

If you have these feelings, you are not alone. Such conterns have become commonplace, and as a result, najor changes in the ways we distribute work over the lays, weeks, and years of our lives are already oc-

considerably more diverse and flexible than in the past, illowing individuals to work in ways that better meet

Traditionally, if one held a job, one worked 40 hours a week for approximately 40 years sandwiched between schooling during youth and retirement in old age Foday, managers and employees alike are questioning he viability of such standardized worktime irrangements and our prevalent education-worketirement lockstep.


Social changes This move toward more worktime flexibility is rooted

in fundamental social changes in education, family life, Less and less do we follow the traditional practice of gaining all of our education during youth. A 20-year-old oday can expect to live another 55 years as compared to 2 years in 1900. Thus the idea of recurrent education throughout life has become increasingly reasonable. In addition, almost one-third of today's workers change their occupations every four years. The need to adjust skills in response to social and technological changes — coupled with growing interest in recreational education and the recognition that "real world" experience augments formal schooling — is en-

couraging youth to interrupt school with employment and adults to break from work for education. Changing family patterns are also increasing the demand for worktime changes. Until recently, traditional amily values encouraged men to hold fulltime jobs as "breadwinners" and women to forego or minimize employment in order to perform full-time "homekeeping" duties. Today, husbands and wives are increasingly sharing income-earning and, to some exent, homekeeping responsibilities as couples have fewer children and women pursue careers or take jobs

to help meet family expenses. As more of us become members of dual-earner households, the task of juggling home and career will necessitate more work scheduling flexibility in order to meet ndividual needs. Additionally, family time constraints when both spouses are employed will foster a desire to forego earnings in exchange for timeoff. 



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

Rates reduced

NEW HAVEN—Hearing and speech impaired customers who use telecommunications devices or teletypewriter equipment to place long distance calls from a resident phone to points outside Connecticut can do so under reduced interstate rates. The adjustments permit certified hearing and speech impaired customers to receive reduc tions during the day and evening on custom

dialed interstate long distance calls. The reduction is 35 percent for calls placed during the day-rate period and 60 percent for calls placed during the evening-rate period. No reductions beyond those already in effect will be made fo calls placed during the night or weekend period, and there is no additional reduction at any time for perator-handled calls.

Customers are eligible for the reductions upon ertification of their disability by a physician. udiologist, speech pathologist or appropriate state or federal agency. Customers who have already been certified for similar reductions on interstate calls will not have to be recertified in most cases Certification forms are available from Southern New England Telephone by calling local residence service centers or dropping in at a Phone Center

The reduced rates were proposed by the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. in recognition of the United Nations' designation of 1981 as the International Year of Disabled Persons.

The question of goals is allimportant for flocks of upwardly mobile working women, said experts at a seminar titled "Career Crosswords: What Next"

How a woman answers, whatever her present stage and time on the career ladder, will help decide if she'll move upward, sideways, downward or stay in

But before tackling the question, a woman should know her chances of getting ahead either at any level probably are better is she's played a team sport or had military training, say the same experts. Team sports teaches team playing. The military schools teach chain of command.

Elaine Kirchen, an associate in Boyden Associates, described as "one of the foremost executive recruiting firms", made that point. She said the corporate world long ago picked up team-playing from the sports scene and chain of command from the military. As a result, she said, workers who have sports and military in their backgrounds have an edge. Historically, and until recently, that advantage was man's

Capsules of points from the experts: Burnout The 'overachiever's disease" is how Dr Rosalind Forbes, president. Forbes Associates, described burnout "Women are more prone to it than men and the most prone women are housewives

The potential burnout victim is a perfectionist and spread thin. Women in the audience were asked to raise a hand. to give a definition of burnout.

Forbes recognized them, one by one Words on the list she assembled from the answers futility, exhaustion, loss of conboredom, frustration, loss of motivation, anger, pooped, depression, lack of feeling, lack of alternatives, inability to make decisions

"Burnout is all of the above and more," Forbes said "And it comes from prolonged negative stress that leaves a person exhausted - mentally, physical-

ly, emotionally, spiritually "We think of burnout as coming from high pressure jobs and long hours. Only those who don't enjoy their jobs get burned out by high pressure and long hours. One study showed the people least likely to experience burnout own their own businesses.

A tendency to overindulgence - food. alcohol, or even mood medicines - can be a sign of burnout. On the intellectual level, burn out means lnability to make decisions, missing deadlines frequently Psychosocially the burnout victim feels alienated Emotionally, victim bottles

The Celica quartet - consisting of coupe and liftback models, the Luxury Supra and a "winged" Performance Supra — amounts to nothing less than a four-pronged invasion of the hotly contested sport luxury market.

The Performance Supra plucks 145 horsepower from 2.8 liters of double overhead cam six-cylinder engine and sends it to the rear tires by way of a fivespeed manual-overdrive transmission and a limited-slip 3.73:1 final drive Celica options include everything from a digital display panel to a banzai sound

Datsun, having unleashed a potent turbocharged version of its luxo-sport 280ZX this summer, will revamp its 510 series for 1982. Called the Stanza, Nissan's slope-nosed threat to GM's new-J-cars will feature three-, four- and fivedoor models, all with front-wheel drive and full independent suspension. A new 2-liter power plant is promised. Fransmission choices will include fourand five-speed manuals and a threespeed automatic

Datsun's dieselpowered luxury sedan, the 810 Maxima, will be equipped for 1982 with a five-speed manual transmission and will also be available in California for the first time.

Mazda's recent entry into the sporty personal car field, the 626 Luxury, will compete with a refined Honda Accord LX, while the latter manufacturer with the minicar market

Rumor has it that a front-drive, 1-liter mini-mite from Honda may reach our shores before the end of 1982. If it does, it will be the smallest car available in America and probably the most

economical. At the other end of the spectrum, the news from West Germany includes a completely new Mercedes 380 SEC costing up to \$50,000. The limitedproduction, four-passenger coupe will be

powered by a 155-horsepower, fuelinjected V-8. By offering five diesels (four of which will be turbo-charged) and only three gasoline models, Mercedes Benz con-

fidently predicts a 26.1 mpg overall average for its 1982 fleet Another German-built prestige car. the BMW, will enhance its 1982 lineup with four substantially revised models in its 500 series. Only the 518 will use a fourcylinder power plant. The 5201, 525 and 5281 will have six-cylinder engines, all

with fuel injection and overhead cam. The new five-series BMWs will not differ greatly in appearance from traditional Bayarian products but will provide a bit more interior room while utilizing improved aerodynamics and a diet to gain in the mpg department. Suspension improvements will ensure the BMW reputation as a superb

driver's car. Also from Germany, but not until spring, will be Porsche's eagerly awaited 944. Porchephiles who complained of lackluster performance from the 924 should take note of the 944's credentials. The new siliconalloy, 2.5liter four-cylinder engine that will power the 944 is rated at 163 horse-power and 1.54 foot-pounds of torque. Its factoryclaimed top speed of 137 mph is 2.5 times

the federal limit. 'Nuf said!

Other news from the Volkswagen-Porsche-Audi triumvirate is a Rabbit diesel that tells you when to shift. Volkswagen claims that shifting when the "E-light" goes on will make it possible to improve fuel economy (as much as 7 percent) without suffering any loss of performance.

Volkwagen will also unveil a reskinned Scirocco and a new Audi 4000based Dasher in 1982. The Dasher will be available with a four-cylinder tur-

bodiesel engine. Audi will wait until 1983 to introduce a super-slippery-looking replacement for the 5000. The Audi Coupe, a late '81 arrival, promises to be the best allaround sports coupe again in 1982. That is, unless the Piazza, a new entry from

Opel-Isuzu, comes to America in time to challenge it for the title. From Italy, look for Alfa Romero's Alfosud hatchback, a capacious threedoor model with a slew of engine options and styling that is typically different from "run-of-the-mill" minis. The "hot" Alfa, though, will continue to be the free-

revving GTV6. If you thirst for something more than Teutonic precision but can't afford a megabucks Maserati, the GTV6 is the essence of Italian soul. This four-seater will keep pace with the quickest of the quick - and leave you giggling in delight over the unmistakable trumpeting of its

exhaust. A few Maserati Quattroportes will trickle to our shores in 1982. Relatively ged for five years, the \$60,000 Italian cruiser represents, perhaps, the ultimate defiance of EPA logic. Its double overhead cam V-8 will shoot the 4,600-pound car to 150 mph, but fourbarrel Weber carburetors beg for fuel at

the rate of a gallon every 9 miles.

With the death of Triumph's TR7 and TR8 sport models and a new Jaguar roadster still a few years off, Great Britain can at least claim to have subsidized the North Ireland-built de Lorean However, credit for the mid-engine, gullwinged stiletto will ultimately go to its ex-G.M. wunderkind creator, John Z. de Lorean. Expect limited American availability of the Renault-engined. stainless steel-bodied specialty car in

1982 — at \$25,000-plus per copy.
From France by way of AMC will come the Renault Fuego. The Fuego will be based on the Renault 18 chassis but fitted with a droop-nose, bulbous-rear body style that should capture the fancy of a lot of people while providing interior space for four adults

Citroen, known for years as a maker of bizarre-looking automobiles, will do nothing to damage that reputation if the Peugeotpowered Visa debuts in the United States. The Visa is a five-door Citroen mini, capable of 46 mpg on the open road. A few Visas will reach our shores, but Citroen plans to sell most of them at home, where it is hoped they will curb the strong Japanese market.

The Japanese have made their presence felt in Great Britain too. For this reason, British Leyland's excellent new mini will be confined to the United Kingdom. Put quite simply, the Japanese have learned to build a better mousetrap. But they have also created sharper competition and much needed change within the auto industry the

Start planning to save taxes

NEW YORK (UPI) - Although April 15 is months away, financial experts say there are steps taxpayers can take now that will make them glad they did when the 1981 taxfiling season rolls around.

With major provisions of the new tax law taking effect in 1982, some year-end tax planning can yield significant

All income tax brackets will be trimmed another 10 percent next July.

In addition, the top tax rate of 70 percent — which

applies primarily to investment income - drops to 50 percent on Jan. 1. So for many couples with taxable income now in excess of \$60,000, or single taxpayers with taxable income over \$41,500, there may be savings to be reaped by taking action before the end of the year.

To take maximum advantage of the tax cuts, the basic strategy espoused by tax planners is to accelerate

deductions and defer income. The object is to defer income from 1981 to 1982 when it will be taxed at a lower rate. Similarly, since tax rates are higher this year, deductions taken in 1981 generally

will be more valuable than in 1982 when rates are lower.

DEFER INCOME — George Mandel, a tax partner in the accounting firm of Seidman & Seidman, suggests one way to defer interest earned between now and the end of the year would be to transfer money invested in a money market fund or savings account deposits where the interest would be taxable in 1981 - to a

Treasury bill which matures in 1982.

Another possibility, Mandel says, is for an employee to ask his boss to hold off payment of any year-end bonus

until the beginning of next year.

For those in the top tax brackets, he says, some tax shelters may prove helpful in deferring income from

ACCELERATE DEDUCTIONS - There are a number of ways to build up 1981 deductions. If you plan to make charitable contributions next year, you could make the donation this year when the deduction for most taxpayers who itemize deductions will be more valuable. But Mandel warns that deductions can't be taken on the basis of a pledge. The contribution actually has to be made. Those who don't itemize can't claim a charitable deduction in 1981, but there will be a limited deduction available for contributions made by non-

itemizers beginning in 1982 Mandel says pertain state taxes and interest payments due next year can be prepaid this year. If a payment check isn't sent in until close to the end of the year, Mandel advises to either send it by certified mail or personally deliver it and get a receipt to avoid any IRS questions on eligibility for current year deductions.

Pannell Kerr Forster is advising its clients to take full advantage of the 1981 provision allowing individuals to receive tax-free up to \$200 in interest and dividends (\$400 on a joint return). That liberal provision doesn't

apply next year. The accounting firm suggests that those who haven't received that much in interest or dividends "should consider investing in the shorter-term notes offered by many banks, commonly called Repurchase Certificates which have an eight to 89 day maturity. Alternatively, you should consider buying stock just before its dividend record date if the dividend on that stock is going to be

MARRIAGE - For some couples contemplating marriage who haven't yet set the wedding date, it may pay to wait until next year. In 1982, the new tax law gives partial relief of the so-called "marriage penalty" which creates a higher tax burden for twoincome married couples than for unmarried couples filing single returns. For two-income couples in the top tax brackets, Mandel says, waiting until after Jan. 1 could provide significant tax savings.

But as financial planners usually like to stress - particularly when it comes to family matters - taxes should't be the only reason one does or doesn't do something.

Modification of 'blue laws' urged

BOSTON (UPI) - Massachusetts could generate thousands of jobs and millions of dollars in state revenues by

repealing the Sunday store closing law, says state Rep. Timothy Bassett. The Lynn Democrat, who is co-chairman of the Legislature's joint Commerce and Labor Committee, has filed legislation to modify the 200-yearold "blue laws" to allow retail stores and

supermarkets to open on Sunday. The legislation is scheduled to be introduced in the Massachusetts House today and slated for deate sometime this

"It has hurt our businesses, our workers, our consumers and our state's revenues." Bassett said of the law. Approval of his legislation would remove "an unfair regulatory disadvantage suffered by our state's business

people." he said in a statement. The legislation would apply only to retail and food stores - not to liquor stores, industry, manufacturing, govern-

ment or other offices Some estimates have indicated the

state could pick up as much as \$20 million a year in new sales tax revenues by allowing Sunday store openings. Retail merchants have blamed the Sunday closing laws for losses in sales and in accompanying state tax revenues. They have noted that a number of Massachusetts consumers regularly drive to neighboring states - especially

Rhode Island and New Hampshire - to shop on Sundays Under the bill, retail and food stores would have the option of opening on Sundays, but they could not force their

employees to work. Those employees who did agree to Sunday hours would be paid time-and-a-half under the law. The measure would not affect the "mom-and-pop" stores and other businesses that have been allowed to

open on Sunday under the current law. Terms recommended in the legislation are similar to those that have been in effect in recent years on the four Sundays between Thanksgiving and Christ-mas, when retail and food stores have been permitted to open

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
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


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
