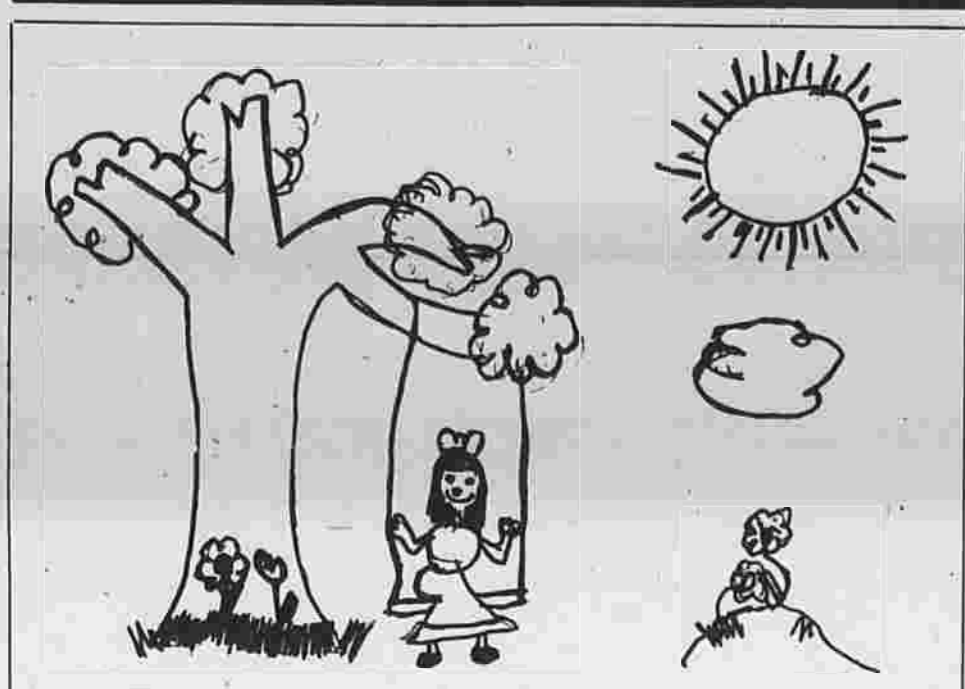

Across the nation

Rain dotted the West and South today in the aftermath of violent storms in Florida and Arizona, and Southern temperatures were lowered a bit but not enough to ease the grip of a heat wave.

Showers and thunderstorms were scattered from southern California across Arizona, New Mexico and northern Texas into northern Louisiana.

Thunderstorms lingered over Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina and Georgia and were widely scattered across the northern and central Rockies. Clear skies prevailed across the Midwest and the Northeast.

A heat wave continued to dominate the Southeast, but afternoon temperatures today were expected to be a few degrees lower — mostly in the 90s — in Alabama, Georgia and the Carolinas. Early-morning temperatures were in the 70s to around 80.

In Tallahassee, Fla., a thunderstorm left two people injured and felled power lines and trees. The two people were hospitalized after part of the roof at a Service Merchandise store caved in Monday, apparently from an accumulation of rain water, officials said.

The storm dropped the temperature from 96 degrees to 72 between 2 p.m. and 5 p.m. A section of Interstate 10 in western Arizona was closed by storm runoff water that was 3 feet deep in spots, and thunderstorms dumped heavy rain in central Arizona.

The interstate was closed from Ehrenberg to 17 miles east, the state Public Safety Department said. In Ehrenberg, some trailers were flooded and an emergency shelter was set up.

Today's forecast called for thunderstorms scattered across the central and southern Rockies, southern Plains, South Carolina, southern Georgia, the central Gulf Coast region and Florida.

Town, union mum on Senkow hearing

The State Board of Labor Relations completed a four-hour hearing Monday into complaints filed against the town in connection with the firing of Town Engineer Walter Senkow for alleged sexual harassment, a labor board official said today.

Assistant Labor Agent Katherine C. Foley conducted a fact-finding hearing with officials of the town and the union that represents Senkow in an attempt to gather information on the complaints. She must now decide whether to dismiss the union charges or recommend a hearing before the three-member labor board.

Foley said it should take her three to four weeks to make a recommendation to the board. She refused to comment on the hearing except to say it was "confidential."

The hearing held in Lincoln Center, was attended by Assistant Town Manager Steven B. Werber, Personnel Officer Linda Parry, Senkow and two members of the Civil Service Employees' Union, Inc. It institutes a policy representing the dismissed engineer and about 60 lower-management municipal employees.

Werber said today he could not reveal details of the preliminary hearing. Union officials could not be reached for comment.

Senkow was fired May 13 for what town officials have called sexual harassment of a female co-worker. According to police records, Senkow admitted to plac-

ing pornographic material on the woman's desk, but said he did so only to cheer her up.

The labor board conducted Monday's hearing in response to two complaints filed by CSEA, which is fighting to have Senkow reinstated with back pay.

The first complaint concerns a June 12 meeting between CSEA Field Director Joseph Carosella and Town Manager Robert B. Weiss. At that meeting, Carosella said, Weiss withheld information pertaining to Senkow's May 13 firing after 18 years in his post.

Carosella later filed a formal complaint with the labor board charging that the town was not following a three-step grievance procedure outlined in the town-union labor agreement. Carosella said that by withholding information from the union, Weiss was not following correct procedure.

Town officials contend employee termination and discipline are not covered by the grievance procedure.

Also discussed during the hearing was a complaint filed in July that charges the town is required by law to negotiate with the union whenever it institutes a policy involving employee discipline.

At issue is a notice the town posted that bars municipal employees from having material with sexual connotations in the work place. Employees were told they could be disciplined if they did not remove such material.

The town denies this is a new policy and said that town officials are public areas that should be devoid of sexual material.

Jean Harris has decided to withdraw any claim to \$220,000 the man she killed had left her in his will, her attorney says.

State law prohibits criminals profiting from their crimes, but a court-appointed attorney had said he would try to show that Harris was under extreme distress when she fatally shot her lover, Dr. Herman Tarnower, and therefore should be allowed to claim the money.

But attorney Michael Kennedy said Monday the 63-year-old Harris, who is serving a 15-year-to-life sentence, never had any interest in the money.

"This lawyer ignored her wishes," said Kennedy, who is representing Harris in efforts to gain a new trial for the 1980 slaying of the Searsdale diet developer. "She fired him and asked me to withdraw the claim."

Let tobacco companies advertise

Ever since the U.S. surgeon general concluded more than two decades ago that smoking caused heart and lung disease, American tobacco companies have been faced with trying to market products in an increasingly hostile environment.

First, cigarette manufacturers were required to affix labels to their products warning of the health dangers of smoking. Then a number of states passed laws that greatly restricted where and when people could light up, and much of the private sector has followed suit.

Now, some smoking opponents are attempting to deny the tobacco industry the right to market its products at all. A bill before Congress would prohibit all advertising of tobacco products in newspapers, magazines, televisions and billboards — and even in sales displays.

The bill has enjoyed the public support of the medical establishment, some television stars, the son of a tobacco magnate and a survivor of one of smoking's casualties.

No one can fault the group's motive — a desire for a smoke-free society. But supporters of an advertising ban are aiming their weapons at the wrong target.

A ban is not a new idea. Tobacco ads were banned from television and radio 15 years ago, and broadcast ads for chewing tobacco were banned earlier this year. But unlike the print media, the public airwaves have always been regulated and subject to some restrictions on speech.

A legislative ban on all advertising of tobacco products would set an undesirable precedent.

Although there is always a danger in a society committed to free speech that an individual or group will spread false information, the premise behind the principle is that the truth will emerge from free exchange.

If the tobacco companies want to try to portray smoking as a glamorous or wise activity, they should be allowed to, so long as they are required to explain the dangers of their product as well. Those who don't like it are then free to counter such information with their own.

They should not be allowed to simply cut off the right to advertise. Such an action could prove hazardous to everyone's health.

Opposing party fights Mexican election fraud

WASHINGTON — A traditional morale booster among Indian braves heading into battle was: "Today is a good day to die."

Their latter-day cousins south of the border who have run Mexico's ruling PRI party since 1929 have a less honorable, if more politically pragmatic, tradition: Stay in power any way you can; lie, cheat and steal, but win the elections at any cost.

The opposition National Action Party, commonly known as PAN, predicted the customary electoral chicanery in the most recent election, and made plans to prevent it. PAN fielded candidates in all 608 municipalities of Chihuahua, and took steps to have observers at every polling booth to "try to ensure that residents do not vote more than once and that ballot boxes are empty when the polls open," as the Mexico City News explained.

These tactics — the blunt instruments of electoral fraud — are not the wild imaginations of a paranoid opposition. Even when their candidates were favored to win, according to intelligence sources, PRI bosses have resorted to a whole arsenal of dirty tricks to achieve overkill at the polls.

FOR EXAMPLE: • Hundreds of teachers have stuffed ballot boxes the day before an election. Complaints, and sometimes riots, have been touched off when voters waited hours to cast their ballots early found that the boxes were too full to hold even the first votes.

• Many known or suspected PAN supporters have shown up on election day only to be turned away because their names had mysteriously disappeared from the registration lists. • Bottles of indelible ink that are supposed to be used to mark the thumbs of departing voters have been found unopened. This meant that PRI supporters were allowed to vote repeatedly — sometimes with the bizarre result that the vote total exceeded the entire population of the community.

The drawn-out vote-counting process gives the best opportunity of all to rig an election. Opposition observers are simply ejected forcibly from the polling places by police.

PRESIDENT MIGUEL de la Madrid's vaunted "moral renovation" has been unable to curb the excesses of regional PRI bosses. Indeed, the CIA has concluded in a secret report that while de la Madrid did win the 1982 election, his majority was not what he and the PRI claimed. On the other hand, the CIA also doubts that PAN, which was officially credited with only 16 percent of the vote, got the 46 percent it claimed.

What was the actual result of the 1982 election? Our sources in Mexico say the PRI keeps two sets of books: the publicly announced official vote count and the true, unampered count (which it needs to gauge the depth of popular opposition). Figures reportedly slipped out of the high-level military office where the second set of books is kept showed that PAN had won 32 percent of the vote — an astonishing show of strength, but close to the CIA's estimate.

One of the most outrageous thefts of an election in recent years was the 1985 gubernatorial race in Sonora, where the popular mayor of Ciudad Obregon, Adalberto Rosas Lopez, seemed a good bet to win for PAN. So PRI officials simply charged him with vague crimes and convicted him. They didn't quite dare put him in jail, and finally let him run in the election. But the PRI candidate won, and PAN claimed fraud.

A real bomb The Federal Aviation Administration is studying a radical technique for detecting explosives at airports: a neutron device that would identify the molecules of non-metallic bombs that might otherwise make it past the regular screening devices. But congressional sources tell us the bomb-detector may bomb out, because it works by using radioactive particles. This means it wouldn't just ruin the film in vacationers' cameras, it might ruin the vacationers themselves. It's even possible, we're told, that the device could turn fluoride toothpaste into a radioactive substance. The FAA admits it's dangerous, but ...

Confidential file Intelligence sources warn that disorders may recur in Egypt similar to those of February, when thousands of Central Security Force conscripts pillaged luxury hotels and mansions of the wealthy. The reason is that these policemen's lot is not a happy one, and nothing has been done to improve it. Their wages rarely exceed \$8 or \$10 a month, a small sum even by Egyptian standards.

Coventry budget is cut

COVENTRY — The Town Council Monday unanimously adopted a reduced spending proposal of almost \$2 million that calls for a tax increase of 1.38 mills in the current fiscal year.

As now proposed, the \$9,172,641 budget would set the tax rate at 32.67 mills for fiscal 1986-87, which began July 1. The new spending plan represents a reduction of about \$174,000 from one that has twice met rejection at the polls.

In the new budget, about \$91,000 has been cut from general government spending and \$64,000 from the school budget. The proposal will be the subject of a town meeting July 30.

The previous budget was left intact by the council after its initial defeat in May, but was offered to townspeople again July 8 with a lower proposed tax rate because of increased revenues from the state.

The proposed increase in the tax rate was 4.78 mills in the first vote and 2.9 mills in the second. On both occasions, opponents of the spending plan had petitioned to adjourn town budget meetings to referendum.

When they met Monday in the Town Office Building, Town Council members strived to salvage as much as possible of the \$6 million in spending proposed for town schools.

The gist of the plan I'm putting forth is to minimize any cut we have to make in the Board of Education budget and Republican Councilman Phillip Bouchard said before explaining a reduction proposal that was accepted almost intact by fellow members.

BOUCHARD'S SIX-PART plan called for the \$64,000 reduction in the use of state revenue sharing funds to buy office equipment, leaving the youth services coordinator position as part time, cutting a \$47,000 contingency fund, increasing building-permit fees and dropping the tax collection rate from 97 percent to 87.5 percent. He also suggested putting about \$51,000 of Coventry's \$91,200 in state revenue sharing into a Public Works Emergency Repair Account for use as a "backstop" by the Highway Department, which sometimes with the bizarre result that the council made last week. At that time the council also decided that \$22,000 in state funds should be used for capital expenditures.

Broad support for maintaining the education budget was emphasized by about 70 residents at a public hearing last week. Prior to that hearing, the school board called a news conference to voice opposition to further cuts in the education budget, which had already been reduced by \$100,000. Further cuts could mean the schools would have to lose about six teachers and members of the support staff, drop enrichment programs and the primary mental health program and not buy athletic equipment and supplies, officials warned.

"I HOPE THE CONCERN shown by residents made the difference," Board of Education Chairwoman Judy Halvorson said after Monday's council meeting, which she attended along with four other board members.

Halvorson said some of the \$64,000 cut will come in fuel money and supply accounts. The board will review staffing to address the remaining difference of about \$25,000, she said.

Councilman Dick Hines, a Democrat, said he was angered by the education cuts. "Short-term it may help the budget, but what will it cost us in the long run?" Hines asked.

He and Republican Councilman Michael Cleary then sparred over the education budget. Cleary threatened that if the council did not agree to reductions in other areas, a deeper cut would be made in education. "No way" retorted Hines.

The new budget includes \$6,119,900 for the Board of Education, \$2,584,476 for general government spending, \$424,075 for debt service and \$44,100 for capital expenditures.

"THIS IS A compromise budget," said council Finance Committee Chairman Patrick Flaherty. "We as Democrats wanted to give people the type of budget we wanted to see. We gave them a chance at significant improvements in roads and education but it would have cost them money. They rejected it not once but twice."

Following those defeats, the Democrats struggled to keep the budget intact as Republicans called for cuts and gained strength when two Democrats — Sandra Pesce and Ken Donovan — resigned from the council. What left a 3-2 Democratic majority, four votes are needed to pass a budget.

"I'm happy," Cleary said of the meeting's outcome. He said the loss of the two Democrats helped make the budget "bipartisan."

The July 30 special town meeting at which voters will be asked to approve the new budget is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Coventry High School Auditorium.

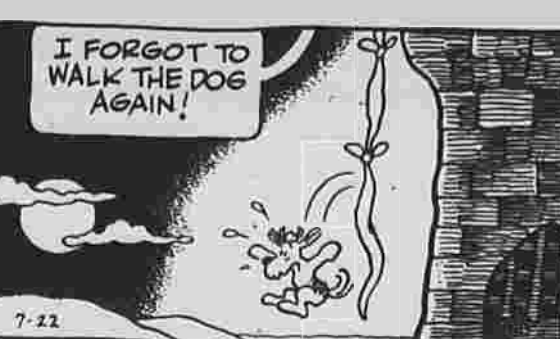

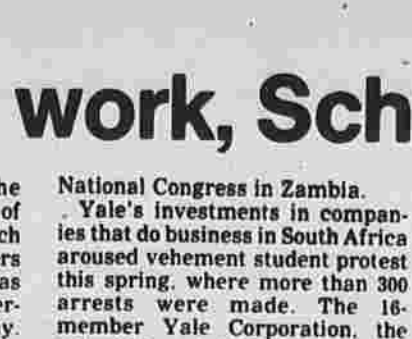

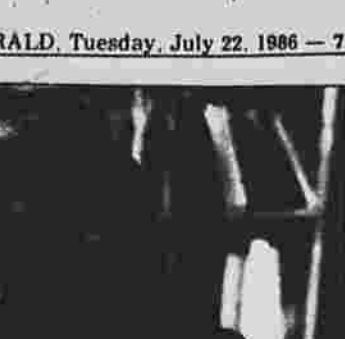

Hidden motive seen in downtown shift

The proprietor of a restaurant that might be demolished to make way for an access road off of Main Street Tuesday suggested that there may be some hidden reason town officials have recommended the road in such a way as to require removal of two buildings in the Purnell parking complex.

"The road is being bent to go through two buildings," said Joseph Sinnamon, who runs the Sinnamon Shop restaurant at Oak Street and Purnell Place. "I think there is more behind why they want to take these buildings down besides sight lines."

The original plan for the access road presented at a public hearing on the proposed \$4.8 million reconstruction of downtown Main Street was modified, according to town officials, because it presented a sight line problem at Oak Street and Purnell Place.

Joseph Sinnamon, an associate in the Fuss and O'Neill engineering firm, which is designing the road, said the only reason further study of the Purnell parking complex concerned over the sight line where the road crosses Oak Street.

Milton Ginter, engineer of municipal systems for the state Department of Transportation, said today that the department is concerned about sight lines on the access road as it was originally routed.
