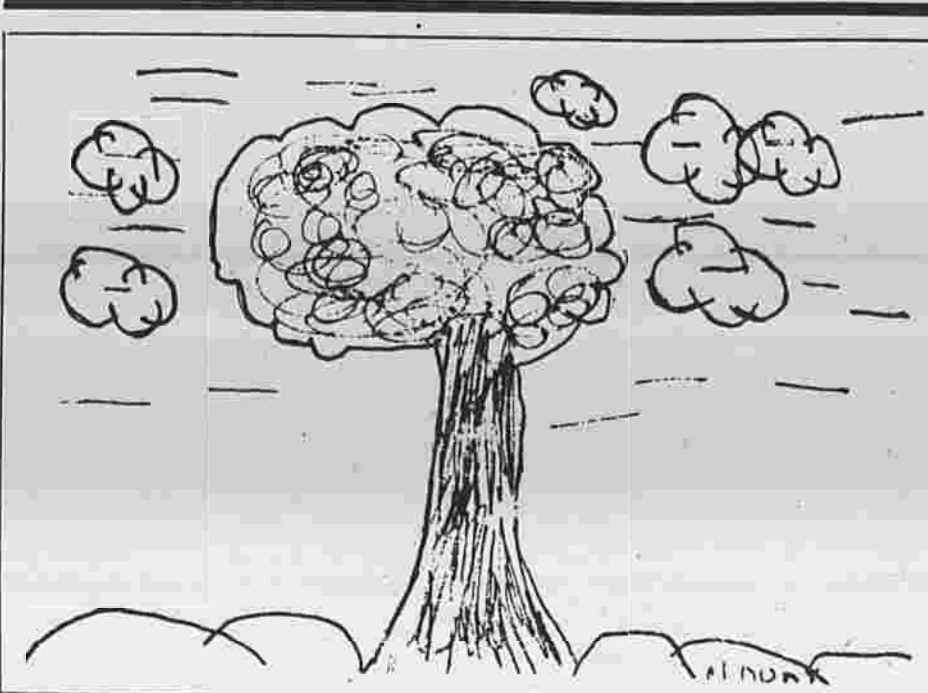
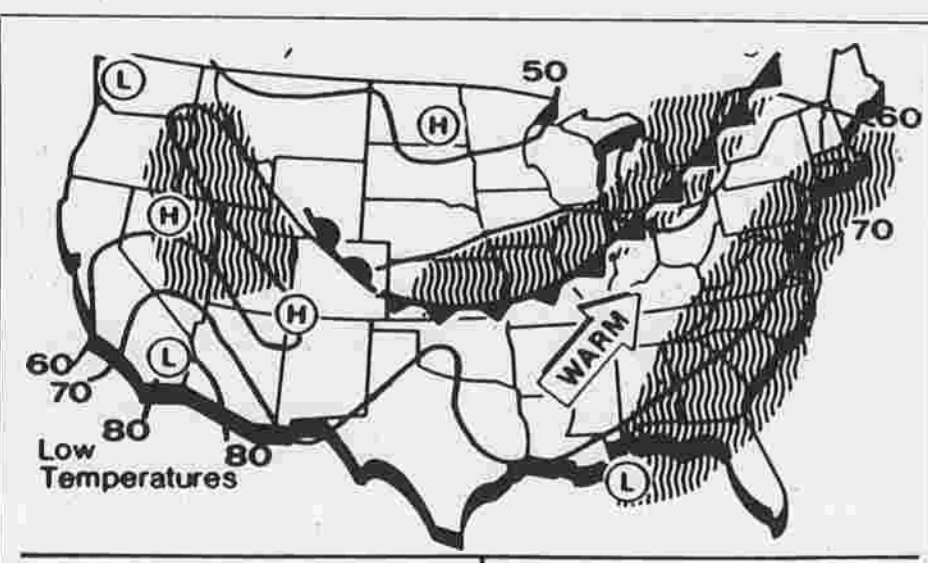

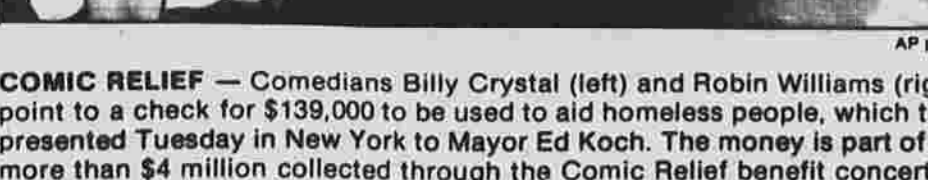
Andrew Lee Skaggs, 7, was shot in the face Sunday as he rode with his mother on an interstate in Virginia. A truck driver has been charged in what authorities said began as a minor traffic incident.

In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed an anti-poverty measure totaling nearly \$1 billion. In 1975, a Soviet-built Czechoslovakian airliner crashed while trying to land in Damascus, Syria, killing almost all of the 128 people aboard.

...be able to pick up the difference. ...The MAJOR PROPOSAL of his agenda, he said, is his plan to cut taxes some \$175 million. This includes cutting the state sales tax by half a cent on the dollar, lowering business and corporate taxes by half a percent and phasing out the tax on dividends and interest.

Bozzuto won the nomination at the GOP convention, but Labriola said that victory will have no effect on Republican voters in the primary. "The luster of his having won a convention is tarnished by having done so poorly in the (delegate) primaries," he said.

LABRIOLA SAID winning Fairfield County will be the key to winning the primary, and he cited his victory in the Fairfield delegate primary as evidence of his strength in the area.

As for facing O'Neill in November, Labriola said he does not consider the prospect of battling an incumbent during economically prosperous times an unwinnable task. He attributed much of the state's economic success to President Reagan's policies, and said there are a number of problems in Connecticut that O'Neill has not addressed.

These include one of the highest infant mortality rates in the country, the failure of many teenagers to graduate from high school, and drug abuse, Labriola said.

Labriola is hoping that voters will give the go-ahead to apply his cures for the state's woes.

Labriola offers east-of-river agenda

Republican gubernatorial candidate Gerald Labriola of Naugatuck said Tuesday he is often criticized for telling residents in various parts of the state one thing, while telling others something else. This charge is not true, he said during an interview with reporters and editors of the Manchester Herald. However, he added that while campaigning, he does try and focus on the concerns of the people who he is speaking to.

Labriola, a pediatrician and former chief of staff at Waterbury Hospital, said there is no neo-natal intensive care unit east of the Connecticut River. As governor, he said he would work with the private sector to change this. He also said he supports construction of the proposed Route 6 highway, which would stretch from Bolton Notch to Windham.

Labriola agreed "Highways that head to nowhere have no meaning," he said, referring to Interstate 284, which ends in Bolton Notch. The former state senator said it was also important to diversify the state's economy. He noted that while defense contractors in some parts of the state have helped keep the overall unemployment rate down, other areas have not fared as well.

Labriola also emphasized promoting tourism in eastern Connecticut as a way of providing jobs. To do this, he outlined a four-point environmental protection plan that includes protecting ground water, parks, recreation and historic sites.

Connecticut In Brief

State wants contribution probe

HARTFORD — The Elections Enforcement Commission is being asked to determine whether Republican gubernatorial candidate Gerald Labriola illegally accepted an unreported in-kind contribution from an anti-abortion political organization.

Margaret Torral of Torrington, the treasurer of the PAC, said she would not comment until after speaking with Guay. The request stemmed from questions raised about a telegram the group sent on the candidate's behalf during the Republican caucus in Fairfield in March.

Man convicted in false-alarm deaths

BRISTOL — Dennis B. Gauthier of Bristol faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine after a jury convicted him of turning in a false alarm that led to the deaths of two 14-year-old girls.

Gauthier, 57, was charged with falsely reporting an emergency that led to injury or death in the Aug. 14, 1985, collision between a fire truck and a car. The accident killed Jodi Kuharski and Julie Labadia, both of Bristol, who were passengers in the car.

Towns face shortage of schools

HARTFORD — Increasing enrollment caused by a "baby boomlet" is prompting some Connecticut communities which had shut down school buildings in the 1970s to consider putting up new ones.

A federal official says that throughout the country, the school enrollment is on the rise because of the new baby boom that began about a decade ago. "Right now, we have the baby boom generation having their own families, the boom that started right after World War II and extended into the early 1960s," said Vance Grant, specialist in education statistics for the federal Department of Education in Washington, D.C.

More towns may join trash project

HARTFORD — The Connecticut Resources Recovery Authority has opened the door for 12 additional towns to join the Mid-Connecticut Project, a trash-to-energy plant.

The CRRRA action Tuesday raised to 45 the number of towns eligible to use the plant. The new towns are Beacon Falls, Beethlembeth, Litchfield, Middlebury, Naugatuck, North Branford, Oxford, Prospect, Southbury, Thomaston, Waterbury and Woodbury.

Judge refuses to delay Klan ruling

NEW HAVEN — A federal judge says the state may not resume indiscriminate searches of all people at Ku Klux Klan rallies despite arguments that a Klan meeting sat for Labor Day weekend needs special attention.

U.S. District Judge Jose Cabranes Tuesday denied the state's request that he delay enforcing his June 30 ruling that the mass pat-down searches violated the First Amendment protection from unreasonable search and seizure.

The judge also denied the state's request to let police use metal detectors to search all rally participants for weapons. He said those types of searches were also unconstitutional when conducted on an indiscriminate basis at a public rally.

States want big lottery

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Officials from 10 states and the District of Columbia agreed Tuesday to work toward a multistate lottery that could produce multimillion-dollar weekly payoffs.

Two other states hope to be included, but officials from those states need to pursue the idea further with lawmakers at home, said Peter J. O'Connell, a spokesman for the group.

enforcement techniques available to police can substantially guarantee public safety at the rallies. Cabranes' decision allows police to search individuals whom they reasonably suspect of carrying weapons. It also leaves police free to separate the Klan from its opponents at the rallies.

State police spokesman Lt. Edw. Dalley said Cabranes' decision means state police will be unable to guarantee anyone's safety at the rally. "We could do it in the past because we knew no one was armed," Dalley said.

Cabranes announced his decision from the bench after a four-hour hearing that centered on a KKK rally planned for Aug. 30 and 31 on the property of Edwin Thrall in East Windsor.

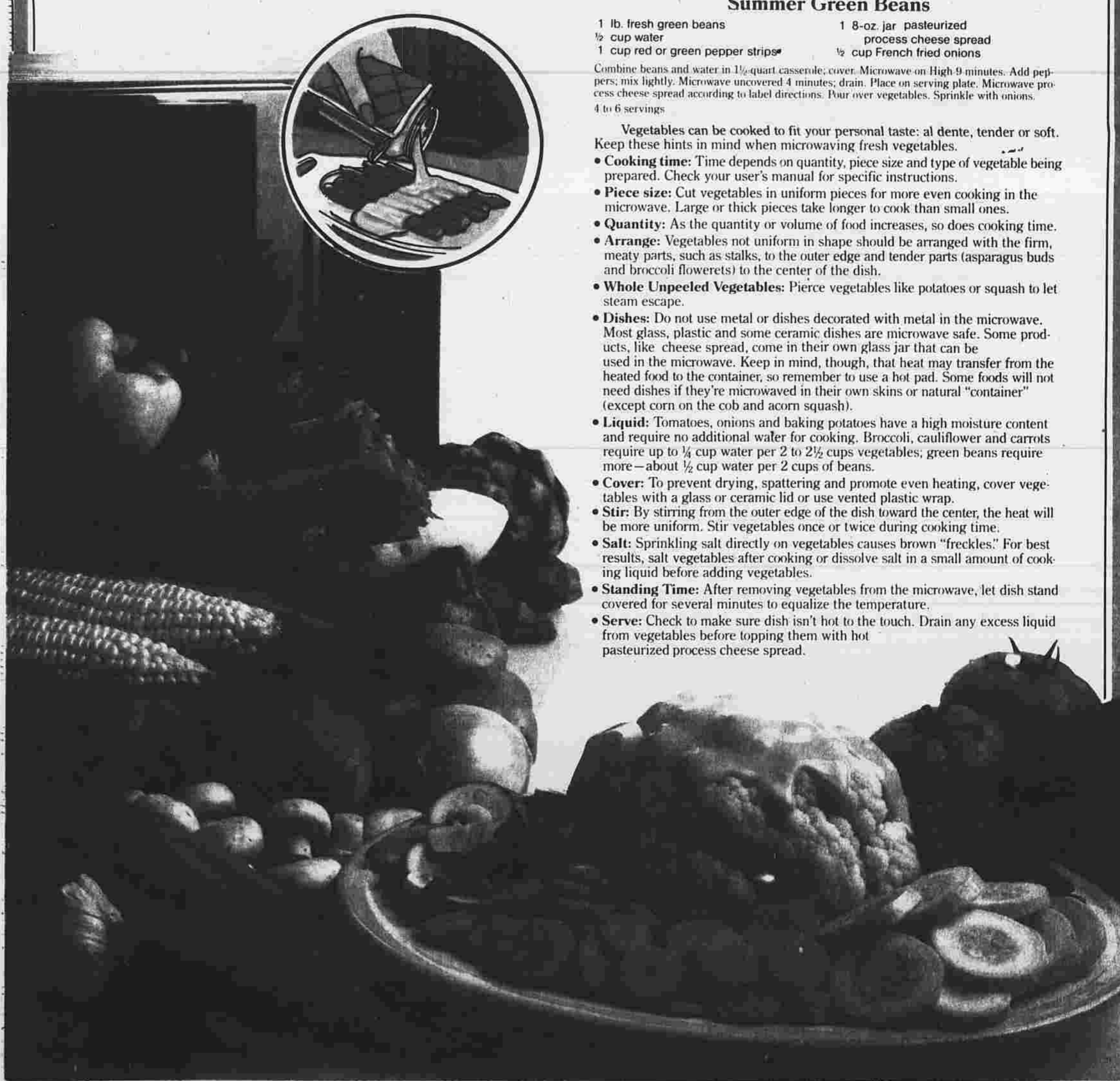

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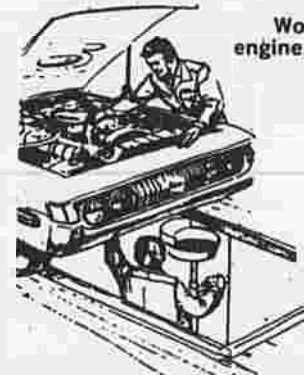

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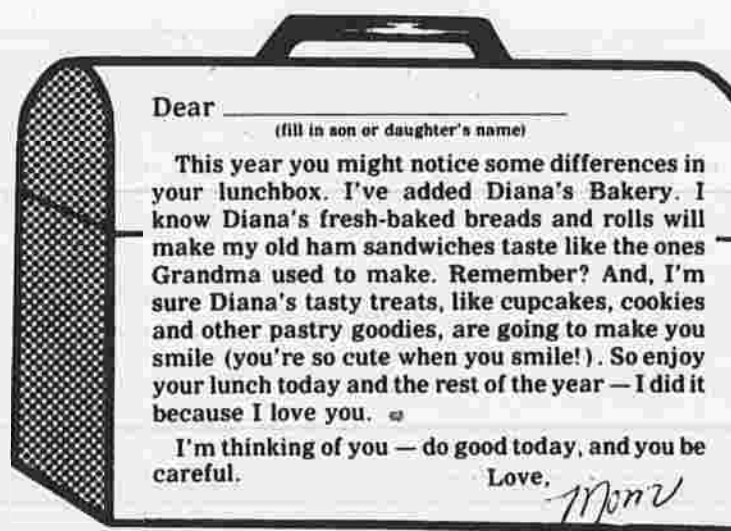
