Monday's New York Stock Exchange volume climbed to 90,800,000 shares from the 77,110,000 traded Friday as big traders continued the long-awaited pullback from the bull market of the 1980s Megabuck institutions found some top-quality

Satellite due

Falling at a rate of about 3 miles a day, the reactor section is in an orbit 125 miles to 132 miles above Earth, they said

Because of the inclination of the orbit and the spin of Earth, the path of the radioactive debris covers the globe's entire land mass from the Arctic to the Antarctic circles.

Scientists say the reactor and nuclear fuel segment of the Soviet surveillance spacecraft "most likely" will be burned up by friction when it enters the atmosphere as the heavier section, which contained radar equipment, apparently did Sunday.
