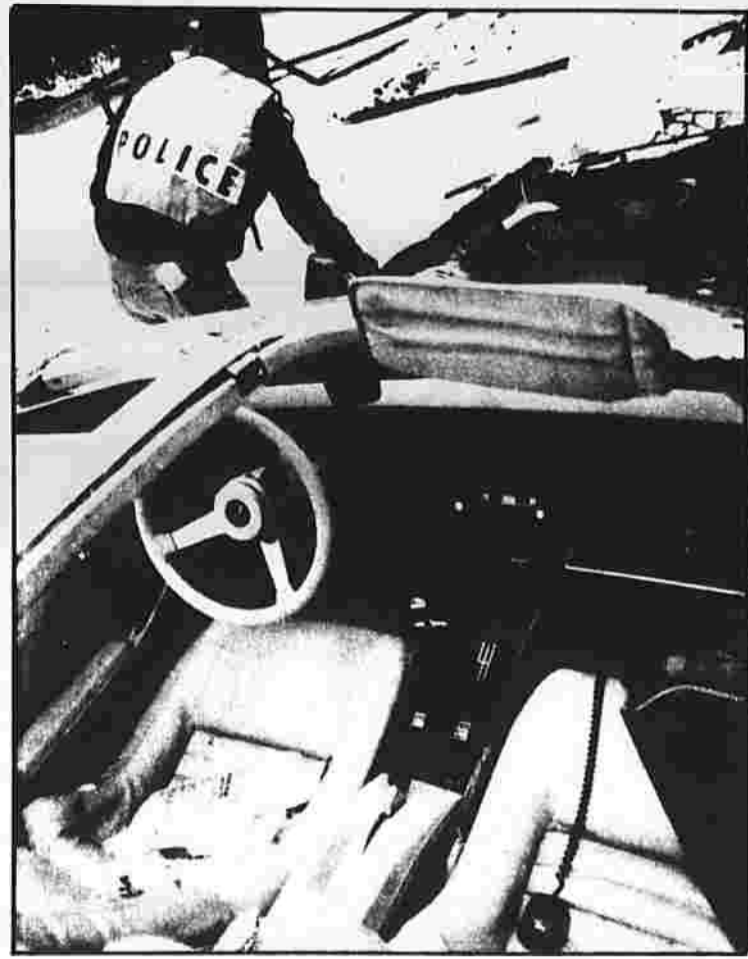

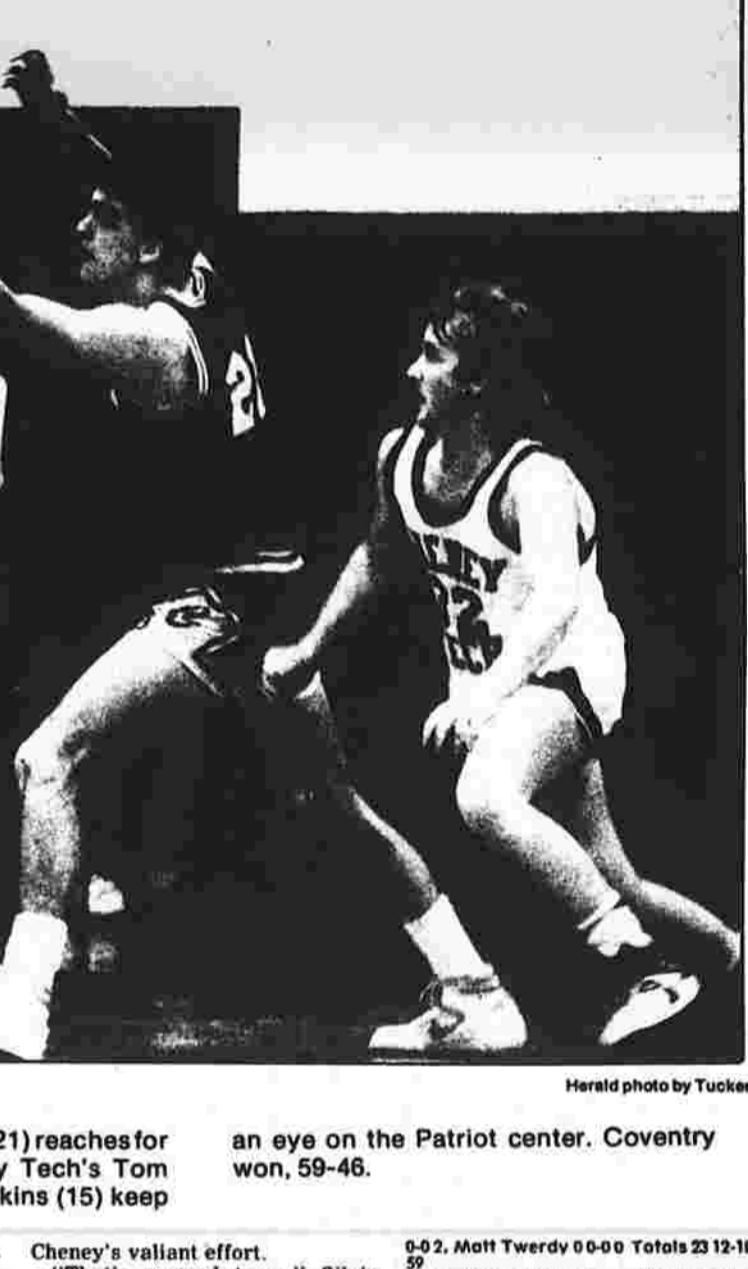
Coventry guard Keith Brault (24) brings the basketball up court as Cheney Tech's Mack Hawkins (15) trails the play.

# Rocket pair suspended by NBA for drug abuse

HOUSTON — Houston Rockets General Manager Ray Patterson now has seen three of his players sidelined by the NBA's stiff anti-drug policy in the past two seasons. On Tuesday, guards Mitchell Wiggins and Lewis Lloyd were banned from the NBA for using cocaine. The move came less than 16 months after guard John Lucas was waived last March 15, after he tested positive for drug use for the second time.

# Stars & Stripes assumes 2-0 lead

FREMANTLE, Australia — After two straight losses to Dennis Comner and Stars & Stripes, skipper Chris Dickson and New Zealand have called time out. For the second straight day, Comner sailed a near-perfect race as Stars & Stripes downed New Zealand by 1 minute, 36 seconds today to take a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven America's Cup Challenger's finals.

After the race, the New Zealand syndicate took the joy they are allowed under the rules and opted not to race Thursday. The series will resume Friday.

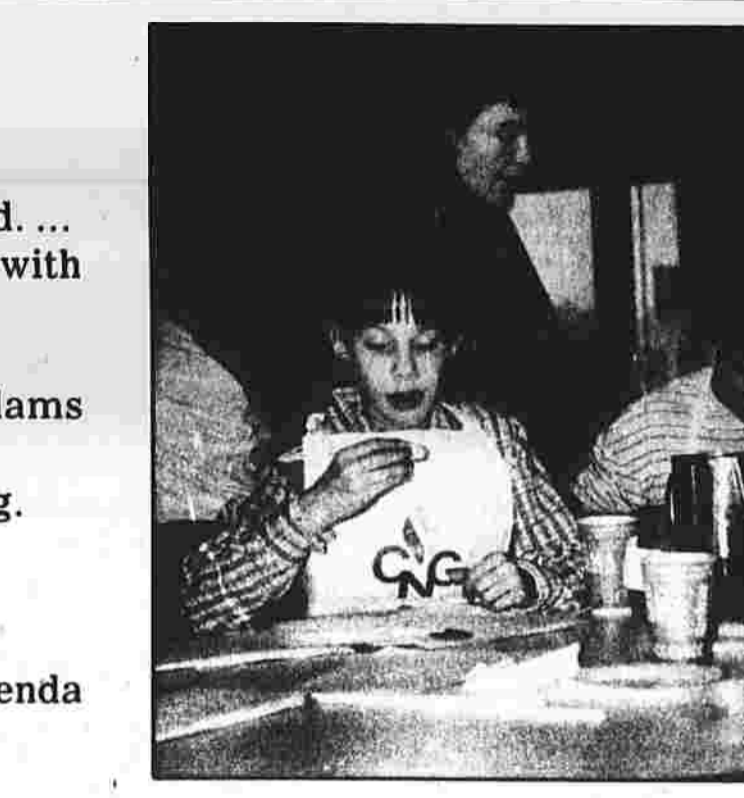

## Terms deal Mafia blow

NEW YORK (AP) — The Mafia has been staggered but not toppled by 100-year prison terms handed to three bosses and four other top mobsters, according to law enforcement officials, who promise unrelenting pressure against the mob.

The heads of the Genovese, Colombo and Lucchese organized crime families were sentenced to 100 years each Tuesday for sitting on a commission of mob leaders that has ruled the Mafia in America since Prohibition.

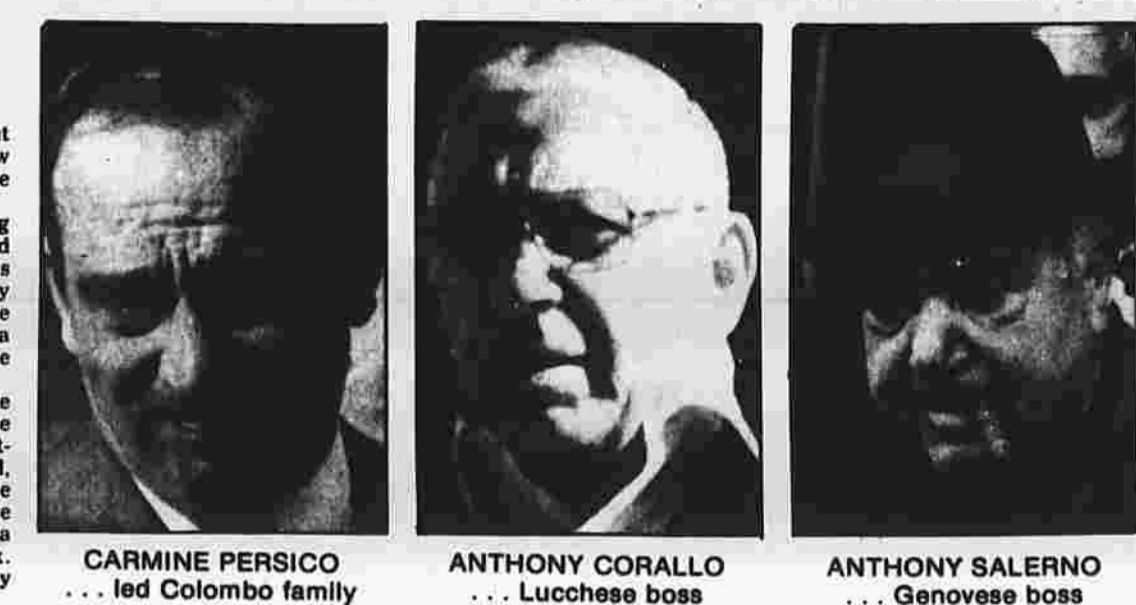
U.S. District Judge Richard Owen also sentenced four other people to 100 years apiece for carrying out the commission's bidding. An eighth defendant was sentenced to 40 years.

"I can't say it's the end of the commission," U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani told a news conference. "But it makes it much more difficult to operate that kind of an operation."

The bosses sentenced to 100 years were Genovese boss Anthony "Fat Tony" Salerno, 76, Carmine "Junior" Persico, 53, head of the Colombo family; and Anthony "Tony Ducks" Corallo, 73, boss of the Lucchese mob.

Giuliani said all would be eligible for parole after 10 years and under federal law cannot have their sentences reduced after serving two-thirds of their sentence — 66 years in the case of those sentenced to 100 years.

"The worst mistake we can make is to declare a final victory," said Thomas L. Sheer, head of the FBI's New York office. "It's the ninth

## IRS goes after thousands who don't bother to file returns

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service is sacking its computers on tax cheats who don't even bother to file returns.

More than 300,000 people who failed to file tax returns for 1984 and who have ignored repeated IRS warnings can expect to be nabbed this year, the agency said. A newly expected and computerized program will create a substitute return for them and then send them a bill for the taxes due.

The high-tech program, which ferreted out 35,000 delinquent taxpayers in a pilot test last year, is expected to bring in more than \$2 billion in taxes, plus penalties and interest, this year. In 1988, the IRS projects \$3.25 billion from 500,000 non-filers.

"People who have been ignoring our notices and letters are going to be in for an unpleasant surprise," William Wauben, an assistant commissioner, told reporters in outlining the program Tuesday.

These cheats are "a hard-core group of folks who have made the decision to drop out of the system," Wauben said. For the most part, he added, they are tax protesters who are driven by greed, not by ideology.

"They're all over," Wauben said. "The income levels typically are in the \$18,000, perhaps \$40,000 level. Income typically consists of wages. They're in a variety of occupations."

## Saudis say diplomat kidnapped in Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A deputy in the Shiite Muslim Amal militia told Anglican Church envoy Terry Waite today that his organization condemns kidnappings, and he advised foreigners against walking on the streets.

A French reporter was kidnapped Tuesday by unidentified gunmen shortly after he took pictures of Waite, who is trying to negotiate the release of foreigners held hostage in Lebanon.

And today in Riyadh, the capital of Saudi Arabia, that Arab kingdom said that Bakr Damjanpour, an employee of its embassy's cultural office in Beirut was kidnapped in west Beirut on Monday night.

The official Saudi Press Agency quoted an unidentified government source as reporting that Saudi authorities learned of the kidnapping from sources in Lebanon. There was no explanation for the delay in reporting the kidnapping.

There was no immediate confirmation in Beirut of the Saudi report.

Waite, who arrived in Beirut on Monday, traveled in a bulletproof white Mercedes to the office of Akef Haidar, Amal's deputy leader. The car was provided by Druse militiamen of Walid Jumblatt's Progressive Socialist Party, who are responsible for the envoy's security.

"We condemn kidnappings," Haidar told Waite in English. "I advise foreigners not to walk on the streets a lot. We as Lebanese have to take precautions in this country."

Haidar, a retired army colonel, said the Lebanese "don't really give much concern when they hear that an American has been kidnapped because Lebanon has been punished without any reason. (President) Reagan is not fair."

He did not elaborate on the remark.

"Amal condemns the kidnapping of French reporter Roger Assouad," Haidar added before beginning his talks with Waite behind closed doors.

Waite, the personal emissary of Archbishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie, has traveled repeatedly to Beirut and other Middle East capitals since 1985 in efforts to win the release of foreigners held hostage.

# Guard stalks sniper

NORTH SMITHFIELD, R.I. (AP) — Roadblocks on rural roads and military police patrolling in combat fatigues were welcome sights for residents living in fear of a night sniper who has struck 11 times, seriously wounding two people.

"Anything that will catch this person will help. It's got to the point where no one wants to stand in front of their windows even in broad daylight," Karol DeLoona, a veterinary assistant in Cumberland, said Tuesday.

"It kind of gives you a feeling of more security. It's getting so dangerous now," said Mary Kennedy, co-owner of a North Smithfield diner.

"Anything anything they can do to stop this man before someone loses a life is worth it, whatever it takes," said Dottie Carrigan, owner of a Cumberland travel agency.

A sniper has attacked 11 times since Dec. 8 in Cumberland, North Smithfield and over the border in Bellingham, Mass., prompting Rhode Island Gov. Edward D. DiPrete to take the unprecedented step Monday of calling out the National Guard to aid in a criminal investigation.

Thirty military police officers carrying rifles and dressed in fatigues studied maps at the Lincoln state police headquarters Tuesday night before piling into Army-green Jeeps.

It was the second night guardsmen assisted state and local police. National Guard Maj. Gen. John W. Kiely remained light-tipped Tuesday about details of the operation. He told a news conference that members of the 43rd Military Police Brigade have the authority to question or arrest suspects.

But he refused to confirm or deny reports from residents that helicopters were being used as part of the Guard's effort. "Our obvious hope is we apprehend the sniper before any more hurt is done," Kiely said.

Two people have been seriously wounded, and a number of bullets have grazed several other targets. In nine cases shots were fired at people through windows of their homes. A shot was fired into a garage and another hit a truck.

Police say they have no suspects but believe one person is responsible. Ballistics tests have confirmed the same gun was involved in the seven North Smithfield shootings. The two Bellingham shootings have been linked to one of the Cumberland incidents, but evidence in those attacks has not been compared to the North Smithfield evidence, according to investigators.

Lt. John R. Loughlin II, a National Guard spokesman, said up to 100 guardsmen, some of whom are reserves called up for the special assignment, are at the disposal of state police. Guardsmen may shoot in self defense, he said.

**Marcos says no cover-up attempted**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Philippine President Ferdinand E. Marcos on Tuesday denied published reports that he or members of his staff were involved in providing documents to disguise the U.S. sale of arms to Iran. Marcos, interviewed at his home in Honolulu on ABC-TV's "Nightline," said the whole story of possible Philippine involvement in the arms deal is "manufactured, fabricated and libelous."



JACK P. MATLOCK JR. urged embassy cuts

# Reagan set to name new ambassador

WASHINGTON — President Reagan is naming Jack P. Matlock Jr., a Russian-speaking career diplomat who urged him to trim the Soviet diplomatic corps in the United States, as the new U.S. ambassador to Moscow, administration officials say.

Matlock, 57, was Reagan's special assistant for Soviet and European affairs at the National Security Council and served as deputy U.S. ambassador in Moscow from 1974 to 1978. He succeeds Arthur A. Hartman, who stepped down last month.

As a presidential adviser, Matlock was a key proponent of Reagan's decision last year to order reductions in the Soviet embassy staff in Washington, the U.N. mission in New York and the consulate in San Francisco as a precaution against espionage.

In all, 80 Soviets were sent home, and a handful of U.S. diplomats likewise were expelled from the Soviet Union, bringing the two sides down to equal diplomatic levels.

The diplomatic feud was touched off by the arrest in August in Moscow of U.S. journalist Nicholas Daniloff on espionage charges.

Tempers finally cooled in this ill-fort-tat diplomacy, but a senior U.S. official speaking only on condition of anonymity said Mor-

day the expulsions had created a "tough situation," forcing abrupt changes in routine for American diplomats in Moscow and causing "some resentment" among them.

Several Soviet specialists at the State Department had recommended a more cautious response than Matlock to the apprehension of Daniloff.

The official said Matlock apparently won out over Harry G. Barnes Jr. and Robert L. Barry, two other Russian-speaking diplomats, and other candidates to succeed Hartman in the prized assignment because his job at the National Security Council had placed him close to the White House.

"He has the language and the experience. I guess Jack had the inside track because he had the access to the White House," the official said.

The Moscow post opened last month when the State Department announced Hartman would retire for "personal reasons." It retracted the statement the next day and Hartman told reporters in Moscow he was leaving immediately so his successor could serve the full two years remaining in the Reagan administration. Speculation immediately centered on Matlock to succeed him.

## Bank T bills are safe from 'Light-Fingered Louie'

**QUESTION:** When we purchase U.S. Treasury bills through our bank we receive a safe-keeping receipt, listing all the information about the T bills — dollar amount, dates, etc.

The back of the receipt states, in part: "Theft, embezzlement, burglary and holdup insurance carried by the bank is in a limited amount... In the event of loss, the amount recovered through insurance will first be applied against the loss of the bank's property and only the excess will be available for pro rata distribution against losses of others. If insurance protection is desired in addition to that carried by the bank, it may be arranged by you with your own insurance company."

Does this mean we should obtain additional insurance to protect against such potential loss?

**ANSWER:** There is absolutely no need to buy such insurance, for the simple reason that your T bills can't be lost through any of the crooked practices mentioned on that receipt.

Your bank does not have physical possession of your T bills. No certificates are printed for T bills. Since 1979, T bills have come only in "book-entry" form — recorded on Federal Reserve or U.S. Treasury Department computers.

Now, if your bank is holding other securities in certificate form for you and you are the extra-cautious type, you might consider buying additional insurance against theft, embezzlement, burglary and holdups. But you would probably be laying out unnecessary money for insurance premiums.

now represents a sizable sum. When the trust was established, a bank failure was almost unheard of. Recently, there have been many bank failures. Should I be worried about the safety of the funds the bank holds in the trust?

**ANSWER:** The property in a trust at a bank — bank accounts, securities, etc. — are not assets of the bank and cannot be claimed by the bank's creditors if the bank goes under.

However, if the trust has deposits at the bank in excess of the federal insurance limit of \$100,000 per depositor, the amount above \$100,000 would not be protected. Check to see where the bank has placed the "sizable sum" in the trust.

**ANSWER:** No. Securities and other property owned by a customer and held by a bank are not part of the bank's assets. If the bank goes belly up, its creditors could not touch your stocks and bonds.

In that situation, your securities would be returned to you. It might take a while for things to be squared away, but you would get your stocks and bonds back.
