

President vows leaks crackdown

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan, angry with the "virtual hemorrhage of leaks," promises to crack down on any administration official who discloses government secrets. Reagan issued a directive Tuesday to "shut down"

foreign policy news leaks which a spokesman maintained have "endangered lives" and compromised national security. The president did not mention possible penalities, but

said anyone who releases classified information will be subject to investigation with the "use of all legal Reagan said the number of persons with access to top

secret documents will be minimized. And, he said, the government's failure to identify the sources of leaks "must be remedied and appropriate disciplinary measures taken."

White House Communications director David Gergen told reporters "leaks are one of the most serious problems facing this administration.' The Washington Post reported today that Deputy Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci voluntarily took a lie detector test as part of a Pentagon investigation to

determine who told the paper about a secret report given to a closed-door session of the Defense Resource Board last week. The Post said that Henry Catto, assistant secretary of defense for public affairs, confirmed Tuesday that Carlucci, who chaired the meeting, and several other

members of the board, which includes top Pentagon civilians, have taken the tests in the probe. Newsweek, in its current edition, reports that Reagan read the "riot act" to his Cabinet last week, brandishin a copy of The Washington Post that prominently playe

But, Love said, those same firms have been reluctant to help the financially troubled Public Service Co. of New Hampshire build the Seabrook plant even though they are better off financially and claim to need the Long Island Sound

generating capacity.



Can swing save music industry?

HOLLYWOOD — The current state of pop music and record sales, according to one established authority Millionaire record producer Richard Perry, presiden and founder of Planet Records, says, "The recording

business is sick but not terminal." Perry's magical touch has produced runaway hit albums for Barbra Streisand, Ella Fitzgerald, Carly Simon, Ringo Starr, Andy Williams, Art Garfunkel, and many others.

AFTER 16 YEARS in the music business, Perry is convinced the recording industry is at its nadir with record sales only one-third of what they were a few "Not long ago a solid single or album would sell a million copies," he said. "Today, 100,000 sales is considered good.

"I think the decline in record sales reflects the national economy. The average album sells for about? bucks, which isn't all that much, but people aren't spending it as easily as they did.

The market is hurt, too, by cassettes. One kid buys an album for 7 dollars and a dozen of his or her pals copy the music on their cassette players for a dollar or two. "Fidelity is good and blank cassette sales are up about 300 percent. Nothing can be done about the situation regarding the copyright laws.'

To ease the burden on taxpayers, Dagon, at the Town Council meeting Tuesday night, called for council adoption of the five-year phase-in plan which would allow taxpayers to spread new tax assessments over a five-year period.

On the 1980 Grand List residential property owners paid 30 percent of the town's tax share and businesses paid 38 percent. Under revaluation the individual property owners will bear 44 percent of the tax brunt and businesses will pay 37 percent. The remainder of the 100 percent will come from personal property and motor vehicle assessment and both of these have decreased.

Under the proposed phase-in plan, residents would pay only an additional 20 percent assessment each year over five years to phase in the total assessment increase.
