The whole issue of who can own land, how you transfer land has always been treated as a state issue."

Price rise is lowest 11 years

WASHINGTON - Consumer prices climbed 0.3 percent in December to give 1983 an inflation rate of just 3.8 percent, the lowest in 11 years, the Labor Department

Inflation for 1982 was 3.9 percent. It was 3.4 percent in 1972. Although most goods and services showed only gentle increases last year, the government report showed the biggest break for consumers was the decline energy prices during 1983, down by 0.5 percent for the largest drop The category of fuel oil, coal and

bottled gas dropped a record 9.4 percent for the year. Natural gas prices were up only 5.2 percent, in sharp contrast to 1982's skyrocketing 25.4 percent climb ne prices dropped 1.6 percent for the year and were up

only 0.1 percent in December. The month showed an actual decline in prices for clothing of 0.1 percent, a year in which apparel, dry cleaning and laundry costs were up only 2.9 percent. The year's 3.8 percent was the 1972's 3.4 percent, and 9.5 percen-



Parents worry about closing's academic effect

Dollar constraints and dipping enrollments all but forced the decision to recommend closing Highland Park School in June, School Superinten James P. Kennedy told the Board of Education Monday night.

Kennedy had explained earlier that if the Highland Park closing is approved at a special board meeting next Monday, 100 students would be trans ferred to Nathan Hale School, 59 to Martin School, and 36 to Buckley

under the tax laws. So if you sell securities or a home - the major capital assets affecting individual taxes -- you should be sensitive to the tax consequences.

In this article we discuss securities. You have a capital gain when you sell a capital asset at a profit. Capital gains are said to be long-term if you owned the asset for a year and a day or longer, short-term if held for a year or less. Only 40 percent of long-term gains are taxed. And 50 percent of net long-term capital losses ordinarily are deductible. Conversely, 100 percent of any short-term

gain is taxable and 100 percent of any short-term loss is deductible but not necessarily in the year of loss. So it makes sense for investors to hold gains for long-term status but to take losses before they become long-term. Since only 40 percent of a long-term capital gain is taxable, the maximum rate of tax on the whole capital gain now stands

at 20 percent. (It works this way: The 50 percent bracket is the highest and percent of that is 20 percent.) You must complete Schedule D to claim capital gains and losses. In completing the schedule, first report all short-term transactions on line 1. Each transaction is reported individually, with date acquired, date sold, sales proceeds received and price paid, to arrive at a net gain or loss for each After all short-term transactions are

Crippled bridge upsets travelers

BOSTON (UPI) - Commuter rail travelers, after an initiation to a new system of bus and trolley transfers, today settled into commuting routines that could last a year until a fire-crippled bridge to North

About 20 firefighters remained at the scene Monday, more than 72 hours after the six-alarm pre-dawn blaze Friday, pouring thousands of gallons creosote-soaked piers that held a drawbridge used to funnel 88 trains and 12,000 riders daily into the station. The bridge was taken out of service during the

height of the fire Friday. A fire department spokesman said there was still no idea when firefighters could be removed. Transportation officials reported no major snarls during the morning rush hour, the first in which Boston & Maine trains discharged passengers at a temporary platform in the Somerville rail yard. From there, commuters transferred to Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority buses and trolleys to reach

MBTA General Manager James O'Leary told a news conference Sunday the pier was "a total loss" and reconstruction would take between six months and a year. He estimated damage at \$6 million to \$8 million. The fire's cause remained undetermined. The new system, which could remain in effect until the pier and drawbridge are repaired, was expected to add up to 30 minutes to average travel time for riders from as far away as Manchester, N.H.

"It seems to be going very well," said B&M spokesman James Stoetzel of the morning commute. All the trains are coming in on schedule, An MBTA light rail vehicle shuttling passengers from Lechmere station to downtown developed brake problems shortly before 9 a.m., forcing transportan officials to use still another shuttle bus. The breakdown, which was cleared within 20 minutes. added an additional 10-minute delay for commuters. Stoetzel said commuters were tolerant of the delays because "a lot of good work has been done to get the

Transportation officials carrying bullhorns distribited leaflets at the temporary station erected in the train vard across the river from the regular terminal 'You've got to make the best of a bad situation," B&M and MBTA officials watched the movement of trains and people during the rush hour and Stoetzel said adjustments will be made as needed.

"We're going to work to improve these temporary arrangements as best we can," he said. The MBTA brought in cranes on barges and other heavy equipment and started removing the 250 feet of pier that remains. The railroad drawbridge built in 1928 remained in a nearly upright positions.

Don't bury waste, commission is told

AUGUSTA, Maine (UPI) — Low-level hazardous wastes should be stored above ground in an "engineered" facility, representatives of several divergent groups told a commission studying the waste disposal.

At a public meeting Monday to reveal its

preliminary report, members of the Low-Level Radioactive Waste Commission heard a nurse say "there is no safe level of ionizing radiation." "Either put the waste above ground in an engineered building at the Maine Yankee (nuclear power plant) site, or stop making it," said Pat Philbrook of the Maine State Nurses' Association. Ms. Philbrook said her group passed a resolution supporting those two points last year, because ill health effects — like leukemia — caused by radiation,

have been documented since 1906. "If you're interested in safety and health," added Ms. Philbrook, "you can't bury these wastes." A Northeast Regional Compact that would include 11 states found "little support" in the report, although the findings indicated favorable changes in the compact plan could be made.

A northern New England compact to include Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont, received a better rating in the report. But the report said, "The degree of political support for the... compact in the other states is uncertain, with the executive and legislative branches expressing different opinions in Vermont Ed Schlick, head of the Maine Nuclear Referendum





'Ghost town' turned out to be a truly great town

It was a blistering hot Wednesday afternoon in August of 1947 when my husband and I drove to Manchester from Washington, D.C., to find a place to live. Our first stop in town was the Jarvis Real Estate office on Center Street where Charles Lesperance sold us a house on Thompson Road, which was under construction at the time

We bought the house with the provision that he would furnish us with an apartment until the house was completed. Our three-room apartment has since been demolished. It was across the street from Willie's Steak House (when minute steaks were 85 cents each, and hip steaks were

After completing the paperwork on our business transaction, we drove around town to acquaint ourselves with our new hometown. As we rode down Main Street we became aware of the fact that we may have made the biggest mistake of our

We had moved to a ghost town where absolutely no stores were open, and not a living soul was walking on the main street of town. (This was a completely foreign feeling to a couple of city kids from Washington, D.C.). As we neared the south end of town, we saw signs of life -

Bergren's Dany Store. We politely inquired of our waitress as to where all of the townspeople were - if there were any. She informed us that everything in town closed on Wednesday afternoons during August. Further inquiries revealed the fact that there were no

hotels or motels available anywhere in Our choice was to return to Hartford or travel eastward to a town called Vernon. In that town, we would find a large, old Victorian establishment called the Vernon Inn. (Formerly this rooming house was located at the Vernon Circle.) Our lodgings had neither restaurant facilities nor private baths. After spending the night, we returned to Washington with fear and trepidation about raising our children in a town so "provincial" that everything closed on Wednesdays. How could we possibly have been so

An author's quest of Marco Polo became an adventure all its own

NASHVILLE Tenn - Bestselling author Gary Jennings didn't anticipate the problems he would have in researching his mammoth novel on Marco Polo's 13th century journey to China.

But Jennings, who is building a cabin in his native Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia and has a home on a take at Mexia, Texas, was shot at, jailed and came up on a detachment of Soviet tanks while retracing the steps of the famous Venetian explorer. Jennings, 55, the author of the bestselling novel, "Aztec," spent almost all of 1981 traveling in Marco Polo's footsteps in the Eastern Hemisphere. The result is "The

Journeyer" (Atheneum, \$17.95). "The Journeyer" is Jennings' imagina-tion filling in the unrecorded gaps of the great Italian explorer's travels to China, Indochina, India, Tibet, Lebanon and

Marco Polo didn't have the problem of crossing so many frontiers as I did," Jennings said in a telephone interview. Naturally the minute I decided to do Marco Polo, everything blew up in the Middle East. Iran threw the Americans out. Afghanistan is no safe place for them. Anyhow, this required some subterfuges on

JENNINGS SAID even "supposedly friendly countries" like Turkey caused him problems. He said he was thrown into jail "I happened to be traveling in the Kurdish part of Turkey which happens to be in rebellion against the authorities as it has been for the last 1,000 years or so, and when I was found up in there after curfew in a suspect part of the country without I convinced them I was harmless," he

When I was in Thailand, I went into the up-country because Marco Polo didn't get down into the flesh pots of Bangkok because they didn't exist in those days." So as long as I was in that part of the

country I thought I would take a look at the poppy fields. It wasn't part of the book because in those days opium wasn't any big deal. So I marched up there and got shot at. Nothing serious. Just a warning shot across the bow but it knocked out the fuel pump in our car so we had to roll downhill again back

Since Afghanistan and Iran were both officially closed off, Jennings said he went to Pakistan to try the backdoor approach. Afghanistan was overrun by Soviet

"To get into Afghanistan I bribed my way into a camel caravan of smugglers. We got as far into Afghanistan as the carayan leader dared. He said we'd better make a detour. He said, 'You see that flag over yonder. That's a Soviet tank detachment sitting over there Some of the romance rubbed off this too

because you would think a desert caravan would be smuggling spices, perfumes and slave girls. Do you know what they were

danging on the humps of the camels."

Jennings managed to get across the border into Iran into a "dead, dreary desert. I'd gone to this kind of trouble to plod across the desert and my guide said, 'OK We're now in Iran.' And I looked around me and the country looked exactly the same as what I'd just left. The people looked exactly the same and I asked myself what the hell have I gone to this trouble for. But I was able to say, Yes, I'd been there.

"THE JOURNEYER" is almost 800 pages long, but there's adventure on every single one in Marco Polo's dealings with the people along the "silk road" to China. particularly his many samplings of love along the way.

Asked why he decided to write about Marco Polo, Jennings replied: "It was a challenge. The minute I suggested this my agent and publishers said Marco has been n the public domain 700 years - longer than Shakespeare. Everybody has done something about Marco Polo. It's the most trite and worked-over subject in the world and that was why it appealed to me, because I wanted to do something really new and different about something that had been worked over all these centuries, and I think I did."

JENNINGS HAS brought himself against a similar challenge in his next project. In the 20th century alone there have been 1,600 books about the circus. My adding one more would be superfluous unless 1 do something totally new and

Rewriting is the key, according to author

ANNISQUAM Mass (UPI) - Writing says author Barbara Pauley, depends on rewriting, whether it's a novel or a sexual

The best writing depends on rewriting and rewriting. It you're not willing to rewrite, you shouldn't write," she says. That's the advice she gives students in a writers workshop she formed. And it worked so well, she says, that she and two of them co-authored a graphic sex book called If You Love Me .. Show Me How.' They believe the book, on how to improve sexual communication, will be a best seller. 'It's not the kind of material I've worked on before," she explained. "When it was presented, one member was upset. It's very





Are Raiders best ever?

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) — Every man is entitled to his opinion regardless of whether he's right or wrong, and that being the case, you are cordially invited to go argue with Al Davis as long as you like over his claim that his world champion Los Angeles Raiders may be the greatest football

That's covering a whole lot of territory, but if anyone can possibly do it, the Raiders' owner can, Washington Redskins 38-9 Sunday in Super Bowl XVIII before 72,920, many of whom huddled together for warmth in the stiff wind gusts. Virtually all of them stuck it out out until the very end to watch what deteriorated into the most onesided contest in Super Bowl history.

Say what you like about Al Davis, he knows a little bit about football and about football teams. He isn't ordinarily given over to superlatives, including me, by how far he went in his evaluation of his present Raiders, the third team of his to win Super Bowl title. "I think this is one of the greatest teams of all time," said Davis, as newsmen tried to pin him in

a corner of the Raiders' dressing room which was iammed-packed with wall- to-wall humanity after they had annihilated the favored Redskins. 'I'm not sure it's not the best of all time. It has speed and size. It has quickness. It has power and drive. It has everything. This team dominates. who to compare it to." You have to understand this was only a few minutes after Marcus Allen had won himself a

fancy new automobile for winding up MVP by scoring two touchdowns, one of which came on an electrifying 74-yard sprint, the longest in Super Bowl history, and Jim Plunkett, the Raiders quarterback, had exploited the Redskins defenses more than sufficiently to puncture any notions of Washington's invincibility. Could it be Davis was getting a little carried away, maybe even a little emotional?

"Who me?" he snapped, indignantly. "Me? Are you kidding? I just think this is a great team. Quite frankly, I respect the Redskins, but we knew we were good going in. I think we played the third and fourth quarter under wraps. This team has gone through more harassment than any "By whom?" one newsman asked,

Groton crash kills 3

GROTON, Conn. (UPI) - Three Illinois residents were killed when single-engine plane crashed in small airport, authorities said.

The victims were identified as Arthur J. Pisarski, 54, of Richton Paul D. Storvic, 45, of Gravslake and Rich McKenna, 33, of Green Oaks. Authorites said the aircraft was enroute from Waukeegan, III. The plane went down in "heavy fog" about 10:40 p.m. Tuesday, said firefighter William Giesing of the Poquonnock Bridge Fire

The crash site is just north of Route 1 about 112 miles northeast of Groton-New London Airport said LaBelle. Authorities said the plane departed from Waukeegan

"I heard a bang and came running outside," said Stephen Botchis of Groton, who was the seond person at the scene. He said there were two loud noises possibly There was no fire but pieces of th plane littered the field.

"The plane was presumably looking for the airport but oversho it. I'm no expert but it looks like it was the weather conditions (that caused the crash)," said Poquon nock's Fire Chief Robert Burdick However, other witnesses told police the sound of an airplane engine stopped before the crash leading to speculation the plane

Burdick said two bodies were next to the plane and another was to to is feet away. He said the bodies were so mangled, officials couldn't determine the sex of the victims. They were pronounced examiner Dr. Boris Pukay. The engine was to the side of the plane and debris was in the trees The cockpit was pushed back into the rear of the plane and the wings
