STRAFORD, N.J. (UPI) — Hockey star Pelle Lindbergh, declared clinically dead after a weekend car crash, was disconnected from life support systems after doctors removed his vital organs for transplant.

Auto expense form is 'Catch-22' for taxpayers

There's a brand-new form 2106 for the individual. It's the only form you can use to deduct your deductible travel and entertainment expenses, including auto use. It's a block-buster. It's also retroactive to Jan. 1, 1985. It's a "Catch 22" under which you invite an audit no matter how you fill it out for this current year of 1985. Whether that's what the professionals who draft our tax laws intended doesn't really matter. That's the way it is. There are questions on this form that never appeared before. To help explain it to you, I asked the help of Eli J. Warach, an editor-in-chief of Prentice-Hall. Questions: What is the distance of your average daily round-trip commute to and from work? How much of your total car mileage for 1985 represents commuting? Since commuting expenses generally are personal and non-deductible, the IRS obviously wants to determine how much non-deductible commuting mileage the taxpayer has run up for the year.

RED FLAG: Showing little or no commuting mileage is a danger sign. In fact, the IRS may take a closer look if there is a big discrepancy between (1) your total listed commuting mileage and (2) the average daily round-trip multiplied by the number of work days during 1985.

But there may be legitimate reasons for the discrepancy. For example, you may frequently stop to visit a customer or client on the way to work. From that point on, the trip is no longer commuting. It's deductible travel between two business locations, and if you can prove your business connection, you don't include the mileage in the commuting total.

Question: Do you or your spouse have another car available for personal use? Yes or no. If the answer is "No," and the mileage total is low, you, the taxpayer, had better have proof of business mileage.

RED FLAG: If you're typical, you'll have some mileage for personal errands and other family driving. If there is no other car available, then this personal driv-

'After Hours' wows fans

NEW YORK — Martin Scorsese, whose string of box office successes was interrupted by a flop, appears to be back on the right track with his latest film, "After Hours," which he calls a lesson in morality.

"I've constructed a morality play, where every man has to go through the underworld, and it comes out saved," Scorsese said, ensconced in a dapper-gray lounge at his publicist's office in New York.

"After Hours," made in two months in low-budget purgatory, is a box office success, especially sweet for a director whose last film, "King of Comedy," flopped.

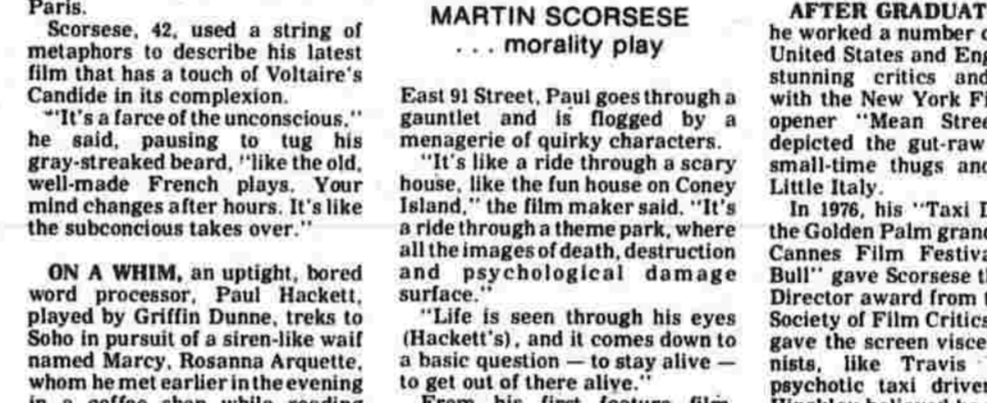
He has begun work on a new film, "The Color of Money," starring Paul Newman, and finished acting in another, "Round About Midnight," about jazz musicians in Paris.

Scorsese, 42, used a string of metaphors to describe his latest film that has a touch of Voltaire's Candide in its complexion.

"It's a farce of the unconscious," he said, pausing to tug his gray-streaked beard. "Like old-world, made-made French plays. Your mind changes after hours. It's like the subconscious takes over."

ON A WHIM, an uptight, bored word processor, Paul Hackett, played by Griffin Dunne, treks to Soho in pursuit of a siren-like waif named Marcy. Rosanna Arquette, whom he met earlier in the evening in a coffee shop while reading "Tropic of Cancer."

Paul's all-night odyssey into the underworld turns nightmarish, with a suicide, a murder, a roving band of bloodthirsty vigilantes and burglars. Unable to return home to

Scorsese stalks comeback trail

"Who's that Knocking on My Door," to "Mean Streets," "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore," "Taxi Driver," "New York, New York," "Raging Bull," "King of Comedy" and "The Last Days of America." Scorsese has dwelled on the theme of an outsider looking in. Scorsese's chronic asthma as a child made him something of an outsider himself.

The son of Italian immigrants, Scorsese grew up in the hard-and-fast world of Manhattan's Lower East Side, and spent most of his youth in movie theaters, devouring films by French New Wave directors, including Francois Truffaut and Jean-Luc Godard.

In 1960, Scorsese entered New York University, as an English major, but found his true vocation in movies, picking up international awards for "What's a Girl Like You Doing in a Place Like This" and "It's Not Just You, Murray."

AFTER GRADUATION in 1964, he worked a number of jobs in the United States and England before turning to directing and producing films. His debut feature, "Mean Streets," which depicted the gut-wrenching and sometimes nihilistic life of Little Italy.

In 1976, his "Taxi Driver" won the Golden Palm grand prize at the Cannes Film Festival. "Raging Bull" gave Scorsese the 1980 Best Director award from the National Society of Film Critics. Hartford Ballet showcases Bach

HARTFORD — This year everyone in the classical music world is celebrating the 300th anniversary of Johann Sebastian Bach's birth and the Hartford Ballet is no exception.

Last Friday and Saturday at Bushnell Memorial Hall, the Connecticut Ballet presented four dance pieces with music written by Bach or inspired by Bach.

The high point of the evening's choreography and dancing was provided by the opening piece, George Balanchine's "Concerto Barocco" (1940). From then on, the dancing degenerated to posing, poorly executed connecting movements and point work and even the heck of a lot of just plain running around.

The live music provided by the Hartford Chamber Orchestra under the direction of Tibor Pustual was always a joy. Less enjoyable however, was the synthetic music arrangement by Lukas Foss of Bach's Baroque variations that accompanied the third piece, "Aves Mirabiles." Its faint relation to anything Bach ever wrote was blanketed by an effect sounding like crackling speakers, and it bore no relationship to the choreography.

BALANCHINE'S classic ballet has three movements as does its music. Bach's Double Violin Concerto in D minor. In succeeding quick Vivace, slow Largo and fast Allegro movements, eight girls in white light wearing short-sleeved white leotards performed the precise point work. Their clean lines moved as a corps, and in one and two groups and duets, through soft light jumps and crisp arm movements.

There is no dramatic storyline theme to the dancing. Instead, there are elegant asymmetrical groupings and the refined contrast of baroque choreography to the continuous counterpoint of the baroque music. The excellent violin solos performed by Cynthia Treggor and Michael Pollard were well represented in dance Friday by soloist Nicole Binder and especially by Jane Scibilia. The shape of a gothic cathedral window imposed on the white backdrop and flamenco-inspired velvet costumes set the mood for the Bach Cantata No. 10, "My Soul Doth Magnify The Lord." (1979) with choreography by Michael Uthoff. The mixed corps of dancers appeared posed in a scattered grouping and proceeded through six movements of dance and a finale. Accompanying choral music was joyously performed in each movement by the Hartford Choral under the direction of Henley Denmark. The glorious baroque cantata had a combina-

Numbness due to poor circulation

DEAR DR. GOTT: Will you please give me some information concerning numbness and redness in hands that occurs during the night? It is accompanied by a sensation in the upper arm similar to that when a tourniquet has been applied.

DEAR READER: You may be suffering a circulatory interruption that temporarily decreases the amount of oxygen reaching the nerves to your hands. The positions sleeping persons assume often result in kinking of arteries in the arms, hand numbness and redness can result. If possible, try to alter your sleeping position and see if the symptoms should usually disappear when the hands are able to receive adequate circulation at night.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I like drinking tea because I'm trying to avoid caffeine. My husband disapproves because the teas have not been proven safe by the Food and Drug Administration. Are they safe? Should I stop drinking them?

DEAR READER: Your husband is correct in his belief that herbal teas are not tested or controlled by any federal agency. What's more, there is tremendous variation in ingredients from brand to brand. I am concerned about it. He also found that one lobe of my prostate gland was slightly enlarged, but not enough to warrant surgery. It does not impede urination to speak of, however, there has been an increase in frequency during the night. I am 73 years old, in good shape and quite active physically. Where is the source of this blood, and is there any danger of hemorrhaging?

DEAR READER: The seminal blood you describe probably is prostatic in origin. There are other possibilities, of course, but in the presence of some prostatic enlargement, this seems to be a logical conclusion. I would be more aggressive than your doctor, however, in ferreting out the exact cause. Although you may have a low-grade prostatic infection (which can be treated with antibiotics), I am concerned that a small tumor in the gland might be leaking blood. You will not hemorrhage, but you need a cystoscopic exam, during which the urologist examines your reproductive tract with a lighted tube. At that time, he will want to take biopsies to make sure that the prostate is tumor-free. Despite the fact that you have had this problem for three years, I believe a full investigation is warranted.

Fresh horseradish is simple recipe

DEAR POLLY: I grew horseradish in my garden this year. I don't know how to prepare it. Can you remember my mother grating it, but do not know what she did next.

DEAR MRS. L.T.: Actually, all you need to do is grind the horseradish before using it as a relish, seasoning or garnish. The grated horseradish can be kept in a tightly-covered container in the refrigerator almost indefinitely.

For a delicious dressing for cold meat, try mixing a tablespoon of prepared horseradish (either grated fresh or grated and preserved in vinegar) with two cups of unseasoned whipped cream. Delicious on cold ham, roast beef, lamb or other cold meats.

Hudson pal says he was deceived

LOS ANGELES — A man who says he was Rock Hudson's live-in lover has filed a \$10-million claim on the late actor's estate and a \$16-million suit claiming Hudson and others conspired to keep him from learning of the actor's illness.

Marc Christian, 31, claimed Tuesday through attorney Marvin Mitchell that he and Hudson began a love affair in March 1983 that lasted until the actor died last month of complications from acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

The blond, mustachioed Christian said Hudson learned in June 1984 that he had AIDS, but lied about it and continued the sexual relationship, thus exposing Christian to the deadly virus.

Mitchell conceded that the antibodies that signal the presence of the virus have not been found in Christian's blood.

He has not been diagnosed with AIDS, but it takes time to incubate the virus, Mitchell said. "It could happen any moment. It's like a death watch."

The lawyer said the absence of the antibodies does prove that Christian "didn't give (AIDS) to Rock."

AIDS, which is usually contracted through sexual activity, destroys the body's immune system and leaves its victims vulnerable to life-threatening infections. In the United States, most victims have been homosexual men.

Christian's suit claims Hudson tried to explain away the symptoms of his illness by insisting that his extreme weight loss was the result of either anorexia or of dieting and exercise.

Mitchell said Christian, who claims to have lived several months in the actor's Beverly Hills mansion, did not know Hudson had AIDS until he heard on the radio in July that the actor was in Paris seeking treatment for the disease.

That disclosure, which helped rally Hollywood support for the fight against AIDS, also sparked controversy because of fears that Hudson had endangered cast members on the TV series "Dynasty," particularly co-star Linda Evans, by keeping his illness a secret.

Christian's Superior Court suit names Wallace Sheft, executor of Hudson's estate; Mark Miller, Hudson's secretary; and two unnamed doctors.

It seeks \$1 million in punitive damages against each of the four defendants, who allegedly knew of Hudson's condition and conspired to keep it secret, plus \$10 million in general damages.

Mitchell also filed a separate \$10 million claim against Hudson's estate on behalf of Christian. He said the defendants have 10 days to reject the claim, and if they do the attorney will file another lawsuit.

In court papers filed earlier this month, Hudson left his entire estate to a trust — with the beneficiaries not publicly named — which he set up in 1974. The value of the estate has not been disclosed.

Witnesses have testified the "hit squad" included Mathews, defendants Lane and Bruce Carroll Pierce, and Richard Scutari, who is on the FBI's "10 Most Wanted" list on June 18, 1984.

Ten members of the group are on trial in U.S. District Court, charged with racketeering for allegedly conspiring to stage a right-wing revolution financed by robberies and counterfeiting schemes.

Black bishop elected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Roman Catholic bishops — black and white alike — are hailing election of the first black to a major U.S. Catholic leadership post as a potential boon for attracting black converts and priests.

"Signs and symbols are extremely important," Auxiliary Bishop Eugene Marino of Washington said Tuesday, moments after being elected secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops.

His election, he said in an interview, could well serve as an encouraging sign to blacks that "there is, in fact, a place for them in the Catholic Church."

Many American blacks don't feel that way now, if membership figures are any guide. Just 1.3 million of America's 26 million blacks are Catholics, compared with the denomination's total U.S. membership of \$2 million of a U.S. population of about 235 million.

The low black membership is reflected in the fact that there are just 10 black bishops out of more than 300. But even that percentage is a big increase over the recent past. Marino was only the third black American bishop in modern times when he was named in 1974.

His election as the national conference's secretary, one of the four main offices, will give him a voice in all major policy and planning decisions. And he said he will use the post to help the new prominence of a black bishop could draw more young black men into seminaries.

Francis, who himself won election Tuesday as chairman of a bishops' committee concerned with religious orders of men, called Marino's election "a very significant indication of the maturity black Catholics have achieved in this country."

Bishop James Malone of Youngstown, Ohio, the white president of the conference, said the election "seems to me a vote of confidence in the stature of the black Catholic."

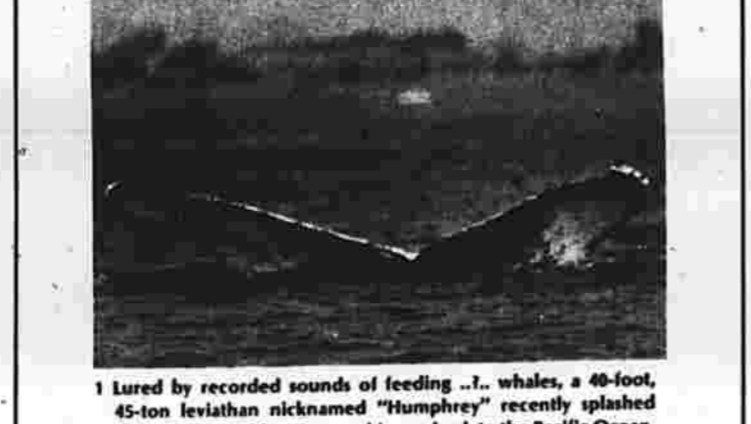

Reagan steps up media blitz as superpower talks near

WASHINGTON — President Reagan says his age may give him an advantage at the superpower summit by affording him the opportunity to give some "fatherly advice" to Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

Reagan, exuding more optimism about the talks than his advisers, made the remarks in an interview Tuesday with five European television networks.

Also on Tuesday, Republican and Democratic leaders of Congress gave Reagan hearty support for his journey to Geneva, Switzerland. Today he will brief his cabinet on his goals for the summit.

The finale of Reagan's pre-summit public relations blitz will be a nationally televised address from the Oval Office at 8 p.m. EST. Thursday, when he will outline his plans for easing East-West tensions at the talks.

Reagan departs for Geneva on Saturday and will meet with Gorbachev Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 18-20.

He hinted the two sides might be closer in the area of so-called theater nuclear weapons than in other areas of planned negotiations.

"I know that the Soviets have talked about such things as a nuclear-free zone in Europe," he said. "And we're willing to engage them and will in conversation on that kind of subject."

The concept of a nuclear-free zone — the elimination of nuclear weapons from Europe — is a popular one in some allied political circles. The United States has been wary of such proposals on grounds that NATO nations need nuclear weapons to counter the larger conventional forces of the Warsaw Pact.

Reagan said that he found "encouragement" in the Soviet offer to cut offensive arsenals by 50 percent. But he said he would not be negotiating "specific numbers and so forth" when he sits down with Gorbachev.

Yurchenko case spurs dispute among agencies

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vitaly Yurchenko, the Soviet KGB agent who defected to the Soviet Union, had hoped to live anonymously with a woman on the West Coast after being interrogated by the CIA. The New York Times reported today.

But the FBI, during CIA debriefing interviews with Yurchenko, kept showing him newspaper articles about his defection, precipitating his defection, a senior intelligence official told the Times Tuesday.

It was then that "he began thinking maybe he'd made a big mistake," the official told the Times. "He was very, very upset."

The official's comments appeared aimed at laying some of the blame on the FBI for Yurchenko's defection to the Soviet Union, the Times said.

FBI press spokesman Lane Bonner said Tuesday that Yurchenko "had free access to television, radio and newspapers," while he was in the United States.

"It's absurd to say any person provided him with clips when he had free access to that."

The official defended the CIA's handling of Yurchenko's relative freedom of movement — and opportunity to escape, saying, "They couldn't lock him up. What are they going to do? Put a ball and chain on him? He had to adjust to life in the United States."

But, "He didn't spend much time alone," the official added.

American-Soviet spouses have high hopes for summit

WASHINGTON — Sandra Gubin says she doesn't live; she just exists.

The 38-year-old doctoral student at the University of Michigan is one of about 30 so-called "divided spouses" — Americans whose partners in the Soviet Union have been repeatedly denied permission to join them in this country.

Encouraged by recent congressional calls for President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev to address their plight at this month's summit, the husbands and wives are expressing new hope they may be reunited at last with their spouses.

"If the Soviets are serious about wanting to improve relations with the United States, there's no more simple, obvious or easy way to demonstrate that than by acting on this issue," said Ms. Gubin, spokeswoman for the Divided Spouses Coalition. "We are all hopeful."

Ms. Gubin married Aleksei Lodiiev in April 1981 while studying in the Soviet Union on a Fulbright-Hays fellowship. Lodiiev was denied permission to follow his wife when she returned to the United States three months later, and they were separated for three years before she visited him in August.

Soviet citizens married to Americans usually are permitted to leave, but not always. Last year, there were about 100 marriages between Americans and Russians, and 80 percent of the Soviet spouses were granted exit visas.

Assistant Secretary of State Rozanne L. Ridgway met with 20 separated spouses in Moscow while U.S. and Soviet officials held talks on the summit in July 1983 as the personal guest of then-Soviet leader Yuri Andropov, who extended the invitation in response to a letter she sent him describing her fear of nuclear war.

The trip won her national attention and a role on the ABC television series "Lime Street" before tragedy struck this past summer. Samantha Smith was killed in a plane crash Aug. 25 in Auburn, Maine, while returning home after filming an episode of the series in London.

"Samantha was loved and mourned not only by Americans, but by the Soviet people as well," Mitchell and Cohen told Reagan in their letter. "The Soviet government should recognize that a youth exchange program is an appropriate memorial to her."

Furthermore, they wrote, "We believe it is important that the world see the summit at least symbolically as a reaffirmation of our two nations of a commitment to peace. A commitment to such a program would send at least one small signal of hope to the world."

Maine senators want program to honor girl

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Maine senators Tuesday proposed a U.S.-Soviet youth exchange program at next week's summit to memorialize the death of the late Maine schoolgirl who journeyed to Moscow for peace.

In a letter to Reagan, Sens. George Mitchell and William Cohen said Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev could secure an important "symbolic achievement" by agreeing to create The Samantha Smith Memorial Exchange Program.

Under legislation they introduced Tuesday, the U.S. Information Agency would be authorized to set aside \$2 million to sponsor educational exchanges for youths under age 21 and scholarships of up to \$5,000 for American undergraduates wishing to study in the Soviet Union.

Samantha, at age 11, visited the Soviet Union in July 1983 as the personal guest of then-Soviet leader Yuri Andropov, who extended the invitation in response to a letter she sent him describing her fear of nuclear war.

Liner hostages sue firms

NEW YORK — Two elderly women held hostage on the Achille Lauro cruise ship sued the cruise line and four tour companies for \$400 million, claiming the hijacking caused them severe psychological injuries and could have been prevented.

The lawsuit, by Sophie Chasser, 70, and Anna Schneider, 73, both of Hollywood, Fla., is the first legal claim filed in connection with the seizure of the Italian cruise ship off Alexandria, Egypt, their lawyers said.

The lawsuit claims the captain and crew on the Italian ocean liner acted as "accomplices" in the hijacking, in which Americans were singled out and threatened with death.

In a related matter, five men accused in the hijacking of the ship will go on trial Monday on weapons charges, a public prosecutor announced today.

The five include four Arabs who seized the ship Oct. 7 and an alleged fifth member of the hijack gang who was arrested in New York Sept. 28, five days before the Achille Lauro sailed on its ill-fated Mediterranean cruise.

Assistant public prosecutor Luigi Meloni, one of the state's top prosecutors, is in charge of the investigation, told a news conference the five Arabs will face trial on secondary weapons charges in a Genoa criminal court Monday.

Cuban-born mayor elected

MIAMI — Xavier Suarez, a suave Harvard-educated lawyer, overcame an early challenge by millionaire banker Raul Masvidal to become Miami's first Cuban-born mayor.

With all 85 of the city's precincts and absentee ballots reported by 11 p.m. EST Tuesday, Suarez had collected 31,602 votes, or 56.7 percent, to 24,284, or 43.3 percent, Masvidal, who was making his first bid for public office.

Between the Nov. 5 primary and Tuesday's runoff several hundred delegates and 6,000 members of the incumbent Maurice Ferré threw their support to Suarez.

Miami's daily newspapers endorsed Masvidal, who led in most of the early tabulations. But Suarez surged into the lead shortly after 10 p.m., as the heavy votes from the Hispanic precincts were counted.

Study cites cholesterol risk

WASHINGTON — A six-year study of 356,000 men indicates that even moderate levels of cholesterol in the blood can increase the risk of a heart attack.

The risk posed by high levels of cholesterol in the blood is well known, but there has been controversy about the significance of lower amounts.

Dr. Jeremiah Stamler of the Northwestern University Medical School said a meeting of the American Heart Association Tuesday that new findings show there is not a threshold below which cholesterol is safe.

That means, Stamler said, "The claim is incorrect that excess risk does not start until the cholesterol reaches a markedly elevated level."

Cholesterol and other fatty substances can build up on the inner walls of the arteries leading to the heart, cutting the flow of blood to heart muscle. This sets the stage for a heart attack, expected to kill 150,000 people this year.

The new study, conducted by researchers at 25 medical centers, followed 356,222 men between the ages of 35 and 57 who were screened for a heart disease risk study. More than 2,000 of the men had fatal heart attacks during the six-year study period.

Bennett details voucher plan

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Education William J. Bennett today asked Congress to give vouchers worth up to \$500 to parents of poor children so they can shop for "the best possible schools for their children," public or private.

Bennett said vouchers could improve opportunities "for millions of young Americans." He predicted the vouchers would spur "a healthy rivalry" among public and private schools to provide a better education for the poor.

"This is a good thing," Bennett told a news conference. "It will lead to better education services for these children and greater opportunities for them later in life."

The \$3.6 billion in federal remedial aid called Chapter One would still flow to local public school districts, but parents would have the right to demand that the school issue them a voucher.

Sporadic fighting in capital

Liberian chief says rebellion crushed

MONROVIA, Liberia (UPI) — President Samuel Doe said today he had crushed a rebellion led by a former military commander who help bring him to power but Western diplomats reported scattered gunfire in the capital.

Radio Elwa, a private missionary station seized by the rebels during the uprising reported today attempted coup Tuesday had been followed by Doe and that the president was in control of the country.

Government officials said rebel forces led by Gen. Thomas Quiwonkpa — who disappeared Tuesday — crossed into Liberia from neighboring Ivory Coast Tuesday and seized portions of Monrovia before dawn. At least 16 people were reported killed in fighting between rebels and loyal troops.

"There is shooting this morning in several locations," said U.S. Embassy official Richard Gilbert. "The fighting is centered on the outskirts of town at the junction of the main airport road. Shooting is also reported in scattered sections near the city."

The Doe government is clearly in control of the radio stations but the situation remains confused to say the least," Gilbert said.

The British Broadcasting Corp. reported today that Western diplomats in Monrovia reported hearing gunshots near the presidential palace.

Reports said thousands of people — disenchanted with Doe and his victory in a controversial presidential election last month — danced in the streets when the rebels claimed victory during the streets emptied as it became apparent Doe had crushed the rebellion.

Doe urged rebel holdouts — including Quiwonkpa, — to lay down their arms. He ordered a dusk-to-dawn curfew and sealed the country's borders.

"I take this opportunity to inform the nation that the coup has failed," Doe said on a Monrovia radio station that had been captured by rebels 13 hours earlier. "I am still the commander in chief of the armed forces of Liberia and head of state."

Andrew Key, the U.S. Embassy's cultural affairs officer, said the mission had not received official confirmation that Doe was in control.

Quiwonkpa, commander of the Liberian military since April 1980, was named secretary-general of the ruling People's Redemption Council in October 1983. He refused the post and was later stripped of authority in the armed forces and the council.

Liberia, on the southwestern bulge of Africa, became the continent's first independent republic in 1847 after being colonized by freed American slaves who returned to Africa with U.S. support.

Doe was an army master sergeant on April 12, 1980, when he and a group of fellow sergeants killed Premier William Tolbert and seized power. Several former government officials were killed in a televised execution.

Doe held presidential elections last month and was declared the winner with 51 percent of the vote, although opposition leaders and Western news agencies reported widespread fraud.

Balloon boxes were burned, hijacked or stuffed with pro-Doe votes, and when early returns showed Doe losing, he dismissed an impartial election committee and replaced it with one loaded with his supporters.

4 die in plane crash

WICHITA, Kan. (UPI) — Fog and drizzle may have reduced the visibility to a quarter of a mile when a single-engine Cessna crashed, killing four people and seriously injuring another man thrown clear of the wreckage, police said.

National Transportation Safety Board investigators were to arrive at the crash site today. Sedgewick County Sheriff Mike Hill said Tuesday night.

The sole survivor, Stephen Shogren, 35, of Wichita, was held in stable condition at Westley Medical Center. He was thrown clear on impact Tuesday and landed at the top of a ravine in the heavily wooded area, Hill said.

"It's a miracle he escaped," Hill said.

Hill said the four others were burned beyond recognition. Identities of the dead were not expected to be released until later today, Hill said.

The Kansas Highway Patrol reported visibility at the time of the crash may have been reduced by fog and drizzle to a quarter of a mile.

Hill said a woman called the Sedgewick County Sheriff's office at 7:50 p.m. EST to report seeing a plane hit a power line, crash and burst into flames two miles east of Jabara Airport in northeast Wichita.

Air traffic controllers at Wichita's Mid-Continent Airport confirmed they lost radar contact with a plane at that time.

What is a Series 'D' Savings Bond?

QUESTION: I have a \$50 Series D, U.S. Savings Bond, issued in my name in February 1981. I tried to cash it at my bank, but they said they said they had never heard of a Series "D" bond. They tried about E, E.E. H and HH savings bonds, but nothing about D bonds.

I plan to take this bond to the district Federal Reserve Bank. Will they cash it?

ANSWER: Sure. Assuming your local bank is a U.S. Savings Bond paying agent, as most banks are, it is authorized to cash that bond. You stumped the bankers there by bringing in something they had never seen before. Only bankers who have been in the business for a long time know about D bonds.

Series A, B, C and D bonds, popularly known as those issued to "baby bonds," were sold at 75 percent of face value and accumulated interest at 2.9 percent when held for their 10-year maturity.

If you think back, you should recall paying \$37.50 for your D bond. In February 1981, it became worth \$50. That's all it's worth to this very day, because it stopped building up interest when it matured.

You can save yourself a trip to the Federal Reserve Bank by going back to your local bank and suggesting to the people there that they study "The Book on U.S. Savings Bonds." That guide for issuing and paying agents has been distributed to all banks by the U.S. Treasury Department.

QUESTION: I am considering buying EE bonds in 1986. I can double my money in those bonds in a five-year period?

QUESTION: I went to my bank with the intention of purchasing \$50,000 face value of EE bonds, which I know from your column would cost \$15,000. You have also explained that if the maximum amount an individual is allowed to purchase each year.

The bank manager said I would have to buy \$50,000 bonds, because that is the largest denomination they are issuing. I called five other banks and they all said the same thing.

Can you explain this?

ANSWER: EE bonds come in \$50, \$75, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000, and \$10,000 denominations. The only possible explanation for the problem you ran into is that none of the banks you contacted keep larger denomination bonds on hand.

That's understandable. After all, banks sell lots of small EE bonds, but most banks don't get much call for big denomination EEs. However, they can always obtain big EEs from their district Federal Reserve bank or branch.

Go back to your bank and suggest that it get the bonds you want from the Fed. With \$15,000 to invest, you should be a pretty good customer. Your bank should accommodate you.

If you still draw a blank, you can buy large denomination EEs from the Fed. There is a Federal Reserve Bank and 25 branches around the country. Your local bank can tell you the address of the one serving your area.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial, which has set new highs in seven of the first 10 trading days, slipped 3.32 to 1,430.28 in the first hour of trading this morning.

Losers outnumbered gainers by more than 2 to 1 in the early tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Colgate-Palmolive led the active list in the early going, down 1/8 at 30 in trading that included a 1 million-share block at 30 1/8.

At 10 a.m., the NYSE's composite index of all listed common stocks was down 38 at 113.85. The American Stock Exchange market value index dropped 34 to 236.07.

On Tuesday the Dow Jones industrial average rose 1.72 to a new closing high of 1,433.60 and Big Board volume climbed to 170.80 million shares, the seventh heaviest ever, up from 128.54 million Monday.

Advances outpaced declines by more than 2 to 1 on the NYSE.

Mexican publisher buying UPI

WASHINGTON (UPI) — United Press International's chairman, union and key creditors are unanimously endorsing UPI's sale from bankruptcy to Mario Vazquez-Rana, Mexico's largest newspaper publisher, who took over the newspaper's operations last week.

The announcement Tuesday night, climaxing marathon negotiations that began last week, opened the way for a financial turnaround for the nation's second largest news service, which has operated under Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection since April 28.

UPI Chairman Luis Nogales said the \$41 million sale proposal "guarantees UPI's future as a full-service and financially secure international news agency."

The proposal by Vazquez-Rana and Houston real estate developer Joe Russo includes \$20 million in working capital over the next three to five years, a promise UPI will remain U.S.-based and a vow of continued editorial independence.

Co-op wants Seabrook protection

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Dissident members of the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission urged the Supreme Court to do what state regulators have not — protect the co-op's interests with the completion of the Seabrook nuclear project.

"The regulatory process has broken down in New Hampshire," co-op member Gary McCool told the court Tuesday. "The only protection left (for co-op members) is this court."

McCool asked the court to order the Public Utilities Commission to do a better job of protecting ratepayers. McCool said the PUC has failed to study adequately a \$67 million bill for the transfer of the federal Rural Electrification Administration toward its 2.2 percent share of Seabrook construction costs.

Co-op wants Seabrook protection

McCool and Rep. Roger Easton, R-Concord, another co-op member, said the PUC's approach, which has included the state's financial problems, have filed a lawsuit challenging his right to propose a reorganization plan for UPI.

The deal must be approved by a federal bankruptcy judge, a process that normally would take two to three months. However, it faces a legal challenge from UPI's chief owners, Douglas Jeffrey and William Geissler, who would receive no money under the proposal.

The pair, who Nogales has blamed for the state's financial problems, have filed a lawsuit challenging his right to propose a reorganization plan for UPI.

McCool said the court PUC estimates of rate increases from Seabrook are far too low. He said the commission underestimated the decrease in electric consumption that will be caused by rate increases.

As less power is sold, Easton said, rates will increase still more. He said Seabrook could cause a 500 percent increase in electric rates during the next 20 years. The PUC has estimated rates may triple during the period.

He said a study by the New England Power Pool shows more reductions in the use of electric power will be made in the long run.

Envoy makes contact



BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — The archbishop of Canterbury's special envoy said today he has made contact with Muslim fundamentalist kidnappers of up to six Americans but warned that "people could lose their lives" if he is not left alone.

Terry Waite, who said "progress is being made," convened a hurried news conference at a west Beirut hotel after being found by cameramen and photographers near a hideout where he was awaiting further contact with the captors.

"I'd like to make a particular plea that I'm not to be followed by anybody because if that happens then that will jeopardize my own safety and the safety of other people," he said.

"It's extremely important because of the great sensitivity of the situation that I am left totally alone because anything I have to do beyond this point will have to be entirely by myself," the bearded Anglican envoy said.

The Briton was accompanied from his hotel by four militia members earlier today but was alone when he suddenly arrived to talk to newsmen.

Waite, 46, secretary to Archbishop Robert Runcie, flew into Beirut Wednesday in a bid to make contact with the kidnappers of the six Americans, see the hostages and arrange their release.

"I really do have to just drop out of the picture, I'm prepared to go anywhere, having got this far, with no reason," Waite said. "We're in touch (with the kidnappers) in several different ways."

"Progress is being made and we're moving forward," he said.

He indicated he had not yet met the kidnappers but had made that a condition of his visit to Lebanon.

Waite said he also wanted to meet the four American hostages who called on the archbishop last week for help.

"We have reached a very critical point and a very dangerous and difficult point. We have procedures being worked out now and I think we shall have those worked out in the course of the day," said the Anglican troubleshooter.

"They're taking a risk, obviously, in meeting me. Just as much as I'm taking a risk meeting them. That's why I say, please, everyone, give me a chance to do that," Waite told reporters.

"A wrong move and people could lose their lives — including myself," he said.

Officials at the Iranian Embassy in Beirut said they were "in no way involved" in Waite's efforts.

Waite has previously succeeded in mediating the release of an American Presbyterian minister in Lebanon and hostages in Iran and Libya.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson said he was ready to travel to Beirut, Damascus or anywhere else to meet the kidnappers and told them that releasing the hostages would help foster peace in the region, the leftist As Saif newspaper said.

Residents rap plan's housing proposals

residential development in areas of town currently zoned for lower densities.

Under the plan, some areas would be designated for housing densities up to 20 units per acre. The maximum allowed under current zoning regulations is 10 units per acre. Other housing densities permitted under the plan would range from one housing unit every two acres to 10 units per acre in a medium-high area.

THE SOUTHWEST Property Owners' Association has led opposition to the plan, which, if adopted by the Planning and Zoning Commission, would guide the commission's land-use decisions through at least 1985. The group placed newspaper advertisements this week urging people to attend Wednesday's hearing.

The plan was also criticized Wednesday by residents of Vernon and Lyndall streets, who said the medium-density housing plan evasions for that area would harm wetlands.

"If you look at the wetlands map," said Mark Connors of Lyndall Street, "the land between Vernon and Lyndall streets is primarily wetlands. That should be a major factor in what zone we would give that."

The land in the northeast section of town is zoned mostly for one to two houses per acre. A Planned Residential Development zone, in which up to 10 units per acre are permitted, lies near the Vernon town line.

Connors read from the proposed plan and said that zoning classifications are based on three factors — the natural features of the land, the land's access to roads and the availability of public utilities.

Besides being a wetlands area, most of the land in northeast Manchester is not served by town sewer and water lines, he said. Both Vernon and Lyndall streets are not suited for heavy traffic because they are winding roads that go up and down hills, Connors added.

OTHERS FROM the area agreed and said that a medium-density classification for that part of town would ruin the area.

"It's completely wetlands," said Barbara Murphy of Lyndall Street. "This is the area they want to put six units per acre."

Some of those who attended the hearing complained that citizens did not have enough input while the plan was being written.

At one point during the hearing, developer Lawrence A. Fiano asked the PZC to consider raising the plan's density proposals for two sites — one at the corner of Tolland Turnpike and Buckland Street and the other on the corner of Chapel Road and Burnham.

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Moffett promises new trends at top

HARTFORD (UPI) — Former U.S. Rep. Toby Moffett officially launched his campaign for governor today, charging the state has gone from a "traillabizer" to a "speculator state" under Gov. William A. O'Neill.

Moffett formally announced his challenge to O'Neill for next year's Democratic gubernatorial nomination with a morning speech at Hartford's historic Old State House.

The former congressman attacked O'Neill for problems in state government including fire code violations in state institutions and state workers fired for failing to put in full days on the job.

"From a trailblazer, a trendsetter, state, Connecticut is fast becoming a speculator state," Moffett said in prepared remarks.

As governor, Moffett said he will work to give women a wider role in state government and take a strong stand on the environment, preparing the state for jobs of the future and cleaning house in state government.

"Shaping up our state agencies means shipping in new people. It means putting a premium on professionalism over politics," he said.

Moffett's formal announcement today came as no surprise since he has made it known for months that he would launch the uphill fight to deny O'Neill the Democratic nomination.

Following his announcement at the Old State House, Moffett planned to travel to Waterbury for an early afternoon rally and then on to Norwich, New Britain and Middletown and finally to a celebration party tonight in New Haven.

In addition to attacking O'Neill's administration, Moffett also attacked his own party's hierarchy.

He charged the Democratic Party under O'Neill has become "an out-of-touch, ineffective organization oriented toward official Hartford."

"Will our state government remain a clubhouse for complacent party insiders who remain isolated from the average citizen? Or will our government reach out and empower citizens?" he asked.

Moffett, who made an unsuccessful bid for the U.S. Senate in 1982, planned to wind up his day today with a series of 100 parties in private homes around the state to show the support his candidacy has generated.

He chose Waterbury for his afternoon rally because of the needs of middle-income people in Fairfield County during his stop in Norwich and then planned to attend house parties held by Democratic state legislators in New Britain and Middletown.

Retail sales slump

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Retail sales fell a whopping 2.3 percent October — the biggest decline since the end of World War II — as consumers put the skids on their auto-buying spree, the Commerce Department reported today.

Retail sales for the month totaled \$115.3 billion, a \$3.89 billion drop from September.

Auto sales had risen 8.0 percent in September and 6.1 percent in August, following a rise of only 0.2 percent in July.

A Commerce Department economist said the last time there was such a sharp decline in overall retail sales was in March 1975, when sales dropped 2.2 percent during the height of the 1975 recession. The October drop was the biggest for any month in the post war period, the economist said.

The 14.6 percent drop in auto sales during October also set a record for the past 40 years. The previous record was 14 percent in March 1975.

Excluding auto sales during the month, retail sales for October climbed only a slight 0.5 percent. Furniture, home furnishings and equipment stores showed a 0.1 percent drop in sales while department stores climbed only 0.1 percent.

Retail sales overall rose 2.1 percent in September.

Sales for the year are still running 6.4 percent ahead of the first 10 months of 1984, at a total so far this year of \$1.147 trillion.

Sales for October were 6 percent, or \$5.33 billion above October 1984.

Developers reach agreement Love Lane back on directors' agenda

A tentative agreement has been reached between two developers who submitted proposals to build starter houses on town-owned land on Love Lane that will pave the way for one of them to go forward, Town Attorney Kevin M. O'Brien said today.

Although final arrangements have not yet been worked out, Visions Unlimited of Tolland and J&G Builders of Windsor have reached an agreement under which Visions Unlimited will use engineering studies made by J&G, O'Brien said.

A contract for construction of 14 starter houses is scheduled to be considered by the Board of Directors when it meets Tuesday.

J&G was originally chosen to build the houses, but its proposal was rejected during negotiations when J&G officials found they could not hold to their original proposed sale price of \$55,000. The town began to negotiate with Visions Unlimited when J&G set the price at \$60,000. Visions Unlimited, however, had not done engineering work needed for the project and doing the work would have delayed construction of the houses.

At Tuesday's meeting, a public hearing will be held on an ordinance, which, if passed, would convey the land to Visions Unlimited to build the houses. The site contains about 7 acres.

Visions' proposal includes three types of houses — a raised ranch at a sale price of \$61,900, a cape at \$67,000 and a colonial at \$64,500.

The sale price would not include the land. The town would hold a mortgage for the land and home buyers would not have to pay for it for at least 10 years.

The project, strongly backed by the Democratic majority on the Board of Directors and strongly opposed by the Republican majority, is designed to provide affordable starter houses for Manchester residents. If there are more qualified buyers than 14, the selection will be made by lottery.

O'Brien said today he hopes to get final legal details of the agreement over the exchange of engineering services completed before the meeting of the directors Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the hearing room of Lincoln Center.

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
