Area Republicans predict light turnout

Republican leaders in the Manchester area are predicting a light turnout and a close race in tomorrow's three-way gubernator-

lal primary Manchester Republican Chairman Donald Kuehl said he hones 30 percent of the 8,655 Manchester party members eligible to vote will show up at the polls. The contest is

Jonathan Mercier, a member of the Republican Town Committee and former candidate for the Legislature, also predicted a light vote - not only in Manchester but throughout the state.

He said any turnout over 25 percent would favor the candidate he supports, state Rep. Julie

Belaga of Westport The three candidates on the primary ballot are Belaga, insurance agent Richard Bozzuto of Watertown and pediatrician Gerald Labriola of Naugatuck. The winner will face incumbent Gov

William A. O'Neill, a Democrat, in

Kuehl said party workers have been making calls to Manchester Republicans, urging them to go to the polls. The election Tuesday will be held from noon to 8 p.m. Workers will continue to make

calls Tuesday afternoon while the election is in progress. Party officials will use a checklist to determine who has voted, but will also make random calls. Kuehl

Mercier declined to predict the

outcome of the race. "Do you have a three-sided coin?" he asked.

Marion Taggart, also a Belaga supporter, said she was discouraged to find that many normally well-informed Republicans she talked to did not even know about the primary

But Mercier has found more interest. "The entire race has taken place in the last week." he

Mary Willhide, Manchester's Republican registrar of voters and a Bozzuto supporter, joined Mercier in declining to predict either the turnout or the outcome of the contest.

Labriola's local campaign coor dinators did not return phone calls from reporters.

Willhide and other election officials toured town polling places today, checking the voting machines that are in place for the primary

Each polling place has two voting machines, the second a spare to be used in the event of a breakdown.

It's too close to call result of GOP vote By Judd Everhart

HARTFORD - Connecticut's too-close-to-call, three-way Republican gubernatorial primary is set Tuesday, with 460,000 regis-tered Republicans eligible to participate.

The election will likely turn on personal style rather than positions on issues. Indeed, there have been no burning issues in the race that's been carried on in the seven weeks since the nominating convention.

The convention gave its endorse ment to former state Sen. Richard C. Bozzuto of Watertown. But Deputy House Majority Leader Julie D. Belaga of Westport and former state Sen. Gerald Labriola of Naugatuck won enough convention support to qualify for a

Bozzuto and Belaga could be classified as moderate to liberal Republicans. Labriola is the clear conservative in the race.

Polls will be open from noon to 8 p.m. Tuesday. Party officials say they'd like to see a 40 percent turnout, but concede that it will

likely be closer to 20 percent GOP leaders say the race is too close to call: all three candidates have expressed confidence in

winning.
Republicans will also pick a candidate for lieutenant governor Tuesday. The nominees are East Lyme First Selectman Dennis J Murphy. Bozzuto's choice: E. Hartford. Belaga's favorite: and Leo J. Redgate of Bridgeport.

PZC to air plans for development around Buckland mall

The developers hoping to build the Mall at Buckland Hills are bringing three separate applications before the Planning and Zoning Commission tonight that could mean additional development around the mammoth shopping center planned for northwestern Manchester

The PZC, which will will meet at 7 p.m. in the Lincoln Center hearing room, has scheduled a separate public hearing on each application

The applications were filed together in June by New York developer John Finguerra, who has proposed to build the 750,000square-foot mall in conjunction with the Homart Development Co.

of Chicago, a Sears subsidiary. The first two seek the rezoning of about 115 acres abutting the 138-acre mall site from Rural Residence to Comprehensive Urban Development. If the request is granted by the commission. Finguerra and Homart will control about 265 acres in the Interstate 84

Finguerra has said he may construct office buildings and a hotel and convention center on the land. The mall site is already zoned CUD, and plans are in the works for high-density housing nearby. The first hearing will concern a zone change for 19 acres off Buckland Street. The second proposal covers 97 acres along Slater

The land includes the Red Rock Golf Course, which Finguerra purchased last year. Although he may build office buildings on the course, the developer has said the land will operate as a golf course for the "foreseeable future."

In the third application, Finguerra, who heads a partnership called Manchester I-84 Associates. is seeking a change in the regulations governing CUD zones. Under the current regulations.

"It's a much more flexible type of regulation." Planning Director Mark Pellegrini said today of the proposal. "It gives the applicant more discretion on its plans. It also gives the commission more

Pellegrini declined to disclose his recommendations on the applications. But he said that either the current CUD requirements or the achieve what the town administration wants in northern Manchester

The town's Comprehensive Plan of Development, approved by the PZC in July, calls for a special mixed-use district in the North End. That allows a combination of high-density residential, commercial and industrial development in an area of Manchester where town officials expect rapid economic growth over the next 10 years. A smaller strip shopping center

is being planned for a parcel in South Windsor, just across the town line from the Buckland Hills site. Legal complications are delaying plans for that center, known as Winchester, and a lawsuit has also been filed in connection with the Buckland Hills plans.

The South Windsor shopping center, which would be like the Manchester Parkade, was proposed by Bronson and Hutensky of Bloomfield and Melvin Simon and Associates of Indianapolis, who plan to work with Homart on the Buckland Hills project.

In an unrelated matter, the PZC will hold a fourth public hearing on a zone change sought by Visions Unlimited Inc. The developer is seeking rezoning that would allow construction of 96 condominiums on 14.8 acres at 205 Oakland St.

Experts predict new wave of terror

An expert on terrorism said today that the attacks on a Pan Am jetliner and a Turkish synagogue could signal a new wave of international violence.

'This airplane and the synagogue atrocity is just a first step in my view for a lot of very unfortunate things to come." Robert Kupperman of the Georgetown Center for Strategic and International Studies said on NBC's "Today" show

"It could be a Rome. Vienna type airport attack; it could be assassinations, bombings, I think they're going to lay off airplanes for a while." he said.

Kupperman said he sensed a Palestinian influence in Friday's abortive hijacking and subsequent attack on passengers aboard the Pan Am jumbo jet at the Karachi. Pakistan, airport, in which 18 people were killed. On Saturday, 21 worshipers attending Sabbath services at an Istanbul synagogue were massacred by two Arab gunmen who then killed

Israel's United Nations ambassador. Benjamin Netanyahu, said today on the "CBS Morning News" that investigators in Pakistan and Turkey may be able to pinpoint the terrorists' true identity within

"You round them up, the usual suspects and the numbers, the possibilities are very few. It's either one of the leading terrorist states - Iran. Syria or Libya - or one of the major terrorist organizations - the PLO, Abu Nidal," he said, referring to the Palestine Liberation Organization and a breakway. Syrian-backed

"The only way out of this is for the nations of the Western world to wake up to the fact that they all have a responsibility in stopping it." said Philip Perlmutter, executive director of the Jewish Community Relations Council of Greater Boston

Former President Jimmy Carter said Saturday that the origin of the terrorism "is the lack of progress in the Middle East. It will not improve until the question of the rights of the Palestinians are

However, he said the Palestinians must recognize the right of Israel to exist and seek their rights without resorting to terrorism.





Geoffrey Naab, a Republican member of the Manchester Board of Directors, says the law requiring the town to reopen negotiations with teachers over the current contract in order qualify for state education funds is "ridiculous," because the agreement already provides a raise of 12 percent in its

He said the contract is extremely favorable to the Manchester Education Association, which bargains for the more than 500 teachers in the Manchester school system. The raises provided in the contract are "very adequate," he

At the same time, Naab conceded that the town has little choice but to reopen talks.

If Manchester meets the require ments of the Education Enhancement Act passed by the Legislature in July under Republican sponsorship, it will receive more than \$4.2 illion in education aid over the next three years. Because the town fell short under a formula compar ing teacher pay scales with those around the state, it must reopen the talks if it is to get the state funds provided under the bill, which seeks to raise the minimum salary

Steps are now being taken toward new talks, but the reopening has yet to win approval from Board of Directors and the Board of Education.

"It makes sense to give them a boost," Naab said. But he argued that Manchester's elected officials did that last year when they approved the two-year contract covering the current year. Naab predicted there will be considerable discussion over the terms of reopening.







All have role in improving the schools

When negotiators for the Manchester school system and the town teachers' union meet to rework their contract for the current school year, both sides need to keep in mind the purpose of the state's Education Enhancement Act.

Legislators passed the measure earlier this summer in response to a general feeling among the people of Connecticut that school systems need to attract the best talent and to keep experienced and talented teachers from turning to more lucrative careers. Behind that conviction, as indicated by the title of the law, was the desire to enhance the quality of public education.

Thus the bill provides communities like Manchester with the opportunity - and the funds, at least for a three-year period - to raise teacher salaries as a means to improve the quality of the schools

Wilson Deakin, the town's assistant superintendent of schools, said the act offers "an opportunity that happens once in a lifetime '

One thing the law does is provide a convincing inducement for school districts to raise teacher salaries beyond those provided in the contract already negotiated for the current year.

Stripped of its complications, the law says simply that if Manchester decides not to use the more than \$3.2 million in the three-year grant to raise salaries so that every teacher earns more than \$20,000, it will not get more than \$1.6 million provided for general education purposes.

Although some town officials have chafed at being forced to reopen contract talks for this year, particularly after having approved, without hesitation, a rather generous settlement, there is no viable alternative to reopening the talks.

The approach now should be to seize the chance to make improvements - not only in the financial status of teachers, which is one key to improved education, but also in their capacity to do an effective job.

Deakin has indicated that the school administration may ask for more in-service time in exchange for the additional compensation provided for in the act. That is one example of how the quality of education can be improved if both sides cooperate in seeking to help the bill achieve its intent.

Public support for increased teacher compensation amounted to a vote of confidence in teachers. If teachers are presented with any chance to acknowledge that vote of confidence in the new contract talks, they should be willing to do their part.

Is America regressing?

WASHINGTON - Secretary of State George P. Shultz is worried that America may be losing its backbone. The same mentality that produced the depression of the 1930s and war's devastation of the 1940s, he says, is making a comeback.

Shultz believes too many Americans have not learned — or have forgotten - the consequences of inadequate defenses, appeasing enemies and shunning ree trade for protectionism. Shultz outlined his concerns
