Reagan condemns incident

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. President Reagan declared Friday that no punishment is too severe for the "despicable and cowardly" seizure of a Pan Am jumbo jet in Pakistan. But his chief spokesman said the United States has been unable to link the captured captors to any specific group or

Larry Speakes read a statement on behalf of the president a few hours after the incident ended when the Arab gunmen opened fire on hostages that had been held in the plane nearly 17 hours.

Reports from the scene through out the day had indicated there were four assailants, but a State Department official suggested there were five - two dead and three captured when Pakistani officials stormed the plane. Speakes said Reagan had been kept apprised of the unfolding incident Thursday night and Fr day and had made several decisions. The spokesman declined to be specific, but the administration ordered an aircraft carrier to sea and, according to sources, dispatched a team of FBI agents to







Suit shows prudence of sewer vote

Although it's too early to foresee the impact of the lawsuit brought against the town Tuesday by the Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection. the action stands as proof that Manchester voters were prudent last year in authorizing bonding for work at the sewage treatment plant on Olcott Street

When the proposal to spend \$14.3 million in local funds was first announced, it was met with a great deal of skepticism. Some townspeople questioned the need for the improvements, while others argued that the agencies mandating better treatment by the end of 1988 would never seek enforcement in

The suit filed Tuesday appears to be one more indication that supporters of the bonding plan were on the right track technically as well as environmentally. Earlier signs have been the approval of \$12 million in state grants to pay for the remainder of the project, recent development trends in town and instances elsewhere in which federal and state authorities have sued to enforce provisions of the Clean Water Act.

Even if the defendant is Manchester, those responsible for pollution control are right to bring legal weight to bear when regulations are ignored and pollution limits violated Locally, the end result will be a cleaner Hockanum River: nationally, it will be countless rivers and streams fit for swimming and fishing.

In this particular case, there may be an

Some observers have speculated that the DEP suit was in part an attempt to stave off action by the Manchester Environmental Coalition. But thus far, there is no evidence to support that contention. And even if the intent is there, it will probably be thwarted. since the coalition is leaning toward entering the proceeding to make sure its own concerns are pursued

At the moment, the lawsuit is not a matter for great financial concern. The most that's at stake is \$10,000 for each of eight instances in which the town is said to have violated its sewer discharge permit

That may change if the environmental coalition joins the action seeking to force a moratorium on major hookups to the system. something that might temporarily block developments such as the Mall at Buckland

Only time will tell on that score, however. and preliminary indications are that the suit will merely teach Manchester that it needs to be a bit more careful. Officials admit to breaking an earlier agreement between the town, the environmental group and the DEP and do not deny the alleged violations, though they cite mitigating circumstances.

Whatever the ultimate impact of the suit, it is clear from the state's release of the grant funds and the DEP's willingness to seek enforcement in court that Manchester would have been the loser had the warnings been ignored in the referendum last year.

moving into the lucrative drug trade According to confidential Justice Department eports seen by our associate Donald Goldberg. the Yakuza gangs have been dealing in methamphetamines, or "speed," the drug of choice in Japan, and recently have been moving out of their home territory to the fertile U.S.

Addiction to methamphetamines has been a problem in Japan since World War II, when kamikaze pilots used the stimulant to fortify themselves for their suicide missions against the U.S. Navy in the (inal battles of the war. The use of "speed" tapered off in postwar Japan, only to begin rising in the 1970s. It has been increasing ever since. Though official estimates claim there are only 320,000 "stimulant abusers" in Japan today, unofficial sources place the figure

"JAPAN IS A USER NATION," one Justice Department report states "The major sources of (methamphetamines) are the Republic of (South) Korea and Taiwan, with a lesser amount

smuggled in from Hong Kong Profits from methamphetamine trafficking are the main source of income for organized crime groups in Japan Drugs, as the single most important component of organized crime's income in Japan, are what pose the greatest threat to the United States

Law enforcement agencies have been aware since the early 1970s that Japanese criminal gangs were expanding into Hawaii, the West Coast and the Pacific Trust Territories, which are particularly attractive because of the large

nber of Japanese residents and tourists. "The Japanese tourists who visit the area(s) expect to be provided with gambling facilities. prostitutes, massage parlors and pornographic shows," another Justice Department report explains. "In order to meet these expectations. Japanese organized crime groups have invested in hotels, bars, restaurants, night clubs, theaters, tourist agencies and similar businesses.

THE REPORT ALSO PREDICTED that Yakuza members would be import methamphetamines into the United States, taking advantage of the price differential. Asian-produced "speed" costs about \$10,000 less per kilogram than the stuff made in this country. South Korea is a major exporter of methamphetamines Clandestine laboratories manufacutre it from ephedrine smuggled in by sea from Thailand. Singapore. Hong Kong. France and Germany

"Although some of the methamphetamine is consumed domestically, about 90 percent is meant for export by ship to the illicit Japanese market." a Justice Department report notes

Sloppy bookkeeping

Many inmates of federal pens would tell you they're only there because of oversights or errors by their accountants: the public has a right to expect better performance by prison

Yet General Accounting Office auditors found that Federal Prisons Industries Inc., the government corporation that operates inmate workshops in 41 facilities, kept its books as sloppily as a teenager with his first checking

For example, FPI's books showed it spent \$1.766,821 on administrative expenses last fiscal year - well below the statutory limit of \$2,074,000. But the GAO auditors discovered that "certain costs totaling \$852.057 were moved" from one account to another, "resulting in those costs not being considered by FPI as subject to the statutory limitation.

The auditors pointed out that "if all the re-allocated costs remained in the administrative expense account, corporate administrative expense would have totaled \$2.618,878, thus exceeding the limitation by \$544,878."

Furthermore, the corporation didn't bother to balance its monthly cash account with the Treasury, as required in its own guidelines Result: FPI thought it had \$471.887 more in its eash account at year's end than the Treasury thought it had. The corporation refused to explain. airily informing the auditors that it would resolve the discrepancy when its staff had more itme to unravel the mystery.

Those who were critical of the U.S. involvement in Vietnam and who applied its lessons to other areas were accused by the neo-conservatives of perpetuating a "Vietnam syndrome,' which tied the hands of U.S. policy-makers and military leaders

Unemployment down to 6.8 percent

WASHINGTON - Unemployment dropped a slight 0.1 percent to 6.8 percent in August as a six-month slide in manufacturing jobs ended, the government reported Friday in what was halfed as the first sign that the long-awaited upturn in the U.S. economy

The economy created between 240,600 and 273,600 new jobs last month, raising the proportion of Americans at work to an all-time high of 60.9 percent and reducing unemployment rolls by 163,000,

the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported A total of 8,027,000 people were still looking for jobs without success in August. But that is half a million fewer jobless than just three months earlier, when the unemployment rate stood at 7.3 percent, the highest it had been since the summer of 1985.

The government said 20 people were killed by police in Aug. 26-27 rioting, while residents claimed the death toll was 24. Police and soldiers watched as families buried their dead

Friday. Residents said that "the comrades," gangs of young men who violently enforced a Soweto-wide work stoppage on Thursday, attended some of the funerals.

Two hijackers who survived the shootout on a Pan Am jet in Karachi, Pakistan, tried to blend in with the crowd after fleeing the plane. But passengers pointed them out to authorities, the wife of in American survivor said Priday.

"They (hijackers) were almost murdered on the spot," Sue Melhart, of Pullman, Wash., said her husband. Dick, told her in a telephone call after the siege of terror ended. Two hijackers were killed, along with at least 16 passengers. More than 100 pasengers were wounded.

Melhart, a former University of Idaho and Washington State University athletic trainer, told his wife he survived by kicking open a door and leading other passengers to safety

"When the generator on the plane failed and the lights went out the terrorists panicked." she said "They had everybody huddle in the middle of the plane and started shooting them with machine guns.

"Dick had positioned himself by a door over the wing of the plane. A bullet went over his head. He waited for the first volley to finish. and he knew that was an opportur ity. He kicked open the door."

Mrs. Melhart said her husband climbed out to the wing and leaped to an escape hatch. Other passengers, seeing the successful jump, followed. "At that point the terrorists

realized everything was over and threw down their guns. They started running with the other passengers." Sue Melhart said. Her husband told her that he and the other passengers raced 500 feet to safety, then assisted authorities in identifying two hijackers who had tried to blend in with the Melhart, 45, had been in Pakis-



Pay equity accord set for clerks

NEW HAVEN - About 7,006 state clerical workers will vote next week on an agreement that represents the "first step" in reaching equity in pay between the sexes in thousands of state jobs, a union official said Friday.

The agreement, which is not an overall labor contract, calls for an upgrading of, and raises for, about 6,000 clerical workers, said Michael Ferrucci Jr., chief negotiator for Council 4 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal

The plan would cost the state about \$4 million in its first year, and represents an ongoing expense as the workers moved into higher pay scales, said Dawn Closs, who was the chief negotiator

"We feel it's a fair settlement," said Closs, who is a labo relations specialist with the state Department of Administrative

New Haven homeless plan tent city

NEW HAVEN - Homeless families in the city plan to pitch tents on the New Haven Green Sunday to call attention to the lack of moderate-income housing.

Some families and social activists who are trying to help them will live in the tent city for at least a week, said the Rev. Karl R. Hilgert, executive director of Christrian Community Action. The tents will help "in terms of dramatizing the immediacy and the emergency nature of the problem," Hilgert said Friday. He said the group has obtained a permit to pitch the tents on the

About 100 homeless families in the area are being put up by the state and city governments in motels designated for emergency housing, Hilgert said. Some of the families have been in the motels for months, costing the government thousands of dollars

Yale grads urged to withhold aid

NEW HAVEN - A Connecticut congressman Friday encouraged Yale University alumni to withhold their contributions in an attempt to convince the Ivy League school to divest from its South Africa-related stocks.

U.S. Rep. Bruce Morrison, D-Conn., called on Yale graduates to funnel their contributions through a new escrow account that will hold the money until the school' divestment policy is change or South Africa reforms its apartheid government. "Divestment is the right answer," Morrison said at a news

conference called to promote the fund. The university should put its "full economic and moral weight" on the side of majority rule in South Africa, he added. Morrison is one of 12 school alumni named to the board that will control the Yale Endowment for Divestment, which is not

officially connected to the university. Its organizers say the fund is a way for Yale's alumni to indicate whether they believe the school should sell its estimated \$400 million in stocks in companies that do business in South Africa.

La grande dame of Caprilands rules the roots

COVENTRY - She's not a stand-up comic. She certainly does not consider herself an entertainer. At least not

But seven days a week. Adelma Grenier Simmons has her audiences chuckling. Dressed in a voluminous jumper and matching cape, she stands in a darkened barn as she tells stories about insects which commit suicide and gardens where rocks grow more readily than plants. She talks about the Roman goddess, Ceres, the wonders of marigolds, and the day the Army asked her to ship three tons of dried artemesia.

Not exactly the subjects you'd hear in a Johnny Carson monologue or on "Saturday Night Live." But for 35 years, tourists and gardening enthusiasts have flocked to Caprilands Herb Farm on Silver Street for the privilege of hearing just

They come from Australia and France, England and Canada. They come from Maine and New Hampshire, New Britain and Litchfield. In all, 27,000 people visit each year, roaming through acres of gardens and admiring unusual plants with names such as purple none-so-pretty and dame's

Promptly at 12: 30 p.m., they convene in the barn - or the greenhouse, once the weather turns cold — to sit on uncomfortable benches and chairs. Above their heads. bunches of silver and magenta herbs dry on rafters.

They come to listen to the grande dame of Caprilands expounding on the proper way to grow basil and poking not-so-gentle fun at foolish gardeners who spend August ruing the many purchases made in the enthusiasm of April.

They come to get advice on lanning a garden, cooking with

herbs and making wreaths and potpourri, teas and purges. fossed in with the lessons — a dash here, a sprinkle there - is a well-crafted sales pitch for the 33 books which Simmons has published in the past two

John Pelrine, the producer of a public television program called "The Victory Garden." summed it up when he filmed a

program at Caprilands in June "This is truly one of the loveliest spots we've ever filmed." he said. "The plantings are spectacular. But all of that is secondary She's the attraction here, not the gardens. That's quite clear. Adelma is - well a happening. People come to experience her

The first thing that strikes the visitor about this "happening" s her clothing. Her signature fashion statement includes black canvas sneakers and an A-line jumper with matching cape and cap

One day the outfit is green wool tweed, worn with a green-print blouse and accented with two strands of large amber beads. Another day she's in rosy cotton lined with a floral print. and deep-green malachite beads the size of cherry tomatoes. When she points toward plants in her garden, the thick bangle bracelets on her wrist click

'I design my own outfits. They're designed so that I can strip." she says. She pauses to see if her slightly naughty statement has had the desired effect upon the listener.

"I like to get out into the kardens in the morning when it's still cool. When it gets a little warmer. I take off my cape. Then if it gets really hot. I can unbutton my blouse and slide it out from inside my jumper. And I'm standing there in a

Each outfit is reversible because, says Simmons, she was once caught in Rome for four days while her luggage took a tour of England. "I was wearing a reversible suit that time, and I guess I wore it every way except upside down. It was terrific. I could look like I was wearing different clothes each day. So that's when I decided I'd wear nothing but reversible clothes for the rest of my life."

mistress of a 50-acre farm. But this is a most unusual farm. How many working farms have been featured in full-color spreads in National Geographic, Bon Appetit. Gourmet and Cuisine magazines? How many working farms have been featured in two Time-Life reference books and

A visitor can appreciate the photographers' fascination with the gardens. On a misty summer morning at Caprilands, a translucent silver-gray cloud lifts from the plants, which consist of 350 varieties at last count. Pink dianthus, golden calendula, enormous bushes of lavender and many more, raise brave colors which contrast with the dark brown shingles of the farmhouse, which is more than

The visitor also sees some of the farm's 30 employees at work in the gardens, planting. pruning, plucking and pinching. Others make herbal wreaths

and dried flower arrangements or cook for the 80 to 100 luncheon guests who are served daily.

The farm was not always such a prosperous operation. In 1929 when Simmons came from New York City to look at the property for the first time, it had little to recommend i

she was Adelma Grenier ther an idealistic woman in her mid-20s with a successful career as a buyer for Steiger's Department Stores. "I was looking for property to buy. looking with my parents." she

Eyes which rarely squint in the sunniest gardens are squeezed into slits now, as if to focus better on a time long ago.

"This place was horrid. The house had been abandoned by the people, had been turned into a chicken coop. Then even the chickens gave up. When we got here, the place had been deserted for about four years.

"It took some imagination, let

me tell you. to picture what could be done with this place. And I guess it took some courage

In spite of the drawbacks, the tract on Silver Street had tremendous appeal to the Greniers, so they made the purchase. Soon after the deal was completed, other Coventry farmers stopped by to

> "You'll never grow anything here,' they told us. You could tell they thought we were helpless. hopeless city people. But still, they were as kind as could be. Coventry was a lovely place." says Simmons

The family wanted to use the land for a small dairy farm. similar to the one in Vermont where Simmons was raised. But each of the Grenjers had daily jobs far from Coventry. Simmons was still based in New York City and regularly traveled to Europe and South America for the Steiger stores.

For a while family members maintained a milk house (now the wreath shop) where they made their own butter and pot cheese. But the difficulties of caring for cattle, hens and pigs became overwhelming for the absentee farmers. They soon gave up the idea of a dairy farm. Next came the goat-farm

had always wanted to raise goats." Simmons says. "And this went very well. We had about 50 goats, with 20 of them milking at any one time. We sold the milk -

quarts and quarts of it During this period, family members also ran a crafts operation, a short-lived antiques shop and a business where fine reproductions of colonial-era furniture were manufactured and sold. Some of the tables on which Caprilands guests dine were built by Simmons' father, who worked in the barn that houses today's

After a time, the goats, too. were sold.

As she explains in her book. "A Garden Walk." "This enterprise (the goats) took up some years.

and proved to be a fascinating lucrative practice. Its chief legacies are remembered today in our name - Caprilands for

But land which was fine for goats was also fine for raising Simmons turned more and more of the fields at Caprilands into herb gardens. Rather than develop one large plot of herbs Simmons planted a patchwork of smaller gardens, each with a

Today there is a fragrance garden, a Shakespeare garden. an ivy garden, the saints' garden, and gardens devotedly exclusively to specific colors. There is a Victorian garden, a colonial garden, and a medieval garden. Of special interest to craftsmen is a garden of plants that make good natural dyes. and one where flowers for drying are grown.

This patchwork approach is the signature of Caprilands, but it was originally adopted, says simmons, as a matter of survival. "I had the good sense to know that I should only bite off a certain amount of work at a time, and no more," she recalls. "I was still working outside of Caprilands, and I needed to devote my attentions to researching and planting only a piece at a time

That research has been one of Simmons' chief delights over the years. For more than 50 years. she has been visiting gardens all over the world, buying books published in all of the English-speaking nations, and reading voraciously on the topics of horticulture, traditional crafts and mythology.

Why go beyond simply growing the plants? "Anyone can grow an herb. Unless, of course, you are one of those hopeless people who cannot determine which end of a plant to stick into the ground," she explains.

"But what is really fascinating is the reason why this plant was grown over the years. Take thyme, as an example. You probably use it in your pork roasts. But it was once

thought of as a disinfectant. The research has also given Simmons one of her chief sources of amusement. "I find the educational snob a rather funny type of individual."

"They come from all over to ask questions, and they're generally satisfied with the answers they

"Then they want to know what universities you've attended. They seem to think that anyone who can pronounce the Latin name of a plant must be college-educated. They're always somewhat distressed, and really quite uncomfortable, to learn that I have no diplomas or certificates hanging on the

In truth, says Simmons, she was an erratic student who left high school a few semesters

before graduation. "I'm a dropout and I'm glad of it." she says. "I know I make myself unpopular when I say that. But I was very lucky that I never had learning spoiled for me by a bad teacher. I simply didn't stay in school long enough."

This isn't to say that Simmons doesn't believe in book learning. She maintains an extensive research library and a bookstore. But she hardly ignores the culinary aspect of life. In fact, Caprilands is known to some primarily as a restaurant

A staff of cooks, supervised by Dee Griffith of Coventry, prepares a four-course luncheon for 80 to 100 people, six days a week. (On Sundays, an afternoon tea is offered instead of the lunch.)

The menu changes daily, and the meals are an odd combination of the traditional and the innovative. One day guests are served cool strawberry soup and a tossed salad with raspberry vinaigrette, cheese biscuits with sage, dilled shrimp and herb

Another meal a month later brings cream of broccoli soup. salmon loaf, a conventional tossed salad, a basket of rather sweet quick breads and squares of gingerbread. "This is a meal that reminds me of my grandparents' farm in northern Vermont," explains Simmons on that day, as she circulates among the guests after the meal. "We would always have plenty of this salmon on hand for the farm hands."

All recipes are from Simmons' books. As she circulates among the guests, she lists the names of each of the dishes, and which of her books they come from. Guests who want to assemble recipes for an entire Caprilands luncheon often need to buy at least four Simmons' books

Despite occasional grumbling from guests, these luncheons were not developed primarily to show off the recipes in Simmons'

out of Simmons' first herb classes, which were offered on Thursdays in the 1940s.

Simmons was still involved then with two retail operations the Hall Galleries in Springfield Mass., and the former Gateway Shop in Hartford. But Thursdays were her day off, and she began offering informal classes on

"I served food, which we all cooked together." she recalls. "We did it in a smidge of a space, everyone trying to avoid each other's elbows. We cooked everything as it came into

"Finally the day came when the summer squash were in season. Everyone came in to class with summer squash to be cooked. That's the day I gave it up. I gave up cooking classes. I never wanted to see another summer squash again. And I've never really taught cooking courses again - at least not in the same way."

She devised a format of lecturing first, then serving food afterward. By the early 1950s. the format was well established Guests arrived for a self-guided walk around the gardens. gathered for a lecture plus

guided garden tour, then dined

At first guests could be accommodated in one dining room of the old farmhouse Today there are so many guests that meals are served in three elaborately-decorated parlors Guests still must avoid one another's elbows as they dine. amily-style, at tables which accommodate anywhere from six to 14 people.

It's not easy to invite large numbers of people to dine in one's own home says Simmons whose living quarters are above the dining rooms. "They're looking for souvenirs sometimes and they'll take the most outlandish things!

If the velvet rope hasn't been hooked across the stairway. Simmons' assistant, Nancy-Sime, will sometimes find guests wandering in the upstairs rooms. "They'll look at me without any embarrassment at all, and say. 'I simply had to see where she lives," Sime says. "She has quite an aura. Quite a mystique."

Simmons is matter-of-fact

about her own mortality. "I

can't live forever, you know And I have no intention of constructing a shrine to myself." she says

When the time comes, her granddaughter. Darlene Lee. will take over the property. Simmons says. Lee and her husband, Jack, are already working at the farm full time. Darlene runs the gift shop. Jack works in the fields and supervises garden operations

"We hope to keep the place running pretty much as my grandmother has always done. says Mrs. Lee. a pretty blonde with her grandmother's eyes "But we know we'll have to put more of the focus on the gardens themselves. Because nobody is going to take her place as the center of attention around here No one would even try."



Moving from TV to film

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Television sitcom tycoon Garry Marshall has accomplished the transition to feature movies except for one thing: He can't ride the camera crane

"I'm terrified of heights," he confessed. "When I need to look at a scene from a camera crane, I have them take Polaroids up there. In this last picture, I had one scene on top of a parking structure. I stood way back from the edge.

Garry Marshall doesn't look like a man who would be scared by anything. As a young man he faced the terrors of standup comedy. In television he survived the crush of weekly deadlines as co-creator of "Laverne and Shirley," "Happy Days" and "Mork and Mindy." During one week in 1979, they ranked as the top three shows in the Nielsen ratings.

After 20 lucrative years in television, Marshall made a career switch in 1982 and directed "Young Doctors in Love" for 20th Century Fox-ABC. He returned to Fox in 1984 for "The Flamingo Kid" with Matt Dillon and Richard Crenna

MTV previews Soviet rock

American viewers got their first taste of real Russian rock 'n' roll when MTV's new 'International Hour' previewed four home-made video clips by underground Soviet bands. True, millions had seen "official" rockers Autograf during Live-Aid, but regional superstars like Aquarium. Strange Games and Kino don't get to play for overseas audiences. In fact, they can't

legally play at all.

"You have to be a member of the union to be official." explains the 25-year-old Californian known as Joanna Stingray She has been traveling to Russia and discreetly exporting tapes of Russia's underground rockers to America. "When you become official, you're allowed to earn money from playing music. But then the government is your boss: They tell you when to tour, how to perform and what to record. These unofficial bands want their creative freedom. Since they're not allowed to make money for their music, by law they have to have other



Pelvic exams deserve sensitivity

Women should look for a gentle, caring physician

DEAR DR. REINISCH: When my girlfriend was 9, she had a dder problem and was trucked around to nearly a dozen different gynecologists. each of whom did a complete pelvic exam.

Now, at age 16, she's been diagnosed as having an ovarian cyst, which requires frequent examinations. With each exam. she becomes increasingly upset about what she refers to as the invasion of her hady by the instruments and the doctor's fingers She calls these exams

Are these feelings a normal reaction to being subjected to so much poking and prodding so often? Or is it possible she was abused by one of the doctors? Do other young women react the same way?

DEAR READER: Regardless of their age, women who are treated roughly or insensitively during pelvic examinations do report feeling violated. This could be considered a type of abuse, although it does not involve behavior of a traditionally sexual nature.

It's important that your friend find a gynecologist who has expertise in working with adolescents. Many medical schools and hospitals have adolescent clinics or teams of specialists who are trained to work with adolescents and their concerns. Some of the physicians at contraceptive or family-planning clinics are also skilled at examining young women in a caring, gentle

Perhaps finding a more understanding physician will reduce her dread of pelvic examinations. There are a number of examination techniques that help women especially younger women. feel less negative and anxious about

apart, but this position is best for an exam. A physician should explain this, and then explain each step of the exam as he or she proceeds. Small speculums (the instru-

ment inserted in the vagina to hold its sides open so the physician can clearly see the cervix) can be used for girls and younger women, so that little or no discomfort should be involved. Warming the speculum with warm water also helps. as does very slow insertion.

A woman should say whether she feels pain. If the physician does not slow down the procedure or become more gentle, she should ask the physician to stop. She should then get up from the table, get dressed, leave and find a physician who will promise to be

After cervix is examined, the speculum is removed and the physician inserts one or two fingers of one hand in the vagina while using the other hand to press on the outside of the abdomen. This allows the physician to feel the uterus and the ovaries. There may be some discomfort or tenderness as these internal organs are gently moved around to check for enlargement, cysts or other problems. This is followed by a check of the rectum.

The more the patient can relax her abdominal muscles. the less discomfort there will be during the examination. However, if a woman has been hurt during an exam, she may not be able to control her muscle responses in order to relax. In some cases, a woman will unconsciously constrict her vaginal muscles to the point that an examination is not possible (a condition called vaginismus)

Women physicians who have reported on their own pelvic exams say that some physicians are simply more gentle, more

tive than others. Encourage your friend to find such a physician. If she continues to have strong negative reaction to all pelvic examinations and all physicians, suggest that she talk with a counselor who has experience working with adolescent women who have had negative sexual experiences Call the nearest medical school or large hospital and ask if they have an adolescent clinic.

Regular pelvic exams are necessary to a woman's health. No woman should dread them so much that she avoids having

which induced labor is often considered necessary include a pregnancy that lasts two weeks beyond the due date (called "post-maturity"; complications when the mother is diabetic; or toxemia, in which the mother's high blood pressure endangers both her and the baby. If labor does not begin within 24 hours of the rupture of the membranes holding the amniotic fluid (sometimes called "the bag of water breaking"), labor is often induced because of a risk of

Prolonged labor or long contractions can also contribute to fetal distress and can benefit

from labor-inducing drugs to speed the delivery; so can deliveries in which labor begins and then stops.

Oxytocin is usually administered by an infusion pump or intravenous drip that can be carefully controlled to produce the strong contractions of active

Unfortunately, the drug can trigger very intense, lengthy contractions in some women These require medication for pain, which, in turn, slows contractions or makes it difficult for a woman to push strongly enough at the birth stage. This can make a forceps delivery necessary - the pattern you mentioned.

The use of modern drugs and technology to manage childbirth can save the lives of both mothers and babies who require special help and attention. For example, using oxytocin to stimulate contractions can help some women avoid having a Cesarean delivery

But oxytocin and painkillers are strong drugs and can have negative side effects on the bab (such as an increased risk of (aundice), as can the use of orceps for delivery

If you believe that the decision to use this birthing pattern was not medically justified in the case of your wife or friends ask to have the records reviewed by your state medical society.

Every pregnant couple should ask the person who will be supervising the birth (family physician, obstetrician, midwife or whoever will be in charge of labor and delivery) exactly what criteria will be used to determine if and when drugs,

Although drugs, forceps and Cesarean deliveries should be avoided whenever possible, all parties should agree about the options that affect the well-being of the mother and baby. It's both your right and your responsibil ity to select a birthing medical adviser whose philosop regarding methods and medications match your own as closely



DEAR READER: No. According to the June 23, 1986, data from the Centers for Disease Control (the most recent report available when this column was written), nearly one-half (47 percent) of all AIDS patients were between the ages 30 and 39 Another 21 percent were between ages 20 and 29

Only 31 percent of AIDS cases reported to the CDC involved patients age 40 or older. This disease is striking young individuals in age groups usually thought of as being in the healthiest time of life.

Yellow Pages are turning toward women

hat's the slogan used by many of the nation's 40-plus women's resource directories. often called the Women's Yellow Pages. Some of these directories emphasize women-owned businesses, while others highlight services for women. Some are profit oriented; others non-profit and/or politically motivated and inspired. Even the president's daughter, Maureen Reagan, is a publisher - of the Colorado Springs Women's Yellow Pages

These books, which are surprise! - yellow in color and more open, airy and graphically interesting than anything put out by a Ma Bell affiliate have inspired other look-alike directories including: Silver Pages (or Gray Pages) for senior citizens, and ethnic directories like San Francisco's Asian Yellow Pages. But the Women's Yellow Pages are to date the real success story. Everyone is reading them, including men.

More than any indicator I've

seen in recent years, the directories are the sign that the women's movement is becoming, or perhaps has become, mainstream. Yes, these books are published by women about women - but they aren't for women only. Increasingly national or strong regional corporations like Atlantic Bell

are placing ads. And increasingly the customers are not women in bookstores decorated with droopy plants and housing stray cats, women looking for a woman-owned shop to fulfill a sense of duty to the cause. The customers are corporations who want to do business with women or need to do business with women-owned companies to meet their minority trade quotas

Leslie Stone, publisher of the Los Angeles directory (the largest in the country) and president of the National Association of Women's Yellow Pages, says, "This issue, '86-'87, we are 200 pages and we have 1,300 advertisers; and we expect more this coming year. When I bought the

The supply of these products is limited, but the demand is growing. I believe you will be seeing more of it on the market.

uestion: How resourceful a cook are you? When the recipe calls for 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon and you don't have any on hand, what do you do? Run in circles, scream and shout? the competently prepared food. The bulk of the menu is evenly divided among salads, hot entrees and sandwiches, with a limited addition of appetizers and desserts. The sherbet is smooth and creamy and the whole, perhaps, would serve even better as a light
