The New Construction-Growing Equity Mortgage program will provide build homes in 94 Connecticut towns. "The result of this program will be 280 new homes on fast response basis, so our financing is going to result in a lot of new

housing starts to spur the slumping housing industry," Stuart Jennings, Deputy Director of CHFA, said Monday. Construction of each house will star within one month after the CHFA nortgage commitment is issued About 787 people applied for loans under the program, which represented a

Black family wins fight to end racial harassment

BOSTON (UPI) — A black family welcomed a landmark civil rights decision by a Superior Court judge barring eight white young men from harassing black families in the city's racially troubled Hyde Park section.

The ruling ended a four-year nightmare for neighborhood black families who testified they were prisoners in their own homes.

"I'm very happy about the decision. I hope it can help the neighborhood be a good one," Bertha Brooks said Tuesday night of Judge James Lynch's order to make permanent a temporary restraining order barring the white men aged 18 to 23 from violating the families' civil rights.

"It's just been a terrible, terrible nightmare," Mrs. Brooks, 27, said.
"I haven't relaxed yet, I'm a nervous wreck. In these four years I've



Previously, he said, cigarette consumption has dropped about a tenth of the amount of the increase. For

example, if the price went up 10 percent consumption would drop about 1 percent.

Connecticut's cigarette tax is among the highest in the nation. The Commerce Clearing House of Chicago says Wisconsin's flat 25-cent per pack tax is highest in the na-

Cigarettes sold in Wisconsin also are subject to a state

sales tax of 5 percent.

Balda said it was "kind of hard to tell" how much

Balda said it was "kind of hard to tell" how much cigarette consumption would drop if the higher tax took effect. "This thing is part of a habit," he said.

In the last fiscal year, the state collected \$74.3 million from the 21-cent cigarette tax and about \$20 million more in sales tax on the approximately 354 million packs of cigarettes sold in the state, Balda said.

tax from 8 cents to 16 cents a pack for three years.







Your Neighbor's Kitchen

From Norway, with love

By Barbara Richmond Herald Reporter

She slips back into speaking Norwegian when she's puzzled about something. Translating recipes from Norwegian to English and from grams to ounces, for instance. Dressed in an out-36 Trebbe Drive was busy doing just that when the Herald reporter and photographer arrived at her home last week. "I had to get my scale and ruler out to conver

the measurements for you," Mrs. Hlivyak (pronounced Liviak) explained. She was born and raised in Oslo, Norway, coming to this country when she was about 21. Her husband was in the Air Force for many years, and during that time the couple lived in many places all over the world.

He originally came from Stratford but when he retired from the Air Force in 1970, they decided to settle down in Manchester. They have

three grown daughters and expect to become grandparents in September. Scandinavians have always had a reputation for being very good cooks, and Mrs. Hlivyak keeps that reputation intact.

IN NORWAY school is six days a week and the girls learn how to stitch and cook at a very young age.
"In school when we were learning how to cook we had to figure out the cost of every single thing we made, right down to the cost of one carrot," she said.

"They were very strict then, especially with the girls, but I think things have probably eased up a lot since then," she said The cake she served the day of the interview

wait to get home and try yourself. It's called Masarin cake and has a buttery-type crust and a filling of finely ground almonds, butter,

sugar and eggs.
"The Norwegian cookbook says bake in a 26 centimeters pan, that's a 10-inch pan," she explained as she took out her tape measure to

"This cake is made in two parts. The mixture for the crust should be put together very fast and then refrigerated while making the filling. After the filling is made the crust mixture is patted into the springform pan with about a one-inch edging. Then the filling is poured in and it's baked for about 30 minutes," Mrs. Hlivyak

Mrs. Hlivyak has a large collection of Norwegian cookbooks, and she also subscribes to magazines from her native country. "They

are my present to myself each year," she said Many are filled with recipes. A favorite meat recipe of the Hlivyak family is one for lamb and cabbage which appears in most of the Norwegian cookbooks. "Everybody who eats it loves it," she says.

The Norwegian name for it is "Far i Kal" with the little "o" mark over the a's. "This used to be a tasty and inexpensive dish in Norway," she says. Americans have passion for corn

As every schoolchild knows, corn was one of the crops that saved the Massachusetts Hay Colony. In fact, corn is one of the great culinary gifts bestowed upon the Old World by the New. First cultivated by the Peruvians, it was introduced into Europe in the 16th century.

There, however, it was — and is — largely unappreciated. The French call corn "mais" and for the

most part ignore it, except in the southwestern provinces where they use it to for country-style coarse breads and for fatterning geese whose livers are destined for culinary stardom. The Italians appreciate corn in the form of polenta, a traditional porriage that is very similar to our hominy grits, and the Spanish rarely eat it all, unlike the Mexicans.

I have an amusing story to relate about this. A few years ago a British friend of mine met a very correct Spaniard from Madrid in San Francisco. In the fullness time she invited him home for dinner and, as it was in eason, put corn on the menu. Where he came from this was a calculated insult, as corn was fed only to the pigs I am happy to relate that he married her anyway, but I understand that corn has never again appeared on the table! Ah, well, food prejudices die hard. Personally I adore corn and always have.

AMERICANS ARE JUST about the only people who have developed a liking for eating corn on the cob -though it's milky sweet and tender, unlike certain varieties that are grown for milling or for animal food. This has created confusion over the years, as many peo-ple have assumed that all corn has to be boiled for half. an hour or more in order to get your teeth into it. Well, of course sweet corn needs to be just heated hrough in boiling water; it tastes awful if you cook it to death. (You may rest assured that the kind you find in your market is tender sweet corn.)

Perhaps the best way to have corn is an hors d'œuvre, with lavish quantities of buter and freshly ground black pepper so that you an appreciate its delicacy properly. It also makes a great deal of sense to serve corn as a vegetable course after the main dish, and then go on to fruit and cheese, or whatever your

dessert might be.

There is a school of thought that insists corn must be off the cob to be fully enjoyed, but this may be a holdover from the Victorian era, when picking up food and munching on it was simply NOT Done! However, corn kernels cooked with cream and maybe a bit of diced, sauteed red or green peppers and some salt and pepper do taste very good; it's just a very different dish from fresh corn.

One can, of course, combine corn with other vegetables for what is generally known as succotash. It's said that the early New Englanders were taught by the Indians to grow beans and corn on alternating hills and given the primitive cooking arrangements at the time, the settlers doubtless tossed both vegetables into one pot with whatever seasoning came to hand. The old Plaza in New York used to serve succotash made with a combination of corn kernels, green beans and peas in a rather rich cream sauce, which must have been a far cry from the original.

A particularly delicious way to prepare corn is on the

outdoor grill. I husk and remove the silk from the corn, llowing a dozen ears for four persons, and brush the corn well with melted butter. I then arrange the corn on two large sheets of foil and fold into large envelope These go on the chacoal grill for about 10 minutes, and get turned once. The corn comes out delicately browned nere and there and is perfectly delicious. One can also peel back the husks and remove the silk, brush the ternels with melted butter and replace the husks, tying m together at the ends. Then grill the ears that way



NEW YORK (UPI) Birth control pills, blamed for grave side effects in some women, can help others reduce the chance o developing arthritis, two kinds of cancer and five other ailments, a federal health expert says. The pill prevents 50,000 hospitalizations a year, Dr Howard W. Ory of the Centers for Disease Control said Tuesday.

Women who use oral conplained of the side effects the most important an increase in strokes among women over 35. The side effects have caused a drop in use from a peak of 9 tillion users to 7.5 million.

New information, however, shows the pill cuts incidence of heumatoid arthritis, endometrial cancer, ovarian cancer, ovarian cysts. benign breast disease, iron-deficiency anemia, pelvic inflammatory disease and ectopic pregnan-cy, Dr. Ory said.

"While it is quite clear there are risks associated with pill use, they are heavily concentrated among women over 35 who smoke. But for the 90 percent of pill users who do not fall into this category, it would seem the benefits of pill use far outweigh the risk," Dr. Ory said.
