





O'Neill no longer a 'substitute governor'

HARTFORD - A year after he decided to seek a full term, Gov. William O'Neill says he no longer considers himself a "substitute governor" and will strike out to make his mark on the Legislature and his

O'Neill, a 52-year-old tavern owner from East Hampton, said there was a "total difference" in his attitude since winning a full term after succeeding the late Ella Grasso when cancer forced her to resign.
"I don't know how to describe it other than that other than I feel now I am the governor and prior to that I was the substitute governor, filling in for the governor elected by the people," O'Neill said.
O'Neill said his new attitude will be reflected in his

dealings with the Legislature, which will receive his proposed state budget this week, and in his role as titular head of the Democratic Party in Connecticut.

HE SAID HE PLANNED to be "very actively" involved with his party when state Democrats join their counterparts across the nation next year to choose a presidential nominee.

As for the Legislature, O'Neill said he hoped he

would be met with more respect from lawmakers, although he said he has no plans to try to get involved in "each and every issue" before lawmakers. the leaders or the legislators themselves don't say well the only reason he's there is because God took our

"The only reason I'm here now is because the people

out me here," O'Neill said in an interview with UPI at the state's Executive Residence in Hartford. As did winning election in his own right, O'Neill said a 1981 heart attack and subsequent open-heart surgery changed his attitude and outlook on life. "I think we take everything for granted until we face a physical crisis of our own and I think you appreciate things a litte bit more after," he said.

O'Neill, who has been criticized by some as not

Probe continues in kennel blaze

PLAINFIELD (UPI) - The state fire marshal was expected to join an investigation today into a weekend fire that killed at least 71 breeding dogs and pupples at a private kennel near the Plainfield Greyhound Park. The fire began shortly after 5 p.m. Saturday at a kennel owned by greyhound trainer Graydon Robtoy and raged for about two hours before being brought

Fire officials said the dogs were housed in an old 60-by-130 foot chicken coop that had been converted to

While fire officials put the death toll at 71, Michael Chartler, a spokesman for the greyhound track said as many as 88 dogs may have died. Fire Marshal Joseph F. Bergeron said most of the dogs in the kennel were owned by Robtoy who also trained dogs for other kennel owners. "It's a tremendous loss," said Bergeron who

estimated the value of a young dog to range between \$1,500 and \$2,000. Bergeron said the cause of the fire is being investigated and he will ask the state fire marshal's office today to assist in the investigation.

John Neikind, a spokesman for Plainfield Greyhound Park, sald Sunday the greyhounds killed in the fire were retired studs and pupples. He said Robtoy's racer dogs were housed at the race track located about 2 miles from the kennel.

"It's a tragedy. The man lost a great deal of his life and livelihood," he said. and livelihood," ne said.

Neikind said the fire did not affect business at the

ark Sunday. He said Robtoy also trained dogs for kennel-owner Barnet Yanofsky of Chesnut Hill, Mass.
Yanofsky has been summoned to answer questions before the state Division of Special Revenue, which is investigating charges of violations of state greybound regulations at the track.

WASHINGTON - Francisco Fiallos Navarro made a brief media splash last December when he resigned abruptly as Nicaraguan sador to the United States and denounced the Sandinista regime in Managua. Last month the Nicaraguan government splashed right back with the charge that Fiallos had absconded with more than \$600,000 of embassy funds.

Since then, the dapper 36-yearold Fiallos has been in seclusion, preparing to defend himself in court against Nicaraguan government's charges and planning a libel suit against his accusers. He consented to an exclusive interview to give his version of the events leading to his resignation and the ensuing controversy.

Depending on one's persona prejudices. Fiallos is either the most unlikely candidate for an embezzlement charge - or the kind of man who wouldn't think twice about looting the treasury of a leftist regime he had been serving. He grew up as a member of the Nicaraguan privileged class Harvard Law School. He was even married briefly to a niece of the late Nicaraguan dictator Anastasio Somoza. Yet he supported the Sandinista regime for three years after it kicked Somoza out.

FIALLOS explained the embezzlement charge as an attempt by the Sandinistas to discredit him in regime's own credibility.

"This is what happens," he said. "Every single person that has resigned in Nicaragua has been accused of mismanagement of (The charge) is completely false, and unfortunately I cannot explain it here to the American people . . . because my lawyers have advised me not to

withdrawal of the embassy funds, He was given coded instructions he said, to withdraw the money because Nicaraguan governmen officials were worried that the United States would try to "freeze" their assets. A State Department official who investigated Fiallo's background said he was "convinced that (Fiallos) didn't take the money for his personal enrichment."

Embassy told my associate that Fiallos misappropriated the money, and he produced documentary evidence to support his assertion. The official also noted with some asperity, that in nearly a year as the Nicaraguan envoy to Washington, Fiallos had never expressed any criticism of the Sandinista regime's policies.

FIALLOS SAID he became "increasingly disenchanted" with the revolutionary government las year. His disillusionment stemmed, he said, from his grow. ing realization that the Sandinistas were becoming as oppressive as the Somoza regime had been.

"I was seeing, especially the last year, that the promises they had made ... to the Nicaraguan people were violated every day," he said. He insists he told his co-"the revolution shouldn't take the path of the Cuban one.

Fiallos said that the "most radical elements in the (Sandinist) party), with Marxist-Leninist even Stalinist, ideology are gain ing power and are more entrenched every day." He said "the communists have taken complete control of the situation by now." The ex-ambassador said the Soviet Union has used surrogates to penetrate Nicaragua. - The skin around the eyes has fewer oil glands. Pat a moisturizer or an eye cream into this area
