Dr. Ali Shakibai, a formerly of 153 Main Street, moved into his new office on Dec. 26 and so far says he loves it.

His previous office has been on the second floor with a staircase the only method of getting upstairs, he explained.

"With so many patients who are elderly or have some heart condition I didn't feel good about them having to climb the stairs," he said.

Dr. Shakibai said his decision to move to One Heritage Place came before he was told of the conversion. But he indicated he would have made the move in any case.

THE CONVERSION of the building vacated in January 1980 was orchestrated by developer John A. DeQuattro. Renovations to the building include closing the department store's display windows and installing new heating and electrical systems while retaining the exterior's period appearance.

When unemployment spiraling upward, the job career counselors who charge you for their services for what often is no more than preparation of a resume are emerging from their sleazy backgrounds to take advantage of your desperation and to "take you" for whatever they can.

- 1) What obligation am I incurring? What is the cost? When must I pay and precisely what services?
2) How long has this firm been active in this business under current management?
3) How competent is its staff in executive guidance and what are the qualifications? What are the firm's resumes like?
4) What is the firm's record of success or placement and what are the names of satisfied clients? Can I check them myself? How soon did they get jobs? What jobs did they get?
5) What are the names of satisfied employers with whom this firm has placed personnel? Can I verify this? How?
6) Has the firm's advertising accurately described services offered? Is the promotional literature different from the contract?
7) Does the contract cover all aspects of the agreement? Have I read this contract several times and double-checked it with experts?
8) Are additional promises in writing and signed by an officer of the firm? Does this officer have authority to obligate the firm?
9) What provisions are there, if any, for a refund? Are there phases of service tied to a partial refund?
10) What service period is covered by the contract? Can I wait that long to get a job and paycheck?
11) The key protection: Be on guard against job counseling firms that charge in advance. Don't sign any contracts hastily.

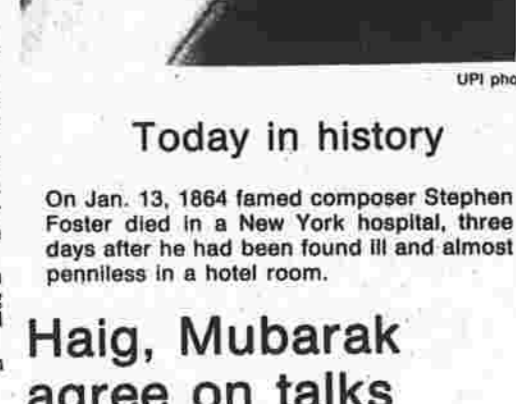

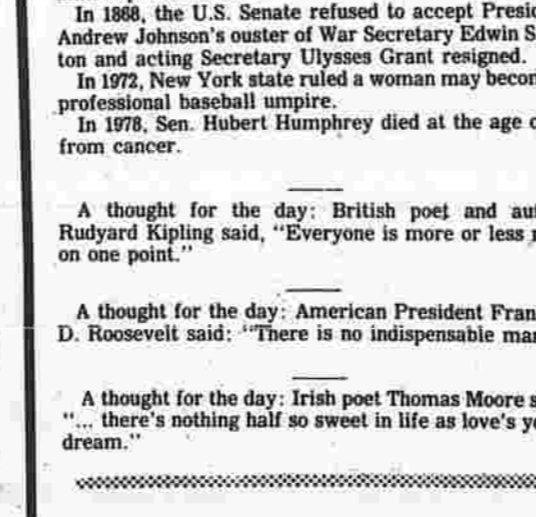

Cold keeps stranglehold on Northeast and paralyzes Dixie

The hardest freeze this century kept a stranglehold on the Northeast and paralyzes Dixie today as new storms threatened to dump more snow from Illinois to New York. At least 133 deaths were blamed on the weather.

Seven-inch snows rendered ill-equipped southern cities helpless and a deep freeze caused \$500 million damage to Florida's tender citrus crop.

Power lines in Alabama snapped under the ice and authorities advised people not to try to travel. Ice, sleet and snow battered the Gulf Coast states, closing schools and industries in Texas, where more than 1,000 Dallas residents were

without water Tuesday due to the more than 30 major water mains that have burst since Monday. A new winter snow storm today moved into Ohio and Pennsylvania, where at least 14 people have died. The snowfall elevated temperatures but made driving perilous.

Heavy snows - up to 10 inches - were forecast for New York by late today and winter storm warnings were posted from Tennessee to the Carolinas.

Snow blanketed the Northern Plains. As much as 4 inches was forecast for Chicago. The brutal cold that began Saturday and peaked Monday in what the National Meteorological Center described as the coldest day of the century maintained its strongest foothold in the Northeast, where the

WARSAW (UPI) - Poland's military rulers said they want to end martial law as soon as possible but President Henryk Jablonski warned the timing depends on the "favorable transformation" of economic and social life.

Polish Foreign Minister Josef Czerw returned from a Moscow visit Tuesday with praise for the Soviet Union's "full understanding" and efforts "to give us all possible aid... until the crisis situation is finally removed."

He charged the United States was seeking to increase international tension by exploiting the Polish crisis. Deputy Prime Minister Jerzy Ozdowski told a news conference Tuesday martial law "is a sharp, painful period which should be as short as possible."

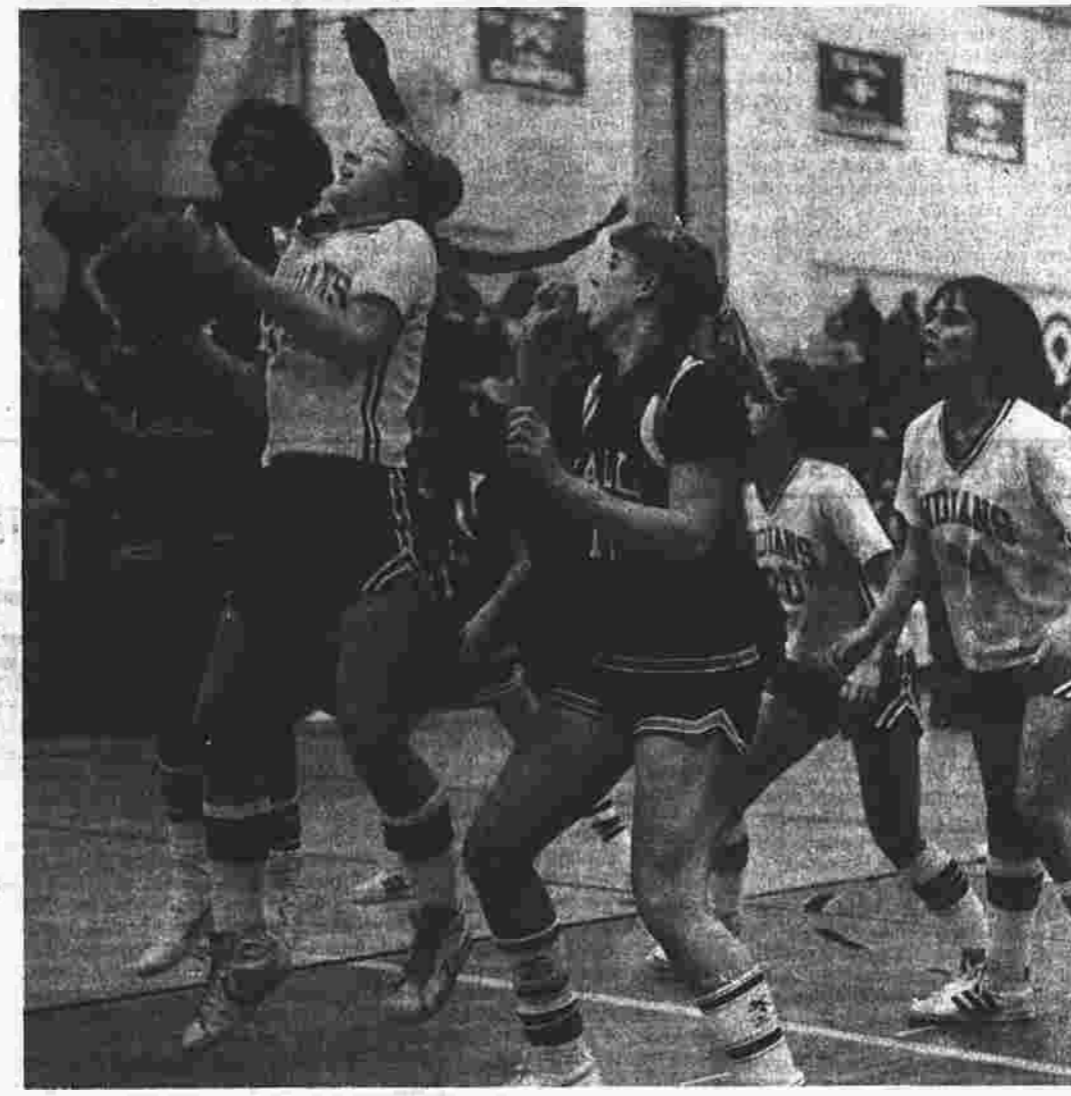

Forget your diet at the Goodwin house

If you're lucky enough to be invited to lunch — or dinner — at Dianne Goodwin's house on Ridge Street, (I was) forget about your diet — forget about the fact that you skip lunch some days and eat lightly on others. When you see the food she prepares, you won't be able to resist. (I didn't.)

"I enjoy cooking. It's probably what I do best to resist," Mrs. Goodwin said. "I love to experiment with new recipes. And I try them out on my friends, not just my family," she said. If she tries something that her family doesn't happen to like, she always makes enough side dishes they can eat so they certainly won't go hungry. "But my family loves to be guinea pigs although I have made some disasters," she admitted.

BESIDES ALL THE cooking she does in her own kitchen, Mrs. Goodwin also has taught some cooking classes for adults and also for children at the Lutz Museum.

She gives a lot of her time as a volunteer at the museum and also is a registered nurse who works at Meadows Convalescent Center.

Mrs. Goodwin, her husband, John, and their two daughters have a dream. And, naturally, that dream has something to do with food.

They would some day like to open a family restaurant. "It would have to be near the water some place. My husband is an avid fisherman and our family dream is to have an inn. He could catch fish and I would cook it, and the girls would help, too," Mrs. Goodwin said.

This idea was strengthened when the family took a trip to the Pennsylvania Dutch Country and stayed at the Groff Family Restaurant. The food was served family-style and the whole family just loved it. "Our two girls think it would be great. We could combine my love for cooking with John's love for fishing," Mrs. Goodwin said.

LUNCH AT Mrs. Goodwin's house is not only a treat for the taste buds but it's also a treat for the eyes. "I love to make fancy garnishes. To do this, all you really need is a good sharp knife to make those extra touches," she said.

"Those extra touches make the eyes tell your mouth and your stomach that something good is coming. I think presentation is important in making a meal special," she said. She said she makes these special touches for her family and for company.

At the luncheon last week she had made roses out of cherry tomatoes and pretty frilly flowers out of scalloons.

She swears by her microwave oven, noting it's a blessing when you're trying to have everything on the table hot at the same time.

Some of her recipes are complicated and take time and care. Others look like you slaved in the kitchen for hours, but they're really very simple. One of these is a delicious chocolate mousse that she makes with semi-sweet chocolate bits. It calls for one pound of semi-sweet chocolate.

SHE HAS a recipe for stuffed mushrooms which is one of her originals. The secret to the special taste is the use of crushed buttery crackers and some minced clams. She said this can also be used as a stuffing for pork chops by omitting the clams and substituting apples chopped.

A recipe for a vegetable herb dip was given to her by a close friend. This is served with assorted fresh vegetables such as cauliflower, cucumbers, carrot sticks and celery. She said it's also good as a sandwich spread or as a salad dressing. Her recipe for peach parfait is quick and easy, she said, noting, "It's great for a last-minute dessert and it looks quite elegant." For recipes that specify butter, Mrs. Goodwin suggests that butter be used, not margarine. She said she uses margarine for a lot of things but some things really need the salty, buttery flavor to make them right. The recipe for Apple Kraut Chops is also one of Mrs. Goodwin's original recipes and it's especially nice on these cold winter nights.

Here are a few pointers for selecting and preparing mushrooms: Choose firm smooth mushrooms with the veil (the membrane between the cap and the stem) still attached. Refrigerate mushrooms as soon as you get them home. Store them in the container in which they were purchased. Rinse mushrooms under running water just before using them. Never soak or peel mushrooms. White, cream-colored and brown mushrooms cook and taste the same and are the same white color inside. Here are some tasty mushroom dishes that can add excitement to winter menus without squeezing the grocery budget: Mushroom Fish Stew Provencal: in a heavy sauce pot, saute onion and garlic. Add tomatoes, clam juice and seasonings. Simmer for half an hour. Stir in sliced fresh mushrooms, chunks of cod or halibut and canned baby clams. Simmer 10 minutes longer. Serve with grated Parmesan cheese. Chicken with Mushroom and Lemon Sauce: Quickly saute sliced fresh mushrooms and minced garlic in a non-stick skillet.

Quickly brown boneless shoulder steak. Add cocktail vegetable juice, onion and bay leaf. Simmer, covered, until almost tender. Stir in sliced fresh mushrooms and green pepper chunks. Simmer until meat and vegetables are fork-tender.

This means that when we find a pad of refund forms on a supermarket shelf, we should take just two — one for ourselves and one to trade. We shouldn't allow temptation to turn us into greedy "pad grabbers."

• We should handle coupons properly. They should be cut out carefully, and the expiration dates should be circled in red. Of course, coupons should be used only for the products we have purchased.

• When we send for refund offers, we should abide by the valid restrictions that appear on the refund form. This applies especially to offers that are limited to "one refund per name, family or address."

• But "New Year" resolutions should not be one-sided. Here are a few we would like to hear from the companies that make the offers.

• We will see that refund requests are processed promptly.

• We will identify our refund checks with the name of the company that makes the offer.

• If our offers have geographic limitations, we will print them on the refund form.

• We will put expiration dates on all refund offers so that requests are not returned to our customers marked "box closed."

• When refund offers are mentioned in our advertisements, we will give shoppers who can't find the

forms an opportunity to write in for them.

• To help our customers save on postage we will keep our required proofs of purchase simple and small.

• We realize that our requiring register tape

causes shoppers a variety of problems and will refrain from asking for it as a proof of purchase.

In 1982, let's all keep the fun in refunding by using our money-saving skills with a sense of fairness.
