The expert automatically looks for a squeeze on every hand when he has almost enough top cards. He knows,

is the need to produce just one extra winner.

In today's hand West leads his king of spades and the defense takes four spade tricks. West discards a diamond on the fourth spade and East leads a diamond since he realizes that lead can't hurt him.

Now let's look at the hand from South's viewpoint. He has exactly eight winners and at first glance only the drop of a doubleton queen of hearts can bring in his ninth trick.

Is there a squeeze? Yes, there may be. Suppose one opponent holds four clubs plus the queen of hearts. Not very likely, but definitely possible. Then a Vienna coup will bring the game home.

South, who has chucked a club from each hand on the fourth spade, wins the diamond and promptly cashes the ace and king of hearts and then runs the diamonds. On the last diamond West is squeezed.







HARTFORD (UPI) — 'Gov. William O'Neill, in testimony in Washington next month, will support keeping federal energy programs in one agency but may be neutral on the Reagan administration plan to abolish the Department of Energy.

O'Neill was selected by staff of the National Gover-

nors Association to testify on behalf of the group at a hearing planned by a subcommittee of the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee.

Mary Hart, an aide to O'Neill who will work with the

governors' group staff in preparing the testimony, said Thursday she expected it would support the concept of keeping federal energy programs and policies under one

agency.

Ms. Hart said O'Neill's testimony may not take a stand on whether the federal Department of Energy should be abolished, as has been advocated by President

Reagan.

However, Ms. Hart said she expected the governor would take a stand in favor of keeping the functions of the Department of Energy under one agency and not farming out various responsibilities to several agencies.

She said O'Neill's testimony before the Energy, Nuclear Proliferation and Government Processes subcommittee would be prepared by the staff of the governors' association working back and forth with O'Neill's staff.

O'Neill announced that he had been chosen to testify for the governors at a news conference called Thursday to discuss issues raised at the National Governors Association Conference he attended this week in

O'Neill said his testimony would represent a "collective" statement of the nation's governors. At the pre-sent time, he said, he expected to be alone in presenting

On other topics, O'Neill explained his opposition to a proposed constitutional amendment to require a balanced federal budget and Reagan's New Federalism program, both of which were discussed at the governors' conference.

ors' conference.

O'Neill said the budget amendment might hamper attempts to create public service jobs, which he said he would prefer in tough economic times to having "people unemployed and in bread lines."

On New Federalism, he repeated his earlier concerns that the Reagan program would shift programs from the national to state and local levels without providing the

States enough money to carry out the programs.

O'Neill said he was concerned New Federalism would represent a throwback to times before the advent of the New Deal when states had to individually cope with

#### Debate possible after Labor Day

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. William O'Neill says he will debate his Republican challenger after Labor Day because he doesn't want the campaign to reach the point

"When appropriate, I'll be happy to debate my op-ponent," O'Neill said at a news conference Thursday. "But I'm certainly not going to do any debating before

The Democratic governor again rejected a call from former Senate Republican leader Lewis Rome, the GOP gubernatorial nominee, for a quick start to campaign

O'Neill's camp has said Rome wants to use the

debates to increase his name recognition, which one poll showed was Rome's biggest problem.
On another issue, O'Neill and Rome reaffirmed their support for the state's capital punishment law. They said they both voted for it as legislators.
O'Neill said the death penalty was justified in some cases, although he couldn't say just how he would act if in the position to decide whether to grant clemency to a

in the position to decide whether to grant clemency to a person sentenced to death.

O'Neill was asked for his views on the death penalty in light of the execution earlier this week in Virginis of convicted killer Frank J. Coppola.

Rome, at an afternoon campaign stop in Ansonia, said the death penalty law was both fair and constitutional because it took into account mitigating circumstances and was reserved only for the most helnous crimes.

Rome said he believed the state already had tough laws for dealing with various types of crime but said more had to be done to enforce the penalties.

O'Neill said he would until after Labor Day to begin a fulltime campaign and until then planned to concentrate fulltime campaign and until then planned to co his efforts on his work as governor.

#### Federal cutbacks worry governor

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. William O'Neill says he is concerned about planned cutbacks in the regional offices of federal agencies dealing with customs, housing and urban development, and energy.

O'Neill said Thursday plans to abolish or reduce operations in three area federal offices, two of them in Connecticut, would hurt the state's efforts to improve its business climate.

"Collectively, these decisions will have a detrimental impact on efforts by the state to develop an attractive and conducive business climate," O'Neill said.

The governor outlined his position in a letter to Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas, chairman of the House Government Operations Committee, and asked Brooks to examine the changes.

The Treasury Department has announced plans to abolish the Bridgeport Customa District and transfer functions of the Hartford Classification and Value Office to Boston.

functions of the Hartford Classification and Value Office to Boston.

O'Nelli said the move would make it difficult for importing and exporting businesses in Connecticut to operate as well as hinder plans to develop the state as a competitive foreign trade zone.

The second planned cutback would be part of a reorganization plan by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Various functions handled at HUD's Hartford office would be moved to Boston.

O'Neill said the HUD move "would detract from state efforts to revitalize urban areas" and also would be contrary to Reagan administration policy to provide local initiative and control to communities.

O'Neill also criticized what he said was a drastic reduction in operations at the Department of Energy's regional office in Boston.

O'Neill said the office had been an "invaluable source" of information about heating oil and gasoline supplies throughout the region.

### First female firefighters join Hartford's department

HARTFORD — Zandra M. Clay, 26, wiped the beads of sweat from her face and struggled out of the heavy coat she wore while putting out a training fire with other recruits of the Hartford Fire Department.

She and Maria E. Ortiz, 26, became the first female firefighters in a major New England city Thursday, joining Hartford's 430-member force.
"I'd like to make a career out of it," said Ms. Clay, a former day care center director. "Because I'm female shouldn't stop me from what I want to do." Ms. Ortiz and Ms. Clay passed the same tests, sweated through the same eight-week training course and wore the same blue uniforms as 25 male recruits


