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## Consolidation backers want to keep volunteers

The Committee for Charter Revision today said it favors consolidation of the town and the Eighth Utilities District but wants to keep alive the district's voluneer fire department. That position emerged from a

morning news conference called by six members of the committee which has come under heavy fire or refusing to reveal its plans. In the past, the nonpartisan mittee has said only that it favors changing the Town Charter to pave the way for a townwide vote

Critics have accused committee members of hiding their real intentions and have pointed to statements by committee member Stephen Penny, who leads major ly Democrats on the Board of Directors, as proof that the group wants to "annihilate" the Eighth District. The district is an independent entity that has provided sewer service and volunteer fire protection to most of northern Manchester for nearly a century Many district residents fiercely oppose any merger with the town

Neither Penny nor Democratic Town Chairman Theodore R. Cummings, a leader in the consolidation movement, attended the news On Nov. 4, Manchester residents

will vote in a referendum tha many see as the first step toward consolidation. If the question passes, two provisions in the Town Charter that currently allow district voters to fend off consolidation will be removed. "In the context of the apparent

insistence of the press and others that the committee should propose a plan, we suggest these items as the basis for consolidation." Committee for Charter Revision Vice

Susag said that the district's volunteer fire department should be retained, but should become a



HARTFORD (AP) — Two thousand homes throughout Connecticut will be tested for radon, an indoor poliutant that scientists believe could cause up to 20,600 lung cancer deaths a year, federal

officials have announced.
The surveys, to be conducted during the winter when there is less turnover of indoor air, will try to identify possible high-risk areas.
The Environmental Protection
Agency said Thursday that Connecticut and nine other states were slected for the week-long house hold surveys because they were ready to participate and because their plans fit the agency's.

Brian Tool of the state Department of Environmental Protection said 2,000 charcoal test kits will be EPA will help the states design their surveys, assess the geology of the home sites, provide up to 3,000 charcoal detection canisters to each state, do laboratory analyses of the samples taken, and help

evaluate the findings. The states selected in addition to Connecticut are: Alabama, Colorado, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Wisconsin and Wyoming.



## Hiring plan needs guts to succeed

For years, Manchester has been hounded by an image problem. A small minority population, a dearth of non-whites on the town payroll and a series of unfortunate incidents have combined to give the town a reputation of hostility toward minority

The town administration has taken numerous steps to rectify that problem, most notably in the area of minority hiring. But more needs to be done.

Critics who have questioned the sincerity of Manchester's efforts to hire more minority-group members have so far been offered little proof that their doubts are unfounded. "We're trying," is usually the response of town officials who lack the statistics to support their claim. However, a new affirmative action plan

being developed by the Human Relations Commission promises to allay some of the

Unfortunately, the new plan has already been met with some trepidation from town personnel officials because it contains a controversial statement on affirmative

The statement, drafted by a subcommittee of the HRC, says that town officials are expected to hire minority candidates and women over equally qualified white men in job categories where the town is 'underutilized," meaning that the percentage of minority-group members and

women is less than that in the job market. The proposed policy also says that "If a qualified ... minority or other protected class candidate applying for an underutilized position is not offered a position, a written report by the hiring authority providing justification for the hiring decision shall be made to the general manager.

The inclusion of that requirement in the statement prompted Personnel Officer Linda Parry to warn against any measure that would remove the town's flexibility in hiring decisions. Town Attorney John Cooney reportedly told Parry that the town was not required to include such a strong statement in its affirmative action plan, but failed to issue a written opinion on the legality of the

In the unexplainable absence of that inion, the subcommittee agreed to send the olan with the statement intact to the full HRC While it is true that the legality of some


affirmative action programs is still being debated in the courts, there is no reason for the town to take a timid stand. The plan can always be revised. Affirmative action is intended to help

redress past discrimination in hiring by giving preference to qualified minority-group candidates. Anything less is only a charade. If hiring authorities are going to ignore the intent of affirmative action, they should be

required to provide justification. The statement proposed by the HRC abcommittee offers to give the town's affirmative action plan some guts and should be adopted if it clears the necessary legal

The fear of becoming a victim of rape, robbery or assault has put many people on the defensive. As a black man, I have a one-in-40 chance of being stain between 15 and 44 years of age. If that ens, there is a 90 percent chance the murder will be committed by a member of my own race. according to a a recent edition of Jet magazine.

White-collar, drug-related and organized crime is still rampant in America. And society should be concerned because most inmates now in prison will be released someday. When that happens, a second chance to improve their lives and enhance their self-worth is vital.

As a state corrections officer at Somers prison and in Hartford, I witnessed several fights and was threatened six times. More prisons, longer pentences and reinstatement of the death penalty are not the final or only solutions to overcrowdin The criminal-justice system itself needs change.

Fortunately, we live in a community that doesn't just sit back and ignore the problem. Education is offered as well as reform and punishment.

THE MANCHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT onsors many programs for the public. Community Relations Officer Larry Wilson sed recently that only a small percentage lice work involves the actual apprehension and arrest of suspects. Lectures about drunken driving, presentations and films about illegal drug and alcohol abuse (including displays of paraphernalis and narcotics) and outreach programs are all ways the police help young le come to see who their friends really are Eigin Zatursky, a Manchester High School istory teacher, established a law and order course for seniors in 1981 to allow those students t

## Bank's link with CIA goes back 10 years

WASHINGTON - For more than 10 years the CIA has used a Maryland bank for secret arms shipments to "clients" around the world Purchase records obtained by our associates Corky Johnson and Donald Goldberg detail arms transactions totaling \$21 million through the First Naitonal Bank of Maryland in Baltimore. Two shipments worth a total of \$5 million involved the rhase and delivery of about 100,000 rifles in a omplex transaction apparently winked at by the

bank management.
The rifle shipments originated in Brazil and ndia, according to the documents, but the final destinations listed are suspect. Several ports were crossed out on the original shipping papers and new destinations written in

The arms deals were initiated by a CIA front called Associated Traders, and handled by Sherwood International Export Corp., a large arms broker licensed with the State Department Sherwood has offices in Los Angeles, Miami, London and Washington, D.C.

THE BILLS OF LADING indicate that Associated bought 60,000 rifles from the Indian Defense Ministry for \$3.6 million in September 1983. The original destination was given as Portugal, but a corrected listing showed the destination as "Any U (nited) K (ingdom) Port." Sources told us the rifles undoubtedly were delivered to Mujahedin guerrillas fighting Soviet occupation forces in Afghanistan.

A year earlier, Associated bought \$1.8 million worth of rifles from Brazil. There was an additional \$1 million purchase of "merchandise" from Brazil that listed Baltimore as the final destination. Shipping Brazilian guns to Maryland makes little sense; observers in Nicaragua say the CIA-backed contras there have been known to use Brazilian weapons in their fight against the Sandinista regime

The Brazilian and Indian arms transactions were handled through Sherwood, which, records show, was the purchase and transfer agent for Associated on several major arms deals. In the past, Sherwood president Michael Kokin has denied that his company worked with the CIA. He did not return our calls for comment on this story.

Associated also used Shimon Ltd., a Cayman Islands firm, for weapons shipments. One of these was a \$9.4 million shipment of "technical goods" - industry jargon for military hardware - sent to Lagos, Nigeria. Lagos would be a convenient way station for weapons going to the CIA-backed The Manchester Herald welcomes original letters to the

LITTLE IS KNOWN about the Shimon firm because of strict Cayman Islands secrecy laws. But it does share the same registration agent on the islands as a Sherwood subsidiary. Cromwell

John Keating, a Bethesda, Md., attorney and director of Associated Traders, said he could not comment on any CIA connection with the company. He said he has "very secretive clients." First National Bank officials also declined to comment. But as we have disclosed, a former bank officer, Robert Maxwell, resigned when he

was unable to get written authorization from his superiors to handle the CIA front's transactions. In a series of memos, Maxwell said he was worried about the CIA connection, but agreed to continue processing Associated's questionable money transfers if he was given written authority. "As I have previously indicated to you." Maxwell wrote his boss on one occasion, "I have no intention of interfering with any government activities, however, at this point I have fears for my personal well-being as well as concern for the

Maxwell was told the CIA refused the written authority he requested. This led him to fear that he would be the sacrificial lamb if federal banking regulators cracked down on possibly illegal transactions that had his name on them.

## Punk funk and INXS catch on

MESA, Ariz. - They're on the threshold of replacing Men At Work as the biggest selling act ever in their native Australia, they have an international following from nine years of extensive touring and they're considered one of the world's funkiest and best live rock 'n' roll bands. In the United States, however, success for INXS didn't arrive

until this year - and that was somewhat by plan. "The more gradual process, the better for us," lead guitarist Tim Farriss said before a recent sold-out concert at the Mesa Amphitheater, "We always felt we knew what we were doing, We didn't want to just come from nowhere - come to the States and have a great summer and then come back next summer and be on the 'Where are they now?' list like so many bands."

"WE'VE ALWAYS had a cult following here and still do," said lead singer Michael Hutchence. "And it's very real, especially since we play small places and not big ones." "But by the time we finish this tour, they say we'll be the second-most successful drawing act this summer on Atlantic

Records and our album ('Listen Like Thieves') will have sold a million by the time we leave the country," Farriss said, "We're at the point now where we could have a situation next year where we don't have any singles in the Top 40 and we'll still sell double-platinum albums and all our gigs will be sold out." "Listen Like Thieves" is the fifth full-length LP from INXS. but their first gold record in the United States for sales of

The album was released in October 1985 and has since spawned five videos and six singles - "This Time," "What You Need," "Shine Like It Does," "Listen Like Thieves," "Kiss the Dirt (Falling Down The Mountain)" and "Same Direction," which was used on the soundtrack of the movie, "American

INXS ALSO HAD the hit "Do Wot You Do" in the "Pretty in Pink" movie and they have recorded a song called "Different World" for the newly released comedy, "Crocodile Dundee." Hutchence, whose flamboyant stage style is often compared to Mick Jagger's, has even landed a starring role in the rock movie, "Dogs in Space," due out next year.

The band began as The Farriss Brothers in 1977 and the lineup remains unchanged with Hutchence, 28, and Tim Farriss, 29 joined by 25-year-old drummer Jon Farriss, 27-year-old Andrew Farriss on keyboards, 29-year-old Garry Gary Beers on bass and 28-year-old Kirk Pengilly on rhythm guitar, saxophone and

Stephen T. Penny and Wallace J. Irish Jr., two opposing forces in the battle between the town and the Eighth Utilities District, went Isce-to-face Friday night to debate a question Manchester voters will answer in November.

The 45-minute debate, which was sponsored by the Manchester Herald and the Journal Inquirer, will be broadcast on Cox Cable Channel 13 at a date to be announced. Arguments centered on a referendum questi that will appear on the ballot Nov. 4.
