Orphaned teen faces eviction

TRENTON, N.J. (UPI) — Because his nother died, Michael Lewis, 16, is being kicked out of their two-bedroom, \$63-amonth apartment. City housing officials say he is too young to hold the lease on it. Attorney Virginia Deitrich Thursday accused the Trenton Housing Authority of "dispossessing orphans" and promised to fight the eviction.

Housing officials said in addition to Lewis being too young to take out a lease, there are 1,100 people on a waiting list for the apartment in Prospect Village. Apartments cannot be inherited either, which prevents Michael's 20year-old sister from assuming the lease "It's not a cut and dried question," of the Trenton Housing Authority. "It does get complicated.

Louise Lewis, Michael's mother, became ill and died June 23. While she was hospitalized, her daughter Loriann moved in with the Michael. A half-sister also returned to Trenton from Germany where she was stationed with the armed

Lewis and his sister got into a dispute with the half-sister and several hours efore their mother died, the half-sister changed, Hillman said.
"The kids came home that afternoon

Pope leaves hospital

ROME (UPI) — Pope John Paul II, fully bealed from wounds sufered in an attempt on his life, left ty prompted by a report that the man who tried to kill Pope Paul VI ras seen in Rome.

John Paul, wearing his traditional white silk cassock and tunic and looking pale and drawn, walked unaided but slowly from Rome's Gemelli hospital at 10.00 a.m. He left by car to begin six weeks of convalescence at the Vatican and the papal summer retreat.

Security around the pope was beefed up because an anonymous telephone caller told police Thursday he had seen Benjamim Mendoza — the Bolivian painter who tried to kill Pope Paul VI in Manila in 1970 — in a central Rome plazza.

Police sources said authorities believed the call was probably a hoax but increased security at the hospital. Mendoza, who tried to stab ope Paul at the Manilia airport, was later released from prison and expelled from the Philippines.

About 300 people waiting in the hospital lobby broke into applause when they saw the pope. John Paul read a brief prayer and said only "goodbye" before boarding his Mercedes limousine.

The pope's 16-motocycle, six-car-potice escort arrived 10 minutes later at the Vatican, where John Paul was greeted by about 1,500 peo-ple as he drove in. The pope is to go to the papal summer retreat at Castel Gandolfo, 15 miles south of

Rome early next week.

Recycling solid waste—a disgraceful waste

Every Monday, the lady who manages our home in exurbia ties into neat bundles the huge stacks of newspapers we have accumulated during the previous week. Her husband then spends the time and money to drive the paper to a recycling center miles away. They are not paid a cent for the collected paper. Their one achievement is getting a load of solid waste out of the bouse.

Prices have collapsed for virtually all recyclables.

Markets for most collected materials — limited from
the start — have dwindled or disappeared. Recycling
groups the nation over are burdened with oversupplies
of solld waste materials ranging from paper to iron and

container manufacturers actively support the recovery program. Unlike other recyclables, aluminum containers do not require major reprocessing and can be used almost "as is" in manufacturing new containers. But here, too, the outlook it turning dim. Many groups that had been active in recycling in past


