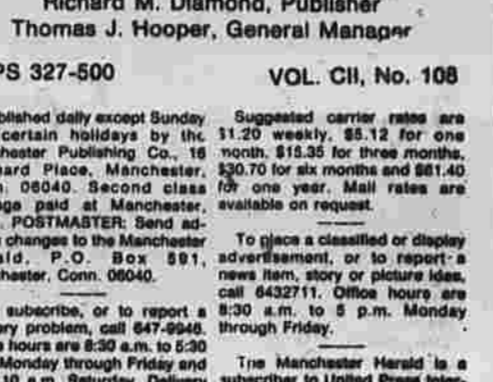

he said. "I really never did. I toyed with the idea in 1970 in eastern Connecticut, running for Congress in the 2nd District, but I never really had the strong desire, which means you don't have the strong push to do that."

"The only reason I'm here now is because the people put me here," O'Neill said in an interview with UPI at the state's Executive Residence in Hartford.

O'Neill admitted he doesn't always like what he reads on newspaper editorial pages, describing the treatment that he has received from editorial writers as "generally negative."

"I have to understand that the person that's writing the editorial has their own ax to grind whatever it may be. And you have to put it in his perspective," he said.

O'Neill said he spends most of his time in Hartford and misses his home in East Hampton and his tavern business, which he hasn't worked at in several years.

Neil H. Swanson, former best-selling novelist, historian and editor with the Sunpapers and News American, died at a Baltimore County hospital following an extended illness. He was 86.

Statham, active in several Los Angeles' area community groups, was also a yachtsman who regularly won races between Los Angeles and Mexico and Hawaii. He was survived by his wife, Doris, of Lone Pine, a daughter, Anne Franson, of Ventura, and three grandchildren.

Swanson was the author of nine books, seven of which were best sellers. His 1948 novel "Unconquered" about the Pontiac Indian uprising was produced as a movie by Cecil B. DeMille and was a box-office smash starring Gary Cooper and Paulette Goddard. His first non-fiction book "The First Rebel" was made into a movie called "Alamo Uprising" and starred John Wayne and Claire Trevor.

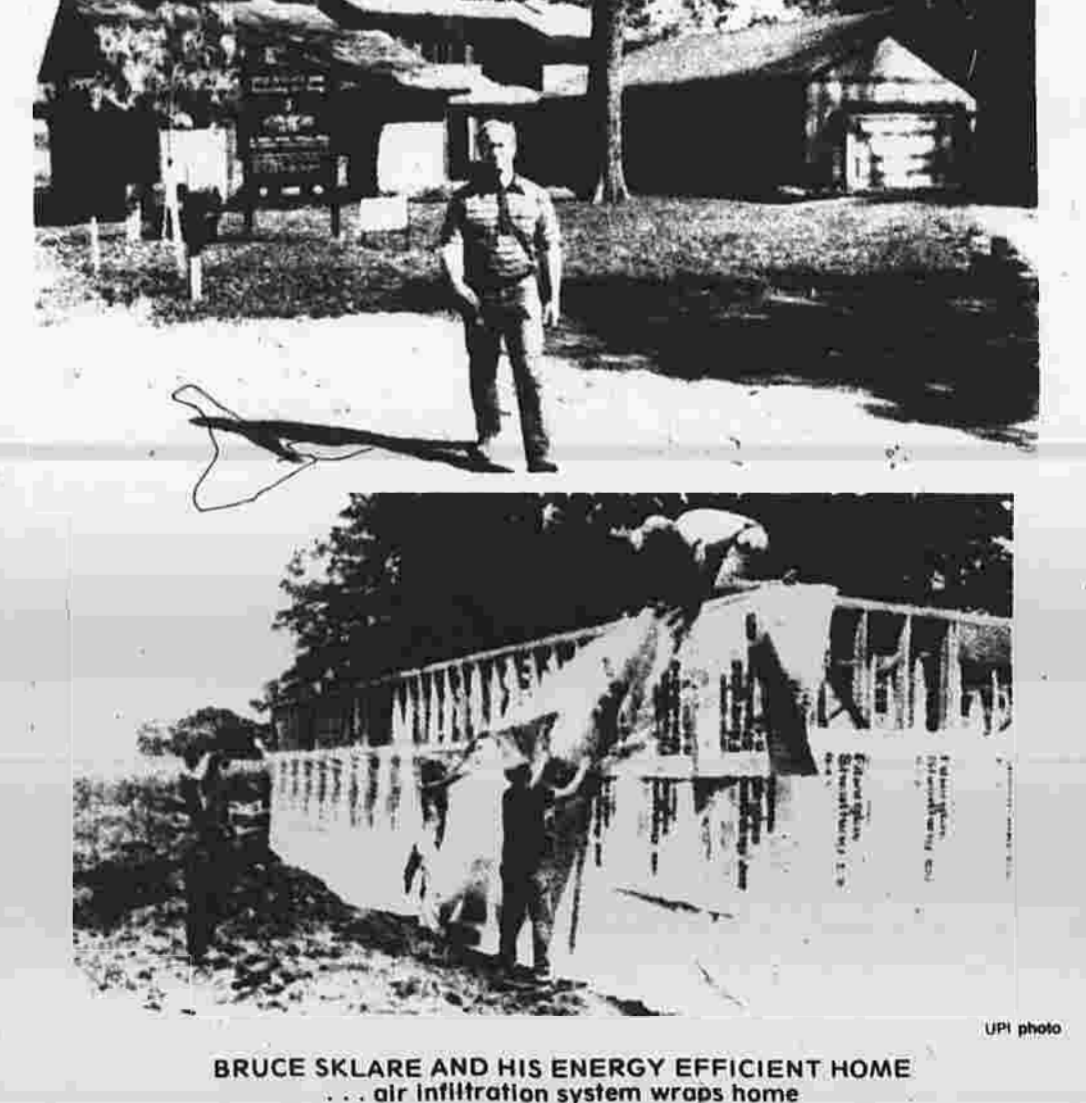

# Officials in Kansas dispute NCAA claim

MISSION, Kan. (UPI) — An attorney for the county said the National Collegiate Athletic Association is about as closely related to education as the factory that makes Big Chief tablets. Johnson County officials dispute the NCAA's claim that it is an educational organization and therefore deserves an exemption from property taxes on its administrative headquarters in suburban Kansas City, Mo. The case is before the Kansas Board of Tax Appeals, which is expected to make a decision within two months.

The issue is whether the NCAA will receive a \$40,000 refund from Johnson County for taxes paid the last three years and an exemption from further property taxes. "The NCAA, with its \$22-million-a-year budget, should not be laying its tax burden onto the shoulders of homeowners and businesses," said Bruce Landeck, the attorney who argued the county's case before the board.

"They're just big business." "They are in it for making as much money as they possibly can. They say no one benefits because they are not-for-profit, but their payroll increases every year." But an attorney for the NCAA contends competitive sports are rooted in history and are a necessity for educating mankind, not just students on scholarships. "In every case where it has been an issue, it has been decided that the NCAA is an educational institution," C.W. Crumpecker Jr. said.

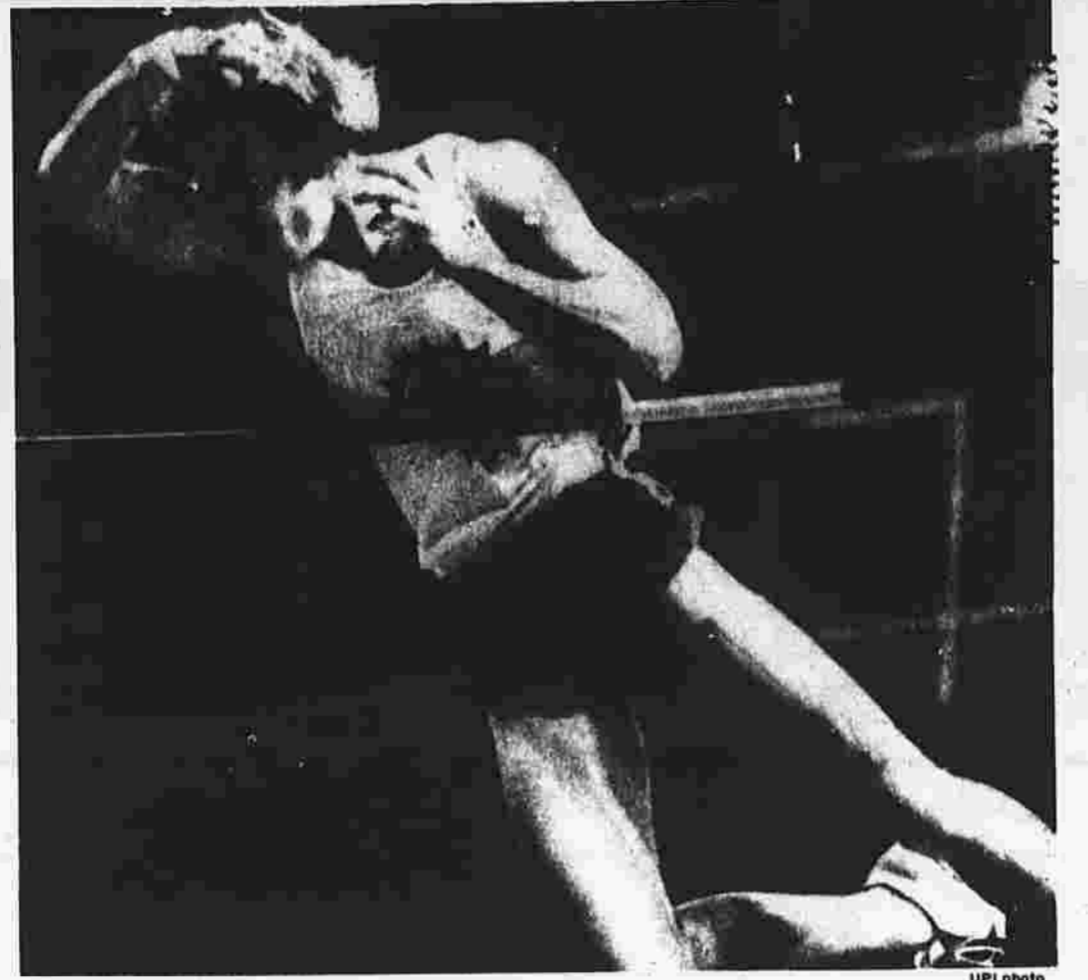
