



Gen. Westmoreland linked with one word: Vietnam

World War II and the Korean War, was promoted to general at age 38, was named Time magazine "Man of the Year," has been awarded five honorary degrees and been decorated by 16 foreign nations. But his universal recognition comes from one word:

Although it has been 15 years since he led American troops in the Vietnam War, "General Westy," at age 69, remains unalterably linked with Vietnam. Eleven years after retirement, his opinions are still sought as historians evaluate - and the general public still debates - America's involvement in that controversial conflict. "I have not hidden out since Vietnam," Westmore-

land says with pride. "I've been very open and willing to talk about it to anybody."

Westmoreland, 69, lives with his wife Katherine in retirement at Charleston, S.C., where he plays golf, swims, does a lot of walking "and I have a wife that keeps me active socially." He also serves on several corporate boards, does some consulting work and corporate boards, does some consulting work, and writes articles from time to time when he feels a subject needs clarification.

He makes many appearances on college campuses but points out he also showed up on campuses during the volatile 1960s. "Even during the turbulent years when I was 'Mr Bad Man' on the campus and I had horns, I really enjoyed it," he says with a smile. "During those days l

"The anti-war groups on campuses were very hostile, very well organized and very well funded, from whatever source I don't know. And they were always there when I was there, and they came from a radius of 100 miles. But I always stood up to them. "But now I don't find that. I find the students are more interested, more serious minded, less emo-tional. They want to listen to all sides without getting angry because somebody may not agree with them.
"I've found an entirely different attitude, except for

And that is one of the strengths of our government, that policies have public support. "If they don't have public support, there are a lot of

projects that are not going to materialize and objectives that are not going to be carried out. I think this lesson is coming into sharp focus." As for his own conduct during the war, Westmorecircumstances. I have no apology for my conduct."

"I have the greatest sympathy and compassion for those young men who did what their country asked them to do, and they did it well," he says. "But they "Never before have troops not been given some expressions of appreciation. This imposed on the veterans have never had before."

He also is frequently asked his evaluation of the "Domino Theory," the school of thought that one country after another would topple to Communism unless America intervened somewhere, sometime. His conclusion: some dominoes fell, but others did

"The Domino Theory worked as far as Indochina is concerned," he concludes. "Hanoi's objective from beginning was to unify Indochina under Hanoi's command, the Communist command. That being Vietnam, north and south, Cambodia and Laos. "So, those dominoes fell and they fell rapidly and Hanol is now in control of Indochina. But the Domino

Theory stopped there because we drew the line.
"We held the line for 10 years which allowed Nations' (the Philippines, Indonesia, Singapore, Malaysia and Thailand) time to have a breathing spell, to develop self-confidence in running their own affairs, to develop their infra-structure, to improve their accommunity to still their accommunity and their acc It gave them time to mature.

officer, suspected Russaw, 33, had had a snootful because his car was weaving. The Eufaula policeman pursued and stopped Russaw, then radioed for another officer to drive the suspect to the station for an intoxica-

When Russaw fled at a high rate of speed, Cutchens radioed for help and again pursued him, finally stopping his car in the next county. Cutchens removed the ignition keys from Russaw's car.

Meantime, according to the police report, Russaw's brother Anthony, 19, and a black female arrived at the scene and jumped Cutchens, whose gun was taken by the older brother.

Police say shots were fired at Capt. Ted Dotson when the white officer arrived at the scene after being summoned by radio. Dotson fired back, killing the Russaw brothers. A grand jury has cleared the two white officers of any wrongdoing in the deaths of the two blacks.

Outraged blacks demanding a federal investigation have boycotted local stores, enraging the Ku Klux Klan. which is marching in support of "the white people."

Armenian terrorists blow up selves and Turk Embassy

LISBON, Portugal — Five Armenian terrorists seized the Turkish Embassy and then blew themselves up as Portuguese commandos stormed the burning building, killing seven people and wounding at least three others, authorities said.

The Armenian Revolutionary Army claimed responsibility for the attack Wednesday morning in which all five grapmen. Cabida Michaicalu, the wife of which all five gunmen, Cahide Michcioglu, the wife of Turkish Charge d'Affaires Yurteev Michcioglu, and a Portuguese policeman died, the Interior Ministry

In a statement delivered to United Press International, the terrorists said, "We have decided to blow up this building and remain under the collapse "This is not a suicide, nor an expression of insanity, but rather, our sacrifice to the altar of freedom. Micheioglu's son, who escaped the burning building by leaping out a window, another diplomat's son and a policemen were wounded in the embassy takeover the latest in a series of attacks on Turkish diplomats

. The Armenian Revolutionary Army, which seeks to avenge the massacre of 1.5 million Armenians killed in Turkey in 1915, sent photos of five members of its commando squad to a French news agency in Paris

The names matched phonetically with the identities given by Portuguese police of the five men who attacked the Turkish Embassy in Lisbon. "May these faces remain engraved forever in the memory of every Armenian," said a letter in French

accompanying the photographs.

The embassy assault came less than two weeks after Armenian terrorists exploded a bomb at the Turkish Airlines counter at Paris' Orly Airport, killing seven people and injuring 56. A Turkish diplomat was killed in Brussels the day before. As a result of the Wednesday attack, police in London tightened security around Turkish Foreign Minister Ilter Turkmen for his visit today with Prime

Minister Margaret Thatcher and other government ministers. Details of his itinerary were withheld. Wednesday's drama began as the gunmen, some wired with explosives, entered the main Turkish mission building firing machine guns and hurling a grenade, killing the charge d'affaires wife and wounding their son. An embassy guard shot and killed one of the

terrorists in the initial assault. The gunmen then seized the adjacent residential section housing the ambassador's home, trapping an undetermined number of people in various parts of the embassy Prime Minister Mario Soares, meeting with top

government leaders in an emergency meeting, made the decision to attack the embassy with a special Some 80 Portuguese anti-terrorist police, clad in black and with faces blackened, stormed the embassy from all sides. Residents of the area described long bursts of automatic weapons fire and explosions.

The government said in a communique today that 17 Tamils were killed in a riot Wednesday at Colombo's maximum security Walikada Prison, where 35 Tamil inmates were killed Monday. Officials said the massacre, apparently carried out by Sinhalese prisoners, took place as prison

other facilities. "Several other prisoners were also injured," the communique said. "The armed forces who were called in by prison authorities used tear gas and succeeded in driving the rioters back to their wards." An inquiry into the massacre Monday found many of the Tamils at the 1,600-inmate prison were beaten to death with clubs and iron bars

In the northern city of Jaffna, three prisoners, two of them Tamils, were killed in another riot Wednesday. Scattered outbreaks of looting and disorders were

reported in the capital and police and troops fired shots into the air to disperse crowds. One source said more than 3,000 Tamil-owned shops and homes were "There is hardly a structure left in the city owned by a Tamil that is worth burning," he said.

The Tamils, who compose about 20 percent of the population and have migrated from southern India, fear their language and religion will be wiped out by the dominant Sinhalese. Radical Tamils have demanded a separate state in their northern

Jesse Jackson's growing influence

WASHINGTON - When the Rev. Jesse Jackson showed up to brief the Democratic National Committee on his black registration drive in Detroit the other day, the party leaders kept him cooling his heels for more than an hour while they attended to routine committee business. The treatment persuaded Dick Hatcher, black mayor of Gary, Ind., in introducing Jackson, to crack: "No one can deny we have made great progress. We have moved from the back of the bus to the last on the program."

Hatcher's remark produced some mild and nervous laughter. That was appropriate, because a central truth in Democratic presidential politics today is that Jesse Jackson and his own plans for 1984 - as catalyst for a massive black turnout and very likely as a candidate in his own right - are no laughing matter to Democratic hopes to defeat Ronald Reagan.

Jackson was given only minutes to make his case on the importance and the opportunity of increased black registration compared to an hour for each of the five declared presidential

The game could be dismissed as just so much dam-foolishness, if it weren't for the sad fact that the accumulated boondoggles cost the taxpayers billions every time the congressional experts sit down to play. Even sadder is the fact that some pork-barrel projects aren't worth the paper the appropriations bills are printed on. Few are justified at a time of runaway budget deficits.

Members of Congress know this all too well. That's why most of the wheeling and dealing is done behind closed doors at the House-Senate conference on appropriations. Despite the determined effort to keep the taxpayers from knowing what's being done to them, my asociate Corky Johnson and Donald Goldberg flushed out some of the most outrageous provisions in the \$14.3 billion Energy and Water Development Appropriation Bill for 1984, Here's what they found:

· In December, the House voted solidly against funding the controversial Garrison water-division project in North Dakota. But Rep. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., appealed to the House Democratic leaders for help. Under pressure from the leadership, 53 Democrats reverse themselves and helped kill motion that would have ordered the House conferees not to fund the project. Result: \$23 million for arrison in the appropriations bill. Technically, no funds were

approrpiated to finish the \$1.8 illion Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway, which runs through the districts of Rep. Jamie Whitten, D-Miss., the appropriations comn, and Rep. Tom Bevill, D-Ala., chairman of the water development subcommittee. Realizing that a specific appropriation would have brought a sticky floor debate, Tenn-Tom's backers pulled an end run, directing that \$202 million be taken from leftover Corps of Engineers con-

Presidential envoys from Latin America's Contadora Group and American troubleshooter Richard Stone shuttled through Central America on separate peace mis-sions as a U.S. Navy flotilla neared the coast of the troubled region. Stone, President Reagan's spe cial envoy to Central America, met in San Salvador Wednesday with presidents Alvaro Magana of El Salvador, Belisario Betancur o Colombia and Ricardo de Espriella of Panama.

Betancur and de la Espriella, representing the Contadora Group, also traveled to Hondura and Guatemala for separate talks with the leaders of those countries "We have revitalized our faith

Espriella said before he and Betancur left Guatemala for Panama Wednesday night. "There will be peace in Central America. But that sentiment was apparently not shared by leftist Nicaragua, whose foreign ministry re-leased a statement Wednesday night by the Coordinating Bureau of the Movement of Non-Aligned Nations demanding that scheduled U.S. naval maneuvers in the region be canceled.

The maneuvers are "contrary to the spirit of the peace efforts of the region's countries," said the statement, which endorsed separate, but similar peace proposals issued by the Contadora Group and

After a decade, the Manchester Book Shop still arouses anger

With plants, a bird bath, and a ceramic rabbit in the window, the Manchester Book Shop looks more like a stodgy real estate office than a porn

On the outside, anyway. Inside, there are edible panties, peep shows, and lots of photographed skin. All on Main Street in "the City of Village Charm." All less than a block away from the Full Gospel Interdenominational Church, with its huge yellow "Jesus Saves" sign, and just a block away from the Mary Cheney Library.

It also leads to crimes against children, such as kidnapping them for porno films."

theless, the anti-bookshop effort failed So, too, did a Manchester-sponsored bill aimed at cracking down on obscenity: It was defeated at the state Senate in April 1972, after passing the House on a close voice vote. (Senators who voted against the bill were later barraged with guilt letters from Swank and his followers.)

LABELED "a fiery evangelical minister" in a New York Times article published around this time, Swank still maintains the protest was 'necessary and worthwhile.'

"But there was so much apathy it was unbelievable, both from the business community and the clergy. Manchester put out its welcomemat for porn and said 'Come on in.' Manchester blew it," he said in a telephone interview last

Swank was also the vice presi Manchester Chamber of Commerce at the time,

but was forced to step down - presumably because of his anti-bookshop stance. Some townspeople were probably annoyed by his tactics: He once passed around dirty magazines at a P.T.A. meeting, and his followers were sometimes jeered at when they picketed the bookshop. He blamed the protest failure on the "laxity" of

he legal system when it comes to porn, and a misinterpretation of the First Amendment pressing freedom of expression into craziness." Pressing for anti-amut legislation is no longer worth the effort, he said. Practicing "psychological" warfare against porn shop owners is more effective in the long run.

BUT THE REV. Eugene Brewer, current pastor of the local Church of Christ, would still like to see an anti-porn ordinance effected in Manchester, even though such a law in East Hartford was recently declared unconstitutional "A community has a right to determine what will be sold in terms of entertainment," he said

Other members of the clergy reject the cry for censorship. "I would rather there be openness in the community for the bookshop, instead of being kept a little village where a handful of people can decide what can come in and what can't...What one person calls porn, another may call beauty." said private counselor and minister Earle R Custer recently.

He called for "openness about sexuality," a stance that didn't make him popular with many of his colleagues at the time of the bookshop

THAT HULABALOO has since died down. Ten years ago Lee Hay's high school English class held debates on the Manchester Bookshop issue. Now the issue is scarcely mentioned in the schools or at town hall. "It all comes down to the right of expression,"

On an anniversary weekend in Bermuda recently my husband. Jim, and I soon discovered that bargain shopping was a waste of time. The local currency is pegged to the U.S. dollar, most goods must be imported to this island paradise — and only the most determined, shrewdest buyer can find any bargains. But acquaintances on vacations in England, Sweden, Ireland and other foreign lands are discovering that with U.S. dollars in their pockets, this summer is bargain-hunter's dream. The reasons are varied and this tale has both a good and bad side. 1) The key to the whole story is the continuing strength of the U.S. dollar — which means your dollar now buys far more goods in other nations than it has in a long time, while exporters of goods made here are finding their prices prohibitively expensive abroad.

(The two sides of the tale.) 2) In addition, many countries have devalued their currencies, enabling your funds to stretch even onger, Mexico, France, Sweden and Spain, among others have undergone well-publicized currency devaluations this past year.

3) More good — but oddly unpublicized — news for bargain hunters: Your allowance on goods that you can bring back with you from your overseas excursions has rise from \$300 to \$400. If you're returning from such spots as the U.S. Virgin Island or Guam (island territories), you can now bring in up to \$800 of goods duty free, raised from \$600 Although U.S. Customs Service raised these limits
