than fellow con-vict Kieran Doherty, 25, who has refused food for 71

Six prisoners have died in the strikes since May and the grim record-keeping shows that Lynch and Doherty have survived on the hunger strike longer than any of

British government sources said that Lynch slipped into a coma Thursday. His family has been at his side in a Maze Prison hospital vigil for almost two weeks. Lynch was too ill Wednesday night to speak with supporters allowed into the prison to determine whether the eight hunger strikers wanted to call an end to the 153-

The delegation emerged from the prison and said the fasting inmates reaffirmed their commitment to starve to death and would yield only if the British government granted their five demands.

The inmates want the right of free association, to be able to wear their own clothes and refuse prison work. They want more letters and visits and 50 percent reduction of sentence. Britain says granting such concessions would confer political prisoner status on inmates that it maintains are criminals

Lynch, a member of the Irish National Liberation Army, has been in jail since Dec. 1976 in a 10-year-term for possession of weapons and conspiracy



NEW YORK (UPI) — The longest and most bitter dispute in the history of major-league baseball ended early Friday morning, climaxing a marathon negotiation seasion and paving the way for the resumption of the season as

Moffett officially announced the end of the strike, which lasted 49 days and was prolonged over the issue of free agent compensation, at 5:45 a.m. EDT. Moffett said the agreement was reached at 2:00 a.m. EDT. It was believed that the intervening time was spent in notifying owners and players

Moffett appeared elated at the settlement.
"I've never been so relieved," said Moffett, "but I'm right back in the Negotiators used a ruse to gain privacy for the intensive talks that roduced the agreement. They announced the negotiations would take place arly Thursday afternoon at a midtown botel, then proceeded to another

# TV inventor decries sex on television

PRINCETON, N.J. (UPI) - Vladimir Kosma Zworykin, the Russian-born engineer credited as the "Father of Television," says he doesn't watch his invention because the programming is "awful." Zworykin, who celebrated his 92nd birthday Thursday t his home in Princeton, said in a recent interview he
