## Walter P. Gorman, 86, founder of Pinehurst

Walter P. Gorman, 86, of 42 Brookfield St., died today. He was born in Manchester on Sept. 30, 1895, and was a resident of Manchester all his life.

Mr. Gorman was the founder and owner of Pinehurst Grocery. He had served as president of Associated Grocers of Hartford and had also been chairman of the board of the Manchester Trust Company and also of the Manchester branch of the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co.

A former trustee of Manchester Memorial Hospital, he was a veteran of World War I. He was also the oldest living member and past Grand Knight of Vincini Basso.

## President steps up AWACs campaign

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With a bipartisan roster of former U.S. foreign policy makers backing him, President Reagan now is trying to win support in Congress to accept his proposed Saudi arm deal.

Senate has signed a similar resolution of opposition. Reagan is focusing his campaign efforts in the Republican-dominated chamber to win support.

At about the same time, in New York, Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir said Israel must speak out against the proposed sale as a danger to its security.

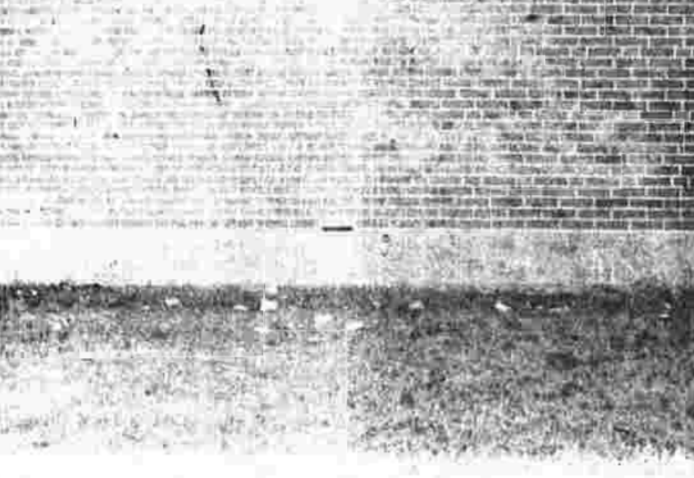

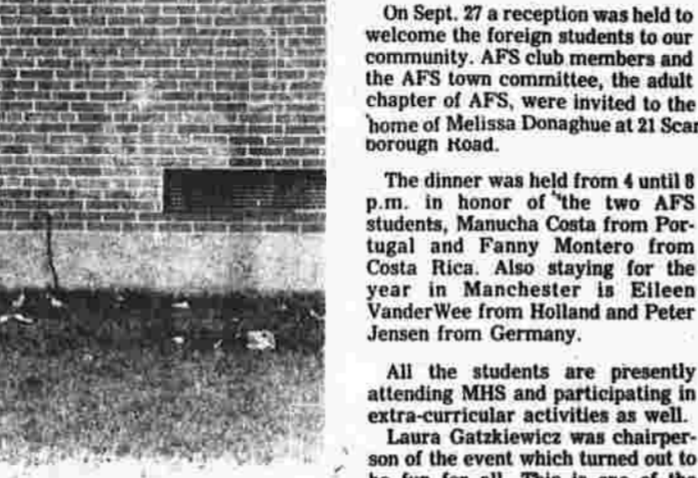
