Ted, who asked that his real name not be used, served 191/2 years in a Pennsylvania prison for armed robbery. Ted was a "right-hand man" in Pittsburgh. collecting money illegally from people who owed the organization he worked for. When he was released from prison in 1984. Ted found

his way to East Hartford, where he was quickly accused of stabbing a man. He spent another year in all before he was acquitted of those charges in 1985. During his time in jail, Ted received literature about PREP, a statewide network of social service agencies that helps ex-offenders acclimate themselves to society after being released from prison.
"I saw it was a beneficial step." Ted told the
Manchester Herald today. "My problem was establishing myself in the community Ted got involved with Manchester's Project

Reentry, spearheaded by coordinator James M.

Foley said Ted came to the program about eight months ago, wanting to re-enter society as smoothly as possible. "We've been providing him that support he needs." Foley said.

Project Reentry, sponsored cooperatively by the Manchester Area Conference of Churches and the Connecticut Department of Corrections, handles about 75 cases like Ted's every year. Foley said. The program currently has 18 clients, he said. The program was lauded this morning in obser vance of Community Justice Day by about 20 government officials and volunteers gathered at the Project Reentry offices on Church Street.





Williams woes worry selectmen in Bolton

By John Mitchell

BOLTON — Ideas on how to improve Williams Road dominated the Board of Selectmen's meeting Tuesday, but no formal action will be taken until after residents have had their say on the

The road needs repair because there is no solid base beneath the pavement, according to Donato Rataszi, the town's highway foreman. He said that lack generally leads to problems at this

"It heaves tremendously in the wintertime," Ratazzi said. "To really do it, it should be rebuilt completely."

The problem, Rateral said, is that total reconstruction would be The residents themselves will get the chance Oct. 16 to say what they think should be done to improve the condition of the street, which links Routes 6 and 44 to a point on Route 55 where there is a westbound entrance ramp to Interstate 384. Because of that

connection, many drivers travel the residential road at high speeds, residents have complained. First Selectman Douglas T. Chency said \$30,000 has been allocated in the town budget for work on the road.

But that is only a temporary solution. Long-term repair is seeded, said Selectman Carl Preuss, who outlined an improvement plan that included overlaying part of

the road and doing drainage base work.

Selectman Michael A. Zizka agreed about the need for a long-term solution. He asked why \$30,000 should be spent on an overlay that will have to be done again next year.

One solution, Ratazzi said, would be to turn the road into a dead

end. Preuss was against that idea because it would create a lack of access for fire apparatus

Selectman Lawrence A. Converse said the overlaying should be done soon. "We should really get on to it rather quickly," he said. "At least it would improve the road for the time being." Chency held the board off from making a decision until the residents have voiced their opinions. "We want to do some



'Flexibility' could be a big mistake

There can be no doubting that changes in the zoning regulations approved this week will allow increased flexibility in determining the future of the area Manchester has set aside for high-density development. But unless planning officials proceed with extreme caution, the only benefits will accrue to developers who stand to profit under any circumstances.

After weeks of study, the Planning and Zoning Commission Monday night revised the Comprehensive Urban Development regulations in accord with a recommendation from the town staff. The revisions, initially proposed by one of the developers of the Mall at Buckland Hills, removed required ratios for commercial and residential development in the area around the planned

750.000-square-foot shopping center and made it easier for the PZC to designate more land CUD, which it promptly did. Mark Pellegrini, the town's director of

planning and development, said the changes were needed so the town would not be required to enforce a restrictive formula as development occurs in the Interstate 84 That may well be so.

At the same time, however, the Manchester administration may have gone too far in seeking to appease a major developer just when the old regulations were about to bear fruit, producing a combination of housing and modern business concerns. Only if planning authorities give the coming construction proposals an unusual amount of scrutiny will the town be assured of averting a rape of the


Right after it decided to adopt the changes proposed by developer John Finguerra, the PZC proceeded to designate an additional 115 acres right near the mall site as Comprehensive Urban Development. That action gave Finguerra and his partners control of about 265 acres in the Buckland section without the stipulation that they build any housing at all in what is still supposed to be a mixed-use zone.

Finguerra now says he'll proceed with plans for a hotel, office buildings and perhaps even a convention center. Neither he nor officials of the Homart Development Corp., the arm of Sears. Roebuck and Co. that plans to construct the mall, have said anything about building housing

If the mall and the other commercial projects are all that is built, townspeople will be the losers, despite the resulting gain in tax dollars. What might have been a vital commercial-residential area under the old formula will just end up as a fruitful investment for corporate interests.

Given the quality of Manchester's planners, that probably will not happen. But given the questionable basis for the revisions and the flawed basis of some previous zoning decisions, it just might

"With discretion and flexibility, there's more responsibility on the commission and staff," Pellegrini admitted after Monday's

Reagan gives Pentagon data on your life

WASHINGTON - Civil libertarians are already worried about military encroachment on civilian law enforcement in the "war" on dope traffickers. But little concern has been shown over a White House directive that would give the Pentagon control over the confidential files that government

agencies have on millions of Americans. This revolutionary intrusion of the military into traditionally civilian areas was sanctioned by a White House national security decision directive. NSDD 145, issued two years ago. It recently survived an attempt by House critics to modify its

most offensive Big Brother features. NSDD 145 was a Reagan administration response to the lack of security for government and industry communications, which were vulnerable to penetration by the Soviets or anyon else with reasonably sophisticated interception equipment. Vast amounts of information, from Internal Revenue Service records to business secrets, are stored in computers that can be "accessed" by foreign agents, industrial spies or

THE DIRECTIVE AUTHORIZED & government-wide system for computer system security. But it put the National Security Agency - which reports to the Pentagon - in charge of security for all government computer systems. the car stopped just in time to and many private industry systems as well.

"Under National Security Decision Directive 145, the Department of Defense could control the access to not only classified information, but also to any information which it considered sensitive. said Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas, chairman of the House Government Operations Committee. "In my view, this is an unprecedented and ill-advised expansion of the military's influence into our

that the NSA is a super-secret agency that is subject to neither public nor congressional scrutiny. Another is the agency's track record: Until then-Attorney General Elliot Richardson put a stop to it in 1973, the NSA collected data on The racing season may be over thousands of Americans, which it proceeded to pass on to other agencies, including the FBI. NSDD 145 reverses the information flow conceivably giving the NSA access to the computer files of the Social Security Administration, the Veterans Administration, the Internal Revenue Service and every other civilian

NSA ACCESS would be guaranteed, its critics say, by giving the agency authority to approve. disapprove and monitor the other agencies' computer security systems. This function has been handled by the National Bureau of Standards, a small civilian agency whose chief concern is uniformity of industrial measurements, not

Legislation sponsored by Brooks and Rep. Dan Glickman, D-Kan., would have mandated civilian control of computer security under the Bureau of Standards, rather than military control under the NSA. It failed to pass after strenuous lobbying by the administration, including Assistant Defense Secretary Donald Latham, to whom the NSA reports. The bill could be reintroduced next year. One of the NSA's first moves under NSDD 145 was to pressure industry into adopting a new data

encryption standard - an expensive change that industry experts say is not necessary. Some critics suspect the NSA's intention is to enforce a new. universal encryption standard that would be too tough for most computer snoopers - but not for the NSA. Government officials deny this. Footnote: Our associate Donald Goldberg

uncovered a Pentagon task force study, completed hree years ago, which concluded that current standards are perfectly adequate. "It is the consensus of the Task Force that encryption can be achieved with commercially available equipment that would provide for privacy of communications," the internal report stated

The death risk to neighbors of nuclear plants should not exceed one-tenth of 1 percent of the sum of prompt fatality risks resulting from other accidents to which members of the U.S. population are exposed," the NRC concluded. 'Principle' drives Klein in 1986 effort

Republican Herschel A. Klein is facing one of the toughest political battles anywhere in Connecticut. Yet Klein, an engineer from Windsor, refused Wednesday to concede his 1st Congressional District race against incumbent Democratic Rep. Barbara B. Ken-nelly. He he will keep plugging away until the Nov. 4 election comes and goes, he said. During an interview with the Manchester Herald, Klein dis-cussed everything from federal election laws that he said keep

challengers at too much of a disadvantage to American foreign policy and the role each branch of the government should play shaping it. A conservative on foreign af-fairs, Klein brought a sophisticated approach to political and economic problems worldwide.
