# Post office gunman kills at least 15

The Associated Press EDMOND, Okla. - A part-time postal worker facing dismissal opened fire in a post office this morning, killing 14 people and wounding at least four before taking his own life, police said. The gunman, identified by police as Pat Sherrill, 44, was hired last

year and was about to be fired, said postal officials in Washington. Sherrill's body and those of 14 office and in the back parking lot of the post office after police moved into the one-story brick building about 9 a.m.





# Housing appeals board rules kitchens a must

The Housing Code Appeals Board ruled Tuesday that the owners of a Main Street apartment building must place kitchen facilities in each of the building's 14 low-income units or face being in violation of the The board's action turns aside an appeal filed by

Phyllis and Nicholas Jackston against an order from Health Director Ronald Kraatz that they place refrigerators, stoves and sinks in each of the housing Kraatz issued his order after Town Enforcement

Officer Thomas O'Marra ruled earlier this year that the building, located at 791 Main St., was a tenement. which requires kitchen facilities in each room. The Jackstons insist the building is a rooming house. which prohibits the facilities "We have dealt with this issue for many, many

months and we have heard the same arguments. aid Planning Director Mark Pellegrini, a member of the board. He said the board could grant the Jackstons. a variance to allow the building to operate without the kitchen facilities or give them an extension of time to comply with the housing code However, other than filing an appeal of Kraatz's

order, no formal request was made of the board leaving its members confused as to what exactly it was supposed to do, members said. The denial was made on a lack of grounds or cause. "The board has met on this several times and each time they (the Jackstons) come up here with

The issue now becomes a zoning matter. Kraatz said. The Jackstons' next recourse could be to either go to court or to fight O'Marra's ruling before the Zoning Board of Appeals. Kraatz said.

Kraatz and Pellegrini said. During a meeting at the Lincoln Center hearing room that became emotional at times, the Jackstons argued that the building has operated as a rooming house since the beginning of the century and should be allowed to continue. However, the Jackstons do not have a rooming house permit to prove this, town fficials have said.

The Jackstons said if the town requires them to put the facilities in they might be forced to close the building

"If you want to shut that building down tomorrow fine." Phyllis Jackston said angrily.

The Jackstons, claiming their name has been 'dragged through the mud' by some town officials called their building one of the "cleanest on Main Street" and not in violation of the housing code. They said they planned to renovate the entire building to make about 16 full apartments equipped with kitchen facilities and bathrooms. It would be a waste of money to place kitchen facilities in the existing building since the entire structure is slated for improvements, Phyllis Jackston told the board. She said the renovation would be good for the tenants, the building

"We're not going to put a penny into that building unless we get results." Phyllis Jackston said. "If we weren't serious (about the renovations), we wouldn't have hired an architect."

"It takes time to do this." Nicholas Jackston said and it involves a \$1 million project " Plans for the renovation have been shown to town officials, but they were not presented to the board Tuesday



# Labriola compares himself, GOP foes

be able to pick up the difference.

THE MAJOR PROPOSAL of his agenda, he said, is his plan to cut taxes some \$175 million. This includes cutting the state sales tax by half a cent on the dollar. lowering business and corporate taxes by half a percent, and phasing out the tax on dividends

and interest. Labriola, who also opposes a state income tax, said these cuts would help stimulate the economy. In other areas. Labriola said he would explore creating a private prison system and motor vehicle department. He also said he favors doing away with the convention system for choosing party nominees, and would instead have direct primaries for which contenders could qualify by obtaining the signatures of two percent of registered voters

Concerning his campaign against Belaga and Bozzuto. Labriola said he is confident that he will capture the same percentage of votes he did during delegate primaries earlier this year. In those contests. Labriola came out on top with just under 50 percent of

Bozzuto won the nomination at the GOP convention, but Labriola said that victory will have no effect on Republican voters in the primary

"The luster of his having won a convention is tarnished by having done so poorly in the (delegate) primaries." he said.

LABRIOLA SAID winning Fairfield County will be the key to winning the primary, and he cited his victory in the Fairfield delegate primary as evidence of his strength in the area. As for facing O'Neill in No-

vember. Labriola said he does not consider the prospect of battling an incumbent during economically prosperous times an unwinnable task. He attributed much of the state's economic success to President Reagan's policies, and said there are a number of problems in Connecticut that O'Neill has not addressed.

These include one of the highest infant mortality rates in the country, the failure of many teenagers in the state's larger cities to graduate from high school, and drug abuse. Labriola

### State wants contribution probe

HARTFORD - The Elections Enforcement Commission is being asked to determine whether Republican gubernatorial candidate Gerald Labriola illegally accepted an unreported in-kind contribution from an anti-abortion political organization. David Guay, head of campaign finance for the secretary of the state's office, sent a letter Monday to the commission stating that the Right-to-Life Political Action Committee failed to file nine financial-disclosure statements since October 1984 that were due under the law.

Margaret Torlai of Torrington, the treasurer of the PAC, said she would not comment until after speaking with Guay. The request stemmed from questions raised about a telegram the group sent on the candidate's behalf during the Republican caucus in Fairfield in March. The telegram provided a telephone number people could use to ask for a ride to the polls during the Fairfield delegate caucus on April 1.

The cost of the telegram never was listed as an in-kind contribution on the Labriola campaign's financial-disclosure

### Man convicted in false-alarm deaths

BRISTOL - Dennis B. Gauthier of Bristol faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine after a jury convicted him of turning in a false alarm that led to the deaths of two 14-year-old girls.

Gauthier, 57, was charged with falsely reporting an emergency that led to injury or death in the Aug. 14, 1985, collision between a fire truck and a car. The accident killed Jodi Kuharski and Julie Labadia, both of Bristol, who were passengers in the car. Gauthier displayed no emotion Tuesday when jury foreman Richard Jones read the one-word verdict following a trial that lasted six days a delinerations lasting an hour and 15 minutes over two days. Prosecutors said they would seek the maximum when Gauthier is sentenced Sept. 4.

# Towns face shortage of schools

HARTFORD - Increasing enrollment caused by a "baby boomlet" is prompting some Connecticut communities which had shut down school buildings in the 1970s to consider puttin up

A federal official says that throughout the country, the school enrollment is on the rise because of the new baby boom that began about a decade ago.

"Right now, we have the baby boom generation having their own families, the boom that started right after World War II and extended into the early 1960s," said Vance Grant, specialist in education statistics for the federal Department of Education in Washington, D.C.

Although enrollments are not expected to be as large as they were in the 1960s, the pressure is being felt throughout Connecticut, where 286 schools were closed in 82 towns between

NEW HAVEN - A federal judge says the state may not resume indiscriminate searches of all people at Ku Klux Klan rallies despite arguments that a Klan meeting sat for Labor Day weekend needs special attention.

U.S. District Judge Jose Ca-branes Tuesday denied the state's request that he delay enforcing his June 30 ruling that the mass pat-down searches violated the white-supremacist group's Fourth Amendment protection from unreasonable search and seizure.

The judge also denied the state's request to let police use metal detectors to search all rally participants for weapons. He said those types of searches were also unconstitutional when conducted on an indiscriminate basis at a

# Don't close the schools; change them

The nation's public schools have come under increasing criticism lately - with good reason.

Students who can barely read or write are graduating from some schools, teachers with questionable skills are being allowed to instruct classes and violence has become a routine part of the day in some schools.

The problems have prompted suggestions for reform that include providing greater discipline in public schools, requiring students and teachers to take competency tests, and providing parents with vouchers to be used toward tuition if they choose to send their children to private schools. The suggestions have some merit.

. But Secretary of Education William J. Bennett went too far this week when he suggested that schools should be treated like any other business in America - if they don't do their jobs. they should be shut down, he

"We must have greater accountability in the schools." Bennett told delegates to the White House Conference on Small Business. ."You know that if your product isn't good, if your services aren't good, you're going to go out of business. We need something more like that in education.

Unfortunately, the choices available to consumers who don't like a given product are not always available to parents "shopping" for a school for their children.

Parents are limited by where they live. how much they can pay for private schools and cultural considerations

Bennett's suggestion, if it takes root, is likely to lead to the closing of schools in inner cities and poor areas - traditionally those with the fewest resources and the highest rates of failure.

Students who fail to learn must also bear part of the blame in most instances, and once schools are closed, the unmotivated students are more likely to give up on education entirely than to go searching for better public or private schools

For better or worse, finding a good school is not as easy as selecting a new car or a

Students and parents who feel public schools are not doing their jobs should work to change schools from within - not further limit the available choices.

# Abolish S&Ls, says nominee for S&L panel

What normally would be an obscure presidential appointment to one of the sleepiest agencies in town has aroused heated objections from influential senators and revived internal policy pattles within the Reagan administration. And that, mind you, is before the nomination has

even been decided on. The man who proved capable of stirring Washington out of its August doldrums is George Benston, a professor at the University of Rochester who is the leading candidate for appointment to the three-member Federal Home Loan Bank Board What makes Benston's likely nomination more than a big yawn is that he is an articulate advocate of abolishing the savings and loan industry - and the bank board, which regulates it. ment concerning the upkeep of

It's not just a fight between moneylenders that has no effect on the public. The nation's 3.300 "thrifts" provide most of the mortgage loans to American homeowners. If they vanish from the scene, some economists doubt that the commercial banks would do the necessary lending, especially during lean years in the

housing market. According to what he has said and written. Benston disputes the need for S&Ls, and thus the federal regulatory agency set up to supervise them. He has suggested that banking regulations cause failures instead of preventing them. He has also urged repeal of some financial anti-discrimination laws, which he feels are unnecessary.

THE S&Ls, with their millions of depositors, have considerable grass-roots clout in Congress. Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan.. recently wrote to Senate Banking Committee Chairman Jake Garn. K-Utah. who would preside at Benston's confirmation hearing. Dole noted that his state's thrift executives are "vehemently and unanimously" opposed to Benston's appointment. In the letter, seen by our associate Michael Binstein. Dole said.

"I am sure you are quite familiar with the views held by Professor Benston regarding the future of the S&L industry. Suffice it to say that the Kansas S&L League is of the belief that his policy beliefs. if fully implemented, would result in the demise of the S&L industry as we know it. It is suggested to me that Professor Benston has expressed considerable doubt as to the viability and

necessity of (thrifts) in this country. Garn reportedly voiced his doubts about the expected Benston nomination at a recent meeting with White House Chief of Staff Donald Regan. In addition, one source told us that Sen. Alfonse D'Amato. R-N.Y., has quietly passed the word to the White House to kill his constituent's

THE FIGHT OVER BENSTON is another skirmish in the trillion-dollar turf war being waged behind the scenes in the administration over whether the S&Ls should remain separate or be swallowed by the commercial banking

Beryl Sprinkel, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, is the chief advocate of letting the thrifts merge or fail their way out of existence. But as a former commercial banker. his views are suspect by S&L defenders.

Of all Benston's controversial views on the S&L industry, perhaps none is so radical as his assertion that there's no casual link between thrift failures and the industry's sometimes harebrained investments in project like fast-food restaurants and sperm banks for Arabian horses. The Federal Home Loan Bank Board put a ceiling on such direct investments by S&Ls.

But that regulation expires at the end of this year. A new bank board with Benston as a member could let it die, triggering a wave of speculative ventures by high-rolling thrifts.



# State Library Board votes to fire director of museum

HARTFORD - Connecticut State Museum Director David O. White faces dismissal proceedings for allegedly trading away priceless guns from the museum's Colt ollection of firearms

The State Library Board agreed Tuesday during a 40-minute executive session to begin the Interim State Librarian Suzanne

LeBarron, who has the power to fire White, said a hearing would be held in two weeks to give White, his lawyer and his union a chance to argue his case. "His dismissal is under consid-

eration." she said, stressing that he has not been fired. She said she told White on Monday of her decision to begin termination proceedings White, a Tolland resident who

has been museum director since 1973, is on an unpaid leave of absence, which began Aug. 8 after the state police issued a report on

its investigation of White's activities over the last several years. White maintains that the trades he made were for guns and other items of comparable value, but the state police concluded that he had never received board approval for most of the trades, as required by state law

"One-of-a-kind, historical treasures having no duplicate in the entire world, much less the state library, have been traded into the private sector and sold for profit. a state police report to the governor stated

Board Chairman Richard C. Lee said the guns that were traded away could be worth as much as

### Pakistani opposition leaders charged

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan - Police charged four opposition leaders with murder in Lahore, and rioting broke out in southern Pakistan today as anti-government forces pressed their drive to oust President Gen. Mohammad Zia ul-Haq.

In Khairpur, in southern Sind province, about 1,500 protest marchers today tried to attack a railway station but were met by police firing tear gas and charging with batons, witnesses said. There were also clashes in the southern city of Karachi, where an estimated 200 youths hurled rocks at buses and attacked a gas

station before being dispersed by police, witnesses said. Twenty-six people have been confirmed killed in battles across Pakistan stemming from opposition leaders' defiance of a ban on protests and the arrest of hundreds of activists.

### Shooting breaks out along border

SEOUL, South Korea - North Korean soldiers started a 5-minute outbreak of shooting along the demilitarized zone that divides North Korea from South Korea, U.N. officials said today. No casualties were reported.

However, North Korea's official Radio Pyongyang said the incident Tuesday began when South Korean soldiers fired more than 300 machine gun rounds at a North Korean guard post. The broadcast was monitored in Tokyo.

It was the second time this month that North Korea fired across the demilitarized zone, prompting a return of fire, according to the U.N. Command.

The U.N. Command said shooting began at 7:40 p.m. Tuesday when 30 to 40 machine gun rounds were directed at a command observation post on the southern bank of the Imjin River near the Han River estuary. The area is about 30 miles northwest of Seoul. The command said South Korean soldiers at the observation post "returned defensive fire" and soldiers at a nearby U.N. Command guardpost used a loudspeaker to call on the North Koreans to end their firing.

### Iranians exchange explosion blame

LONDON - The Iranian Embassy and opponents of Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini today accused each other of responsibility for an explosion at an Iranian-owned newsstand and video shop in which one man died and 12 people were injured. Scotland Yard said the blast Tuesday could have been caused by a bomb and that the inquiry was being turned over to the anti-terrorist squad. Police initially believed the explosion might have been caused by gas.

Anti-Khomeini exiles said the Iranian Embassy had threatened the store's owner, whom they identified as Razi Faezaley, an actor who has made several videotapes against Khomeini's government and shipped them to Iran. The friends, who spoke in radio and television interviews

without being identified, said Faezaley's 22-year-old son died in The Iranian Embassy blamed the blast on a group opposed to Khomeini, maintaining the group planned to attack the Iranian Consulate but failed.

### Star Wars may require agreement

LIVERMORE, Calif. - Scientists designing Star Wars say it may be impossible to orbit the weapons until a detailed arms agreement with the Soviet Union is hammered out. Space-based weapons can be extremely vulnerable to attack, especially at the moment they are put into orbit, said Robert Perret, chief of a unit at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory which is assigned to examine and test weapons

"In a historical perspective, the Soviets have demonstrated the national will to oppose in an active and violent way actions which they find threatening, if they can," said Perret, citing the Russian destruction of a civilian Korean airliner in 1983 and the downing of an U.S. U-2 spy plane flown by Gary Powers in 1960.

### Missile silo leak forces evacuation

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. - A leak of a caustic rocket fuel omponent that forced the evacuation of six households near missile silo is being investigated by the Air Force. "We know what happened, but I'm not sure we know how i

happened," Air Force spokesman Capt. James Smith said. Two gallons of a chemical known as nitrogen tetroxide leaked Tuesday night from a Titan II missile silo near Saint Vincent that was being dismantled. The silo is about 60 miles northwest of

# Americans' income rises .5% in July

WASHINGTON - Americans' personal incomes rose 0.5 percent in July, the biggest increase in three months, but consumer spending rose only modestly, the government reported today. The Commerce Department said that the rise in personal incomes

followed a tiny 0.1 percent June increase and a 0.1 percent May decline. It was the strongest gain since a 1.3 percent advance in

Personal consumption spending.

which includes virtually all consumer payments except interest on debt, rose just 0.2 percent in July following strong gains of 1 percent in June and 0.8 percent in May. The slowdown in spending likely

reflected the weak income gains of the last two months. Analysts have been worried that consumers, who have provided the driving force behind the recovery, would start cutting back because of weak income growth and growing debt

The 0.2 percent July rise in consumption spending reflected

July. This held back purchases of durable goods - items, such as cars, expected to last three or small annual rate of \$1.9 billion in

Purchases of nondurable goods increased \$100 million last month while purchases of services, which includes housing costs, rose at a rate of \$8.6 billion. The big increase in income was affected by a large increase in retroactive Social Security benefit payments, which boosted the July

Vegetables can be cooked to fit your personal taste: al dente, tender or soft. Keep these hints in mind when microwaving fresh vegetables.

· Cooking time: Time depends on quantity, piece size and type of vegetable being prepared. Check your user's manual for specific instructions.

· Piece size: Cut vegetables in uniform pieces for more even cooking in the microwave. Large or thick pieces take longer to cook than small ones.

 Quantity: As the quantity or volume of food increases, so does cooking time. Arrange: Vegetables not uniform in shape should be arranged with the firm, meaty parts, such as stalks, to the outer edge and tender parts (asparagus buds and broccoli flowerets) to the center of the dish.

 Whole Unpeeled Vegetables: Pierce vegetables like potatoes or squash to let steam escape.

· Dishes: Do not use metal or dishes decorated with metal in the microwave. Most glass, plastic and some ceramic dishes are microwave safe. Some products, like cheese spread, come in their own glass jar that can be used in the microwave. Keep in mind, though, that heat may transfer from the heated food to the container, so remember to use a hot pad. Some foods will not need dishes if they're microwaved in their own skins or natural "container" (except corn on the cob and acorn squash)

· Liquid: Tomatoes, onions and baking potatoes have a high moisture content and require no additional water for cooking. Broccoli, cauliflower and carrots require up to ¼ cup water per 2 to 2½ cups vegetables; green beans require more-about 1/2 cup water per 2 cups of beans. · Cover: To prevent drying, spattering and promote even heating, cover vege-

Stir: By stirring from the outer edge of the dish toward the center, the heat will

be more uniform. Stir vegetables once or twice during cooking time. Salt: Sprinkling salt directly on vegetables causes brown "freckles." For best results, salt vegetables after cooking or dissolve salt in a small amount of cooking liquid before adding vegetables.

• Standing Time: After removing vegetables from the microwave, let dish stand covered for several minutes to equalize the temperature. Serve: Check to make sure dish isn't hot to the touch. Drain any excess liquid from vegetables before topping them with hot
