

No link reported in Tylenol poisons

CHICAGO (UPI) - Investigators tracking a saboteur, whose cyanidespiked capsules of Extra-Strenth Tylenol killed seven people, narrowed their list of suspects to concentrate today on those who "rise above other suspects for reasons that are obvious to us.' State Attorney General Tyrone Fahner

FBI enters acid eye drops case

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - The FBI is investigating at least 10 cases of acid-laced eye drops and nasal sprays in Southern California stores, but the latest scare in San Bernardino County was just one of about 200 false alarms in the past year Police and state health officials said Tuesday laboratory tests on a suspect bottle of Visine AC eye drops bought in Rialto, Calif., concluded the solution was normal, Carol Ann Sam, 28, had complained the drops burned her eyes.

"As of now, we consider the investigation closed, based on the chemical chemist," Rialto Police Chief Raymond Susan Bond, a spokeswoman for the California Department of Health Services, said the scare, which resulted in

from the Stater Bros. store in Rialto, was a "total false alarm." "We've gotten probably 200 calls since last December - almost all of them false alarms," said Miss Bond. Meanwhile, officials told United Press International the FBI is investigating at least 10 cases of tampering with the eyedrops in the Los Angeles area in the last 10 months.



The policy would allow less dangerous criminal to be released after shorter sentences, freeing cell space, said the studies announced by The Rand Corp. Tuesday.

multiple drug use and violence, constitute an important criminal threat to society," a companion report by Jon and Marcia Chaikens said. The reports, commissioned by the Department of Justice, acknowledged such a policy would raise ethical controversies, because some criminals would serve short sentences while others convicted of the same crimes would be kept in prison for years "in order to prevent crimes they might commit in the future."

"In fact, the system we now have implicitly accepts this concept for both criminals and mental patients," Greenwood wrote. "Preventive detention is a fundamental premise of incapacitation." The six-year studies, done with a grant from the Department of Justice, were based on a survey of nearly 2,200 prison and jail inmates in California, Michigan and Texas. The criminals sll were serving time for robbery or burglary "the predatory stree crimes about which the public is most concerned." The studies acknowledged the researchers had access to information with the prisoners' cooperation prosecutors and judges would not have in real life, such as juvenile crime histories that remain secret in most states.

They also conceded official police records now "provide a very limited and usually misleading picture of the seriousness of any given offender's criminal behavior," which could lead to mistaken classifications, and that more studies are needed. The studies identified seven factors the studies said could be reviewed by sentencing judges. The researchers said the presence of any four usually identified the "violent predator" type: . In prison or jail more than half the time in the

· Heroin or barbiturate use as a juvenile. · Employed less than half the time in the two year period before arrest. In the absence of such a guide, the prisons are crowded with criminals who would not be commit-

prime minister of Israel, Reagan feels, would remove an incendiary from the midst of the powderkegs. A more moderate Israeli government might enable the bitter adversaries in the Middle East to muddle through without Armageddon. But the president would like to

the truck. Hospital officials said the Salvadorans were not ready to be interviewed by Border Patrol agent . The aliens reportedly crossed the U.S.-Mexico border in small groups at McAllen and were loaded into the refrigerated truck Sunday night. They reportedly paid

"I think we'll eventually run them into the ground," "This is about as bad as we've had down here." · Selbe said the 10 aliens who were taken from the truck

were the easiest for the smugglers to get to. "They made two compartments in the truck with the nallets and those that got out just happened to be closest to the door," Selbe said. "Someone took 10 of those people out. That's the last our group saw of them." Selbe said investigators believed the 10 Salvadorans were transferred to another vehicle or placed by

Skelley said several studies were examined at his request over two months by the Office of Legislative Research. None showed a definite connection between the use of VDTs and health problems, he said. "Most of the information we have does not point to VDTs as the direct cause," Skelley said. "But we think

both the employer and the employee have a right to know if there is a problem out there." More than 2,000 state employees and several times that number in the private sector operate the machines. Skelley said. He estimated more than 7 million VDTs are in use across the nation.

Perk up that boring breakfast!

If your breakfasts are boring, it's time to try 3 to 4 tablespoons butter or margarine some new recipes for morning eye openers. This doesn't mean you have to buy exotic ingredients. Familiar foods like eggs, bacon, sausage, and pan-

You can use a brown-and-serve sausage, or regular sausages, thoroughly cooked. A sausage frittata, with onions, green pepper and tomato, not only makes an attractive dish, it's full of vitamins, and it tastes good, too, A city farmers' breakfast may be better to daw-

dle over on a weekend. It consists of eggs, potatoes, sausage and cheese, all combined Another interesting breakfast is a giant pancake baked in the oven and topped with sausages French toast, combined with bacon and scrambled egg on top, is another hearty meal that will start your day off and keep you going all day.

Sausage oven pancake

8-ounce package sausage links 1 cup pancake mix 4 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg 1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup chopped apple Cook the sausages according to directions. In mixing bowl, combine pancake mix, spices, milk and egg. Mix until batter is smooth. Add apple. Pour into well-greased 10x6x11/2-inch baking dish. Arrange sausages on top. Bake in preheated 450 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serve hot with maple

Sausage frittata

8-ounce package sausage links 1/4 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper 5 eggs

4 cup milk tomato, peeled and chopped 11/2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Cook sausages in heavy 8-inch ovenproof skillet according to directions. Remove sausages and keep warm. Saute onion and green pepper. In a medium bowl, combine eggs and milk. Add onions, green pepper and tomato. Melt butter in skillet. Add egg mixture and cook over low heat until eggs are almost set. Arrange sausage links on top of eggs. To finish cooking top, broil 4 inches away from heat source until center is firm and top is lightly browned. Cut into five wedges and serve warm.

City farmers' breakfast 8 ounce package sausage links

3 cups hash brown potatoes

Chopped parsley Brown sausages in 9-inch skillet: remove and set aside. Melt butter and cook potatoes until barely tender and lightly browned. Pat down flat in pan. Arrange sausages in pairs, spoke-fashion, in pan leaving 5 spaces for cheese and eggs. Sprinkle cheese on potatoes. Carefully crack eggs on top of cheese. Cover and cook over medium-low heat until eggs are set or done to individual liking. Garnish

Breakfast quiche

1 baked 9-inch pie crust 9 strips bacon 14 cup chopped onion 4 cup shredded Swiss cheese

2 eggs, plus 2 extra volks 112 cups whipping cream

1/2 teaspoon white pepper 2 tablespoons butter

Preheat oven to 375. Cook 6 bacon strips until lightly browned. Drain on paper toweling. Cut into 4-inch pieces. Scatter over bottom of pie crust with Swiss cheese and onion. Combine eggs, egg volks, cream and seasonings in a medium bowl. Beat to combine well. Place pie crust on rack in oven; pour iquid ingredients over all. Dot with butter. Bake for 25 minutes or until custard sets. Cook remaining bacon strips and serve as garnish with quiche

Breakfast stacks

8 strips bacon 8 eggs, beaten 2 cup milk

Salt & pepper 1 tablespoon butter or margarine cup chopped green pepper tablespoons finely chopped onion

4 slices process American cheese

Sprinkle with paprika.

Cook bacon and cut strips into halves crosswise and keep warm. Combine eggs, milk, salt and pepper. Melt butter in skillet. Saute green pepper and onion until barely tender. 





Town surplus more

BOLTON - The town ran a "healthy" surplus at the end of the last fiscal year, about \$50,000 more than anticipated, officials said. The 1981-82 budget surplus was \$158,231, according to a report filed this week by auditor William C. Reynolds. Town officials, when putting the current budget together last spring, were expecting a \$107,545 surplus.

The surplus is down about \$50,000 from the prior year, which is right in line with what inance board officials had hoped, board Chairman Raymond A. Ursin said Tuesday. Ursin said Reynolds told his board last year that a surplus for a town the size of Bolton shouldn't exceed \$200,000, and that town officials might consider paring it down to about

"There's no real surprises there," Ursin said. "It's what we wanted to do. It looks good, and it gives us a little bit of room." The town also carried over about \$23,000 in

encumbrances from the last fiscal year, which will lower the surplus Reynolds said Tuesday the town is "in pret ty good financial shape." He said officials here have made good investments, and are keeping precise records.

The 'anti-credit' card has arrived

Interested in saving money? How about 10 to 20 percent off everything you buy everytime you buy it, from cases of beer to furniture, from heating oil to dinners out? Yes? Well, a little card, part of

savings concept, is for you.

It's called the Cash Discount Card of America, and small merchants nationwide are quickly lining up to take part in the 8-month-old method of financing. Now in Coventry a three-week-old arm of the California-based company that sponsors the new card is attracting merchants in Manchester.

And it's snowballing, says regional manager William Peoples, a Manchester resident himself who opened the new Hartford-region office of Cash Discount Cards of America on Route 44A beneath Allen's Supermarket (it's the fourth office in Connecticut, all of which opened within the last three months).

Already 30 merchants, about 90 percent from Manchester, are offering their goods at cut rates to anybody who owns a Cash Discount Card, Peoples says. And there are more businesses, attracted by the advertising and the cashflow that the program offers, joining each day, he said.
