ational Airport.







BUSH'S BID for the Republican presidential nomination was unsuccessful, but he was selected to be Ronald Reagan's running mate. Weicker dutifully (if not enthusiastically) supported Reagan but pointedly refused to endorse

Four charged in corruption in state's DOT

WALLINGFORD (UPI) — Charges including larceyy, bribery and perjury have been lodged gainst four men as a result of the ongoing investigation of corruption in the state Department of Transportation.

The arrests were basd on evidence detailed in a second report by Superior Court Judge George Stoughton, who is acting as a one-man grand jury investigating allegations of bidrigging, kickbacks and bribery within the DOT.

Chief State's Attorney Austin J. McGuiga said Tuesday two DOT employees and the owner of a Milford maintenance company were charged in a scheme that grossed the firm a \$203,415 profit on a DOT contract to

remove transformers with a PCB-laden coolant.

Prosecutors also claim DOT employees used state purchase requisitions to buy items for personal use. The charges were the first to be issued involving the DOT since April 16, when former Transportation Com-missioner Arthur B. Powers was accused of bribe receiving, perjury, tampering with a witness, fabricating physical evidence and attempting to tamper

with physical evidence.
Powers, a former Berlin mayor, has pleaded inno cent. His trial has not yet been scheduled.
William V. Carbone, 52, of Rocky Hill, former plan and maintenance superivsor in the DOT's Office of Concessions, was charged Tuesday with nine felonies.

Lowell Cantor, 37, the owner and operator of the Connection Lighting Maintenance and operator of the Connecticut Lighting Maintenance and Service Co. of Milford, was charged with bribery, first-degree larceny and conspiracy to commit first-degree larceny.

Alphonse Morello, 29, of Cheshire, an employee of the DOT Office of Concessions was charged with perjury. Iirst-degree larceny and conspiracy to commit first-

degree larceny.

John Delvecchio, 40, of Bridgeport, a former employee in the concessions office, was charged with two counts of second-degree larceny and two counts of conspiracy to commit second-degree larceny.

The charges against Delvecchio centered on personal

purchases made with state funds and are not related to the case involving the three other suspects.

Meals sound very tasty in cookbook for hungry hikers

I must confess that I've never cared for life-sustaining repasts consumed after hiking through the woods for 20 miles and pitching a tent. That's MUCR too far from civilization for me. But I do like eating out of doors, and indeed I can remember pionics at the beach or in the woods when the salty tang of the sea breeze or the fresh sharp scent of the pines seemed like nature's spice for the food we were eating.

It has always struck me as odd that hikers — hearty, health-conscious people that they usually are — should tramp off down the trail laden with carefully chosen gear and then, having worked up a really good appetite, eat the most appailing meals of freeze-dried, chemicalladen junk.

laden junk.

I understand that as a rule that stuff not only tastes terrible, but it also very expensive in the bargain. I tried "bacon bits" once. Dear me! It isn't bacon, and it's very doubtful if it's even food. I think I'd do without bacon on Stir 1 % teaspoons baking powder into the remaining

my hike.

Well, it seems that I was not the only person to wonder why hikers don't eat better. Gretchen McFlugh, who seems to have been blessed with a charming sense of humor and more than a fair share of common sense, has written a delightful book entitled "The Hungry Hiker's Book of Good Cooking" (Knopf, \$8.95). In it she discusses the pros and cons of camp stoves vs. camp fires, basic equipment for a portable kitchen, the all-important foods to take along and bake-shead breads and cakes. I must say that the meals sound very tasty indeed

deed.

As you have to carry your food, dried foods are, of course, the mainstay of wilderness cooking. However, it seems that commercially available dried foods, with a few notable exceptions, are unreliable and unpalatable. Gretchen McHugh gets around this problem by giving readers full instructions, complete with drawings, on how to construct a simple home food dryer for about \$30.

I couldn't help thinking that it might be a very handy thing to have even if you never hike further than around the block, inasmuch as one could dry all kinds of fruits, vegetables and herbs in the summer when they are cheap and plentiful. (Dried foods keep because the bacteria that cause spoilage can't grow in a dry medium.) This simple little wooden contraption uses a 200-watt light builb and is therefore very inexpensive to run. Of course, you can buy a ready-made dehydrator, and several are discussed but they cost nearly 2400. 200-watt light bulb and is therefore very inexpensive to run. Of course, you can buy a ready-matic dehydrator, and several are discussed, but they cost nearly \$400.

I particularly enjoyed the chapter on make-sheed breads, cakes and cookies. The author wryly notes that the recipes have been thoroughly tested by family, friends and assorted critters. In fact, one moonlight night a New Hampshire raccoon dug past even gorp to feast on a McHugh pound cake, which was in an inadequately guarded backpack. (Gorp, is case you don't know, is Good Old Raisins and Peanuts.)

Try quick meals to beat the heat

Fast foods from the neighborhood drive-in aren't the only way of putting quick meals together these hot

summer days.

A growing number of cookbooks address the subject, with varying degrees of success.

Rose Grant says she developed the recipes for her Fast and Delleious Cookbook (Nitty Gritty \$4.55 paperback) during 25 years of marriage that included rearing four children.

There's a vegetarian main course chapter because most of her now grown children were vegetarism at one time — but "they've all recented," she said in a recent telephone interview from her summer home in Woods Hole, Mass. Her permanent home is in Eugene, Ore.

Mrs. Grant, who has worked as a librarian and now is

a book indexer, regards recipes as road maps — to be collected and adapted to suit your family's appetites, the cook's time and budget and people's changing ideas about what constitutes healthful enting.

While she does use a few convenience products, she also advocates using fewer processed foods and less sugar and salt for day'to-day meals.

Most of her recipes can be prepared in 30 minutes or less and few take as long as an hour to cook.

The 40-Second Omelet Guaranteed! by Howard Heiner with Joan O'Sullivan (Atheneum \$12.95) is amusing to read and useful for people who can't think what to put in an omelet or how to use up leftovers hanging around the refrigerator.


5 Minute Feasts (Contemporary Books \$7.95), for example, refers to cooking time only, and per recipe. Another time element Wurzer ignores is the need to defrost frozen vegetables, quickly done only by microwave.

And anyone who has ever tried to prepare two or more stir-fried dishes for a single meal knows the first ones tend to wilk while subsequent ones are being cooked. In The New 15 Minute Gournet, by Beverly Adams (Acropolis Books \$4.95 paperback), the time givan applies only to preparation. Some stews, for example, require three hours cooking, one saind calls for 34 hours marination, cakes take up to 1 hour to bake and a frozen salad, for which no freezing time is given, would take several hours.

living commitment to the Lord dissipates the guilt we are often inclined to feel.


Faith in his guidance and care forestalls and prevents exaggerated urges to self-attack and criticism.

How safe is credit union account?

When the highly-flying Penn Square Bank of Oklahoma City went down in flames recently, 132 federally insured credit unions were singed in the conflagration. They had imprudently loaned money to Penn Square based on the bank's loans to oil developers. Credit unions had \$125 million of their members' money at risk in the Penn Square situation, of which \$104 million was not covered by federal insurance. The maximum for federal insurance is \$100,000 per account.

There are more than 21,000 credit unions in the United States, with more than 50 million members and \$84 billion in gross assets, an average of about \$1,680 for each member's account. Federal insurance covers 12, 000 credit unions, with 40 million members and \$66.

How many Penn Square situations lurk just below the surface? How much risk is there to the millions of you who have money in a federally insured credit union ac-

To get top-level answers, my associate George Bookman put our tough questions to Wendell Sebastian, executive director of the National Credit Union Adninistration, the federal agency that insures credit un-

ANSWER: Traditionally, credit unions lend money primarily to their own members. Recently, there has been a drop-off in demand for loans from members, and business decisions. This should continue.
